Students Seek Rental Housing

Organized Hitchhiking Being Tried

An effort is being made at Santa Rosa Junior College this fall to regulate, or at least organize, hitchhiking by students to and from the campus.

The program, going into effect this week, is designed to help students get back and forth to the campus, especially those who have to rely on their thumb as a means of getting rides. Concern for the program began last spring after two SRJC coeds disappeared while hitchhiking. One was found dead. The other is missing.

Spearheading the organized hitchhiking program is James Guichard, who has been appointed by student body president Joe Blackburn as the first Transportation Commissioner at the college.

Guichard, 25, married and majoring in Forestry at SRJC, contacted Sonoma County Undersheriff Robert Hayes and other state and county officials enlisting their suggestions and co-operation in developing a plan. As set up, hitchhiking students at SRJC are being urged to ride only with fellow students, whose cars are identified by an SRJC student parking sticker.

Campus hitchhikers may obtain—free of charge—a placard identifying them as a student at the college when hitchhiking rides. Also being passed out is a sheet of common sense advice for potential hitchhikers, urging them to use caution, and listing some procedures they should follow in accepting rides.

An integral part of the program, modeled after a similar arrangement at California State College, Sonoma, is an alert board where students may anonymously post information about cars or drivers they have had bad experiences with. This can include descriptions of cars and drivers, license numbers, and other similar information.

According to figures from the Sonoma County Sheriff's office there were 39 rapes in the county in 1971 that were reported, 30 of these were directly attributable to hitchhiking. Officials estimate only 25 to 30 per cent of such incidents are reported.

Figures for the first six months of this year are in the same vein. Nine rapes, eight incidents of indecent exposure, and 20 cases of assault were reported by hitchhikers in the county.

According to Guichard, several other steps to improve the ride situation are on the horizon. A computer print-out will be out in about two weeks, which will list names and addresses of students by various county areas, and whether they have transportation or need rides.

Hopefully, this will make it easier for students to get together and share transportation.

\$1.25 Million for SRJC If Proposition One Passes

Santa Rosa Junior College could receive about \$1.25 million to finance a new liberal arts building if Proposition 1, the \$160 million Community College Construction Bond issue on the November ballot, receives voter approval.

Major purpose of the measure, which needs only a simple majority to pass, is to provide the necessary funds to meet the major building construction, equipment and site acquisition needs of the state's existing 68 community college districts. It is anticipated that the bonds would provide building funds through 1974-75.

According to the California Junior College Association, "The ballot proposal will be for general obligation bonds of the state, the least expensive means of financing other than through a direct tax . . . State law sets the maximum interest rate at seven per cent. The State Treasurer has been selling bonds at between 4.7 and 5 per cent."

Supporters of the measure

point out that the bonds will not be sold until needed and the funds will be subject to the same review and control as general fund expenditures.

Bond funds cannot be used for matching district funds to build dormitories or student unions, to pay salaries or to purchase supplies. The bond issue "will be paid from state taxes on sales, personal income, banks, corporations, insurance, inherit-

ances, gifts, cigarettes, alcoholic beverages and horse racing."

Proposition I is being supported by the state AFL-CIO, the State Chamber of Commerce and the entire Santa Rosa Junior College campus community including the board of trustees, students, faculty, classified staff and administration.

SRJC officials indicate that in addition to getting the funds for the new liberal arts building, the college is hopeful of qualifying for an additional \$500,000 in federal funds.

Liberal arts has been granted top priority at SRJC because the disciplines involved — English, ethnic studies, foreign languages, philosophy, social sciences — are housed either in temporary and leased facilities, or in buildings identified for other instructional areas as part of the campus master plan.

Occupancy of the new liberal arts building is planned for the 1976-77 academic year.

It is hoped that Proposition I would also provide SRJC with enough money to remodel Analy Hall into a permanent facility for the art department and possibly pave the way for an environmental science building.

The new art facility is planned for 1976-77 and the environmental science building for 1978-79.

Switchboard Is on Again

The Santa Rosa Junior College-based Community Switchboard is back in operation again after being dormant over the summer months.

The operation is manning telephones from 10 a.m. until 10 p.m. on weekdays, with a possibility of expanding into weekend hours as well.

By dialing 528-CARE, area residents can obtain information on a limitless number of subjects — Weather reports, transportation schedules, entertainment activities and other types of information are available from operators, who are backed up by researchers who will tackle the more difficult requests.

Switchboard prefers not to deal in crisis matters and usually refers this type of calls to other agencies, such as 544-HELP. The service, housed and financially supported by the Associated Students at SRJC, is probably the only service of its type in the north bay area.

The office, located in the Doyle Student Center at SRJC, serves as headquarters for campus car pool efforts, as well as for a campus housing operation.

Students working on the project this year are being given credit under a Social Science 51 project at the college, which provides academic credit for work in approved community involvement projects. Non-SRJC students are welcome to involve

themselves in Switchboard.

Besides the actual answering — office operation, Switchboard maintains a small lounge with informal activities for drop-ins. Activities include craft demonstrations and chess lessons.

