CSA — COLLEGE STUDENT ASSEMBLY — *The main legislative body of the Associated Students composed of all Associated Students elected and appointed officers.*

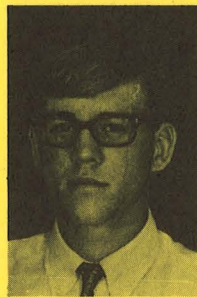

Units for Student Government Participation Proposal

This body is petitioning for the addition of a course in student government.

We would like to see the initiating of a course in which:

1. One (1) unit of transferable credit will be given upon completion of one semester as an office holder for the Associated Students.
2. This course should be graded on a credit or non-credit system
3. The course and grade should be administered by the Student Activities Advisor on the basis of attendance at C.S.A. meetings.
4. This course should apply to both elected and appointed officers who have held their office since the first month of the semester.
5. This course may be repeated for no more than four (4) units.

Our reasons for requesting such a course are:

1. Holding an associated studentbody office is not only a responsibility, but also, a course which teaches
 - a. the workings of a government
 - b. parliamentary procedure
 - c. public relations
 - d. organization
2. The amount of time required of an office holder often exceeds that of a normal two (2) or three (3) unit course.
3. Much of the work involving student government is done during school time.
4. Out of eighty-one (81) "junior colleges" in California forty-two (42) colleges already offer course credit for holding office. Attached is a list of those colleges offering units for participation in Student Government. Thirty-seven (37) colleges do not offer credit and two (2) colleges did not report.

It is appropriate that we consider College Hour at this time, as the present hours were set up for a one year trial basis -- a year and a half ago.

The proposal before you from the Curriculum and Instruction Committee is recommended for a one year trial period as before.

This proposal has been considered by and recommended by:

The proposal from the Student Affairs Committee which has been passed on to the Faculty Council is attached.

There seem to be two basic reasons for asking for a change from T-Th 12:00 - 1:00 to M-W-F 12:00 - 1:00.

The calendar has become increasingly crowded. Next Fall there are fourteen (14) Thursdays available.

The following presentations are anticipated:

4 or 5 Mid-Day Series
6 or 8 Open Forum (8 dates have already been requested)
2 Faculty Lecture Series
1 Freshman Welcome Assembly
1 Homecoming Queen Assembly
2 Associated Student's Election Assemblies
1 AWS Women's Introductory Hour
1 Christmas Program (Music Dept.)
2 Associated Student's Entertainment Programs

Next Spring the situation is much the same. There are fifteen (15) Thursdays with fourteen (14) of these being usable. In the Spring of 1969 the following presentations are anticipated:

5 Mid-Day Series
6 or 8 Open Forum (8 dates requested)
2 Faculty Lecture Series
1 Associated Student's Election Assembly
1 Assembly Hour for Values in Life Week
1 Bear Fair Queen Assembly
2 Associated Student's Entertainment Programs

As you can see, the calendar is extremely crowded. We find ourselves in the position of being forced to schedule activities that conflict and compete with each other. We also are unable to take advantage of additional desirable presentations which might be made available to us during a given semester.

The second basic reason for this proposal is that there are more students on campus on M-W-F than T-Th. It is hoped that with a change, the presentations would reach a larger student audience.

It has been proposed by some to use Tuesday 12-1:00 for presentations and force the clubs to find some other time for their meetings. I cannot accept this solution.

In a time when there is less and less student loyalty to the college as an institution, the clubs stand as a block of students willing to demonstrate their support of this institution.

In the last year and a half, the number of active clubs on campus has almost doubled. There are thirty (30) faculty members involved with clubs as faculty advisors, thus demonstrating their belief in the worth of these clubs.

The following is a break-down of clubs and their purposes:

In addition to the general purposes stated above, the clubs serve the college and students in a variety of ways. Below are some illustrative examples:

- Provide a wide range of leadership opportunities
- Curriculum-oriented clubs add an extra dimension to the curriculum
- Promote an on-campus blood drive
- Participate as guides on college night
- Provide ushers for drama productions
- Supply a large portion of the labor and activities for Homecoming
- Provide scholarships for S.R.J.C. Nursery School children
- Provide labor and toys for the Clearwater Ranch for mentally disturbed children

I feel strongly that forcing clubs to meet at a time other than one of the "College Hours" would sound the death knell for many of them.

