I. Call to Order

President Marker Karahadian called the meeting to order at 3:12.
II. Roll Call

IV. Approval of Minutes

V. Reports
A. PRESIDNT: Mark Karahadian discussed the appointments he had made and informed everyone that lyyde Park Open Fowum and Dance Conmissioner were vacant. Dance Commissioner will remain vacant since Rich Trenam is Assistant Finance Commissioner but he agreed to fill both jobs.
Kathy Saltsgaver will replace Everett Branson on the Educational Opportunity.
The Student Affairs Committee is comprised of the following students, Pom Alderwan, Bill Adans, Gary Cia, Ken Williams and Andy Duport.
Maxk congradulated Eileen Dougan and Peggy hristian for being selected 5.5 Women of the Month for September and October respectively. He also congradulated the new officers Executive VicemPresident? Rosa Mar, VicemPresident, David Herrington, Recording Secretary, Peggy Christian, Assistant Finance Conmissioner, Rich Trenam, Freshman Rep to Executive Cabinet, Andy Duport and Freshman Rep., Pam Buford. In Executive Cabinet, Wednesday, Betty Jones a professionally trained travel advisor is making her services available to students. The purpose is to find the least inexpensive and easiest way for students to travel. No money will be transacted. Advertisement will be throught the Bear Facts.
The Accreditation Team will be on campus November 3, 4, 5. They will be asking questions of the members of CSA and the Lxecutive Cabinet. Please be cooperative.
David Jessa, Western States director of an organization called Frontlash " 70 will be working in Santa Rosa to register underm privileged voters. He is making an investigation of funds as to wether right wing politics is financing the left wing radicals in
reference to the San Jose Riots when President Nixon was recently visiting. $H_{0}$ also is conderining the violence. Mark will ask for CSA support on this matter next week.
Mark ended his report by urging everyone in Student government to stick together and not to criticize what is being done. No one likes to be shut down, so the tone of student government is going to be on this level.

EXICUITVE VICE-PRESIDRNI: Rosa Mar reported that there will be an SCIC meeting Wertesday, November 5, 1970 at 3:00 in the Board Room. The finalization of the Teacher Evaluation will be made. It will not be out in time for Prewregistration in December but will probably be out in January. The evaluation will cost about $\$ 350$. Everyone interested please attend. Rosa also added that she expected criticism, constructively or otherwise if she were not doing her job up to par.

## VI. Old Business

A. COMMUNICATION PAPMR: Mark received a request from Steve $\mathrm{C}_{2}$ bot for funds from the Associated Students Budget to finance the Comunication Paper for 10 days. The amount asked for is $\$ 188.50$. The reason the extension was being asked for was that the Board of Trustees will not meet until November 16, 1970 due to an out-of-town meeting. Steve Gabot stated that he was not really confident that the Board would finance the paper and that was his reason for asking CSA for 10 additional days. He also hoped to return to CSA to have them finance the paper for the remainder of the semester if the Board of Trustees denied him the money. Steve asked for a discussion to be made on the paper since he was told that there were negatives feelings about his paper. He also informed everyone that he had 2,000 signatures encouraging the continuing of the Commanication Paper.

A discussion followed with different people reporting their views on the paper. Many members of the body spoke in favor of the paper saying that they felt the paper was a useful outlet for student opinion. Others spoke out against the paper stated that they were tried of the same people submitting articles everyday and reading the same thing. Alaw expressed, was the high cost of the paper and the precedent that Steve is setting by using the paper as a student project.

Gary Cia, Finance Comassioner stated that by the end of the senester $\$ 1200$ will have been allocated to the Communication Paper. The money will come from Publications.

Larry Farrell moved to vote immediatel.y. It was seconded, but failed and the discussion continued.

Rich Truax moved to vote immediately, David Herrington seconded. This motion passed. The motion was made to give Steve Cabot $\$ 188.50$ to finance the Commuication Paper for 10 days until November 23, 1970 with the stipulation that it will be repaid if the Board of Trustees gives him the $\$ 906.80$, A roll call vote was asked for from the floor and the motion carried 12-10.

## SRJC Student Officers Resign

Student government at Santa dents and those who actually

Rosa Junior College has undergone a major change in officers with a series of resignations from apparently unrelated causes.
President Larry Gibson, who this semester was re-elected to the top student post, resigned Tuesday.
His resignation followed a stormy session of the student assembly at which James Burnside, executive vice-president, submitted his, followed by Lonnie Russell, assistant finance commissioner, and Ken Beyries, Hyde Park Open Forum commissioner. Mr. Burnside's stated reasons were a heavy schedule of studies and personal obligations that prevented him from doing justice to the elected post.
The appointed commissioners gave frustrations in attempts to get other students to take a serious interest in student selfgovernment.
Mr. Gibson told The Press Democrat yesterday his resignation Tuesday was submitted to faculty advisor Eugene Canevari after he decided the present form of student government is ineffective and serves as a "buffer between the stu-
work on problems and get things done."
The 20 -year-old political science major said he was working with a group of other students to present a new constitution at the next election Dec. 9.
Meanwhile, Marker Karahadian, former vice-president, has succeeded Mr. Gibson as president.
He appointed David Herrington, former freshman representative, as vice-president.
Mr . Herrington was appointed Thursday. He resigned Friday.
Mr. Canevari said yesterday
Rosa Mar is the new executive vice president, succeeding Mr. Burnside.
At least she was Thursday. Mr. Canevari was out of town Friday, he said.

HEREBY INSURES all the students, except any such who shall file with the School a written statement that he not be covered, under the jurisdiction of

(Hereinatie: called the Policyholder)
against loss resulting directly and independently of all other causes from accidental bodily injuries (herein called such injuries) and sustained while this Policy is in force and (1) while the Insured is in or on a building or premises of the school and acting in conformity with the rules of the school during the time the Insured is required to be therein or thereon either by reason of attendance at the school during the regular school year or enrolled during a regular summer session, or (2) while the Insured is traveling directly and uninterruptedly between the exterior limits of his home premises and the school, within one hour each way, for the purpose of attending or returning from regularly scheduled classes or school-sponsored activities scheduled immediately following such classes, or (3) while the Insured is participating in and while attending school-sponsored and supervised student activities during the months the school is in session; PROVIDED, HOWEVER, that there shall be no insurance coverage hereunder for such injuries resulting from (a) participation in interscholastic athletics and practice therefor (except as provided under Part VI), (b) use of trampoline (except when actively school supervised), (c) use of this, snowshoes, water-surfing devices, snowmobiles or snow-sliding devices. (d) being in or on any motorized evehicle with one or more wheels (except as provided under PART V); and PROVIDED FURTHER that there shall be no insurance coverage hereunder for such injuries that are covered under any Workmen's Compensation Act or simitar legislation and those which come within the EXCEPTIONS AND LIMITATIONS of this Policy.

Attendance at the School shall not be deemed to include summer playground activities.
The foregoing agreement is subject to all the terms appearing on this and the following pages, which are hereby made a part of this policy.

This policy is not in lieu of and does not affect any requirement for coverage by Workmen's Compenstation Insurance.

PART I. Accidental Death. If, as the result of such injuries, the Insured shall suffer loss of life within ninety days from date of such injury, the Company will pay $\$ 1,500$ in addition to any other indemnity payable under this Policy.
PART II. Medical Expense Benefits. If the Insured by reason of such injuries shall require the service of a legally qualified physician or surgeon (not a relative) within 26 weeks of the date of the accident, the Company will pay the actual expense personally incurred for any usual and normal treatment for medical services that are necessary and rendered within 52 weeks of the accident as follows: (1) The amount to be paid for necessary service of a legally qualified physician or surgeon shall be at the rate of $\$ 6.00$ per unit in accordance with the Medical. Surgical, and X-ray Procedural Index of the 1964 Relative Values Studies of the California Medical Association. Only one lee, the largest, will be paid for multiple surgical procedures performed through the same incision. Only the amount shown in the Relative Value Studies will be paid regardless of the number of physicians involved. For any operation or service not shown in the Surgical Procedural Index, the Company shall objectively determine the amount payable on the basis of an operation or service of equivalent gravity or severity; (2) the amount payable for the necessary services of Registered Nurses (R.N. and not a relative) shall not exceed $\$ 420.00$ for any one accident; (3) if there is no fracture, the amount payable shall not exceed $\$ 10.00$ ( $\$ 25.00$ for skull) for necessary X-rays; (4) hospitalization due to injury must commence for surgical or medical reasons within 90 days of the accident and may not exceed 180 days for any one accident nor a maximum of $\$ 40.00$ per day for daily hospital room and board; (5) the maximum amount payable for special in-patient hospital services is $\$ 200.00$ and includes such fees as operating room, X-ray fees, laboratory, drugs, anesthetics, etc., but excludes nurses' and physicians' fees and personal items; (6) plastic or cosmetic surgery limited to a maximum of $\$ 30.00$; (7) the Company will pay up to a maximum of three office calls for chiropractic services as defined by statutes at the conversion factor stated in point (1) above; (8) ambulance fees are payable up to a maximum of $\$ 30.00$. However, in no event shall the amount payable under this PART II exceed ten thousand dollars $(\$ 10,000)$ in aggregate for any one accident over and above the first $\$ 10$ of such expense
PART III. Dental Expense Benefits. If the Insured, hy reason of such injuries, shall require treatment on or to the teeth, the liability hereunder shall be limited to the actual expense incurred up to fifty dollars ( $\$ 50.00$ ) per injured tooth over and above the first $\$ 10$ of expense for such treatment actually accomplished within fifty-two (52) weeks of the accident on natural teeth.
PART IV. Athletic Team Air Travel. This Policy provides a maximum of $\$ 1.500$ Accidental Death under Part I, and in addition, a maximum of $\$ 1,500$ under Medical Expense Benefirs, Part 11, resulting from accidental hodily injuries to the Insured while being transported as a farepaying passenyer on a regularly scheduled aircraft passenger carrier to or from school and the place of an athletic event.
PART V. Motor Vehicle Coverage. This Policy provides a maximum of $\$ 1.500$ Accidental Death Insurance under Part I. and in addition, a maximum of $\$ 1.500$ under Medical Expense Benefits. Part II, resulting from accidental bodily injuries to the Insured while being transported in a one-or more-wheeled motorized vehicle by or under the sponsorship or arrangement of the insured School or School District or an authorized student body organization thereof to or from School or other place of instruction or the place of a School-sponsored event.
PART VI. Interscholastic Athletics Coverage. This Policy provides a maximum of $\$ 1,500$ accidental death insurance under Part I, and in addition, a maximum of $\$ 1,500$ under Medical Expense Benefits, Part 11 (in accordance with Sections 31752 and 31755 of the California Education Code), resulting from accidental bodily injury to the Insured while participating in interscholastic athletics or practicing therefor (except tackle football).
PART VII. Hospital Outpatient Emergency Care. If the Insured by reason of such injuries shall require the services of the Hospital Outpatient Emergency Rexom the Compony will pay for any ane accident the actual expense personally incurred over and above the first $\$ 10$ of expense for all such services rendeled up to a maximom of $\$ 4000$, including a maximum of $\$ 10.00$ for non-fracture X-ray fees