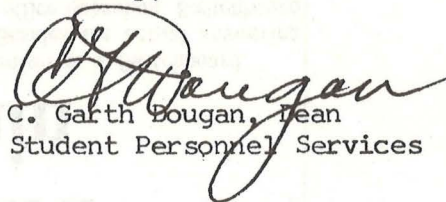

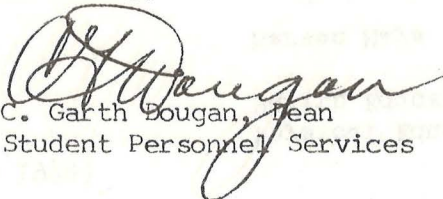

2. Will the Department take the initiative in establishing appropriate courses utilizing the FM Station as a Radio Broadcasting instructional tool?
3. Will the Speech Department arrange for a faculty member to teach the broadcasting courses and supervise the operation of the station?

If the answers to the above questions are affirmative, the College Student Assembly will press for the allocation of space for the station in Doyle Student Center, and also assist in the funding for the station.

We will need a tentative reply by October 23, 1972.

The Speech Department has responded, tentatively and informally, to your letter of 16 September 1972 regarding the establishment of a ten-watt educational channel FM broadcast facility in the Doyle Student Center. We would now like to respond more formally and to make clear the conditions under which Speech Department operation of an FM station is feasible. In answer to your specific questions:

1.) The Speech Department is indeed interested in establishing an FM radio station on campus. A broadcast facility is an integral part of the department's master plan and of its eventual curriculum in mass media. The generous offer of assistance and space from the College Student Assembly makes an eventual development imminent and is, of course, welcomed by the Department. The benefits of an FM station to the students of Santa Rosa Junior College are, of course, obvious; the Speech Department and the CSA share a common concern.

2.) Courses in Broadcast Station Operation (including console-engineering, programing, copywriting, news presentation, and management as well as broadcast ethics) and in such skills as announcing are part of the Department's master plan, and the Speech Department will indeed take the initiative in establishing these courses and making them available to all qualified students within whatever limitations of space, personnel, and budget that may develop.

3.) The Speech Department will arrange for a faculty member to teach the broadcasting courses and supervise the operation of the station, subject to approval by appropriate College bodies.

In short, the Department welcomes this opportunity to accelerate the development of a student station and broadcasting curriculum, and looks forward to a relationship with the CSA that will benefit the maximum number of SRJC students and the Santa Rosa community at large. The educational, cultural, and social benefits to the college, its students, and the larger community are self-evident.

There are, however, certain conditions regarding the operation of a station that the Speech Department agreed upon in its meeting of 25 October 1972. These conditions are important to the successful and continuing operation of a station; there are obligations both to academic tradition and to the process of operating a government-licensed broadcast station that must be met if the station is to be a continuing, viable force in the college and the community. We ask your agreement on the following points:



1.) While the responsibility for licensing the station will probably be that of the Sonoma County Junior College Board of Trustees, the administrative responsibility for operation of the station will rest with the Speech Department. This includes program content, selection and supervision of student staff, and policy decisions in the day-to-day operation of the station. The Speech Department recognizes, of course, the probable desire of the Associated Students to serve in an advisory capacity and welcomes advice from student government. It is assumed that suitable processes for advisory help will be established.

2.) The Speech Department assumes that partial funding for the construction and continuing operation of the station will be forthcoming from the Associated Students and that additional funding from the Board of Trustees will affect neither present Speech Department budgets nor future funding from either body for non-broadcast functions of the Speech Department.

3.) Financial arrangements acceptable to the Speech Department will have to be made for maintenance and operation of the station in future years, so that the broadcast facility can be permanent in accordance with FCC regulations. The Department cannot do this from present budgets.

4.) Suitable space for the operation of the station must be made available on a permanent basis -- the Department does not presently have suitable space, and FCC technical requirements governing transmitter situation dictate a permanent location.

5.) The successful operation of the station is dependent on the College's agreement that the person designated by the Speech Department to teach broadcasting and to manage the station be assigned each semester as part of his load one class release-time for station management as well as one teaching class assignment in Broadcast Station Operation.

The Speech Department is delighted at the prospect of joining the Associated Students in this important project. We trust that the CSA will realize that the conditions set forth above are necessary for the adequate planning of an on-going broadcast operation by the College. We trust, too, that you will forgive the necessarily formal tone of this letter. We look forward to a relationship of great benefit to the students of Santa Rosa Junior College.

PROPOSAL

Subject: Utilization of the present Student Activities Office Space

Adopted: By the Student Affairs Committee on October 19, 1972
By the Executive Cabinet, College Student Assembly on October 25, 1972

During the spring semester of 1972, the Student Affairs Committee and the Student Assembly adopted and forwarded to the president of the college a resolution which stated that the present Bookstore and Student Activities Office spaces should be utilized in the future for Student Activities or Student Services. On October 5, 1972, the Student Affairs Committee again unanimously adopted a resolution which proposed that the Bookstore space and Student Activities Office space, when vacated, should be used for Student Activities or Student Services. It is clear to those who have studied the facilities, that the Doyle Student Center should remain a center for student extra-curricular activity.

