January 3, 1972
Last Meeting

- I. Call to Order
Dennis Duckett called the meeting to order at 3:10 p.m.
- II. Roll Call
Pam Buford, Mike Pinson were absent.
- III. Approval of the Agenda
The Agenda was changed under item B to read: White Guard Hut; and Under item C to read: Switchboard; and under item D to read: Dogs; and adding item E, No Answer to Sex.
- IV. Approval of the Minutes

- V. Reports:
Jim Weaver brought everyone's attention to the November Budget.
- VI. Old Business:
 - A. C.S.A. Banquet
Mr. Canevari reminded everyone that the CSA Banquet is this Thurs. at 7:00 p.m. at the Los Robles Lodge. Doug moved that members pay for their guests attending the banquet. AN OPEN LETTER THAT YOU PROBABLY WON'T WANT TO READ
(Since it only concerns you)

As student body elections draw near again; I would like to remind everyone that there is NO SUCH THING AS STUDENT GOVERNMENT.

We, (the students) labor under the continuing guise of participating in student government, just as we continue pretending that we have some say in the selection and preparation of academic study materials.

Student government at this school, like so many others, is a complete shuck, a sham; and it is tokenism in its worst form; the tokenism of apathy.

Consider this; last semester approximately 500 students out of 5,200 voted in the ASB election. Less than 1/10th of the student body!

If our administrators are all that concerned about us taking an active role in the management of student affairs, in really "working together", why weren't we bombarded with distribes on this horrible showing in selecting "our" representatives?

The answer is quite simple. We heard nothing because those who really run student government, were more than satisfied to see things go as they did.

The SEMESTER POPULARITY CONTEST was held, all participants were paraded in front of us for the "no less than five minutes each" they are allotted; they shuffled their feet, scratched their heads, picked their noses, and grinned through their ignorance.

A few words should be said here about the selection of candidates. The ASB student handbook, "a service of your student government", besides carrying the POPULARITY CONTEST winners' pictures, also carries the constitution under which the student government functions.

In Article III Section 2, it states that for a person to be eligible to hold office he need only "be a regularly enrolled daytime student with a minimum of 10% units..", that's it.

It is a different story however, when you get down to it. Upon receiving the form that you must fill out, (name, soc. sec.#, office that you're running for, etc.) even before you can get the 75 signature petition that is necessary for nomination, you are introduced to some of the surreptitious methods used to control anyone who would dare use his own innovative abilities for the benefit of his fellow student.

Below the necessary information, set off by a dotted line, neatly labeled "For Office Use Only", are the additional items: "Total Completed Units at end of semester: _____". "Grade Point Average for _____ Semester _____". "Present Probation status: _____"., and a place for the elections commissioner's signature.

When the secretary in the Student Activities Office, from whence the forms are drawn, is questioned as to the validity and necessity of the appendages, she affixes on her face, that smile of perplexity that all really good secretaries are equipped with, and says something like "I don't know" or "You'll have to ask so and so", usually her immediate superior, who coincidentally is "out to lunch" or "just stepped out".

Now the fun begins...The additional information is needed, you are told, because a few semesters ago, some "wise guys" ran, almost successfully, a pig, and "we wouldn't want an embarrassing situation like that to happen again, no would we?"

Legality of the extra information? Doubtful. It is, you are told again, provided for in the ASB-PUBLICITY AND ELECTION CODES (9 pages worth) governing election campaigns and publicity. A nice enough title to cloak, what are in reality, controls so stringent, as to effectively allow the manipulation of the elections to the satisfaction of the few whose position it is, to keep the students from actually getting something together in the way of a student-run government.

Upon investigating said code, that by admission of its own Statement of Purpose is to: "...provide more orderly, pleasing and effective publicity, and at the same time retain the beauty at the SRJC campus.", you find no less than 5 sections with a total of 14 additional items imposing more qualifications on would-be candidates.

The rest of the code is so woven, as to be virtually student-proof. The code, by the way, is supposedly under the control of an elections commissioner who is appointed by the incumbent president.

The key to the whole insidious manuscript can be found in Section IX, titled "Responsibility". Clause 111 (Catch 22) states in full that: "The responsibility for all campaign posters rests with the individual publicized. Failure to comply with this publicity code will result in the removal of a candidate from an election. Individuals, clubs and organizations in violation of this code will be subject to a fine of not more than \$15.00." (my underlining).