I would ask you to consider carefully the importance to students of the extra-curricular presentations and activities as they relate to College Hour. I urge your support of the proposed change.

E. S. CANEVARI

Upon the suggestion of the College Student Assembly, the Student Affairs Committee has evaluated the one year trial of the Tuesday-Thursday noon College Hours. That experiment was instituted under the auspices of various student-faculty-administrative committees last spring, and the review of the policy that follows was mandated at the time of the initiation of the experiment.

The College Student Assembly has recommended that the College Hours be increased to three hours weekly by scheduling free noon hours Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. These hours would replace the Tuesday-Thursday hours presently scheduled. In the opinion of the Dean of Instruction, the re-scheduling would be possible, though it would mean some loss of class space and time would occur. Mr. Tauzer was unable to estimate exactly how much, as scheduling problems vary from semester to semester. He did assert that the time would have to be made up by scheduling either 8:00 a.m. or 2:00 p.m. and later classes on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday or by increasing hour to hour-and-a-half sessions on Tuesdays and Thursdays. He also estimated that at present approximately fifteen instructors would be affected by the change, and the Student Affairs Committee has agreed that the fifteen will be notified so that they may speak to the faculty body considering the proposal.

In arguing the proposal the following reasons for extension of hours have been offered:

1. The number of student clubs has doubled in the last two years. At present over 400 students belong to clubs, most of which meet weekly on Tuesday. That day, then, is almost entirely devoted to club activity. Because of an exceptionally crowded calendar, Open Forum -- for one -- has been forced to schedule programs in conflict with club meetings, thus potentially limiting its attendance severely.
2. Next year, the fiftieth anniversary of the College, promises to bring an increased budget to various college programs. These programs -- the Mid-Day Series, the Open Forum, C.S.A., special programs, and rallies -- are now in sharp competition for free Thursday hours. Next year's expansion of College Hour offerings will make conflict-free scheduling impossible.
3. As the student population increases, educational experiences shared by all the students increase in importance. College-wide programs provide the student with a means of communication that increasing numbers limit. The usefulness of the programs and good attendance should increase in importance as a matter of value to the curriculum. Monday-Wednesday-Friday re-scheduling will allow the greater number of students on campus on those days the choice to attend College Hour offerings.
4. The proposal has the endorsement of those committees presently vying for the most time -- the Open Forum, the Mid-Day Series, the College Student Assembly and campus clubs.

5. Open Friday noon hours would allow the College Student Assembly to schedule rallies on the day that the athletic event is to take place and might, therefore, improve the currently poor attendance at these events.

Upon reviewing these and other reasons offered for increasing the hours devoted to college programs, the Student Affairs Committee recommends this proposal and forwards it to interested college committees for their consideration. Hopefully a decision can be made before March 8 so that the Dean of Instruction can schedule for the fall semester.

S.R.J.C. *** ASB Publicity Code

CANEVARI

PURPOSE: The purpose of this code is to provide more orderly, pleasing and effective publicity, and at the same time retain the beauty at the SRJC campus.

DEFINITION: "Poster" is construed to mean any means of conveying messages other than by machines. "Publicity Machine" is construed to mean any electrical viewing device and any other object used for publicity except posters.

Section I - Content

Clause I Posters and publicity machines will deal with information of general interest, to faculty, administration, and students originating with student groups (clubs, organizations and Associated Students).

Clause II Posters and publicity machines will deal with election announcements (see election rules), events of clubs and organizations, dances, assemblies, athletic events, Mid-Day series, Open Forum, Academic Department announcements and events, and others at the discretion of the Publicity Commissioner or the Advisor of Student Activities.

Section II - Approval

Clause I All posters and publicity machines must be approved before posting.

This may be done in the office of Student Activities by the Publicity Commissioner, his delegated representative, or by the Advisor of Student Activities. Posters which are not approved will be removed.

