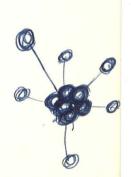

SPECIAL BUDGETS

The following special budget items are to be used, financed, operated, and budgeted as indicated:

SPECIAL PROGRAM SERIES: Customarily a mid-winter program of three or four concerts, plays, operas, or musicals are presented. For this special program series, a budget of from \$2,500 to \$5,000 from the General Funds of the college is established.

An admission therge is made for attendence at this program series in ticket reales and such income that may be derived shall be abated against the expenditures.

A special program series committee composed of day school faculty and evening college administrators organizes and presents the series.

The budget for this series is established by the Board of Trustees of the College upon the recommendation of the president.

MID-DAY SERIES/MID-WEEK MOVIES: These series of presentations is titled for record purposes "Mid-Day Series". It consists of a wide variety of programs presented with one exception (Mid-Week Movies) during the day for students of the college. The series is jointly financed and administered by the college and the associated students. The college portion of the budget from the General Funds is established by the Board of Trustees upon the recommendation of the president and for the associated students by action of the student council through the provision of equally matching funds; presently, in the amount of \$2,000 from each for a total of \$1,000 per year.

\$ 6,000

A Mid-Day Series Committee composed of students and faculty members organizes and presents the programs.

No admission is levied for attendance at the Mid-Day Series. An admission fee is charged to the general public who may attend the Mid-Week Movies. One-half the cost of programs presented during the day is charged against the General Funds of the college; thus, for the day presentation, cas-half is budgeted by the college from the General Funds and cas-half is sumplied from the funds of the associated students.

The Mid-Week Movie Series, a part of the Mid-Day Series Program, is financed and charged as follows:

One-half Associated Students
One-half from the General Fund of the college shared equally by day college.
Mid-Day Series Budget and an Evening College Budget item for that purpose.

The general public may attend the film series upon payment of an admission charge. Income from the films shall be abated against the evening college budget provided for that purpose.

All charges for the college share of the Mid-Day Series/Mid-Week Movies presentations shall be made against the General Fund of the college.

CSP PROGRAM: This involves any other public presentations made by the evening college such as: The Audubon Series, Medical Series Estate Planning, etc., This shall be budgeted under the title "CSP Programs" by the evening college and the reverse from such presentations shall be abated against this budget item.

Please note that these are all General Funds and in no way are to become a part of the Community Service Program's Special Tax.

DRAMA PRESENTATION: Occasional budgets may be established by the administration in cooperation with the associated students for the presentation of special dramatic or musical productions. Funds to come from the associated students and general funds of the college on a ratio to be agreed on each production.

PARLIAMENTARY PROCEDURE Based upon Sturgis Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedure

Introduction:

The basic reason for having any standard procedure is to dispose of the business before the assembly as quickly, efficiently, and justly as possible. The most important principles underlying parliamentary procedure are the following:

1. Parliamentary rules exist to facilitate the transaction of business and to promote cooperation and harmony.

2. The vote of the majority decides.

3. All members have equal rights which must be protected.

4. All members have equal rights, privileges, andoobligations.

- 5. Full and free discussion of every proposition presented for decision is an established right.
- 6. The simplest and most direct procedure for accomplishing a purpose should be followed.

7. Motions have a definite and logical order of precedence.

8. Every member has the right to know at all times what question is before the assembly and what its effect will be.

9. Only one question can be considered at a time.

10. Those to whom power is delegated must be chosen by democratic processes.

Definitions:

- 1. Motion-A proposal submitted to an assembly for its consideration and introduced by the words, "I move that..."
 - a. Main motion—a motion presenting a subject to an assembly for discussion and decission.
 - b. Subsidiary motion—a motion which may be applied to a main motion in order to modify, delay or dispose of the main motion.
 - c. Privileged motion—a motion affecting the comfort or convenience of the assembly or one of its members, and having the highest order of precedence.

d. Incidental motion—a motion relating to questions which arise incidentally out of the business, or order or manner of considering the business of an assembly.