As ecologically-minded people we are more than aware of the need to preserve "the beauty at the SRJC campus", but to have such dictatorial reigns hidden amongst a supposedly righteous cause, when the cafeteria dispenses drinks in styrofoam cups, not to mention plastic spoons and plastic foods, is pure

elitist crap.

First and foremost in this hierarchy, is the Student Activities Director (Dictator could as easily be used here). In the "Publicity Code" there are no less than 10 clauses that read "at the discretion of the Publicity Commissioner or the Advisor of Student Activities." These are, cut and dried, purely control items.

If you doubt the power held by the person in this position, go to any of the "elected officers" with a proposal of student interest and see if you don't end up "standing tall" in front of his desk. He has the final say on all kg gigs.

You might also seek out, as I did, some of the former officers and question them on their terms in office. Invariably the Student Activities Advisor's name and the absolute power that he possesses is brought into the conversation.

Even our current ASB president, before he took office was instructed as to the futility in bucking this set-up. He states in the Student handbook: "If one could remove the surface formalities of student government, he would be confronted with a picture of a small group of students actively involved in working for the good of the whole."

This means that he can't. And is "surface formalities" just a misnomer for the Student Activities Advisors absolute power? Reading further we find a line that I suggest should be sent to President Nixon's speech writers. "We have come far together but let us not forget that there is always a new road to travel." A fine example of absurd rhetoric that we don't need from a "brother" student.

You might also ask him (Dennis Duckett); you can recognize him by the chrome wheels on his black VW and the tiparillo that he smokes, about how and why he came to run for ASB president, and who actually engineered and financed his campaign.

Then find Howie Vano, who was also a candidate, and ask him the same questions.

This past Friday at 12 noon in Burbank Auditorium 47 people, including the candidates turned out to listen to proposed solutions for getting the Government back to the students. It was another exercise in futility. We listened as each of the prospective politicians rocked and rolled us about, "communication", "getting it together", and of "changing it from the inside," all the good, current, popular bullshit.

Then some of us in the audience started to discuss the control factors in the government and the school. We found, as small as number as we were, that we in fact were communicating. That we were getting it together, and then the controll agent of class scheduleing cut us off. Out of that small coalition, came a very good proposal, that herein stated is directed to all students, and especially to the candidates who, if sincere

in their desire to listen to those they are supposed to serve, will give some serious thought to.

The proposal is that of a NO VOTE ELECTION. If in fact student government is as necessary to the functioning of this school as we have been led to believe, then the absence of it should cause some problems. Some disruption of the status quo. It will not.

The candidates should withdraw from the election, (Wednesday Morning would be ideal) and the students should boycott the polling booths as if they were contagious. Their disease is horrific innoculating us with the serum of blind obedience. One that we carry with us into the "Big Adult world. We vote on a Federal level the same way we do here at SRJC, only for those candidates available, and we have no say in their selection.

What is worse is ~~xxx~~ we have no way of altering the system they will work in after they are elected.

The supposition of a government, especially one as militaristic and suppressive as ours, in a "Free Country" is anathema. It is self-condemning, and self-ridiculing and sets the model for all lesser Governments under its jurisdiction.

Santa Rosa Junior College is the United States in microcosm. And every counterpart necessary to its demagoguery can be found here.

Since we are so adept in apathy at this school-let's carry it to its epitome and have no votes cast at all. Maybe then, as things go on as usual, and they will, we will realize for what it is, the hoax of student government that has been perpetrated on us for too long.

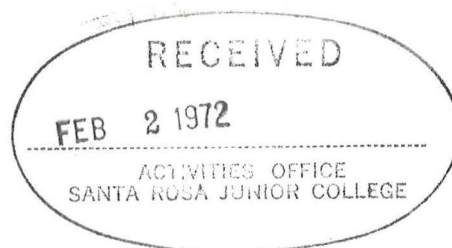

Ann Byrd Will Seek SRJC Trustee Seat

Ann Byrd, partner in a Santa Rosa public relations firm, today announced her candidacy for the Santa Rosa Junior College District Board of Trustees.

"There is a yawning gap between the educational system and the job structure. This gap is particularly serious for the high school graduate who enters the community college and ends his formal education there," she said.