## EXCEPTIONS AND LIMITATIONS

The insurance hereunder shall not cover any loss which is the result of: (1) War or act of war. (2) participation in interscholastic athletics and practice therefor (except as provided under Part (1), (3) riding in or being in, upon or about any aircraft, (except as provided umder Athletic Team An lravel Part IV), (4) any hind of hernia, (5) eyeglasses or contact lenses, (6) infection of bone, (7) disease, cin! for appliances, sick bed equipment, wheel chairs and artificial limbs, (8) ptomaine, bacterial or vegetation poisoning, (9) appendicitis or appendectomy, (10) suicide or attempt thereat, (11) intentionally self-inflicted injuries, (12) heat exhaustion and sun stroke, (13) injuries occurring outside limits of United States or Canada, (14) prescriptions (except while hospitalized).

No payments will be made for heat treatment, diathermy, massage, nor hydrotherapeutics
No payments will be made for treatment of pre-existing conditions or direct complications thereof.
A pre-existing condition is defined as a congenital affiction or a condition which required medical treatment within one year prior to the issuance of this Policy and which pre-disposes or confers a tendency to ward future injury or disease.

## POLICY PROVISIONS

The Contract: This policy and the application of the Policyholder constitute the entire contract between the parties and any statement made by the Policyholder shall, in the absence of fraud, be deemed a representation and not a warranty. No statement made by any Insured whose eligibility has been accepted by the Insurer shall be used in defense to a claim hereunder.

No agent has authority to change this policy or to waive any of its provisions. No change in this policy shall be valid unless approved by an executive officer of the Company and evidenced by endorsement hereon, or by amendment hereto, signed hy the policyholder and by an executive officer of the Company.

Notice and Proof of Claim: Written notice of injury upon which claim may be based must be given to the Company within TWENTY DAYS of the date of the commencement of the first loss for which benefits arising out of each such injury may be claimed.

Notice given by or in behalf of the claimant to the Company at its Home Office or to any authorized Agent of the Company, with particulars sufficient to identify the Insured Student, shall be deemed to be notice to the Company. Failure to furnish notice within the time provided in this policy shall not invalidate any claim if it shall be shown not to have been reasonably possible to furnish such notice and that such notice was furnished as soon as was reasonably possible.

The Company, upon receipt of the notice required by this policy, will furnish to the claimant such forms as are usually furnished by it for filing proof of loss. If such forms are not so furnished within fifteen days after the Company receives such notice, the claimant shall be deemed to have complied with the requirements of this policy as to proof of loss upon submitting, within the time fixed in this policy for filing proofs of loss, written proof covering the occurrence, character, and the extent of the loss for which claim is made.

Affirmative proof of hospital confinement for which claim is made must be furnished to the Company within ninety days after the termination of the period for which claim is made. Affirmative proof of any other loss on which claim may be based must be furnished to the Company not later than ninety days after the date of such loss.

Examination: The Company shall have the right and opportunity to examine the person of the Insured Student when and so often as it may reasonably require during pendency of claim hereunder.

RE: A Summary Report without Recommendation

A change in our present college calendar could take one of three directions ir our goal is to complete the fall semester prior to the Christmas holidays; and allow for more instructional flexibility:

1. Aciopt the quarter system.
2. Start the fall semester in August and end betore the Christmas holidays. Conclude the spring semester in May.
3. Start a shortened fall term in September, followed by one on two intersessions and a shortenea spring semester endinf, in June.

The committee has aroitrarily chosen to suggest for your conside ation the latter method. A proposal for a calendar with an intersess ion might take any of the following forms:
(1) $13-3-3-13$

Students would take 4 courses durine the two long semesters and one each during the two three-week intersessions.
(2) $1.2-4-4-1.2$

Same as above, except for one week aifference in lenfth of semester.
(3) $14-i_{r}-14$

Under this system a single intergession of 4 weeks allows a student to take one course on a concentrated basis. (Also known as the 4-1-4 Plan, usec by St. Mary's and under conm sideration by Sonoma State.)
(4) $3-3-3-3-3-3-3-3-3-3$

This system envisions one course per three-week perion or a full year of 30 weeks.

Any of these systems can be adapted to our present beginning and onding dates and to our existing sumer session schedule. They couln also be used concurrently with the existing sentster system.

There are many considerationm involved in a change of uniz kind. Several of them are noted below ror your discusaion and comment. The comittee does not feel tree to recommend a course of action, but is unanimous in its feeling that an institution should continualiy search for better and more tlexible ways or educating our youne people.

Considerations are:

1) The creation of an enrichment/immexsion experience sor students during the intersessions.
2) Allowance for lowering of teaching loads during tad. aud spiing semesters from dive to four sections if an inetructor teaches one section in each of the interseamione.
3) The possibility of teaching in sumaer session an an alternabive to teaching during the intersessions.
4) The racilitation of the transfer of students reom ous institution to colleges preaently on the quarter system.
5) The feasibility of chamging tuaditional inatructional patierns to fit the intersesmion.
6) Equalizing and balancing of teacher loads and schechlinf of" classes.
7) The effect of modifien calendar on our A.D.A.
8) The availability of rooms and instructional materials min'mer intersessions.
9) The implications for the Evening College.
10) Possible hardships that this calendar might mipose upon the Registrar's ofrice.
11) Question of student acceptance of a new calendar.
12) The possible danger of prolizeration of courac osilerings.
13) The effect upon the student povernment and paricicipation in extra-curricula activities, particularly during intersession periods.
14) Problems of instructors in revising courees to iti the shortened sessions.
15) Number and content of examinavions under the new Bystem.
J.6) Arranging special ofl-campus expexiences, group tours, ant speciaj. events.
1'7) Eifect on student enrollments, irmcluding encolimerts during. summer months.
16) The athletic program, including consideration of eligioility regulations affecting inter-collegiate competition.
17) Purchase and distribution of textbooks.
18) Making the fullest use of faculity and stat\%.
21.) Facul.ty opportunity for mployment or study riuring the school year.
19) Ambiguity conceming equivalency of work done in any varieu calendar period which might give rise to questions about salary adjustments of faculty members.

PROPOSAL FOR A "DOUBLE IUTARSESSION" SCHEDULE
In order to eliminate the inflexibility of the present schedule the Schedule Comittee submits the following proposal;

1) The Academic Year would be changed to consist of:
A) a 12-week Fall semester (starting the same date as now)
B) a 4-week "First Intersession" during the montin of January.
C) a 4-week "Second Intersession" during the month of February.
D) a 12-week Spring Semester(endine the same date as now).
2) The full time semester load for students and instructors would be changed to l2 units (four rather than five three-unit courses). Since the shortened semester means that classes yould have to meet 4 hours per week it is sucgested that the MWF class period be changed to $\operatorname{lnr} .20 \mathrm{~min}$. and the mph period be changed to 2 hours. Consideration should be given to allowing classes to meet on a combined schedure (ie. indenath) to allow for greater flexibility: .
3) During each Intersession each student would take, and each instructor teach, only one course. That course would meet a sufficient number of hours during that month to fulfill its unit requirement.
4) This proposal mould affect all courses and faculty members. If a faculty member did not wish to teach during Interesssion he would be given the option of teaching a summer course to meet his load requirement.

It should be pointed out that an instuctor during the year would be in class the same number of hours as at present, but these hours and classes lould be arranced differently.

It is hoped that this proposal could be adopted for the 1970-71 Academic Year in which case the calender would be as follows;

## Academic Senate Approves Experimental ${ }^{6} 4-14$ Plan

The "four-one-four progiam" means, in effect. that the academic year will be broken up into fall semester, ending before Christmas. in which full time students whl be expected to tahe at least three or four classes. followed by a four week

term in January, in which stu four-week period students will retura to the regular spring

The present system has a fall and a spring semester. so actually no time will be added to the amount of time students spend in classroom work. The fall semester will be shortened somewhat, but that time will be made up in the shortened four-week term in which students will be expected to do intensive study in a chosen area.
Barring any "legal" problems that would prevent it from being imp!emented, the new schedule will go into effect next school year.

