> Minutes Meeting #1 September 16, 1969

I. Call to Order

The first meeting of the Fall Semester was called to order at 12:14 p.m. by Chairman Larry Gibson.

II. Roll Call

The clubs absent at the first meeting were: Black Student Union, Christian Varsity, Delta Psi Omega, Engineers Club, Hawaiian Club, Home Economics, Interfaith, Masque & Sandall, Medical Assisting, Spanish Club, Tau Pi Rho, and Young Democrats. New Clubs names not included on the Poll were: English Culture, LDSSA, and the Awareness Club.

III. Approval of Agenda

Several revisions were proposed for the agenda. Corrections were: add Money Making as a separate heading between New Business and Announcements, correct the numbering, and include the approval of the minutes. The agenda was then approved as corrected.

IV. Approval of Minutes

One correction was made on the minutes from Spring semester. The correction consisted of notifying representatives that a continued sentence had been omitted. The minutes were then approved as corrected.

V. Reports

Chairman-Larry Gibson welcomed everyone. He introduced ICC Secretary, Donna Williams; Parliamentarian, Steve Cabot; Advisor, Mr. Canevari; and himself. He proceeded to discuss the problem of the Lost and Found; that it is in need of a supervisor to auction the items. In the binders that were passed out to representatives Larry asked that all clubs fill out the cards for the club accounts in the Student activities Office and turn them in at the next meeting, at which time Larry Gibson will have a nominee.

A motion was then made by the Chairman to a prove newly formed clubs on campus. The motion was seconded. Discussion was held and the motion was then passed.

Parliamentarian -- Steve Cabot read the ICC Code to inform all the representatives of the proper proceedures.

Advisor—Mr. Canevari urged a club to take over the Lost and Found.

The Law Enforcement Department desperately needs a club to auction off the items at a profit. The club would keep half of the money made and the other half would be given to the Dean's Loan and Assistance Fund. A volenteer is needed.

Bank accounts for clubs have to be kept on campus in the Student activities VI. Office. To withdraw money the clubs must make out slips and present them in the office which offers 24 hour service. This account is for the clubs own protection.

Mr. Canevari also stressed the importance of the Account Cards to the members, and the importance of the information sheets and urged the clubs to turn them in as soon as possible.

VI. Old Business

A. Steve Cabot read the rules for the Best Club trophy. The trophy is presented two weeks before dead week. Circle K was the last recipient of the award. Any club can obtain this trophy if it has the desire.

VII. New Business

A. Chris Zeek, representative from Circle K, moved to accept Donna Williams as ICC Secretary and Steve Cabot as Parliamentarian. The motion was seconded and approved.

B. Nominees for ICC Representative to CSA were: Siri Amblem and Chris Zeek. Monimations were then closed and a vote was cast. Chris Zeek was elected to be ICC's Representative.

C. Club Day is the 26th of September. All clubs are urged to get their booths organized.

VIII. Money making Requests

IX. Announcements

I. Call to Order

The second meeting of the Fall Semester was called to order at 12:10 by Chairman Larry Gibson.

II. Flag Salute

III. Roll Call

Absent were representatives from: Delta Psi Omega, Engineers Club, Interfaith, Masque & Sandall, Medical Assisting, Spanish Club, Tau Pt Rho, and Young Democrats.

IV. Approval of Agenda

The agenda was approved as written.

V. Approval of Minutes

The minutes were a proved as written.

VI. Reports

Chairman-Larry Gibson said that all of his reports would be included in New Business.

Parliamentarian--Steve Cabot reminded the clubs that all new constitutions must be turned into him before they are to be presented before ICC.

Representative -- Chris Zeek reported that CSA discussed women visitation, abolishing the Dress Code and made known the different appointments made by Jeff Hess.

Advisor--Mr. Canevari asked SBC and MLC to pick up their checks at the Student Activities Office. All clubs require receipts for club deposits. He asked the officers to be sure that their requests got to the secretary and were not just dropped on the desk.

VII. Old Business

A. Money Making Requests—the two money making requests from WLC and Delphi that were postphoned from last meeting were brought up for debate. Each club stated their qualifications and specific reasons why they should have Homecoming. A motion was made by the Chairman to vote on Homecoming Sponsor. WLC won.