The basic student proposal is that the present Bookstore facility (in its entirety) should be converted into additional food services, a student lounge and recreation-game room. The food service portion of this facility should take two forms. It is envisioned that there would be a barbeque grill arrangement, in conjunction with a delicatessen or sandwich bar operation. The facility should be so arranged so that the Student Lounge could also serve as a coffee house when desired. In addition, it is proposed that the area from the east side of the Bookstore to the cafeteria be screened off to form a sheltered outdoor eating area.

The second portion of this proposal deals with the present Student Activities Office space. This proposal would designate this space as the location of an on-campus FM Radio Station. This portion of this proposal would be based on the Speech Department's willingness to develop the curriculum in support of a radio broadcasting program and to make arrangements for the faculty person necessary to teach the classes and supervise the station's operation. If the Speech Department is unable, or unwilling to proceed with the establishment of an FM Radio Station, then it is proposed that the offices of the Oak Leaf be moved into the present Student Activities Office space.

It is envisioned that the Student Switchboard operation would continue to be housed in the Doyle Student Center. The present Journalism space should be used for additional direct student services. Included in this area would be a new student housing office.

 - a. Community College Film Guild

Last Monday evening I spent 2½ hrs. at a Board of Trustees meeting and came away extremely disappointed because a proposal that had been made was defeated. It was not so much that the proposal was defeated that upset me but rather the attitude of one of the Board members. The item before the Board was a \$1,700 change order to provide wood paneling in the Assembly Room in Pioneer Hall. The concept of this room had been planned by Dr. Newman, who was then president of the college, and who now is Administrative Assistant to the President; by the architects, one of whom is inspector for the college, on the job, Walt Brown; and by myself. During the progress of the preliminary stages of the project, it is necessary to remove this item in order to try to bring the cost of the building down. However, very recently, Dr. Newman, Walt Brown, the architect Steele and van Dyk, and I all concurred the paneling in this room was necessary to establish a certain feeling for this meeting place. As it is now planned, it will look very much like a classroom. I feel very strongly about surroundings and how they affect people and the things that people do. I want the Assembly Room to be a place of some formality. A place where the best is expected from people. With the Assembly feels the necessity to weigh carefully the proposal before them students at large. Therefore, after the architect had made his proposal rather badly, I added that we wanted this to be a special place. I am afraid that some of the Board members did not understand. One of the responses I received was that one of the Board members had gone to school in a place with concrete floors and concrete walls and that was sufficient. His attitude was that this was a frivolous extravagance. I am afraid from his attitude when the proposal was voted down, by a tie vote incidentally, I really felt, Oh the hell with it! During this past week two different students convinced me that this item was important, was \$1,700 worth important. That this room was be used by the College Student Assembly in years to come. That we might invite, my idea was that we invite the Faculty Senate to use this facility, and that we will be making it available to other conferences, meetings, by on-campus groups and by community groups and that it should be a special place. And, so, I bring this item to the College Student Assembly, asking that you be more sensitive and more understanding than our own Board of Trustees.

It is too bad that a publication such as the BEAR FACTS should be used to express political opinion by the Board of Trustees when it is a rule that no political opinions should be expressed in the BEAR FACTS.

I am in agreement with what is being said, to vote yes on Proposition 1, and no on 14, but there are other propositions which also are very important, maybe not to the Administration but to the students; Proposition 22, Proposition 19, Proposition 20, Proposition 7, Proposition 11, and Proposition 18, all could very much affect the student depending on the vote. These do not really economically concern the Junior College, but they could affect individual students in varying degrees. Those students who have gone to jail because of marijuana laws, those farmworkers who cannot afford to send their children to a community college, and so on down those listed above.

It is extremely unfair to the students that the controversial issues such as Propositions 1 and 14 should be allowed in the BEAR FACTS, and other very controversial and perhaps as important issues to individual students cannot.

A rule should not be made to be broken, or if a rule is amended for a particular reason such as two propositions, then that amendment should be open to all the other propositions. Board policy should apply also to the Board. Economics is very important in running this Junior College, but so is the welfare of many individual students, or students to be, who will be affected greatly by the vote on the Propositions.

ACADEMIC STANDARDS SRJC

PRESENT

PROBATION 1

A student will be placed on probation 1 for any of the following reasons:

If upon admission to the college his record is not satisfactory; (See ADMISSION)

If upon withdrawal after the ninth week his grade point average for that semester is between 1.00 and 1.99

PROBATION 2

A student will be placed on probation 2 for any one of the following reasons:

If upon admission to the college his record is not satisfactory; (see ADMISSION)

If while on probation 1 he withdraws after the ninth week and his grade point average for work in progress is between 1.00 and 1.99;

If while on probation 1 he completes a semester and his grade point average for that semester is between 1.00 and 1.99

CONTINUED PROBATION

A student on probation 1 or 2 earning 2.00 or better grade point average in more than twelve units attempted will remain on the same status.

REMOVAL OF PROBATION

A student on probation 1 or 2 will be given clear status upon earning a 2.00 or better grade point average in all work undertaken in a minimum of twelve more units attempted in one or more semesters.

PROPOSED

PROBATION

A student will be placed on probation for any one of the following reasons:

If upon admission to the college his record is not satisfactory;

Upon readmission to the college following disqualification;

If his Santa Rosa Junior College cumulative grade point average is between 1.00 and 1.99

CONTINUED PROBATION

A student on probation who earns a C (2.00) or better grade point average for the semester but lacks a cumulative grade point average of C (2.00) or better at Santa Rosa Junior College will remain on continued probation.