Under this proposal the academic year would be divided into ter equal sergions, each seventeen instructions] iby s long (about three weexs including weekends.) During each sessici; the s, muent worid take orne class ind anly one class; each instructor would teach cue : lase man culy ure cleas. Duriag a session a typical threemant would neet for a total of Ol hours, but the scheduling and lemetit of meting weuld be ueable. Ihe calendar would be such that there would be four or five days between cach sescion. Christmas vacation, the present senester breal: and Jorzect break would also be between semsions. The ausdemict year worla hegin and end ha preacntly. Unlike its noighboring public campruses, St. Mary's College in the East Bay's Moraga chose to look at them objectively, implement those with immediate apparent merit, and evaluate the rest.

The resuli has been that the poplar-lined campus, which enrol!s 930 young men, has undergone a sweeping but bloodless revolution. The college's calendar, curriculum and entire outlook has been drastically changed.
Students, faculty and administrators generally agree the changes are for the bet-ter-even the plan now in the works to let girls in for the first time since the Christian Brothers took over the college in 1863.

## DEAN

Nobody could be happier about the changes than Dr. Alan Follock, the lay dean of the college.
"Some of the demands and requests of the stutents had already boen sugsested by the faculty, but we rrankly weren't moving fast enough," Dr. Pollock explained. "If it hadn't been for their pressure, none of this would have happened so quickly.
"Four years to an adminis. trator is normally just enough time to get his committees rolling to sludy some new proposal. But to a colloge kid, it's his whole career."

## STABTREG POINT

The demand for extensive changes dates back to little more than a year aro with a statement by Dan Whitehurst, 106 student president, in the collc $\quad$ newspaper.
"I picture a college in which the studenis are not concerned with gettiag grates on preparing for 2 job, but are dedicatod to confronting the great issues of mankind, walraid to consider or rballenge any idea; erying to srok out the meaning of life." Whitohurst wrote.

Motivated by a genuine concern for the quality and relevance of their education, a movement began among the students that eventually materialized as an organization dedicated to change and called Stutents for Progressive Action Now (SPAN), with some 100 students sign. ing up.
On February 18, 1909, SPAN issucd a list of "demands and requests" to the administration. The list in. cluded a call to break up the academic year into more meaningful units than semesters, and a revision of academic requirements, grading procedures, and house rines.
SPAN also demanded that the school, which has served only males since its founding. be made co-educational.

By March, the campus was alive with debate. The academic council met with SPAN members and issued a resolution endorsing the proposals as "worthy of serious consideration." Extra faculty meetings were called, timetables for decisions set and secret ballots taken.

I. Call to Order

The meeting was celled to order at 3:08 by President Mark Karahadian.
II. Roll Call

Those absent were Fínance Commissioner Gary Cia, Sophomore Representative Kathy Padroni, AHS Representative Ann Coset and Publicity Commissioner Ken Osborae.
III. Approval of Agenda

Two deletions were made to the agenda, one moving reporta after 01. Business and to delete announcements. The agenda was then approved as written.
IV. Approval of Minutes

The minutes were approved as written.
V. Reports

PRESIDENT: Mark Karahadian suggested that we move on to Old Business and have all reports alter that item. The motion was seconded and passed.
VI. Old Business
A. COMMUNICATION PAPER: The matter of Budgetary Freeze was brought up. Andy Duport made a motion to allow Steve Cabot to discuss the freezing of the budget before the discussion on the Communication Paper. John Carroll seconded. The motion carried.
Larry Gibson mentioned the fact that the Budget had been approved last spring and that there was no money allocated for students to do indepedent work. He felt that there should be more money for experimental grants so students will have money to do student: projects. He suggested that we take $\$ 2,000$ from the Athinighes budget and take the remalnder of the insurance funds and put them into an experimental grant fund. He feels that this would alleviate the hassle students have to go through to acquixe money for projects.
Mc. Canevari pointed out that there is $\$ 1,500$ in the budget undor Student Sexvices and it was designed into the budget for a Birth Control Clinic, if it came about. He also wanted to know how much money would be involved in the experimental grants. Larry stated about $\$ 8,000$ would be involved.
David Herrington suggested another avenue to attain funds which would be to iiquidate the Oak Leal Funds.
Frank Lawler, Oak Lear Rep. moved to cease Punding of the current Oak Leaf issues, giving the stalf and Mr, Cabot alliance to work together in an oien comranication experience. Mr. Hawkins would act as councelors and they would jointly publish the Communication Paper to fit the needs of the students by giving professional help. David Herrington seconded.

Mark asked Steve Cabot if this motion were acceptable to him and he said he had never heard of it before, and that he opposed the idea of a daily paper the size of the insert page because it would be too tedious to read. He stated he would not particularly like this set up. Mr. Hawkins had not been notified of this motion. Andy Duport moved to vote immediately. It was seconded. The motion passed. Frank's motion was voted on and failed by a $3-17$ vote. Larry Krogness moved to delete the insurance payment for next semester and take $\$ 2,000$ from the Athletic budget and set that up for an experimental grant fund through which the Birth Control Clinic and the Commanication Paper will be funded. David "errington seconded. Larry Farrell moved to vote immediately. David Herrington seconded, the motion to vote immediately failed.
A discussion of the insurance benefits were brought up and several points pro and con were pointed out.
Larry Krogness amended his motion to make fee for insuarance voluntary and that information be available on this matter. The amendment was seconded by David Merrington. He also moved to vote immediately on the amendment. Andy Duport, seconded. The motion carried. The vote on the amendment was $18-5$, it carried.
Debbi. Cox moved to amendment the main motion and to delete Athlefins so that only the insurance payment will remain. The amendment was seconded. A discussion followed. Mr. Canevari stated that the head of the Athletics Department, Mr. Matson was opposed to any change in the budget. Larry Krogness moved to vote immediatley on the amendment, seconded. The motion passed to vote immediately. The vote on the ameudnent carried by a 12-9-1 vote.
Andy Duport moved to vote immediately on the motion on the floor, seconded. The motion carried. The original motion on the floor was passed by a $20-2-2$ vote.
David Aerrington moved to add Athletics to this motion, seconded. Rosa Nar moved to vote immediately, soconded. The motion carried by a $21-0$ vote. The vote on the motion to add Athletics back to the original motion failed.
David Herrington moved that CSA give Steve Cabot enough money to finance the Comanication Paper to the end of the semester. John Busek seconded. Mr. Canevari thinks Commnication Paper shouid be funded BUT he also feels thet an editorial board shouid be widen to include more students. Andy Duport moved to amen the motion to include the following: a joint committee of editors comprised of five (5) students be established, that Steve Cabot be one of these students and chatiman of this joint editorship committee. This editorship conmittee will function as any other committee and that each member of this committee have equal say. The remainder of this committee will be approved by the Student Affairs Comraittee.
Steve dabot suggested that he and Andy discuss this matter and return in a weak because he also had ideas for a publications board. Andy rescinded his amendment so that he and Steve may discuss the subject of an editorial board.
Bill Adams moved to postpone the main motion til next week so that Andy and Steve can straighten thing out, seconded. David Herrington moved to recess until 5:15, seconded. Bi.31 Adams moved to vote immediately on the recess, seconded. The motion carried.

The meeting was called back to order at $5: 15$ by President Mark Karahadien. Roll Call was again called. Those absent were Gary Cia. Peter Chin, Kathy Padroni, Tami Romirez, Ann Coset, Ken Osborne, Sue Meyers and Sandra Raphael. The house count was 20 after the recess. Andy Deport moved to adjourn, seconded. The motion passed by a 12.4 vote.
The meeting was adjourned at $5: 35$.

Dear Mr. Gibson:
During the College Student Assembly meeting of October 19, a resolution was passed that requested this office tolreplace Mr. Richard Nazarian on the newly formed Sudent Afficirs Committee with "a more competent and capable aministrator." Subsequentiy and in order, I engaged in the foylowing conversations: (1)
Mr. Eugene Canevari; (2) Mr. Rickard Nazarian; (3) Mr. Laryy Gibson, Mr. Mark Karahadian, and Mr. David Herrington. Resulting from these discussions, and upon concurrence of all goncerned (though to varying degrees), I requested that the CoNoge Student Assembly, Executive Cabinet, meet ylth Mr. Nasarian, Mr. Canevari, and me to confront the issues. We met in the Beard Room, Bailey Hall, 7:00 p.m. 9:00 p.m., Tuesday, October 20.

The discussion was indeed honest and open, and from it results my basic decision to rejedt the College Student Assembly resolution. These personal reasons are eited. Elrst, personalities more than issues are pesponsible for the disagreement between students and Mr. Nazariah. In fact, the conflict of personality is centralized in the persons of a limited number of students. Second, the resolution was ill-timed and implies a state of emotional as opposed to a reasoned response. If a crisis stage had been attained, the Executive Cabinet meeting on Tuesday evening should have preceded the College Student Assembly session on Monday in the interests remediating problems. Third, removal of Mr. Nazarian from the Student Affairs Committee achieves nothing of a constructive nature. Because he is responsible for housing, bookstore, coop, and conduct, he is central to the proper functioning of the committee -- a committee, incidentally, newly conceived and never operative. If there are difficulties in the areas cited, these should be addressed to the entire committee, with expertise contributed by students, faculty, and administrators.