- 2. Pending—A question is said to be a Pending Question when it is before the assembly and has not yet been voted upon. The Immediately Pending Question is the last question proposed when several questions are on the floor, and it is the first question that the assembly must decide.
- 3. Previous Questions—A motion made to close debate upon a matter of business and to have a mote taken at once upon the immediately pending questions. It requires a two-thirds vote and the correct form is, "Mr. Chairman, I call the Previous question."
- 4. Put the Question-The Chair asks for a vote on the question seeing that there is no more relevant discussion on the question.

Methods of Conducting Business by Sturgis and other parliamentary codes-

The most common means of introducing business to the gathered assembly is the motion. In the case of receiving committee reports, etc. it is no required to make a formal motion.

In order to make a motion, the speaker must be recognized by the chair. An example of the procedure of making a motion follows:

There are four main parts to this docket that will be of importance today. The green sheets deal with the presentation and the mock meeting. The white sheets are a summary of Sturgis, and a very general outline of forms to use. The yellow sheet is a chart that will be very valuable in this meeting, as well as in day to day use. The pink and blue sheets deal with the mock meeting and are correct forms of written items to be considered.

The Parliamentarian and any other officers of C.S.A. will be glad to discuss Sturgis Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedure and the possibility of future meetings like this with you. This is not meant to be substituted for a more formal knowledge of Sturgis through reading or through a class in parliamentary procedure. Please help this meeting, by your questions and discussion to be a helpful meeting for you.

- Form: "I appeal the discision of the chair" or I appeal from the decision of the chair."
- c. Other incidental motions should use form accepted by chairman and parliamentary.

ALL STATEMENTS DIRECTED TO THE CHAIR SHOULD, IN MOST INSTANCES, BE PRECEDED BY THE JORDS, "MR. CHAIRMAN, MR. PRESIDENT, OR MADAME CHAIRMAN!

Mr. A: (rising and addressing the Chair): "Me. Chairman." Chairman: "Mr. A."

Mr. A: "I move that this club undertake a campaign to raise funds for the purchase of the property adjoining our clubhouse."

Mr. B: (without rising): "I second the motion. "

Chairman: "It has been moved and seconded that this organization undera campaign to raise funds for the purchase of the property which adjoins our clubhouse. Is there any discussion?"

Discussion of the motion is then in order.

All motions should be addressed to the chair in similiar fashion. Many motions do not need seconds and are not debatable. These motions along with all other motions are listed in order of precedence on the yellow sheet accompanying this leaflet.

Secondary motions to the main motion may be proposed and discussed. If a question incidental to the business arises, it becomes immediately pending question and must be disposed of before returning to the main motion.

Voting takes place when all debate has ceased. The chair asks, "Are you ready for the question?" If it is clear that no one objects, he then puts the question. Voting may take place in one of eight ways. The most important of these are: voice vote, rising vote, count vote (show of hands), roll call, ballot, and unanimous consent.

This is just a small part of the many rules that must be followed in order to conduct an effective and orderly assembly. However, the codes of parliamentary law are flexible and mmay be changed slightly to elevate unwanted formalities in certain assemblies.

I refer anyone interested in the orgazization and procedure of assemblies to Sturgis Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedure. This will help you to understand many of tye things which I have not included here and some of the things that I have only lightly touched on. I hope that this paper will help you in your meetings, to understand and simplify procedures and the handling of business. I would appreciate any questions on this or on Sturgis and its relationship to running your club, I.C.C. or other meetings.

CONTRIBUTING EFFECTIVELY TO A MEETING

The success of the democratic group depends on you as much as it does the leader. To do your part, you should participate intelligently. The following suggestions may help you to be more effective.

- 1. Speakeyour mind freely The discussion meeting is yours. It is a chance for you to say what you think. Say it! Here, everyone's ideas are worth just as much as the others fellow's. Remember that nobody else has your background and experience.
- 2. Listen critically and thoughtfully to others Try hard to understand the other man's point of view-see what experience and thinking it rests on. Don't always accept ideas immediately, for they might not have sound bases. Remember, however, that there are always several points of view.
- 3. Don't monopolize the discussion Try to LIMIT YOUR COMMENTS TO A MINUTE OR SO AT A TIME. Make your point in as few words as possible and then pass the ball to someone else. Remember it doesn't matter who carries the ball, as long as it is carried in a forward direction.
- 4. Don't let the discussion get away from you If you don't understand where it is going, say so! Ask for examples, illustrations, until you do understand.
- 5. Indulge in friendly disagreement When you find that you're on the other side of the fence from the discussion, say so and tell why. But do so in a friendly manner. Sound conclusions are the goal, and good-humor discussion leads part way there.
- 6. Come to the meeting with questions in mind Frequently your points are accepted more freely if you phrase them in the form of a question.