REMOVAL OF PROBATION

A student will be removed from probation when his cumulative grade point average at Santa Rosa Junior College is a C (2.00) or better.

PRESENT

QUALIFICATION

(not applicable during summer session)

A student will be disqualified and notified of this to his parents as well if he is under 21)

If upon completion of a semester while on probation 2 his grade point average for that semester is below 2.00;

If while on probation 2 he withdraws after the ninth week and his grade point average for work in progress is below 2.00;

If upon the completion of a semester his grade point average for that semester is below 1.00;

If upon withdrawal after the ninth week his grade point average for work in progress is below 1.00.

QUALIFICATION FOR READMISSION

A student may petition for readmission on probation 2:

After completing five or more units with a 2.00 or better grade point average in summer session, correspondence, or another accredited college; or

After an absence of one or more semesters.

PROPOSED

DISQUALIFICATION

A student on probation whose grade point average remains below C (2.00) for two successive semesters at Santa Rosa Junior College will be dismissed unless his grade point average for the last semester completed is a C (2.00) or better.

A student whose semester grade point average is below D (1.00) will be dismissed.

A student readmitted after disqualification whose semester grade point average is below C (2.00) will be dismissed.

QUALIFICATION FOR READMISSION

A dismissed student may petition for readmission on probation:

After completing five or more units (excluding CR/NC) with a C (2.00) or better grade point average in summer session, correspondence, or another accredited college; or

After an absence of one or more semesters.

ELIMINATION OF AN "F" GRADE

Where a course is not repeated, the student may petition to have "F" grades removed upon the subsequent completion of 24 or more units with a C (2.00) or better grade point average. CR/NC will not count toward the 24 units.

The units used in the above calculations need not be taken in consecutive semesters, nor is there a minimum load requirement for any one semester. However, all units recorded, except CR/NC, will be used in the grade point average calculations.

These units may be taken at any accredited institution.

PRESENT

COMPLETE GRADES

Complete grades should be given only in EXCEPTIONAL circumstances whereby the student has not been able to complete the examination. If the examination is not taken by the end of the second week of the following semester, a grade of "F" is recorded.

PROPOSED

INCOMPLETE GRADES

A student is granted an Incomplete grade only under EXCEPTIONAL circumstances whereby the student has been unable to complete the requirements of the course and where prior arrangements have been made with the instructor to make up the necessary work.

Incomplete grades shall be recorded on transcripts with an "I" symbol and will not be computed in the grade point average.

Incomplete grades will be changed to a letter grade by the end of the twelfth (12th) week of the next semester or they will be converted to an "F" letter grade.

PROPOSAL

Subject: Utilization of the present Student Activities Office Space

Adopted: By the Student Affairs Committee on October 19, 1972
By the Executive Cabinet, College Student Assembly on October 25, 1972

During the spring semester of 1972, the Student Affairs Committee and the Student Assembly adopted and forwarded to the president of the college a resolution which stated that the present Bookstore and Student Activities Office spaces should be utilized in the future for Student Activities or Student Services. On October 5, 1972, the Student Affairs Committee again unanimously adopted a resolution which proposed that the Bookstore space and Student Activities Office space, when vacated, should be used for Student Activities or Student Services. It is clear to those who have studied the facilities, that the Doyle Student Center should remain a center for student extra-curricular activity.

The basic student proposal is that the present Bookstore facility (in its entirety) should be converted into additional food services, a student lounge and recreation-game room. The food service portion of this facility should take two forms. It is envisioned that there would be a barbeque grill arrangement, in conjunction with a delicatessen or sandwich bar operation. The facility should be so arranged so that the Student Lounge could also serve as a coffee house when desired. In addition, it is proposed that the area from the east side of the Bookstore to the cafeteria be screened off to form a sheltered outdoor eating area.

The second portion of this proposal deals with the present Student Activities Office space. This proposal would designate this space as the location of an on-campus FM Radio Station. This portion of this proposal would be based on the Speech Department's willingness to develop the curriculum in support of a radio broadcasting program and to make arrangements for the faculty person necessary to teach the classes and supervise the station's operation. If the Speech Department is unable, or unwilling to proceed with the establishment of an FM Radio Station, then it is proposed that the offices of the Oak Leaf be moved into the present Student Activities Office space.

It is envisioned that the Student Switchboard operation would continue to be housed in the Doyle Student Center. The present Journalism space should be used for additional direct student services. Included in this area would be a new student housing office.

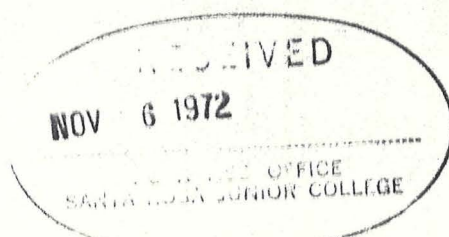

The benefits of an FM station to the students of Santa Rosa Junior College are, of course, obvious; the Speech Department and the CSA share a common concern.