Questioned may be my action not to accept a recommendation that was passed by an apparent large vote. I assume full responsibility for my own actions, and, on occasion, responsibilty for the action of others. If the Academic Senate, for example, passes a resolution reflecting upon policy, and I'm charged with implementing that policy, in good conscience I will proceed to apprise myself of the details and render a decision accordingly. Relationship to a student agency will not differ.

I submit that the College Student Assembly passed a resolution of the most serious nature, and did so without that documentation which is necessary if an educator of some 20 years experience can legitimately be called .- at least by implication -f incompetent.

1. The Parking Judiciary Board will be composed of five students selected by the Student Affairs Committee. Three students will constitute a quorum.
A. A judge will be appointed by the president of GSA or Student Affairs Committee, who will be responsible for selecting four other students to serve on the Judiciary Board.
B. An advertisement in the Bear Facts will call for students interested in cserving on the Board to appear before a special meeting of the SAE. This committee will then select five students.
2. The student must appear at the Law Enforcement Department within five days of issuance of ticket (as stated on citation) to appeal the citation. He will be required to post bail until the Board has passed a decision.
A. The student will fill our a Notice of Appeal which will include his name, date of issuance, officer who issued the ticket, plus his signature verifying his promise to appear, and his understanding of the Appeal Notice.
The date when the student is to appear before the Board to appeal his citation, will be stamped on the notice so that the student will know when he is to appear at the time he files for an appeal. A copy of the citation will be attached to the notice and dropped into a box provided for the Judiciary Board.
3. The Board will meet Mondays 12-1 to hear the appeals filed from the previous seven days, or five school days.
A. If a student is unable to attend the meeting, he will be able to postpone his case only if he refiles his appeal at the Law Enforcement Department before the Board meets. This is a one-time privilege.
B. If a student fails to appear before the board on the agreed date, and has failed to refile his appeal, his failure to appear will be regarded as admission of guilt, and he wil forfeit his bail. In such a case, if the student then appeals to the Dean of Students, the Board would expect the Dean to uphold its decision regardless of mitigating circumstances.
C. The Board will pass judgement based on evidence on hand plus the student's testimony only.
4. The Board will not judge the legality of the parking Regulations, but only whether or not there were mitigating circumstances to warrant a dismissal of the citation issued.
5. The Board will have the power to void any ticket appealed to them on the basis of a majority vote.

(3) riding in or being in, upon or about any airuraft. (except as provided under Athletic Team An Itasel. Part IV), (4) any kind of hernia, (5) eyeglasses or contact lenses. (6) infection of bone. No payment, will be made for heat treatment, diathermy, massage, nor hydrotherapeutics.
No payments will be made for treatment of pre-existing conditions or direct complications thereof.
A pre-existing conditon is defined as a congenital afliction or a condition which required medical treatment within one year prior to the issuance of this Policy and which pre-disposes or confers a tendency toward future injury or disease.

The Company, upon receipt of the notice required by this policy. will furnsh to the ctaimant such forms as are usually furnished by it for filing proof of loss. If such forms are not so furnished within fifteen ans after the Company receives such notice, the claimant shall be deemed to have complied with the requitements of thi policy as to proof of loss upon submitting, within the time fixed in this policy for filing proofs of loss, written proof covering the occurrence. character, and the extent of the loss for which claim is made.

## TACKLE FOOTBALL RIDER

The Policy to which this Rider is attached is hereby amended to include the scheduled benefits in consideration of an additional premium paid to the Company. This Rider is made part of and subject to the conditions and limitations of said Policy, except as herein stated. The risk covered by this Rider is not covered under the Policy.
The effective date of this Rider shall be the same as the effective date of the Policy but this Rider expires on the next following June 30.

SUBJECT: Renort No. 2 on the Status of Student Government in Califomia's Public Junior Colleges

This report is the second status report on the progress, problems, and changes made since I took office one year ago. The report contains four main sections:
I. Accomplishments - A review of changes made since August 1, 1969
II. Legislative and Policy Resolutions - A report of results of student policy and legislative proposals
III. Present Problems - An analysis of current strengths and weaknesses of the student association
IV. Goals for 1970-71 - Plans and goals for the coming year
I. Accomplishments

The past year was an extremely successful one for the cccicin. The following is a list of major changes and accomplishments of the past year:
A. A complete reorganization of the statewide student government assorlation.

Nine area executive boards were set up and a nine-man statewide executive board was implemented to facilitate communications and accountability and to insure that each area of the state has both a voice and a vote in decisions.
B. Implementation of the position of Executive Secretary of the statervide student association.

Beginning in August, 1969, the statewide student association acquired the services of a part-time Executive Secretary to help reorganize the student association and to initiate lsgislatıre and policy proposalis in Sacramento. The position is funded jointly by the CCCSGA and the California Junior College Association and, to our knowledge, is the first of its kind in this country.
C. Inituation of monthly mectings with the governox.

One of the problems faced by students in seeking policy changes is getting a direct hearing by those in decisuon-making positions. The CCCSGA has arranged for monthly meetings with Governor Reagan to dascuss student problems and proposals and to ask for needed changes. The meetings have helped provide a clearer understanding of the positions and problems of both the students and the Governor. The most notable successes of the meetings to date were the Governor's agreement to sign Serate Bill 524 (concerning circulating petitions for lowering the voting age) and the improved image and visibility of the statewide student association in Sacramento. More meetings are planned for this year, with an emphasis to be placed on the chief executive's support of CCCSGA legislative proposals.
D. Hut d, vic.. oh تuuent proposals as legislative bills or as policy changes.

Following the fall conference, a number of student resolutions were presented to various governing agencies and to the Legislature as proposals for change. The next section of this report contains a complete rundown of how student resolutions fared in the first year of the new statewide organization.
E. Implementation of a quarterly newsletter, "The Student Voice."

This newsletter is published four times a year to help prepare students for conferences and to aid in the dissemination of program information and follow-up of legislative proposais.
F. Seating of students on major policy-making state agencies including the following:

1. The Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges
2. The Board of Directors of the California Junior College Association
3. The student advisory committee to the Legisiature's Joint Committee on Higher Education (CCCSGA student is the chairman)
4. State committees on educational opportunity; grants, aids, and loans; and governance
G. Completion of a statewide survey of the progress and problems of student participation in governance in junior colleges in California.

The paper will be published in October, 1970, and distributed to all junior college presidents and student body presidents, and should provide a perspective for individual campuses on how they measure up to current practices in the state as a whole.
H. Revision and improvement of statewide conferences.

Last year the statewide conferences were changed to eliminate some of the duplication that occurred by haring the same kinds of conferences in

Eall as in spring. 'this yod' wo wall make further refinements. The fall conference will for devoted to developsnc legislative proposals and to orienting new jumiser gollege stuchent:s. J.t will be a large ( 400 students) conference. the spring confexence will he a conference only of presidents, and i.t will be devoted to meetings with key legislators and policymakers in an effort to improve follow-up of legislative programs. Hopefully, this smaller conference in the spring will reduce costs and increase the effectiveness of the student legislative program.
II. Legisiative and Policy Resolutions

There is a saying in political circies that very little significant legislation is passed in an ejection year. That saying surely applies to this past legislative session. Ithe session was extremely disappointing, with the rinvornor's +ov mfnvil package dominating much of the time and effort of the sesslor. The following is a report on how CCCSGA policy and legislative proposals fared.

## A. Policy Matters

1. Insuring a transfer piority for junlor college students.

A move by the state collers syster to move unilaterally in establishing transfex friorjutos was blochel. A nergotated compromise was passed (with the active participation of the California Junior College Association, the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges, and the Califormia Communaty College Student Govermment Association). However, final resolution of this problem is still. to be reached. We plan to see how the policy is implemented this fall before taking any further steps. If junior college students are denied ty ansfer in the coming year, we will introduce additional legislation to try to insure them a top prioxity. Hopefully, this new policy will be effective and additional legislation will not be needed.
2. Establishing a mandatory course in ethnic studies for junior colleges in California.

This resolution was passed by the Board of Directors of the Califormia Junior College Association, and $1 s$ currently being reviewed by the Board of Governors of the Californıa Communaty Colleges. Hopefully, this course will be implemented and wall contribute in a small way toward better understanding between races.
3. Addition of students as voting members to the Board of Directors of the Califormia Junior College Association.
The California Junior College Association, at its May Board meeting, voted to add nine students as full voting members of the Board of Directors. The action should be ratified by the fall general assembly of the Association in November, thus allowing students to become a full fourth arm of the Association. The new CJCA Board of Directors will consist of nine trustees, nine administrators, nine faculty, and nine students.

4. HR 11959 (Federal affain - 1 noreases veterans benefits by more than 30 pexcent; provides new benefi"s for educationally disadvantaged vetexans. the bill was signed into iaw by president Nixon. While the CCCGGA was only one of mary aroups supporting this bill, the student resolutions were rommbir ated to the president and were acknowledffed hy hiss staff and by koy serrators in washington, ale. Our support did eontr pute to the implementation of this law.

5. Lowering the voturg age to ió - this matter is being approached in two main Way: :
a. Through the souxts - The CCCSGA is involved in a court case (through Citizus for Lovering the voing Age) that will test the recent congressional mandate to give 18-year-olds the raght to vote. The case should be heard in October. Depending on the outcome of the court case, we will do one of two things:
(1) If we win, we wll begin a voter registration drive tc sigri up newly francinsej voters on junior college campuses.
(2) If we lose, we wj.l. begin a petition drive (under SB 524 Just sluned into law) to gathex signatures to put the matter of ioneriby tho voting age on the ballot.
b. In the lefulatra - ACA 40 ( $B r i g g s$ ), which mold have put the questich of allowing 18 -year-olds the right to yote on the November baum, passed the Assembly and died in the Senate. The measure received 23 votes, but fell short of the 27 votes needed (two-thirds of the 40 -member house).