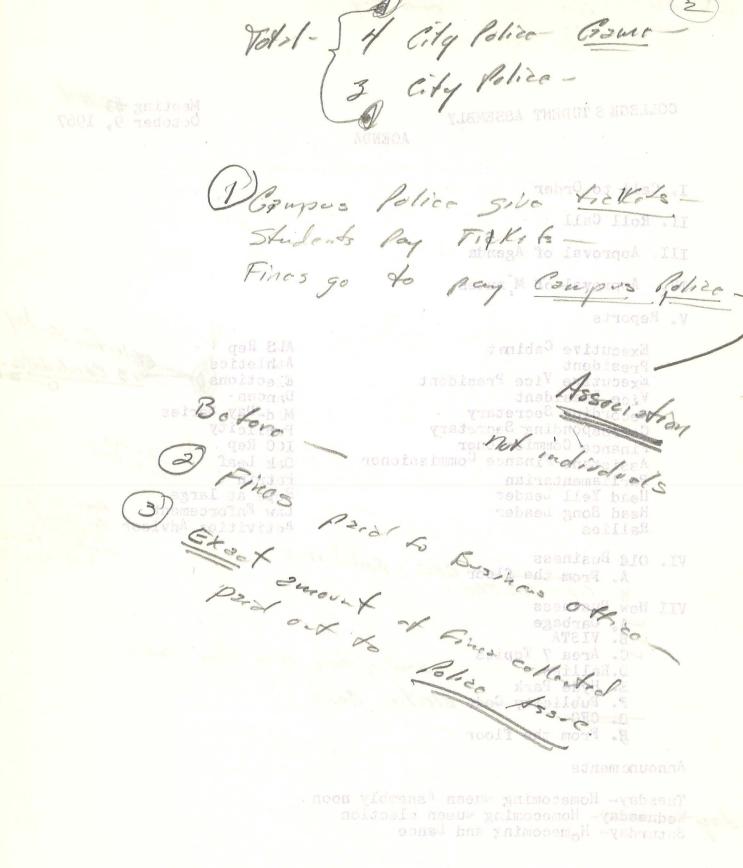

ASSOCIATED STUDENTS OF SANTA ROSA JUNIOR COLLEGE

ELECTION CODE

- SECTION 1. The Elections Committee shall be composed of the following: Elections Commissioner as chairman, Executive Vice President, one Representative-At-Large and other members deemed necessary by the committee chairman.
 - A. If any members of the committee shall be a candidate in an election, the President shall appoint a temporary replacement to serve only for that election.
- SECTION 2. The Elections Committee shall serve as the governing body over all general and special elections.
 - A. A general election is that in which candidates for Associated Student offices, Homecoming and Bear Fair queens and Bear Fair Ugly Man are elected.
 - B. A special election is that in which the College Student Assembly announces an election for purposes other than the above.
- SECTION 3. Any Santa Rosa Junior College student who has purchased an Associated Student membership card shall be eligible to cast one ballot.
- SECTION 4. The College Student Assembly shall determine the exact dates of the regular and special Associated Student elections.
 - A. Elections for Associated Student President, Executive Vice President, Vice President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary shall not be later than three weeks prior to the end of the semester or before eight weeks prior to the end of the semester.
 - B. The election for Head Song Leader and Head Yell Leader shall be during the Spring semester preceding the term of office and held on the same day as the general election for other Associated Student offices.
 - C. Election for Representatives-At-Large for the Fall Semester shall not be later than four weeks and not before two weeks after the Fall semester begins. Spring semester election for Representatives-At-Large shall be conducted on the same day as the general election for other Associated Student officers for the Spring semester. All Associated Student members may vote for eight Representatives-At-Large, four to be Sophomores and four to be Freshmen.
- SECTION 5. Casting of the votes shall take place over a one day period, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. and not less than two polling places will be in operation during this time. At the discretion of the Elections Committee one polling place may be located inside the cafeteria.