"We have large numbers of young people who have done everything society told them they should. These young people will graduate into a labor market that has little interest in them. The cost of this gap between the educational system and the job is great and growing," she said.

Mrs. Byrd, the 35-year-old mother of three children, was awarded the NAACP Freedom Award in 1970 and the Sojourner Truth Award last year for her contributions to community life.

She is a founder of the Sonoma County Club, National Association of Negro Business and Professional Women's Clubs, and past president of the Village Elementary School Parent-Teachers Association. She is a member of the Office and Professional Employees Union.

She was educated at Santa Rosa High School, Santa Rosa Junior College and San Jose City College, but she was forced to go to work before completing her college education.

She worked for 10 years as executive and legal secretary and seven years as executive secretary for the Northern California Carpenters Joint Apprenticeship and Training Committee.

"There are those who say that I have no chance of being elected because I am a woman," Mrs. Byrd said.

"But I believe that the time is long past that a woman should be a member of the Santa Rosa Junior College Board of Trustees. In this day and age it seems incredible that no woman ever has served in that capacity."

"There are those who say that I have no chance of being elected because I am black.

"But I believe that one of the ways that middle Americans can indicate a desire to solve some racial problems is to work for and vote for black candidates."

Mrs. Byrd said the most important way she wants to be judged is by her educational philosophy.

"What we want for our chil-

dren is to develop the efficiency of person to person learning so that they develop trust in themselves and others. We want them to shed identity stereotypes and we want the schools to help them unleash any creativity they might have."

Mrs. Byrd filed a declaration of candidacy signed by Frank Morabito, Al Deorsey, Robert Boudreaux, Barry Keene, Michael Seneff, Helen Rudee, Polly Hampton, Helen McAboy, Jonnie Ryan and Dorothea Proctor.

Her statement:

"The Community college is the single most important educational source of widespread access. I speak from personal knowledge.

"Without the Junior College (Community College), I would not have had access to ANY college. I might not have enjoyed some unique employment experiences as a business and professional woman; and I might have been less likely to form the intense interests in public service which I now hold.

"If our society is ever to function cohesively, the door to jobs for the young — to equal opportunity for aspiring women, and the door to positive community roles for minorities, are all doors which must be permanently unlocked.

"Education is the key that can unlock those doors.

"Balanced representation of those who end their formal education at the community college to enter the labor market; women; and certainly minorities on the Community College Board is your assurance that those doors will be unlocked."

AD HOC STUDENT COMMITTEE CODE

An Ad Hoc Student Committee (any informal student organization), is a group of students, or a group with students as part of its membership, who organize on a temporary basis for a specific purpose. The membership of such an organization may include SRJC students, SRJC faculty, SRJC administrators, and SRJC staff members.

An Ad Hoc student committee may apply for recognition to the Inter-Club Council of Santa Rosa Junior College. Recognition is granted upon a majority vote of the Inter-Club Council members. The Ad Hoc committee becomes a recognized on-campus organization for a period of time, not to exceed nine consecutive weeks during any one semester. At the conclusion of the first nine weeks period, an Ad Hoc student committee may apply for an extension of a second nine week period.

Once an Ad Hoc student group has been given recognition by the Inter-Club Council, such a group has all of the rights and privileges of an on-campus club, as shown in the Inter-Club Council Code. Ad Hoc student groups, however, do not have a vote in the Inter-Club Council.

An Ad Hoc student committee must have a faculty advisor and must submit to the Inter-Club Council an information sheet showing the name of the organizer of the committee, the name of the faculty advisor, the name of the student chairman, or president, and a brief statement of purpose. Once Ad Hoc student committee status has been obtained, the group need not send a representative to the Inter-Club Council meetings on a regular basis.

Whenever an Ad Hoc student committee wishes to sponsor a money-making activity of any kind, it must file a money-making request with the Inter-Club Council. The decision of the Inter-Club Council will be made by a majority vote of that body.

If an Ad Hoc student committee wishes to sponsor an off-campus speaker, who is invited to address the student body in an assembly type program, it must follow the procedure as outlined in the policy statement on speakers, solicitation of funds, and dissemination of information on campus, which is Section 6.10 of the Administrative Handbook. An Ad Hoc student committee must also abide by all campus policies regarding the distribution of literature and the dissemination of information.