Until the courts decide on the federal mandate, all of these appoaches will be slowed down. Hopefully, the Supreme Court will hear the matter in october and will rule in our favor. A further report on our court case will be made in the student Voice in November.
III.

Present Problems
A. Area organization

When we started the reorganization program last August, a three year plan for reorganization of the statewide student association was developed. All of the goals for the first year lave been achieved. I now believe that the junior college student association is better organized and much more effective than any other student association in California-at the statewide level.

The next step in reorganization, and a major problem, is to more effectively develop each area in the state so that communications and accountability to local campuses are more fully insured. To date, the statewide student executive board has functioned well. Some areas are also functioning well. We now need to concentrate on additional help to weak areas so all reorganization work will be completed by this spring.
B. Finance

While the statewide student association is stronger than ever, many individual campuses are in financial trouble. Sale of student body cards is down, budgets are slim, and programs are being curtailed. The chances of passing a mandatory student body card bill are practically zero. Newex and more creative approaches to financing student activities must be found. The "crutch" of the mandatory student card is slipping away.

Some schools have had success with extensive discount programs that help student cards to "pay for themselves." Other schools have developed new financing patterns in cooperative efforts with the junior college district office. One plan currently being discussed at the state level is to devote a major portion of the spring conference to financial problems. Hopefully, we could enlist the help of several experts on financial affairs to assist us in developing a sounder and more effective approach to financing student programs than the current attempt at mandatory student cards. In any case, the whole question of financing of student activities will be reviewed and acted upon this spring.
C. Work in the districts

Almost the entire thrust of the legislative and policy program of last year occurred in Sacramento. This is natural in the first year of operation. However, to be more effective, we must improve contacts with legislators and policymakers out in the districts. Theoretically, when a bill is about to be heard, we should be able to call the nine area presidents who in turn will call the local campus presidents in their respective areas. We should be able to generate hundreds of letters and telegrams, not just randomly, but directed to each legislator from each

IV. Goals for 19\%0-71

We are weil ahead of schedile in terms of the three-year plan for reorganization of the Calıfornia Commundty coliege student Government Association. The major goals for tiis fall include the tollowing:
A. Improve the areas'orgarization

Each area will ntel. With the statewide president and the Executive secretary. At these meetilgs, plans for earth area, unique needs of areas, and
 caciow mechantsms ore jeing developed to insuxe that we know about you and you know about is.
B. Tmplementation of pecial commituees

Two special student commitues are being set up to try to insure a minority voice in a majoriti systern. 'the nomittees axe for veterans and minorities. These comuittees qill develup lequslative proposals to bring to the fall ronference, meet. with legislators to discuss these proposals, and advise the state board and tha Executive secretaxy about needs of their particular group.
C. Foundation propusals

Two proposals for fourdation funding of CCCSGA activities will be submitted this year. One proprisal wiil be for a general grant to nelp improve and expand CCCSGA statewhte act.jsities. This money would be used for student publications, travei, and expanded conferences ard communications.

A second proposal would request funds for several student interns to assist the Executive Secretary in working with policymakers and legislators.

Both proposals are now in draft form and should be submitted this spring.

## D. Further refinements in conferences

As mentioned earlier in this report, there will be one large conference in the fall and a conference of student presidents in the spring. The format of the conferences will also be changed. New workshops will be added and inesertive workshops will be deleted. It is also imperative that area presidents do a much more effective job of orienting students before they come to the state ronference. Preparation is the key to effective student programs. We can only do so much in providing opporturities for stidents. Beyond a limit, students are entirely on their own in making the most of those opportunities.
E. Development of a special student sexvices program
plans are under way to offer a nunber of special student services through the CCCSGA statewide office in Sacramento. Included in the plans are. the following kinds of services:

1. Discounts on travel programs

Current proposals include trips to Europe, Hawaii, etc. CCCSGA members will soon be able to travel at a reduced rate. Negotiations are currently under way with several travel groups, and a final contract should be produced late this fall.
2. Discounts on special purchases
r תe CCCSGA is examining the possibility of arranging special discounts on certain services and produrts (such as automobile necessities, insurance, entextairment, etc.). This particular program will be developed this spring and will be ready for implementation next fali.

## A final note

To help all of you communicate better with each othex, I am enclosing a list of names you should know. Hopefully, all of us can work together as effectively as last year to produce further needed changes in public junior colleges in California.

If you have any comments, suggestions, or criticisms of the ideas presented in this paper, please drop me a line. I would appreciate your judgment.

I would like to request a $\$ 300.00$ student grant for a high quality black and white photography project. The prints, archivally processed and matted on museum board, would be the beginning of Santa Rosa Junior Colleges permanent collection of fine photographic prints.

The photographs, to be of nature scenes, will be specially processed for maximum quality and permanence. Using a modified Morgan-Adams archival process such as the Smithsonian uses, the prints will theoretically last $150+$ years. The end result of the project will be a portfolio of the finest prints to be presented to SantaRosa Junior College for a permanent collection. I will retain all rights to the negatives and prints made from them, kut the college may use the prints from the portfolio as they wish, such as shows, displays, etc. The prints may not be cropped or reproduced in any form. One idea for their use may be a display in the new college library when it opens.

The benefit to me would be twofold: 1.) I would be able to work with highly advanced methods of fine photographic print production, and 2.) I would gain valuable experience with my medium.

I feel that since the effect a photographic statement has depends upon the print one sees, the better and more controlled the print is, the clearer the statement. I expect to learn more about the subtle nuances of the photographic print and its creation, and as my life shall be as a photographer, this is of the utmost importance to me. I want to be able to make a photographic statement and have that statement live in a print which I create.

The subject of the photographs, nature, is a topic with which I am familiar photographically and spiritually, and which I feel to be of the utmost importance to man and his future. I have done previous shows at Santa Rosa Junior College, including a display for the college production of "Little Mary Sunshine", and recently a show of environmental photographs. Both of these productions have been about a given theme, but this is to be my theme, using highly advanced methods of production. I am currently employed as a photographer for the Speech and Drama Depts. of SRJC.

A budget outline is attached, and the price total, please note, is before discounts and taxes have been figured, but should remain near this figure. These figures are current as of December lst, 1970.

## UC Faculty Desires To Go Back To Semesters; "Harmful,"Not Helpful

BERKELEY - A University of California faculty committee suggests abandoning the quarter system and reinstituting the semester plan at UC's nine campuses.
The Academic Senate's Committee on Educational Policy issued the report yesterday, saying the educational consequences of the quarter system are "more harmful than helpful."
UC regents switched to four 10 week quarters four years ago with the idea of more fully utilizing expensive campus facilities.
But the 1970 summer quarter was eliminated in an economy move and a similar move is being considered for next summer.

The summer quarter was "pivotal to the advantages of the quarter system," the committee said.

A survey last week of deans and department heads revealed that two favored quarters, three were neutral and 40 others "expressed mild to vehement disapproval."
The Berkeley Academic Senate has scheduled an advisory vote on the topic for Nov. 10. The final decision rests with UC regents.

Since abandonment of the system of two semesters in a nine-month academic year, the committee said incomplete grades have risen sharply.
"A student finds the quarter to be a hurried and unsatisfactory experience," the report said. "He spends a higher proportion of his time in mechanical tasks that have nothing to do with his education.
"The faculty member .. . finds himself teaching 'bit-sized' survey courses in the time available."

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## PROPOSED CONSTITUTION FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A CAMPUS GOVERNMENT AT SANTA ROSA JUNIOR COLLEGE

## PREFACE

The idea of a campus government was presented originally at this year's Hoberg's Conference in the form of a proposal which would somehow provide an organization that enhanced effective commanication between students, faculty, administration and classified staff. Reference was frequently made to the concept that we are all involved in education as one large family.

If we ere to function as "a large family", or indeed if we are even to communicate openly and honestly with one another, we must do so not only on retreats as was the case at Hoberg's, but at "home" also. It seems to me that wo should discuss and integrate our differences on campus and should strive to make future Hoberg's, "vacations" and not retreats for the entire "ramily"。

It is hoped that all copies of this constitution will be returned to me with comments and evaluations written in the same spirit as was this constitution; which was and still is a search for workable and creative solutions to the problems of conflict we all face on this campus.

Vital to the integration of any conflict is a feeling of equality sensed by the conflicting factions. Readers of this constitution hopefully will sense the importance of sincerely felt equality amongst students, faculty, administration and classified staff, that is necessary for efficient and meaningful commanication.

The adoption of this constitution or some closely related
form of it by all of us at this campus could minimize the severity of the divisions between us and maximize the potential for a meaningful educational experience so desired by us all.

This entire constitution has been taken froin a model prom posed by the Center for the Study of Democratic Institutions. Many valuable insights and key problems of faculty, students and administration were revealed to $m e$, and aided in the formalation of this constitution in "The American University" by Jacques Barzum, who was Dean of Faculties and Provost at Columbia University for twelve.years.

Personal thanks for encouragement and suggestions should go to my fellow students, faculty and administrators who I have met with in the past few months to discuss the idea of a campus government rather than a student body government.

PREAMBLE

We, the students, faculty, administration and classified staff of Santa Rosa Junior College, together with the Board of Trustees, in order to establish a fiexible and creative form of selfagovernment, do ordain this constitution as our own; whose purpose it shall be to provide for the constant improvement and quality of education through open and honest communication bew tween all concerned.