- SECTION 6. A candidate for all offices must be in regular attendance without academic probation status.
 - A. All elected members of the College Student Assembly must be able to attend College Student Assembly meetings every Monday from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m.
 - B. All candidates, unless enrolled for the first semester of college, must have a 2.0 grade average the semester prior to the semester being nominted in.
 - C. All candidates must have a 2.0 grade average during the semester in which elected in order to take office the following semester.
 - D. Candidates for all offices, except Representatives-At-Large must have completed twelve units or more at Santa Rosa Junior College before taking office.
 - E. Candidates for President shall have had at least two successive semesters of academic work and twenty unites or more at Santa Rosa Junior College prior to taking office.
- SECTION 7. All candidates must have read and be familiar with the Associated Students of Santa Rosa Junior College Constitution and all Codes and Statutes.
- SECTION 8. Candidates for Head Yell Leader and Head Song Leader shall declare the names of their assistants at the time of filing for nomination and present a statement of good health signed by a physician for all assistanta, Head Yell Leader and Head Song Leader.
- SECTION 9. No person may run for more than one Associated Student office in a given semester.
- SECTION 10. Nominations for office shall be by petition.
 - A. Petitions may be obtained from the Activities Office no earlier than fifteen days before the election and returned to the Activities Office no later than five days before the election.
 - B. Petitions shall include the name, address, phone number, office sought and class schedule and must be signed by at least 75 Associated Student members.
 - C. All petitions shall be checked by the Elections Commissioner to be sure the candidate is eligible.
 - D. In the event a minimum of two petitions is not filed for one office with the Activities Office by deadline date, the College Student Assembly may, by majority vote, nominate eligible candidates.

- SECTION 17 Candidates may use the Activities Office duplication machine at no cost.
- SECTION 18 There will be no campaigning the day of election within fifteen feet of the polls.
- SECTION 19 No more than \$25.00, including contributions, may be spent for one campaign for each candidate.
 - A. All candidates or their compaign manager must file in writing to the Election Commissioner within three weeks after the election a detailed report of expenses of their campaign.
 - B. No candidate for office may use photographs for campaign purposes except for Bear Fair and Homecoming Queen candidates. On these occasions, photographs of each club's candidate may be used for campaign purposes only.
 - C. If a candidate is found to have spent more than \$25.00, or has filed a false statement of expenses, this shall be sufficient grounds for either disqualification of candidacy or removal from office. In the event a candidate is removed from office under this Section, the provisions of Section 20 shall apply.
- SECTION 20. It shall be the duty of the Elections Commissioner to regulate campaigning and disqualify any candidate found by the Commissioner to be in violation of any rules or regulations of the Associated Students.
 - A. Any candidate disqualified may appeal the decision of the Commissioner to the College Student Assembly within eight days after the decision of the Elections Commissioner. A two-thirds vote of the College Student Assembly members voting shall reinstate the candidate.
 - (1) If a candiate is disqualified and then reinstated, but after the election, the President shall declare the election for the office void and a special election shall be held within ten days after reinstatement.
 - B. The Elections Commissioner shall inform the President in writing of any protests of violations by any student to or on the Elections Committee, within twenty-four hours after the protest has been made.

MOTION FOR THE CREATION OF A "HYDE PARK" CODE

I move that the President shall cause to have created a code concerning public speaking events. commonly known as "Hyde Park" events, for the Santa Rosa Jr. College community. Such code is to be concerned with policies and facilities. creation and mechanics of the "Hyde Park" idea on campus.