Clause II Approval of posters and publicity machines will be made depending on appropriateness as to size and content.

Section III - Placement

Clause I In general, all posters will be confined to the area in front of Doyle Center across the campus to the north side of the Auditorium and from the front of Analy Hall west across the campus to the circle drive. Other

(Section III - Clause I Con't.)

areas for publicity will be considered at the discretion of the Publicity Commissioner or the Advisor or Student Activities.

Clause II The brick fountain, area in front of Bailey Hall, and the interior of the Cafeteria will be used on occasion by the Publicity Commissioner only, or his designated agent, for publicizing an ASB activity or Event of such importance to be of interest to the campus community as a whole.

Clause III The four brick columns in the cafeteria, up to the ceiling of the inside terrace room and the four outside brick columns on the south wall of the cafeteria, (outside only) up to the overhang, may be used for publicity by the Publicity Commissioner or his designated agent. -- No handbills or leaflets may be distributed in the cafeteria.

Clause IV The brick columns in the interior of the cafeteria may be used for general Associated Students publicity with the approval of the publicity commissioner, his designated agent or the Student Activities Advisor.

Clause V No posters or publicity machine of any kind are to be placed on campus other than the area designated under Section III, Clause I and II unless specific exception is authorized by the Advisor of Student Activities.

Clause VI No publicity will be placed on or in buildings except as otherwise noted in this code. Publicity cannot be located where it will obstruct walkways or driveways -- Publicity will be placed on large Oak trees only (no small trees to be used). This clause will be strictly enforced.

Clause VII All posters are to be fastened securely at all corners. Means of fastening will be determined by material of surface upon which the poster is to be placed. -- Examples are tying, if possible; using masking tape or other kinds of adhesive that are not harmful or detrimental to the wall or surface; or taping (if first checked with Publicity Commissioner or Advisor or Student Activities).

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Section IV -- Bulletin Board Notices

Clause I Student's personal notices, such as items for sale or trade, may be placed on the bulletin board located in Pioneer Hall next to Room #10 and on the Kiosks. Standard advertisement cards can be procured in the Student Activities Office. Cards will be removed from the bulletin boards every Wednesday by 12:00 noon, after a minimum of one week's display. These cards will be removed by the Publicity Commissioner or his designated representatives.

Section V - Transportation Requests

Clause I Transportation requests may be placed only on the bulletin board right outside the Student Activities Office or on the Kiosks. Standard Advertisement cards may be procured in the Student Activities Office.

Section VI - Analay Hall Bulletin Board

Clause I Notices and publicity for general Student Body interest may be placed on the Analay Hall Bulletin Board -- Use to clubs and individuals is also accepted, but must be approved by the Publicity Commissioner or the Advisor of Student Activities for that purpose.

Section VII - Off-Campus Organizations, Groups or Individuals

Clause I All off-campus posters, literature and publicity may be placed on those bulletin boards designated as "Open". The "open" boards are supervised, on a weekly basis, by the Publicity Commissioner. The Commissioner will remove out-of-date publicity and also will remove, with concurrence of the Student Activities advisor, those materials deemed to be inappropriate. A list of "open" Bulletin Boards and "Student Activities" Bulletin Boards is attached.

Section VIII - Time Limits

Clause I All campaign posters and publicity machines within a radius of

(Section VIII - Clause I Con't.)

ten (10) yards of the polling place are to be taken down the day before the election.

Clause II All campaign posters and publicity machines must be taken down carefully no later than twenty-four hours after the event if the event is held during the week, and by Monday noon after the event if the event is held after Friday noon.

Clause III All posters and publicity machines will be restricted to two weeks posting prior to the event.

Section IX - Responsibility

Clause I All posters must be stamped for approval before posting. This may be done in the Student Activities Office by the Publicity Commissioner or his designated representative or the Advisor of Student Activities.

Clause II It shall not be the responsibility of the Publicity Commissioner to make or provide materials except for Associated Student functions.