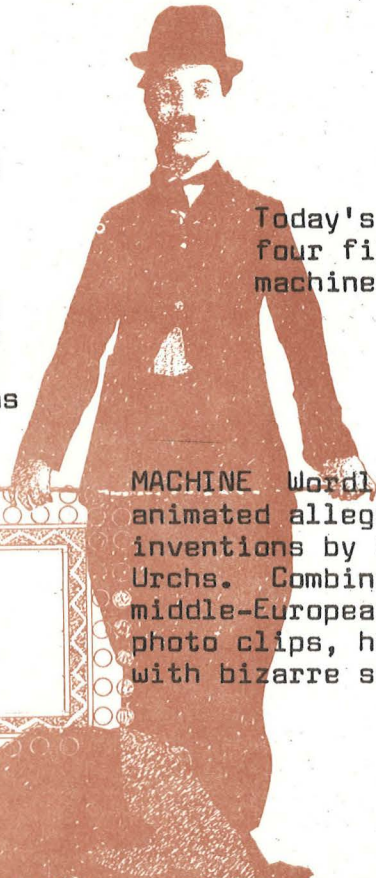

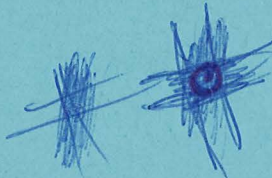

STUDENT PROJECT GRANT GUIDELINES

1. Student Project Grants will be granted by a majority vote of the College Student Assembly.
2. A Student Project Grant for a single project may not exceed \$300 and an individual may receive only one grant per school year.
3. Each application for a Student Project Grant will include a detailed description of the proposed project, a description of the project's educational value, a short personal resumé about the applicant and a detailed budget break-down.
4. Students must have a faculty advisor to assist them with the project. The student will be required to meet with the advisor every two weeks to discuss the progress of the project. Failure to aggressively seek the advice of the advisor may result in charges of misconduct against the student. The faculty advisor may be asked by the Student Project Grants Committee to take part in the presentation of the proposed student grant.
5. All financial matters pertaining to the Student Project Grants will be handled through the Student Activities Office. All requests for funds must be signed by the student and his faculty advisor.
6. Each application will be submitted to the Student Activities Office. Upon submission, it will be dated. If an application is incomplete, it will be returned to the student and it will lose its priority.
7. All Student Project Grants must be completed by Dead Week of the semester of application unless an extension is granted by C.S.A.
8. Students must submit a progress report by the date mid-term reports are issued.
9. With proper notification, the student may be required to present his project to classes or other groups.
10. Not more than one-half of all funds allocated for Student Project Grants will be spent in the fall semester.
11. At the discretion of C.S.A., certain items of equipment purchased by the students with Student Project Grants funds, will be required to be returned to the Associated Students.

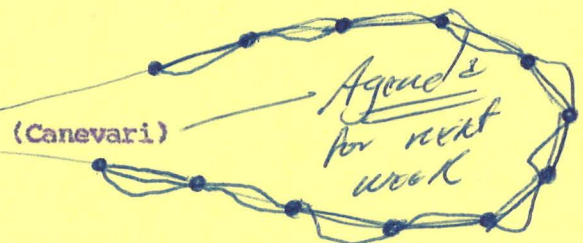

ASB - PUBLICITY CODE

PURPOSE: The purpose of this code is to provide more orderly, pleasing and effective publicity, and at the same time retain the beauty at the SRJC campus.

DEFINITION: "Poster" is construed to mean any means of conveying messages other than by machines. Handbills and leaflets will not be considered posters.

Section I - Content

Clause I Posters will deal with information of general interest, to faculty, administration, and students originating with student groups (clubs, organizations and Associated Students).

Clause II Posters will deal with election announcements (see election rules), events of clubs and organizations, dances, assemblies, athletics events, Mid-Day Series, Open Forum, Academic Department announcements and events, and others at the discretion of the Publicity Commissioner or the Advisor of Student Activities.

Section II - Approval

Clause I All posters must be approved before posting. This may be done in the office of Student Activities by the Publicity Commissioner, his delegated representative, or by the Advisor of Student Activities. Posters which are not approved will be removed.

Clause II Approval of posters will be made depending on appropriateness as to size and content.

Section III - Placement

Clause I In general, all posters will be confined to the area in front of Doyle Center across the campus to the north side of the Auditorium and from the front of Analy Hall west across the campus to the circle drive. Other areas for publicity will be considered at the discretion of the Publicity Commissioner or the Advisor of Student Activities.