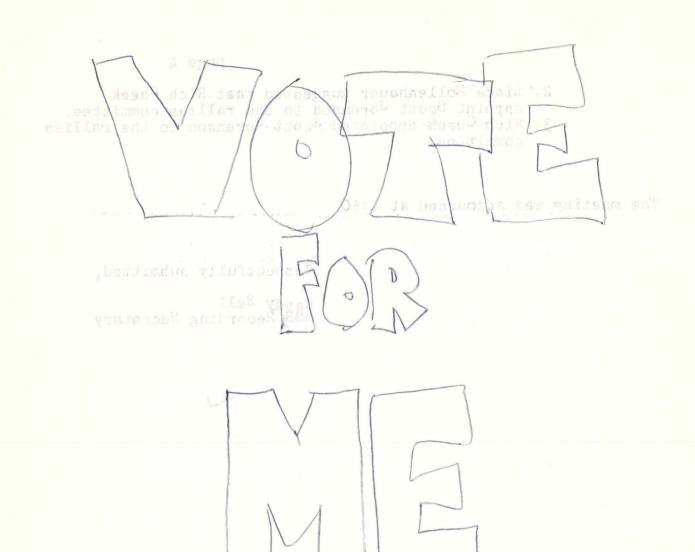

REPORT

My first encounter with the California Federation of Colleges this semester was somewhat puzzling inthat the same group of hardworking people I met last semester struck me as very passive and lazy at this first meeting.

I went to the meeting with high spirits and expected to find all the member colleges there and I also expected them to have many new ideas and plans for the coming semester. What I found was very disheartening. The chairman, Dave Harrington, had a lot of great ideas, but he didn't know how to make them workable. He was open for suggestions but he got off the track when Rich began asking him questions about the organizational aspects of C.F.C.

Dave Harrington was, indeed, a very poor choice for the chairmanship of C.F.C. At the last meeting of the spring semester, when we elected Dave as chairman, he asked for summer delegates from each college so that we could hold summer meetings. I waited all summer for one of these meetings but I didn't hear from them again until they called the first meeting a few weeks ago. This one particular point started me to wondering whether or not C.F.C. would go down the tube under the leadership of Dave Harrington.

The few colleges that were represented at the first meeting (Santa Rosa, Merritt, Marin, and Laney) did seem to have good ideas for consideration this semester, but those ideas and the ideas of the chair didn't seem to be able to work together under the framework of C.F.C.

When I heard that Dave had resigned and that Phil Bechtel had been appointed temporary chairman, I became more optimistic for the future of C.F.C. Under Phil last semester, C.F.C. really moved. They held regular meetings and had a written agenda and information sheets for every meeting. In other words, every meeting was planned out in advance and every subject on the agenda was covered in depth, and when we were finished with an item on the agenda everyone knew what was coming off.

I couldn't give you a report on the second meeting because I didn't attend it, but on the whole, with a new chairman, I think that C.F.C. will again become a very workable organization and I hope that you decide to join C.F.C.

REPORT ON CALIFORNIA FEDERATION OF COLLEGES (C.F.C.)

I have tried to evaluate the worth of the California Federation of Colleges fairly and without bias. My approach was somewhat clinical and therefore I feel that my conclusions bear validity. In all cases my decisions have been made free from emotional consideration.

In reveiwing the purpose for the existence of C.F.C., that of providing a meaningful base for the exchange of ideas, cooperative effort, and mutual economic, educational, and political benefit, a need is net that is now lacking for members of the Associated Student Body here at Santa Rosa Junior College. Our membership in the California Junior College Student General Assembly (C.J.C.S.G.A.) does not afford us the opprtunities for these privileges and responsibilities except in an indirect way: The purpose of CJCSGA being mainly the development of student leadership and commerce of general information. Its political activities are limited to a filtering up process thru its parent organization composes of faculty.

Concerning the operation of the C.F.C., meetings are held with more frequency than any other college association. C.F.C. neets monthly, thereby allowing for more innediate remedial action for campus problems and fuller benefits from economic and educational implementation, whereas CJCSGA meets only once per semester, thus being an ineffective instrument for college dialogue. Although CFC is small, it should grow rapidly.

The current internal make-up of C.F.C. seems to call for some meaningful overhauling. Certain areas of its constitution are vague and need strength. I feel that this is not unusual for a reletively young organization, or unamendable.

Therefore, I recommend, as a member of the C.F.C. investigation team, that C.S.A. approve the payment of our semester dues to the California Federation of Colleges.

REPORT

At the first meeting of CFC at Marin, I was very disappointed with what took place. But through much discussion in the committee, we decided to attend another meeting to see if CFG was in fact, an organization and not just a small group of college students getting together just to air their views on many different and alienated fields including items pertaining to State legislation.