Clause III The responsibility for all campaign posters and publicity machines rests with the individual publicized. Failure to comply with this publicity code will result in the removal of a candidate from an election. Individuals, clubs and organizations in violation of this code will be subject to a fine of not more than \$15.00

Clause IV Clubs and organizations publicizing an event are responsible for their posters and publicity machines.

Clause V Any poster or publicity machine which represents a violation of this code will be removed at the discretion of the Publicity Commissioner.

Clause VI Any person mutilating or moving any poster or publicity machine, other than the Publicity Commissioner, will be summoned to appear before the CSA Executive Cabinet and will be subject to their action.

(Section IX - Con't.)

Clause VII An appeal to action taken by the CSA Executive Cabinet may be taken to the College Student Assembly for a decision.

Clause VIII Any exception to these regulations must be approved by the CSA Executive Cabinet.

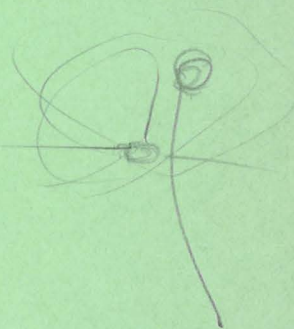

S.R.J.C. ASSOCIATED MEN'S STUDENTS
INTRAMURAL ATHLETIC PROGRAM

1. Any ^{male} student participating in the intramural program must have an S.R.J.C. student body card for his participating semester.
2. Any ^{male} student participating in the intramural program must be carrying at least 8 units in his participating semester.
3. Any ^{male} student who is participating in a varsity sport at S.R.J.C. is ineligible for participation in the same intramural sport in the same year. This rule applies to anyone who made the roster for that varsity sport, no one else. (IE. a varsity basketball player at S.R.J.C. may not play intramural basketball that same year.)
4. Any ^{male} student at SRJC may organize an intramural team, provided he can comply with all the rules for intramural competition. This student must act as spokesman for his team at all intramural functions and meetings.
5. Any ^{men's} club on the SRJC campus may sponsor ^{men's} an intramural team. They participate only if they comply to all rules for intramural competition. A competitor on that team must act as spokesman for his team at all intramural functions and meetings.
6. All intramural teams, club sponsored or student organized, must submit a complete roster for their team at least 3 days before their first intramural game. Their team spokesman must be designated on the roster. There shall be no roster changes. No exceptions.
7. All intramural teams, club sponsored or student organized, must submit, along with their roster, a designated entry fee. The fee will be decided according to the number of teams participating. The more teams participating, the less the fee.
8. All intramural teams, club sponsored or student organized, must comply with the maximum and minimum player roster regulations. These vary depending upon the sport.
9. Any intramural team, club sponsored or student organized, that cannot comply with these intramural regulations will be barred from further competition and their games forfeited.

The members of the Board of Trustees, the Administration, the Faculty, and the Staff of S.R.J.C. have been asked to join with the Associated Students in this blood drive. If the groups choose to participate, the members of these groups and others will be eligible to receive blood from the campus blood account when needed under the rules shown below.

Each member of the participating groups will be eligible to receive blood from the account when needed.

The wife or husband of a member of the participating groups will be eligible to receive blood when needed.

The legal dependents of the members of the participating groups will be eligible to receive blood when needed.

A Board of Trustees member shall be defined as a person currently serving as a member of the Sonoma County Junior College School District Board of Trustees.

An Administrator shall be defined as any person currently employed as an administrator by the district.

A Faculty member shall be defined as any person currently teaching at least one day class.

A staff member shall be defined as any classified person employed by the district, or by the Associated Students.

A student shall be defined as any person currently enrolled in at least one day class with the exception of P.E.

The Student Activities Advisor will serve as the administrator of the account. He will have the right to make exceptions to the above rules at his discretion. In the absence of the Student Activities Advisor, the Dean of Students or the Dean of Men will serve as the administrator of the account.

MID DAY SERIALS COMMISSIONER

She asked if anyone here attended and finding that they didn't asked why we complained about apathy when we ourselves were guilty of the same thing. She then asked how we expected her to go and excitedly ask for extra programs for next year when this is all the support that is received.

LAW ENFORCEMENT REPRESENTATIVE

Rich Martin reported that there will be 10 officers working for College Night.