ARTICLE 1
Rights of the Governed
Membership in this organization shall be restricted to all concerned who purchase a Campus Government Card.

SECTION 1. No person, group, or assoaiation shall impinge upon the development of inteliectual curiosity, integrity, and acm complishment of any member of this organization.

The atmosphere of intellectual freedom whereby all concerned may best grow to understand moral, aesthetic, social, and economic values whall be preserved by this constitution.

SECTION 2. Academic freedom at this institution shall be officially limited to the definitions of Acsademic Freedom in the California Education Code. It is further recognized by members of this organization that if the California Education Code at any time appears to be in need of change, it shall be the responsibility of this government to respectfully submit proposals for change to the proper authority.

SECTION 3. The members of this organization recognize in good faith the the only power of veto over their government is held by the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College. If such power is ever exercised by the board, accompanying it must be specific recommendations for the revision of the legislation.

ARTICLE 12
Elections Board
SECTION I. In order to provide for the responsible selection of
candidates running for office in this campus government, there shall be an elections buard headed by the Dean of Campus Activities (presently the Student Activities Advisor) who shall appoint two students and one faculty member to assist him.
a. The members of this board shall not cast a vote in the elections for which they are serving.
b. Any appointee of the board may be removed by majority vote in the General Assembly. He shall be replaced by another appointee.

SECTION 2.
a. It shall be the responsibility of this board to provide adequate and convenient facilities for the electorate to discuss: issues with the condidates.
b. This board shall present to the electorate views of the President, the Planning Branch, and the General Assembly of this government on the state of the campus one week prior to the date set for nominations.
c. This board shall provide once a week facilities for voter registration during the entire school year except between the state of the campus messages provided for above and the election of candidates.
d. All voter registration shall be invalidated after each presidential election.
e. All members of this organization must register in order to vote.

SECTION 3. Persons wishing to be nominated for candidacy to any government office provided herein may be rejected only if they demonstrate to the elections board an unfamiliarity with the provisions of this constitution.

SECTION 4. This election board shall devise an election code which shall be approved by the majority of the General Assembly and the Planning Branch of the government.

ARTICLE 111
The Presidency
SECTION I. The president of this campus government shall be responsible to all its members and shall protect academic ireedom as guaranteed herein. He shall interpret for himself the spirit of this constitution and shall make every effort to insure its livelihood and viability. He shall be a representative of this campus government to the community of taxpayers who help to support this institution and shall respond justiy to their criticisms and comments concerning it.

SECTION 2. He shall be familiar with the provision of junior colleges as outlined in the California Education Code and shall respond to this code in a manner which is representative of this campus government.

SECTION 3. He shall take care that the educational resources available at this institution are evaluated according to the needs and wishes of the members of this organization and he shall make recommendations concerning the use of those resources to the proper authority.

SECTION 4. In case of iliness or resignation, the president may appoint one of the viceapresidents to succeed him.

SECTION 5. The General Assembly together with the Planning Age sembly may discharge the president with a two thirds majority vote in each assembly.

SECTION 6. The president shall submit whatever legislation he deems necessary to the General Assembly which shall be acted upon within thirty days.

SECTION 7. The president, with the assistance of the finance department provided for herein, shall submit budget proposals to the General Assembly for the following ilscal year by May 1 and final action by the General Assembly shall take place before the end of the school year.

ARTICLE IV
The Vice Presidencies
SECTION 1. There shall be one vice president elected from each of the following groups; students, faculty, administration and classified staff, whose responsibility it shall be to reflect the ideals and interests of the electorates they represent.

SECTION 2. The $\begin{aligned} \\ \text { ice presidents shall provide adequate feedback }\end{aligned}$ to their respective electorates concerning immediate and imm portant issues.

SECTION 3. The three vicempresidents shall work together to integrate conflicts which arise between their electorates. They shall be responsible for providing for a means of efficient and enjoyable communication which exists at all times between their respective electorates. They shall encourage a sense of equality and a singularity of purpose between their electorates and shall propose to the General Assembly whatever legislation they feel is necessary to achieve these ends. Such legislation must be acted upon by the General Assembly within thirty days.

SECTION 4. The vice presidents may be requested by the president to administer such duties as may be appropriate to their office.

## ABTICLE V

The General Assembly
SECTION 1. The General Assembly shall consist of the following voting membership:
a. one student and one faculty member, running on the same ballot, from each department included in education and instruction at this institution.
b. two administrators running on separate ballots.
c. two classified staff running on separate ballots.
d. 1) one student and one counselor running on a ballot for students with undeclared majors.
2) one student and one counselor running on another ballot for students with undeclared majors.
e. one member of the Board of Trustees of Santa Rose Junior College.

1. The above voting membership may receive at a general election one vote from each paid member of this organization who is registered to vote in the department most appropriate to their particular classification on campus. Students may vote in any one and only one department which they choose. Faculty must register to vote in the department they are from. Administrators and classified staff shall vote only in the department in wich they belong.
go One Commissioner of Speakers, Assemblies and Forums em lected by all concerned who shall appoint an assistant with one Vote in the Assembly.
h. One Commissioner of Social Events elected by all concerned who shall appoint an assistant with one vote in the assemily y .
2. Two Intex Club-Council Comissioners elected by members of the InnermClub-Council.
1) one commissioner shall represent clubs of a social nature.
2) the other commissioner shall represent clubs of an academic nature.
3) each shall have one vote in the General Assembly.

SECTION 2. Responsibilities of members of the General Assembly
a. The student/faculty departmental representatives shall reflect the interests and needs of their respective electorates.
b. The administrative representatives shall within the scope of this constitution reflect the interests and needs of the administration.
c. The classified Staff representatives shall reflect within the scope of this constitution the interests and needs of the classified staff.
d. The Comnissioner of Speakers, Assomblies and Forums tom gether with his assistant shall encourage the members of this organization to submit proposals for speakers, assemblies and forums. They shall also seek out persons to speak at this campus whorn may be appropriate to timely or desired issues. All proposals shall be passed by the majority of the General Assembly.

- The Commissioner of Social Events and his assistant shall provide for dances, rallies, parties and functions wich represent the various social interests of the members of this organization. Realizing the importance of social intercourse to all persons, the Commissioner of Social Events shall make every effort to coordinate some social events which provide for the general good feelings and happiness amongst all members of this organization. All events must be approved by a majority of the General Assembly.
f. The IntermClub Council Representatives shall reflect the interests of the clubs that they represent and shall do their ute most to encourage the formation of other clubs on this campus which represent the interests of the various members of this orm ganization.

SECTION 3. Duties of the General Assembly
The General Assembly shall:
a. meet twice weokly. At one of these meetings a member of the Board of Trustees shall be present and preferably a Board member shall be present at both meetings. Only one Board member may vote at meetings of the General Assembly.
b. be the official law-making and policy making body for all matters pertaining to the members of this organization that are within the scope of this constitution, and more specifically within the scope of the budget provided for herein.
c. determine the cost of the Campus Government Card which shall entitle the bearer to all benefits and protection provided herein for members of thes organization.

1) There shall be no free Gampus Government Cards given to any members of this organization.
2) All members of this organization must have a card. 3) Purchases of Campus Government Cards shall not bo retroactive.
3) The cost of the Campus Government Card shall be uniform.
4) Revenue from Campus Government Cards shall be col-
lected by the Department of Finance provided for herein.
d. make expenditures according to the budget provided for herein.
e. provide adequate insurance for risks and liabilities to members of this organization who are not covered elsewhere under other auspices of this institution.
f. set aside adequate funds for projects pursued by members of this organization which enhance development of intellectual curiosity and personal growth in moral, social, and economic values.
g. provide for changes in curriculum and instruction which will improve the quality of education as defined by members of this organization.
h. encourage experimentation and creative thought in newer and better ways of education.
1. be concious of the sense of equality and mutual respect between faculty, students, administration and classified staff.
that is the spirit and the law set forth herein.
J. provide in practice, services, activities, and general information for a cleaner, more numathe and more beautiful natural enviornment which will best serve not only the members of this organization but the community outside of this campus.
k. pass all legislation by a majority vote of its members present except in cases specifically provided for herein.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of the elected representatives to present a budget request for the following fiscal year to the Finance Department provided herein by April l. Only one budget request shall be submitted from each department which is rem presented in the assembly. Budget requests must be specifically related to the provision of this constitution.

## SECTION 5. Committees:

a. shall be formed by caucus with a chairman appointed by the General Assembly Chairman.
b. shall approve all action by majoritv vote. If a committee is to become permanent on this campus, its members shall serve no longer than two years and vacancies may be filled by appointment of the committee chaiman. All matters within the scope of this constitution which are annually or routinely handled shall be placed on the agenda of the General Assembly. (Several existing committees should be dissolved and their functions absorbed by the General Assembly).

SECTION 6. The Faculty Vice-president of this organization shal 1 serve as Chairman of the General Assembly for its first three meotings. At the fourth meeting the Vice-president shall conduct nominations and elections for General Assembly chairman from amongst its members.

ARTICLE VI
The Planning Department
SECTION 1. Shall be composed if they so desire, of all presidents and vice-presidents who have held office within the past three years. The presidents and vice-presidents who wish to become members of this department shall appoint by majority consent past members of the General Assembly who wish to become members of this department. The above members of the department may ape point by majority consent anyone who is a member of this organ1zation. The planning department shall not total more than one half of the Genoral Aissembly.

SECTION 2. Members of the planning assembly shall elect a chairman from amongst themselves who shall serve for one year unless the members of the department wish to discharge him and elect another in his place.