At the recent CFC meeting that the committee went to, I was not impressed. One big falisay was that if tye delegates passed any business at CFC, it would not be bluding on their member colleges until they respected college student government

As the meeting progressed, the Chairman resigned his post. Before doing so, he tried to push through an election for a permanent chairman to take his place. Thanks to our Presidents objections, CFC elected a temporary chairman. After the temporary chairman was elected, the meeting progressed (and I use that term loosely).

There was absolutely no order whatsoever at that CFC meeting. Everything brought up was a hodge-podge of ideas and resolutions. Some delegates, including the temporary chairman, seemed to like the use of profain four letter words to add impact to their oratories.

After reading over CFC's constitution, I have come to the conclusion that it is a farse with very many loopholes.

At one part of the meeting a point was brought up as to why CFC has not expanded to got more colleges to subscribe over the past two years. Their reply was that they did not have a strong foundation either economically or otherwise. But later in the meeting, with this weak foundation still in mind, CFC tried to accomplish business such as sending representatives to San Francisco to a meeting on tuition with the iden that CFC was strong enough to vote a worthwhile opinion.

One thing that showed itself strongly was that CFC is still strongly politically oriented.

It was the general concensus of the committee that if we send delegates to CFC, we would gain enough power to rewrite their constitution and change the general attitude of CFC to not become politically oriented but more economically oriented. I personally believe that we will not have this power because of strong blocks from certain member colleges who want to keep CFC the way it has been in the past.

CALIFORNIA FEDERATION of COLLEGES REPORT

On attending California Federation of Colleges it is in my opinion that they need organization, but they do have the ability to become a well organized body and a benefit to Santa Rosa Junior College. I made this statement in the light of this year since I have had no previous relations with C.F.C.

C.F.C. is now in the process of getting organized with the intention of devoting their time to a 40-40-20 system. This means 40% of their time devoted to economical gains to the schools in C.F.C. For an example, a top name band who charges \$2,000.00 for a performance will be hired to perform for all six (6) schools (in succession) in C.F.C. for \$10,000.00 This will be an economic gain to us here at Santa Rosa Junior College.

The next 40% of time is devoted to helping each other to attain their needs in their own college communities. For an example, to do a case study on giving college credit (units) to student leaders (C.S.A.)

The last 20% of time is devoted to political gains. For an example, it was brought up at the last meeting to write a resolution to have a general meeting of the Area Presidents to pick the topics of CJCSGA instead of the President of CJCSGA piking the topics for the agenda.

C.F.C. meets monthly to discuss problems of the various college communities, plus other benefits previously discussed. At the present time there are six (6) colleges attending C.F.C. These colleges are: Solano, Contra Costa, Laney, Merritt, Marin and Santa Rosa. It is the feeling of the other five (5) colleges that C.F.C. is an asset to their college.

Lets back up a little and discuss what makes a good organization..

Of course, a good chairman is essential, but without a body the chair does not function correctly. What makes a body? A body consists of members

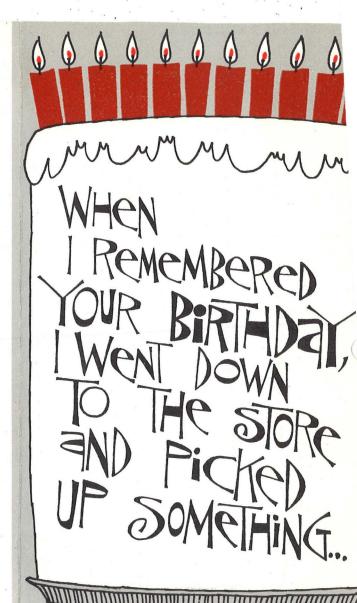

Hyde Park Code

Section I - Purpose

The purpose of this code shall be to establish on campus times, places facilities and opportunities for free speech for the Santa Rosa Junior College community.

2 *Agde Park* facility -7

Section II - Control

Control of the Hyde Park program shall be vested with the Assembly Commissioner of the Associated Student Body, or in his absence the Student Activities Advisor.

Section III - Activities Covered

- A) Formal
 - 1. Speeches
 - 2. Orations
 - 3. Debates
 - 4. Lectures
- B) Informal
 - 1. Discussions
 - 2. Statements
 - 3. Presentations
 - 4. Questions

Section IV - Place

The place designated for these activities shall be on the landing in front of the Doyle Student Center (coop).