PUBLICITY COMMISSIONER

Paul Weyhe reported that anyone interested in a new club called the Young Democrats should contact him.

HEAD YELL LEADER

Dennis Vanderkerff moved and Alice Fish seconded an objection to consideration.
The motion Carried.

Paul Weyhe moved and Dirk Lely seconded that CSA allocate approximately \$200. to ICC for the year Fall '68 - Spring '69.
The motion carried.

III. NEW BUSINESS
A. BLOOD DRIVE

Mr. Canevari presented the format of this blood drive which will be conducted by the Vets Club in conjunction with the SRJC Associated Students. This drive will enable donors to give blood either to the armed forces or to the general school fund. Day students, Board members, faculty, administrators, staff, and their spouses and legal dependents will

have access to the general fund if needed. The Student Activities Advisor will be the administrator of this account and will have the right to make exceptions to the rules at his discretion.

Paul Weyhe moved and Pat Marks seconded that CSA go on record in favor of this blood drive. The motion carried.

The problem of the Oak Leaf was next brought up for discussion. Some of the following points were brought up.

It was felt that the staff does not get sufficient training in Journalism 1A (which stresses more the principles and history of journalism) to write the paper. It was suggested that this problem be brought to Dean Tauzer to be solved between he and Mr. Hawkins.

It was mentioned that too much of the paper dealt with the administration and the faculty instead of the students. It is supposed to be a student paper, but is it? In the past it used to be more club oriented. This was felt to be a good idea as it would concern the students personally. It was also felt that the paper staff should really go out and find more news in order to really get to the students.

VII. OLD BUSINESS

A. DSCC MEETING (STUDENT LOUNGE)

Dennis Vanderkerff reported that the DSCC met and after a long discussion established themselves as an advisory committee and then recommended that President Newman open the Student Lounge for a six month trial allowing food and card playing. If this goes into effect they also set up an evaluation committee who will give monthly reports on the condition of the lounge.

B. UNITS FOR ASB OFFICE

Bob Landry and Mr. Canevari talked with Dean Dougan concerning the possibility of ASB officers redieving units for holding office. As the Curriculum and Instruction Committee is setting up courses and will soon start a credit- no credit system, he felt it would be possible to make it credit-no credit and recieve 1 unit. An appropriate letter was submitted to Dean Dougan.

C. REQUEST FOR INFORMATION FROM POLL

Norm Boyer read the letter from Dean Miller explaining

why Open Forum refused to release the information given in the poll.

When Open Forum asked to set up the poll, CSA allowed them to do so only under the strict provision that it was their sole responsibility. As a result it can't be released without a majority vote from the committee. When this was brought up the vote was 0-5 for releasing the information. This negative vote was made on the following grounds:

1. The poll was not intended for general public use but only as an aid for Open Forum programming.
2. The results of the poll might lend themselves to unethical usage be individuals and organizations as invalid evidence as to college student consensus on issues which the poll in no way conclusively proves or disproves.
3. That while interest of ICC and CSA is genuinely appreciated and your support earnestly solicited on behalf of the student bldy, certain committee functions and prerogatives are inviolate, both for the general good and in keeping with the committee's rights.

He made the point that Open Forum is operating well within the limits of its powers, discharges all offits duties, and has taken this action, in part, to safeguard it rights.

While the poll did indeed invlove the student body, this was only ~~incidental~~ incidental to the formulation of programming policy by the committee, which is entirely as internal function.

II. NEW BUSINESS

A. STUDENT STRIKE

Mr. Canevari reported that as long as students **involved in this strike do not disrupt classes, intimidate, and block others from attending classes,** no action will be taken by the adm nistration.

George Black moved and Alice Fish seconded that CSA go on record as favoring the International Student Strike for Peace on April 26, 1968.

Pat Marks moved and Rich Martin seconded an objection to consid ation. The motion failed.

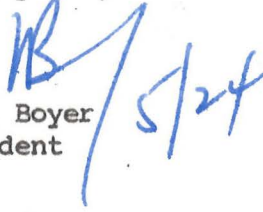