SECIION 3. The Planning Department shall meet once a week and preferably one of the days after the General Assembly meets.

SECTION 4. The Planning Department shal l review all proposals passed by the General Assembly and either pass it by majority to the Board of Trustees or return it to the General Assembly by majority vote with recommendations. The objection stands un= less the Assembly passes the proposal again by a majority vote at which time the proposal is final.

SECTION 5. It shall be the resposivility of the Planning Department to recommend alterations of this constitution which will correspond to similar alterations in the members of this organization as a whole.

SECTION 6. The Planning Department shall do its utmost to anticipate crisis and shall propose solutions to prevent it. Niso this department shall seek out and arrange for research on the improvement of higher education and shall involve itself with the imaginative and philosophical aspects of education as provided for herein.

SECTION 7. Members of this assombly may be asked by the president of this campus government to:
a. attend conferences and conventions sponsored on behalf of higher education and to initiate proposals for the same. b. to sponsor events for the pullic which will involve them in matters of an educational nature relating to this college.

SECTION 8. The Planning Department shall at all times be conscious of the competency, integrity and efficiency of all facets of this govermment. as provided herein. They shall help to ine sure the safety of intellectual curiosity, academic freedom, and the enviornment which is most conducive to the development of social, economic and moral values provided for herein.

All proposals which relate to this section shall be acted upon by the General Assembly within thirty days after they are received.

SECTION 9. The Planning Department shall submit its budget prom posals by April 1 to the Department of Finance.

ARTICLE VII
Department of Finance
SECTION 1. a) Shall consist of two students appointed by the president on recommendationfrom the chaiman of the Department of Business at this college. One faculty member in the Department of Business shall be the
advisor.
b) One of these three persons shall be in attendance at each General Assembly meeting.
c) Shall meet with the Planning Department if roo quested.
d) Shall counsel with the President on the budget proposals received from the General Assembly and Planning Department on April 1.
e) And shall work with the President in proparing a budget for the following fiscal year which shall be completed by April 30.

SECTION 2. If no students majoring in business desire to receive credit for serving in the Department of Finance, the President shall appoint three persons familiar with governmental accounting to serve and they shall receive pay as decided upon by a majore ity of the General Assembly. Paic persons shall not have priore ity over students who wish to serve in this department for credit.

SECTION 3. It shall be the duty of this department to make monthly reports of all income and expenditures of this government and to provide updated reports upon request to any member of this organization.

SECTION 4. This department shall collect all monies as may be authorized by the General Assembly.

SECTION 5. Members of this department are encouraged to give advice to persons serving in this government.

SECTION 6. The President of this government shall sign for all payments of bilis and requisitions releasing the funds of this organization. If he is not present to sign or if he is under the age of twenty-one, he shall authorize one of the vice-presidents to sign for him.

ARTICLE WIII
General Provisions
SEGTION 1. The President shall present to the Department of Finance a budget proposal which shall pay for all proposed secretarial and administrative functions necessary to the officient operation of this government. No person holding an office may be paid for service in that office or be appointed for a job which is funded by the members of this organization. No person appointed by the President to a paid secretarial or administrative position shall have a vote in the General Assembly or Planning Branch.

SECTION 2. All complaints from members of this organization concerning elected officials shall be submitted to the chairman of the Planning Department and further investigation may be completed as provided herein.

SECTION 3. No elected or appointed member of this government shall accept bribes for services rendered while in office.

SECTION 4. All persons who intend to serve in this government shall be selected on the basis of individual capabilities and for no other reason.

SECTION 5. Funds collected from the members of this organization may be spent only as authorized.

SECTION 6. AIl government officers shall be elected for one year.
SECTION 7. All students participating in this government shall receive credit as authorized by the General Assembly. SECTION 8. The president of this government shall be a student.

ARTICLE IX
SECTION 1. Amendments to this constitution shall not conflict with any other part of it.

SECTION 2. Amendment proposals shall be presented to and discussed with the Planning Department. Upon their recomendation the amendment proposal shall go tio the General Assembly, wherem by with a majority vote, the proposal shall be presented to the electorate in the coming general elections. If two-thirds of the electorate vote for the proposal it shall become an amendment to this constitution.

SECTIUN 3. A proposal may be made by any member of this organization to rewrite any part or all of this constitution. In such a case, the Planning Department shall review the proposal and submit it to the General Assembly, whereby after review, it shall then be presented to the electorate in the next general election. If the proposal passes by a twoothirds majority of the olectorate it shall become effective in the following school year.

ARTICLE X Enactment Clause

SECTION 1. Upon approval (in the coming election, Fall 1970) of three-fourths of the students who voted in the last general election, this constitution shall become effective (in the 19711972 school year) in all articles which provide for their
inclusion.
SECTION 2. Upon approval of the Faculty Senate, faculty mem bers shall become a part of this government in all articies in which they are provided for herein.

SECTIUN 3. Upon approval of the Administration and Classified Staff, this constitution shall become effective in all articles which provide for their inclusione.

## ELECTION CODE

SECTION 1. The Elections Committee shall be composed of the following: Elections Commissioner as chairman, Executive Vice President, one Representative-At-Large and other members deemed necessary by the committee chairman.
A. If any members of the committee shall be a candidate in an election, the President shall appoint a temporary replacement to serve only for that election.

SECTION 2. The Elections Committee shall serve as the governing body over all general and special elections.
A. A general election is that in which candidates for Associated Student offices, Homecoming and Bear Fair queens and Bear Fair Ugly Man are elected.
B. A special election is that in which the College Student Assembly announces an election for purposes other than the above.

SECTION 3. Any Santa Rosa Junior College student who has purchased an Associated Student membership card shall be eligible to cast one ballot.

SECTION 4. The College Student Assembly shall determine the exact dates of the regular and special Associated Student elections.
A. Elections for Associated Student President, Executive Vice President, Vice President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary shall not be later than three weeks prior to the end of the semester or before eight weeks prior to the end of the semester.
B. The election for Head Song Leader and Head Yell Leader shall be during the Spring semester preceeding the term of office and held on the same day as the general election for other Associated Student offices.
C. Election for Representatives -At-Large for the Fall Semester shall not be later than four weeks and not before two weeks after the Fall semester begins. Spring semester election for Representatives-At-Large shall be conducted on the same day as the general election for other Associated student officers for the Spring semester. All Associated Student members may vote for eight Representatives-At-Large, four to be Sophomores and four to be Freshmen.

SECTION 5. Casting of the votes shall take place over a one day period, from $10 \mathrm{a}_{0} \mathrm{~m}_{\mathrm{a}}$ to 2 pom . and not less than two polling places will be in operation during this time. At the discretion of the Elections Committee one polling place may be located inside the cafeteriad

SECTION 6. A candidate for all offices must be in regular attendance.
A. All elected members of the College Student Assembly must be able to attend College Student Assembly meetings as scheduled.
B. All candidates must have a 2.0 grade average during the semester in which elected in order to take office the following semester.
C. Candidates for all offices, except Representatives-At+Large must have completed twelve units or more at Santa Rosa Junior College before taking office.
D. Candidates for President shall have had at least two successive semesters of academic work and twenty units or more at Santa Rosa Junior College prior to taking office.

SECTION 7. All candidates must have read and be familar with the Associated Students of Santa Rosa Junior College Constitution and all Codes and Statutes.

SECTION 8. Candidates for Head Yell Leader and Head Song Leader shall declare the names of their assistants at the time of filing for nomination and present a statement of good health signed by a plyysician for all assistants, Head Yell Leader and Head Song Leader.

SECTION 9. No person may run for more than one Associated Students office in a given semester.

SECTION 10. Nominations for office shall be by petition.
A. Petitions may be obtained from the Activities Office no earlier than fifteen days before the election and returned to the Activities Office no later than five days before the election.
B. Petitions shall include the name, address, phone number, office sought and class schedule and must be signed by at least 75 Associated Student members.
C. All petitions shall be checked by the Elections Commissioner to be sure the candidate is eligible.
D. In the event a minimum of two petitions is not filed for one office with the Activities Office by deadline date, the College Student Assembly may, by majority vote, nominate eligible candidates.

SECTION 11. All elections shall be by secret ballot.
A. The order of candidates' names on the ballot will be in alphabetical order under the candidates' respective offices unless the incumbent is running for re-election and then his name shall appear first.
B. The order in which the offices shall be placed is: President, Executive Vice-President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Head Yell Leader Head Song Leader, and Representatives-At-Large.
C. Candidates running for re-election shall have "incumbent" placed under their names, candidates presently holding another elected or appointed College Student Assembly office may designate that office under their name, and other candidates may state positions held in any other recognized student organization.

SECTION 12. Write-in votes may be written in pencil or pen and a write-in candidate, for an office with no nominated candidate, must have at least fifty write-in votes for one office in order to be declared elected.

SECTION 13. All properly marked ballots shall be counted no later than five hours after the closing of the polls. The Activities Advisor shall be responsible for the safekeeping of the ballots for two weeks after the election, upon which time the ballots shall be destroyed.

SECTION 14. Results will be posted at the Activities Office only after each candidate is notified by the Elections Commissioner and told of the candidates victory or defeat.
A. The posted results shall include the amount of votes cast for each candidate and shall designate under each office the winning candidate. The posting of the amount of votes cast for each candidate shall only apply to Associated Student officers' elections.

SECTION 15. The Elections Commissioner and one other Elections Committee member shall send to the President the names of the elected candidates and their respective offices along with one blank ballot with the votes cast for each candidate within twentyfour hours after the election.