Section V - Time

- A) Facilities shall be made available on all days of regularly scheduled classes.
- B) The time for these activities shall commence at noon and remain available for no less than one (1) hour.

Section VI - Equipment

Equipment for Hyde park shall consist of the following:

- A) lectern or podium
- B) A sign denoting "HYDE PARK" to designate the place
- C) A sign outlining the rules of courtesy and notice of individual responsibility for slanderous statements.
 - D) No power amplification equipment is to be permitted.

Section VII - Monitoring

The facilities are not to be monitored except that the Assembly Commissioner shall have the authority to examine the credentials of any speaker to determine his or her eligibility to use the facilities.

Section VIII - Eligibility

The use of Hyde Park facilities shall be limited to the following persons.

- A) Any student enrolled in at least one day course in which at least one unit of credit is given at SRJC.
- B) Any member of the SRJC faculty.
- C) Any member of the Administration or Board of Trustees.
- D) Any member of the classified staff of the college.

Section IX - Rules of Courtesy

- A) Five minutes shall be deemed a maximum courteous time for speaking if others desire to use facilities.
- B) Persons should show care for the equipment provided, not damaging, altering or removing.

Section X - Rules of Slander

A copy of a statement by the Sonoma County Council concerning 'fair play' and slander shall be reproduced, and made available to each speaker using Hyde Park facilities. Copies shall be made available at the lecturn and at the Student Activities Office.

Section XI - Misc. Policies

- A) Activities are not required to be scheduled, however, notification of planned speeches, etc. to the Assemblies Commissioner can be made for coordination purposes.
- B) Any eligible person may commence to use Hyde Park facilities at any time during its operation, on a first come first serve basis.

Section XII - Effective Date and RepealeF

- A) This code shall be in effect the first Monday after sanctioned Stole-Asby both the College Student Assembly and the Dean of Instruction.
- B) This code may be repealed by a majority vote of the College Student Assembly. or by written notice from the Dean of Instruction.

DELETE ADD Rights of Free Speech statement: (In order to insure the proper use of a Hyde Park policy users of this means of communication are guaranteed the rights of free speech and care shall be taken to see that these rights are not abused. Additionally, the rights of other members of the community shall not be abused by the users of Hyde Park in the name of free speech.)

Section VIII - Eligibility

The use of Hyde Park facilities shall be limited to the following persons.

- A) Any student enrolled in at least one day course in which at least one unit of credit is given at SRJC.
- B) Any member of the SRJC faculty.
- C) Any member of the Administration or Board of Trustees.
- D) Any member of the classified staff of the college.

Section IX - Rules of Courtesy

- A) Five minutes shall be deemed a maximum courteous time for speaking if others desire to use facilities.
- B) Persons should show care for the equipment provided, not damaging, altering or removing.

Section X - Rules of Slander

A copy of a statement by the Sonoma County Council concerning 'fair play' and slander shall be reproduced, and made available to each speaker using Hyde Park facilities. Copies shall be made available at the lectern and at the Student Activities Office.

Section XI - Miscellaneous Policies

- A) Activities are not required to be scheduled; however, notification of planned speeches, etc., to the Assemblies Commissioner can be made for coordination purposes.
- B) Any eligible person may commence to use Hyde Park facilities at any time during its operation, on a first come, first serve basis.

Section XII - Effective Date and Repeal DELETE and ADD Adoption, Revision, and Repeal

- A) This code shall be in effect the first Monday after sanctioned by both the College Student Assembly and the Dean of Instruction

In order to insure the proper use of a Hyde Park policy, users of this means of communication are guaranteed the rights of free speech and care shall be taken to see that these rights are not abused. Additionally, the rights of other members of the community shall not be abused by the users of Hyde Park in the name of free speech.

It is expected that the privileges, responsibilities, and limitations imposed by the Hyde Park Code will be observed by all users of the facility. Lewd or obscene conduct violates the report of free speech. It is the obligation of the President of the Associated Students, the Activities Advisor, and the Dean of Students, or their duly designated representative, to require observance of the Hyde Park Code.

Section VIII - Eligibility

The use of Hyde Park facilities shall be limited to the following persons:

- A) Any student enrolled in at least one day course in which at least one unit of credit is given at Santa Rosa Junior College.