2.) Courses in Broadcast Station Operation (including console-engineering, programing, copywriting, news presentation, and management as well as broadcast ethics) and in such skills as announcing are part of the Department's master plan, and the Speech Department will indeed take the initiative in establishing these courses and making them available to all qualified students within whatever limitations of space, personnel, and budget that may develop.

3.) The Speech Department will arrange for a faculty member to teach the broadcasting courses and supervise the operation of the station, subject to approval by appropriate College bodies.

In short, the Department welcomes this opportunity to accelerate the development of a student station and broadcasting curriculum, and looks forward to a relationship with the CSA that will benefit the maximum number of SRJC students and the Santa Rosa community at large. The educational, cultural, and social benefits to the college, its students, and the larger community are self-evident.

There are, however, certain conditions regarding the operation of a station that the Speech Department agreed upon in its meeting of 25 October 1972. These conditions are important to the successful and continuing operation of a station; there are obligations both to academic tradition and to the process of operating a government-licensed broadcast station that must be met if the station is to be a continuing, viable force in the college and the community. We ask your agreement on the following points:

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1.) While the responsibility for licensing the station will probably be that of the Sonoma County Junior College Board of Trustees, the administrative responsibility for operation of the station will rest with the Speech Department. This includes program content, selection and supervision of student staff, and policy decisions in the day-to-day operation of the station. The Speech Department recognizes, of course, the probable desire of the Associated Students to serve in an advisory capacity and welcomes advice from student government. It is assumed that suitable processes for advisory help will be established.

2.) The Speech Department assumes that partial funding for the construction and continuing operation of the station will be forthcoming from the Associated Students and that additional funding from the Board of Trustees will affect neither present Speech Department budgets nor future funding from either body for non-broadcast functions of the Speech Department.

3.) Financial arrangements acceptable to the Speech Department will have to be made for maintenance and operation of the station in future years, so that the broadcast facility can be permanent in accordance with FCC regulations. The Department cannot do this from present budgets.

4.) Suitable space for the operation of the station must be made available on a permanent basis -- the Department does not presently have suitable space, and FCC technical requirements governing transmitter situation dictate a permanent location.

5.) The successful operation of the station is dependent on the College's agreement that the person designated by the Speech Department to teach broadcasting and to manage the station be assigned each semester as part of his load one class release-time for station management as well as one teaching class assignment in Broadcast Station Operation.

The Speech Department is delighted at the prospect of joining the Associated Students in this important project. We trust that the CSA will realize that the conditions set forth above are necessary for the adequate planning of an on-going broadcast operation by the College. We trust, too, that you will forgive the necessarily formal tone of this letter. We look forward to a relationship of great benefit to the students of Santa Rosa Junior College.

It is too bad that a publication such as the BEAR FACTS should be used to express political opinion by the Board of Trustees when it is a rule that no political opinions should be expressed in the BEAR FACTS. I am in agreement with what is being said, to vote yes on Proposition 1, and no on 14, but there are other propositions which also are very important, maybe not to the Administration but to the students. Proposition 22, Proposition 19, Proposition 20, Proposition 7, Proposition 11, and Proposition 18 all could very much affect the student depending on the vote. These do not really economically concern the Junior College, but they could affect individual students in varying degrees. Those students who have gone to jail because of marijuana laws, those farmworkers who cannot afford to send their children to a community college, and so on down those listed above.

It is extremely unfair to the students that the controversial issues such as Propositions 1 and 14 should be allowed in the BEAR FACTS, and other very controversial and perhaps as important issues to individual students cannot.

A rule should not be made to be broken, or if a rule is amended for a particular reason such as two propositions, then that amendment should be open to all the other propositions. Board policy should apply also to the Board. Economics is very important in running this Junior College, but so is the welfare of many individual students, or students to be, who will be affected greatly by the up-coming vote on the Propositions.

PROPOSAL

Subject: Utilization of the present Student Activities Office Space

Adopted: By the Student Affairs Committee on October 19, 1972
By the Executive Cabinet, College Student Assembly on October 25, 1972

During the spring semester of 1972, the Student Affairs Committee and the Student Assembly adopted and forwarded to the president of the college a resolution which stated that the present Bookstore and Student Activities Office spaces should be utilized in the future for Student Activities or Student Services. On October 5, 1972, the Student Affairs Committee again unanimously adopted a resolution which proposed that the Bookstore space and Student Activities Office space, when vacated, should be used for Student Activities or Student Services. It is clear to those who have studied the facilities, that the Doyle Student Center should remain a center for student extra-curricular activity.

The basic student proposal is that the present Bookstore facility (in its entirety) should be converted into additional food services, a student lounge and recreation-game room. The food service portion of this facility should take two forms. It is envisioned that there would be a barbeque grill arrangement, in conjunction with a delicatessen or sandwich bar operation. The facility should be so arranged so that the Student Lounge could also serve as a coffee house when desired. In addition, it is proposed that the area from the east side of the Bookstore to the cafeteria be screened off to form a sheltered outdoor eating area.