(Section III - Con't.)

Clause II The interior of the Cafeteria will be used on occasion by the Publicity Commission only, or his designated agent, for publicizing an ASB activity of event of such importance to be of interest to the campus community as a whole.

Clause III The four brick columns in the cafeteria, up to the ceiling of the inside terrace room and the four outside brick columns on the south wall of the cafeteria, (outside only) up to the overhang, may be used for publicity by the Publicity Commissioner or his designated agent. No handbills or leaflets may be distributed in the cafeteria. It is up to those who distribute handbills and leaflets to see that they are not littered about the campus grounds. Candidates may distribute handbills and leaflets during elections.

Clause IV The brick columns in the interior of the cafeteria may be used for general Associated Students publicity with the approval of the Publicity Commissioner, his designated agent or the Student Activities Advisor.

Clause V No posters of any kind are to be placed on campus other than the area designated under Section III, Clause I and II unless specific exception is authorized by the Advisor of Student Activities.

Clause VI No publicity will be placed on or in buildings except as otherwise noted in this code. Publicity can be placed on the large oak trees (No small trees to be used). Publicity will be fastened to the oak trees by tacks, staples or tying. No nails are to be used. No banners will be displayed from buildings or oak trees, except with prior approval by the Publicity Commissioner or Student Activities Advisor. This clause will be strictly enforced.

Clause VII All posters are to be fastened securely at all corners. Means of fastening will be determined by material of surface upon which the poster is to be placed. -- Examples are: tying, if possible; using masking tape or other kinds of adhesive that are not harmful or detrimental to the wall or surface; or tacking (if first checked with Publicity Commissioner or Advisor or Student Activities).

Clause VIII Posters cannot be placed in or on the windows of the coop, except with the approval of the Publicity Commissioner or Student Activities Advisor. -- Example - cardboard posters 14" by 23" may be leaned against the bottom of windows.

(Section III - Con't.)

Clause IX Other types of Publicity for elections are sandwich boards, open forum and outdoor stage (for speeches), small fence south of Analay Hall, Garbage cans, and posters on stakes on edge of grass.

Section IV - Bulletin Board Notices

Clause I Student's personal notices, such as items for sale or trade, may be placed on the bulletin board located in Analay and Burbank Halls and on the Kiosks. These signs will be removed by the Publicity Commissioner or his designated representatives, every two weeks.

Section V - Transportation Requests

Clause I Transportation requests may be placed on the bulletin board outside the Student Activities Office. Standard Advertisement cards may be procured in the Student Activities Office.

Section VI - Kiosks and Analay Hall Bulletin Board

Clause I Notices and publicity for general Student Body interest may be placed on the Kiosks and the Analay Hall Bulletin Board -- Use to clubs and individuals is also accepted, but must be approved by the Publicity Commissioner or the Advisor of Student Activities for that purpose.

Section VII - Off-Campus Organizations, Groups or Individuals

Clause I All off-campus posters, literature and publicity must be approved by the Counseling Coordinator (Dean of Students' Office).

Section VIII - Time Limits

Clause I All campaign posters within a radius of ten (10) yards of the polling place are to be taken down the day before the election.

Clause II All campaign posters must be taken down carefully no later than twenty-four hours after the event if the event is held after Friday noon.

Clause III Posters will be restricted to two weeks posting prior to the event. During elections, posters will be restricted to one week posting prior to the election day.

(Section VIII - Con't.)

Clause IV During elections each candidate will be limited to a maximum of Ten (10) posters. Posters will be of reasonable size decided upon by the Publicity Commissioner. No hanging signs except by the Publicity Commissioner for Associated Student purposes.

Section IX - Responsibility

Clause I All posters must be stamped for approval before posting. This may be done in the Student Activities Office by the Publicity Commissioner or his designated representative or the Advisor of Student Activities.

Clause II It shall not be the responsibility of the Publicity Commissioner to make or provide materials except for Associated Student functions.

Clause III The responsibility for all campaign posters rests with the individual publicized. Failure to comply with this publicity code will result in the removal of a candidate from an election. Individuals, clubs and organizations in violation of this code will be subject to a fine of not more than \$15.00.

Clause IV Clubs and organizations publicizing an event are responsible for their posters and publicity machines.