The item of the Lost and Found Auction that was also postphoned was also brought up to a debate. Three clubs competed for this project: Circle K, Christian Varsity, and Alpha Gamma Sigma. After their talks by each club representative as to their qualifications a vote was motioned. A suggestion was made by Buddy Clark to let the three clubs sponsor it together and split the profits but Mr. Canevari stated that the profits were not large enough so it would not be feasible. A vote was held and Circle K was granted the auction.

VIII. New Business

- A. Nominations and election for Off-Campus Speakers Committee—Larry Gibson said that he would have the three students needed on the committee for the next meeting. Mr. Canevari told the representatives that all clubs can have anyone speak to only their club but if they open their meeting to the whole school they then need an Off-Campus Speakers Requisition from ICC. The form is then voted on by the members of the Off-Campus Speakers Committee which consists of three students and three faculty members. The committee will meet when needed.
- B. Approval of Vice-Chairman--Tom Rodella was the Chairman's choice as Vice-Chairman. His qualifications are: he is currently Finance Commissioner and was a former ICC member. Circle K made a motion to approve Tom Rodella as Vice-Chairman. It was seconded. No discussion was held and the vote was cast. Tom was elected as ICC Vice-Chairman.
- C. Club Day-for Club Day requisition forms must be filled out and turned in today. A map will be made showing the locations of the various clubs. The maps can be picked up at the Student Activities Office. There they have a booth which is located in the center of the clubs booths with the official sign-up list. This is in existance so that selectivity does not occur. Pick up for materials is 10:45.

Rich Truax made a motion that ICC back up CSA's requisition to abolish the Dress Code. It was seconded and discussion held. The motion passed.

Chairman Larry Gibson enterained a motion to support also the Kent Hall Proposal. The motion was seconded and discussion held. The motion to support Kent Hall Proposal in CSA passed.

Chris Zeek then moved to accept the changed name of the Christian Varsity Club to the Santa Rosa J.C. Power and Light Company. It was passed.

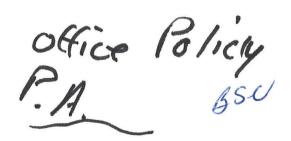

- B. Vice-Chairman: Tom Rodella also talked about his participation in the State Conference. There were 75 resolutions for consideration but both Larry and Tom agreed that the conference could have been handled much faster.
- D. Parliamentarian: Steve Cabot proposed that ICC pass a new constitution from the Chess Club. The chair moved to accept this new constitution for the Chess Club on the recomendations of the Constitution Committee, (which had already a proved the Constitution). The motion passed.

Steve also talked on the Best Club Trophy award which is to be presented on December 16. A committee will determine the club which will be presented with the trophy. Members of the committee are: the Dean of Students, Mr. Canevari, one CSA member and one ICC member. Clubs should present their records of activities next week for consideration. The clubs should include the hours put in and the number of members involved.

Tom Rodella moved to open nominations for a representative from ICC to be on the Best Club Trophy Judging Committee. Chris Zeek was elected.

E. ICC Representative to CSA: Chris Zeek said that CSA talked about the State Conference. He announced that from December 3 to December 19 Circle K is sponsoring a food drive for the needs.

F. Advisor: Mr. Canevari urged the clubs to search through their clubs for some candidates for the coming election.

Mr. Canevari also stressed that the Xerox machine is very expensive to run and that clubs should use the ditto in the Students Activities office first. Club material that is passed out to the student body must have the clubs identification on it.

VII. Old Business

A. Skit Contest: The skit contest was withdrawn because of a lack of participation by the clubs. Instead there will be an outdoor assembly held with a band and a skit from SBC, on December 5.

B. ASB Constitution: The Constitution Committee reviewed the S. R. J. C. Constitution and made several changes but decided against the changes proposed by Mr. Brantingham to make ICC independent of CSA. The ICC provision remains essentially unchanged.

The Associated Students have pledged funds to an investigation committee to consider remodeling or creating a new Bookstore and/or Student Activities Office.

Mr. Canevari also asked the clubs assistance in selling tickets for a Christmas program to be put on by the Music Department on a Monday night. The tickets sell for 50¢ of which ½ will go to the club and ½ to the Dean's Loan and Grant Fund. The event will be held on December 15.