The second portion of this proposal deals with the present Student Activities Office space. This proposal would designate this space as the location of an on-campus FM Radio Station. 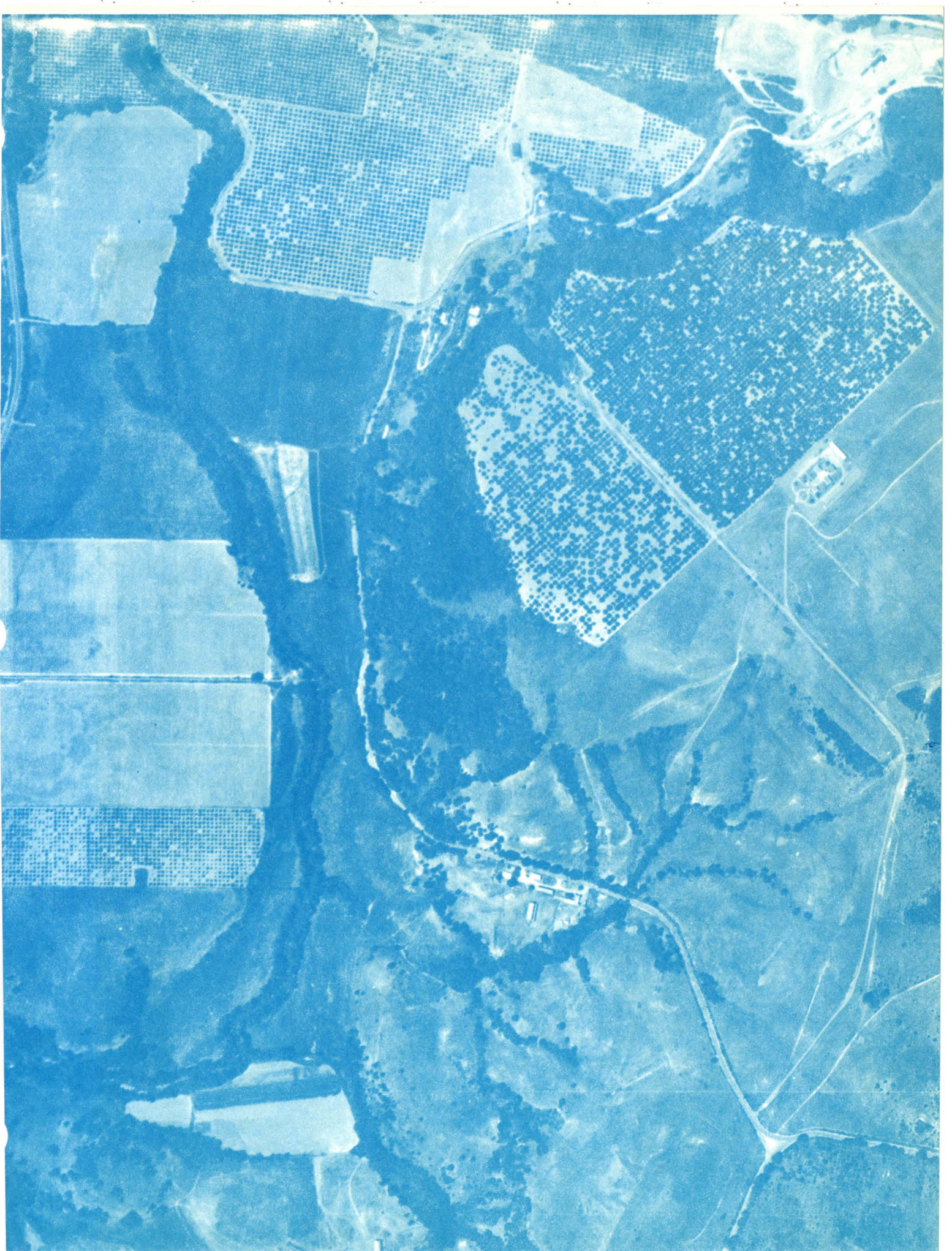

Sirs,

It is not without some regret that I must again request an audience before you to express grievance toward the policies of the office of the Dean of Student Personnel and Services. As you might recall, last year I appeared before you on behalf of students desiring their right of choice in regard to Student organizations. You agreed that all student organizations must be voluntary and that none of them could require membership of students at this college. At that time the Associated Student Body was in essence requiring students to join their organization through the ploy of the registration procedure. This procedure required all students carrying more than nine units to pay additional fees amounting to 9.00 which was the membership fee in the forementioned student organization. YOU ruled in accordance with our argument that no student should be required to join this, or any, student organization.

I am hoping to appear before you to demonstrate that dissemination of this policy was next to non-existent. That at least eighty per cent of the new students felt, as did almost all students previously, that payment of this extra 9.00 was required. That with minor expense and difficulties the Dean's office would have problem making this fact known and understood, and that the policy

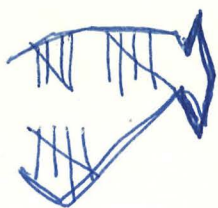

It is located on the western part of the campus; is a two story structure divided into three wings and is composed of 18 apartments. Each apartment accommodates four residents; has a separate porch entrance that includes two rooms divided by a bathroom.

Kent Hall is governed by the Kent Hall Council. The Kent Hall Council is composed of four resident advisors, four elected residents. The housing financial secretary and the Assistant Dean of Student Personnel Services are exofficio members without vote. Kent Hall Council supervises and administers the dorm as authorized by the Sonoma County District Board of Trustees.