SECTION 16. Nominees for the elected Associated Student offices shall be allowed no less than five minutes each for a campaign speech at a regular assembly of the Association.
A. Candidates may have one other student speak before and/or in place of the candidate.
B. The Assemblies Commissioner shall preside at the assembly. In case he is running for office, the President shall appoint another student.

SECTION 17. Candidates may use the Activities Office duplication machine at no cost.

SECTION 28. There will be no campaigning the day of election within fifteen feet of the polls.
SECTION 19 No more than $\$ 25.00$, including contributions, may be spent for one campaign for each candidate.
A. All candidates or their campaign managers must file in writing to the Elections Commissioner within three weeks after the election a detailed report of expenses of their campaign.
B. If a candidate is found to have spent more than $\$ 25.00$, or has filed a false statement of expenses, this shall be sufficient grounds for either disqualification of cadidacy or removal from office. In the event a candidate is removed from office under this Section, the provisions of Section 20 shall apply.
SECTION 20 It shall be the duty of the Rlections Commissioner to regulate campaigning and disqualify any candidate found by the Commissioner to be in violation of any rules or regulations of the Associated Students.
A. Any candidate disqualified may appeal the decision of the Commissioner to the College Student Assembly within eight days after the decision of the Elections Commissioner. A two-thirds vote of the College Student Assembly members voting shall reinstate the candidate.
(1) If a candidate is disqualified and then reinstated, but after the election, the President shall declare the election for the office void and a special election shall be held within ten days after reinstatement.
B. The 议ections Commissioner shall inform the President, in writing, of any protests of violations by any student to the Elections Committee, within twenty-four hours after the protest has been made.

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S.R.J.C. ## ASB Publicity Code
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PURPOSE: The purpose of this code is to provide more orderly, pleasing and effective publicity, and at the same time retain the beauty at the SRJC campus. DEFINITION: "Poster" is construed to mean any means of conveying messages other than by machines.

## Section I - Content

Clause I Posters will deal with information of general interest, to faculty, administration, and students originating with student groups (clubs, organizations and Associated Students).

Clause II Posters will deal with election announcements (see election rules), events of clubs and organizations, dances, assemblies, athletics events, MidDay Series, Open Forum, Academic Department announcements and events, and others at the discretion of the Publicity Commissioner or the Advisor of Student Activities.

## Section II - Approval

Clause I All posters must be approved before posting. This may be done in the office of Student Activities by the Publieity Commissioner, his delegated representative, or by the Advisor of Student Activities. Posters which are not approved will be removed.

Clause II Approval of posters will be made depending on appropriatness as to size and content.

## Section III - Placement

Clause I In general, all posters will be confined to the area in front of Doyle Center across the campus to the north side of the Auditorium and from the front of Analy Hall west across the campus to the circle drive. Other areas for publicity will be considered at the discretion of the Publicity
(Section III - Clause I Con't.)
Commissioner or the Advisor of Student Activities.
Clause II The interior of the Cafeteria will be used on occasion by the Publicity Commissioner only, or his designated agent, for publicizing an ASB activity or event of such importance to be of interest to the campus community as a whole.

Clause III The fourbrick columns in the cafeteria, up to the ceiling of the inside terrace room and the four outside brick columns on the south wall of the cafeteria, (outside only) up to the overhang, may be used for publicity by the Publicity Commissioner or his designated agent. No handbills or leaflets may be distributed in the cafeteria.

Clause IV The brick columns in the interior of the cafeteria may be used for general Associated Students publicity with the approval of the Publicity Commissioner, his designated agent or the Student Activities Advisor. Clause $V$ No posters of any kind are to be placed on campus other than the area designated under Section III, Clause I and II unless specific exception is authorized by the Advisor of Student Activities.
Clause VI No publicity will be placed on or in buildings except as other wise noted in this code. Publicity cannot be located where it will obstruct walkways or driveways - - Publicity will be placed on Large Oak trees only (no small trees to be used). This clause will be strictly enforced.

Clause VII All posters are to be fastened securely at all corners. Means of fastening will be determined by material of surface upon which the poster is to be placed. -- Examples are tying, if possible; using masking tape or other kinds of adhesive that are not harmful or detrimental to the wall or surface; or taking (if first checked with Publicity Commissioner or Advisor or Student Activities).

Clause VIII No posters can be placed in or on the windows of coop. Only those areas noted in Clauses III and IV.

## Section IV - Bulletin Board Notices

Clause I Student's personal notices, such as items for sale or trade, may be placed on the bulletin board located in Analy and Burbank Halls and on the Kiosks. These signs will be removed by the Publicity Commissioner or his designated representatives.

## Section V - Transportation Requests

Clause I Transportation requests may be placed only on the bulletin board right outside the Student Activities Office. Standard Advertisement cards must be procured in the Student Activities Office.

Section VI - Kiosks and Analy Hall Bulletin Board

Clause I Notices and publicity for general Student Body interest may be placed on the Kiosks and the Analy Hall Bulletin Board $-\infty$ Use to clubs and individuals is also accepted, but must be approved by the Publicity Commissioner or the Advisor of Student Activities for that purpose.

## Section VII - OffoCampus Organizations, Groups or Individuals

Clause I. All off-campus posters, literature and publicity must be approved by the Counseling Coordinator (Dean of Student's Office).

## Section VIII - Time Limits

Clause I All campaign posters within a radius of ten (10) yards of the polling place are to be taken down the day before the election.

Clause II All campaign posters must be taken down carefully no later than twenty-four hours after the event if the event is held after Friday noon. Clause III All posters will be restricted to two weeks posting prior to the event.

Clause IV During elections each candidate will be limited to a maximun of 10 posters. Posters will be of reasonable size decided upon by the Publicity Commissioner. No hanging signs except by the Publicity Commissioner for Associated Students purposes.

Section IX - Responsibility

Clause I All posters must be stamped for approval before posting. This may be done in the Student Activities Office by the Publicity Commissioner or his designated representative or the Advisor of Student Activities.

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(Section IX - Con't.)
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Clause II It shall not be the responsibility of the Publicity Commissioner to make or provide materials except for Associated Student functions. Clause III The responsibility for all campaign posters rests with the individual publicized. Failure to comply with this publicity code will result in the removal of a candidate from an election. Individuals, clubs and organizations in violation of this code will be subject to a fine of not more than 曹15.00. Clause IV Clubs and organizations publicizing an event are responsible for their posters and publicity machines.
Clause $V$ Any poster or publicity machine which represents a violation of this code will be removed at the discretion of the Publicity Commissioner.
Clause VI Any person mutilation or moving any poster or publicity machine, other than the publicity Commissioner, will be summoned to appear before the CSA Executive Cabinet and will be subject to their action.

Clause VII An appeal to ation taken by the CSA Executive Cabinet may be taken to the College Student Assembly for a decision. Clause VIII Any exception to these regulations must be approved by the CSA Executive Cabinet.

## STUDENT PROJECT GRANT GUIDELINES

1. Student Project Grants will be granted by a majority vote of the College Student Assembly.
2. Student Project Grants will be considered on a first come-first served basis.
3. A Student Project Geant for a single project may not exceed $\$ 300$ and an individual may receive only one grant for the year 1970-1971.
4. Each application for a Student Project Grant will include a detailed description of the proposed project. The description will also show the educational value of the project.
5. The application will include some information about the student and will include a statement of his purpose in doing the project.
6. Each Student Project Grant application will include a detailed budget breakdown.
7. Students must have a faculty advisor to assist them with the project. The student will be required to meet with the advisor once every two weeks to discuss the progress of the project. Failure to aggressively seek the advice of the faculty advisor may result in charges of misconduct against the student.
8. All financial matters pertaining to the Student Project Grants will be handled through the Student Activities Office. All requests for funds must be signed by the student and by his faculty advisor.
9. Each application will be submitted to the Student Activities Office. Upon submission, it will be dated. If an application is incomplete it will be returned to the student and the application will lose its priority status.
10. [athStppan lioject Grants for the year 1970-1971 will be completed by June 1, 1971.
11. Each application will be signed by the student and his advisor.

The purpose of our joint research project is to explore three areas of the silk screen printing process. In all three projects the application of photographic stencils will be used to derive the imagery.

Rick Cate will explore the interaction and relativity of color. of primary concern will be the investigation of non-spectral color, namely fluorescent silk screen pigments. This will be accomplished by the use of multiple printings using repeated images and then varying the colors and registration of each printing.

Steven Kelez's project will involve the investigation of photomechanical technioues and manipulations in creatinp photo-silk screen stencils. This will include rosterization, montage imares, and the overprinting of multiple texture and pattern screens. Also planned is an experiment to create what appears to be a three dimensional image, but infact is a two dimensional print. This is possible by offsetting each print and by using colored filters when viewing the final print.

Gary Lisandrelli plans to explore imagery possibilities by combining hand derived stencils (direct blockout) with photographically derived stencils. By combining these two stencil techniaues Gary plans to create imarery that becomes surreal. Within this surrealistic format Gary also intends to create the sensation of motion, metamorphasis and depth.

All three particirants are art majorswith a special interest in printing and photography. By combining these two graphic arts processes we hope to explore a new dimension in image making. Through practical application we also hope to learn about color and form and its effects upon one another in creating an image. By having a joint project , with individual research, we feel that there will be a great deal of information
exchange as well as a sharing of the materials involved.
Upon the successful completion of this project we plan to put on an exhibit of our best prints in each area we have chosen to work in. We hope you will make this possible through your generousity and the student Project Grant.