Kent Hall was built to alleviate the housing problem for male students. Adequate housing for female students was then available. On-campus housing has been and is equal to or less expensive as private housing.

TODAY SEVERAL FACTORS HAVE CHANGED.

Additional private housing for male and female students is available in the greater Santa Rosa area. Private housing near SRJC is now available to both male and female students.

College Community Film Guild
State of affairs, Dec. 11, '72

Though the film guild was conceived during the summer prior to fall semester '72, and some organizational groundwork done at that time, the organization did not actually become a reality until October. On the twenty-fourth of that month, a meeting of interested persons met with Mr. Broderick to measure interest and decide if the guild had enough support to continue. Seven people attended that meeting and several more showed up to another the week following. The membership has since grown to twelve people.

To date, the members of the guild have started several projects, and completed a couple as well. One of the first was an attempt to get footage for use in a film previously in the making, at the Tom Hayden presentation. Tom Hayden did not appear, and footage shot of George Smith was poor because of inadequate lighting. During the same week, an attempt to film scenes from the Theater Arts Dept.'s production "Oh Dad, Poor Dad" failed to produce usable footage. The special rehearsal was scheduled for video taping by the Media Production Workshop, and the noise produced by our movie camera interfered with that taping, so our filming was cancelled.

Last week the guild produced a video production of the debate between the candidates for next semester's College Student Assembly, and showed it continuously for a day-and-a-half in the Co-op.

The first two rolls of film shot in making of a Parking and Traffic film, were to be picked up from the processors today, but were not available yet. The finished film should be complete before spring semester. Filming has begun on two other films, and scripts are in the writing for several others.

Switchboard has been asked, and has agreed to act as recorder of information submitted to the film guild. Notice of our services has been given to the B.S.U., S.V.A.W., Theater Arts Dept., English Dept., Speech Dept., Art Dept., Environmental Science Dept., Community Switchboard, Student Activities Office and the S.S.A.. It is hoped by the guild that these organizations (and others) will submit ideas for films to increase campus or community awareness of their activities or bring to light some problem of which they are particularly aware.

The purpose of the guild, as felt by the membership, is not only to provide the student filmmaker with the means of producing his own film, but to provide a communications channel between the college and the community. It is hoped by what the existence of the guild will increase interest in filmmaking within the student population, and that this interest will increase potential for college/community interaction. As such, the value of the guild cannot be measured by the quality of any individual project, for each remains the creation of the producer, and merely the property of the Film Guild.

The enthusiasm for the guild and interest in film as a communications link between campus and community, and among students themselves, assures us of the potential to grow into an effective medium.

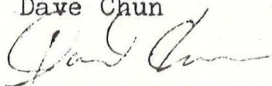

- ELECTION CODE -

- SECTION 1. The Elections Committee shall be composed of the following: Elections Commissioner as chairman, Executive Vice President, one Representative-At-Large and other members deemed necessary by the committee chairman.
- A. If any members of the committee shall be a candidate in an election, the President shall appoint a temporary replacement to serve only for that election.
- SECTION 2. The Elections Committee shall serve as the governing body over all general and special elections.
- A. A general election is that in which candidates for Associated Student offices are elected.
- B. A special election is that in which the College Student Assembly announces an election for purposes other than the above.
- SECTION 3. Any Santa Rosa Junior College student who has purchased an Associated Student membership card shall be eligible to cast one ballot.
- SECTION 4. The College Student Assembly shall determine the exact dates of the regular and special Associated Student elections.
- A. Elections for Associated Student President, Executive Vice President, Vice President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary shall not be later than three weeks prior to the end of the semester or before eight weeks prior to the end of the semester.
- B. The election for Head Song Leader and Head Yell Leader shall be during the Spring semester preceeding the term of office and held on the same day as the general election for other Associated Student offices.
- C. Election for Freshman Representatives-At-Large for the Fall semester shall not be later than four weeks and not before two weeks after the Fall semester begins. Spring semester election for Representatives-At-Large shall be conducted on the same day as the general election for other Associated Student officers for the Spring semester. All Associated Student members may vote for ten Representatives-At-Large, five to be Sophomores and five to be Freshmen.
- SECTION 5. Casting of the votes shall take place over a one day period, from 10 a.m. to 2:15 p.m. At the discretion of the Elections Committee the polling place may be located inside the cafeteria.
- SECTION 6. A candidate for all offices must be in regular attendance.
- A. All elected members of the College Student Assembly must be able to attend College Student Assembly meetings as scheduled.

(Section 6 - Con't.)

- B. All candidates must have a 2.0 grade average during the semester in which elected in order to take office the following semester.
- C. Candidates for all offices, except Representatives-At-Large must have completed twelve units (12), or more, at Santa Rosa Junior College before taking office.
- D. Candidates for President shall have had at least two successive semester of academic work and twenty units (20), or more, at Santa Rosa Junior College prior to taking office.
- E. Candidates for all office must carry at least 10 ½ units during the semester in which they run for office.

SECTION 7. All candidates must have read and be familiar with the Associated Students of Santa Rosa Junior College Constitution and all Codes and Statutes.

SECTION 8. Candidates for Head Yell Leader and Head Song Leader shall declare the names of their assistants at the time of filing for nomination and present a statement of good health signed by a physician for all assistants, Head Yell Leader and Song Leader.

SECTION 9. No person may run for more than one Associated Students office in a given semester.

SECTION 10. Nominations for office shall be by petition.

- A. Petitions may be obtained from the Activities Office no earlier than fifteen school days before the election, and returned to the Activities Office no later than five school days before the election.
- B. Petitions shall include the name, address, phone number, office sought and class schedule and must be signed by at least seventy-five (75) Associated Student members.
 - (1) All students signing a petition must include their S.S. No.
- C. All petitions shall be checked by the Elections Commissioner to be sure the candidate is eligible.
- D. In the event a minimum of two petitions is not filed for one office with the Activities Office by deadline date, the College Student Assembly may, by majority vote, nominate eligible candidates.

SECTION 11. All elections shall be by secret ballot.

- A. The order of candidates' names on the ballot will be in alphabetical order under the candidates' respective offices unless the incumbent is running for re-election and then his name shall appear first.
- B. The order in which the offices shall be placed is: President, Executive Vice-President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Head Yell Leader, Head Song Leader, and Representatives-At-Large.

- C. Candidates running for re-election shall have "incumbent" placed with their names.
- D. The names of any candidates for a given office nominated by the College Student Assembly shall appear below the names of all other candidates for that office and shall be arranged in alphabetical order.
- E. Two or more candidates wishing to run together as a "slate" will be designated on the ballot by the same single letter or numeral after each name. Candidates wishing to run on a "slate" must file a request, in writing, with the Student Activities Office, by the last day for filing petitions.

SECTION 12. Writ-in votes may be written in pencil or pen and a write-in candidate, for an office with no nominated candidate, must have at least fifty (50) write-in votes for one office in order to be declared elected. Write-in votes will not be counted in a run-off election.

SECTION 13. All properly marked ballots shall be counted no later than five (5) hours after the closing of the polls. The Activities Advisor shall be responsible for the safekeeping of the ballots for two weeks after the election, upon which time the ballots shall be destroyed.

SECTION 14. Results will be posted at the Activities Office.

- A. The posted results shall include the amount of votes cast for each candidate and shall designate under each office the winning candidate. The posting of the amount of votes cast for each candidate shall only apply to Associated Student Officers' elections.

SECTION 15. The Elections Commissioner and one other Elections Committee member shall send to the President the names of the elected candidates and their respective offices along with one blank ballot with the votes cast for each candidate within twenty-four hours after the election.

SECTION 16. Nominees for the elected Associated Student offices shall be allowed no less than five minutes each for a campaign speech at a regular assembly of the Association.

- A. Candidates may have one other student speak before and/or in place of the candidate.
- B. The Elections Commissioner shall preside at the assembly.

SECTION 17. Candidates may use the Activities Office duplication machine at no cost.

SECTION 18. There will be no campaigning the day of election within fifteen feet of the polls.

SECTION 19. No more than \$25.00, including contributions, may be spent for one campaign for each candidate.

- A. All candidates or their campaign managers must file, in writing, to the Elections Commissioner within three weeks after the election, a detailed report of expenses of their campaign.

- B. If a candidate is found to have spent more than \$25.00, or has filed a false statement of expenses, this shall be sufficient grounds for either disqualification of candidacy or removal from office. In the event a candidate is removed from office under this Section, the provisions of Section 20 shall apply.

SECTION 20. It shall be the duty of the Elections Commissioner to regulate campaigning and disqualify any candidate found by the Commissioner to be in violation of any rules or regulations of the Associated Students.

- A. Any candidate disqualified may appeal the decision of the Commissioner to the College Student Assembly within eight days after the decision of the Elections Commissioner. A two-thirds vote of the College Student Assembly members voting shall reinstate the candidate.
 - (1) If a candidate is disqualified and then reinstated, but after the election, the President shall declare the election for the office void and a special election shall be held within ten days after reinstatement.
- B. The Elections Commissioner shall inform the President, in writing, of any protests of violations by any student to the Elections Committee, within twenty-four hours after the protest has been made.
- C. In the event that the results of an election are challenged, the College Student Assembly will act as the final arbiter.

SECTION 21. The following rules shall apply to initiative, referendum and recall elections

- A. An initiative measure may be proposed by a petition signed by a number of members equal to one-third of the votes cast in the last Associated Students election. A valid petition must state the issue of the petition on each page and must include the signature, student body card number, social security number, address and phone number of the student signing. Petition forms are available in the Student Activities Office and forms will be dated when they are taken out. Petitions must be returned within two weeks after they are taken out from the Student Activities Office.
- B. Any measure may be submitted for referendum by a two-thirds vote of the College Student Assembly, which shall set an election date not more than two weeks after the measure has been submitted for referendum. Approval of a referendum measure shall require a two-thirds majority of the votes cast.
- C. A recall measure may be proposed by a petition signed by a number of members equal to one-half of the votes cast in the last Associated Students election. A valid petition must state

the issue on each page of the petition and must include the signature, student body card number, social security number, address and phone number of the student signing. Petition forms are available in the Student Activities Office and forms will be dated when they are taken out from the Student Activities Office.