Clause V Any poster or publicity machine which represents a violation of this code will be removed at the discretion of the Publicity Commissioner.

Clause VI Any person mutilation or moving any poster or publicity machine, other than the publicity Commissioner, will be summoned to appear before the CSA, Executive Cabinet and will be subject to their action.

Clause VII An appeal to action taken by the CSA Executive Cabinet may be taken to the College Student Assembly for a decision.

Clause VIII Any exception to these regulations must be approved by the CSA Executive Cabinet.

SANTA ROSA JUNIOR COLLEGE

H Y D E P A R K C O D E

Section I - Purpose and Introduction

In accordance with the provisions of the College policy statement on speakers, solicitation of funds, and dissemination of information on campus, the College Student Assembly in cooperation with the Dean of Students establishes this code for the conduct of a campus Hyde Park.

Section II - Operation

Having been delegated the responsibility for operating a Hyde Park program by the Dean of Students, the College Student Assembly vests the control of the program in the Open Forum - Hyde Park - Mid-Day Series Commissioner acting in cooperation with the Student Activities Advisor.

Section III - Activities Covered

"Hyde Park activities might include debates, prepared or spontaneous statements, or simple, informal discussion"

Section IV - Place

The place designated for these activities shall be in front of the Doyle Student Center (coop).

Section V - Time

- A) Facilities shall be made available on all days of regularly scheduled classes.
- B) The time for these activities shall commence at noon and remain available for one hour.

Section VI - Equipment

Equipment for Hyde Park shall consist of the following:

- A) Lectern or podium
- B) A sign denoting "HYDE PARK" to designate the place
- C) A Sign outlining the rules of courtesy and notice of individual responsibility for slanderous statements.
- D) No power amplification equipment is to be permitted.

Section VII - Privileges and Responsibilities

In order to insure the proper use of a Hyde Park policy, users of this means of communication are guaranteed the rights of free speech and care

Section VII (Con't.)

shall be taken to see that these rights are not abused. Additionally, the rights of other members of the community shall not be abused by the users of Hyde Park in the name of free speech.

It is expected that the privileges, responsibilities, and limitations imposed by the Hyde Park Code will be observed by all users of the facility. Lewd or obscene conduct violates the report of free speech. It is the obligation of the President of the Associated Students, the Activities Advisor, and the Dean of Students, or their duly designated representative, to require observance of the Hyde Park Code.

Section VIII - Eligibility

The use of Hyde Park facilities shall be limited to the following persons:

- A) Any student enrolled in at least one day course in which at least one unit of credit is given at Santa Rosa Junior College
- B) Any member of the Santa Rosa Junior College faculty.
- C) Any member of the Administration or Board of Trustees.
- D) Any member of the classified staff of the College.

Section IX - Rules of Courtesy

- A) Five minutes shall be deemed a maximum courteous time for speaking if others desire to use facilities.
- B) Persons should show care for the equipment provided, not damaging, altering or removing.

Section X - Rules of Slander

A copy of a statement by the Sonoma County Council concerning "fair play" and slander shall be reproduced, and made available to each speaker using Hyde Park facilities. Copies shall be made available at the lectern and at the Student Activities Office.

Section XI - Miscellaneous Policies

- A) Activities are not required to be scheduled; however, notification of planned speeches, etc., to the Assemblies Commissioner can be made for coordination purposes.
- B) Any eligible person may commence to use Hyde Park facilities at any time during its operation, on a first come, first serve basis.

Section XII - Adoption, Revision, and Repeal

This code shall be effective the first Monday following its adoption by the College Student Assembly and the Dean of Students. Its contents may be revised or repealed by joint action of the College Student Assembly and the Dean of Students.

FINANCIAL CODE
ASSOCIATED STUDENTS - SANTA ROSA
JUNIOR COLLEGE

ARTICLE I - OBJECTIVES

This Financial Code is established to define those policies and procedures for the developing, approving, and expending of all money under the control of the Associated Students of Santa Rosa Junior College and its associated organizations in order to insure worthwhile educational experiences for the students and to insure that all financial transactions will be made in the best interests of the Associated Students and in accordance with all pertinent County, State, and District financial regulations.

ARTICLE II - RESPONSIBILITY OF THE COMMISSIONER OF FINANCE

The Commissioner of Finance (and the Student Activities Advisor) shall be responsible for seeing that all financial transactions of the Associated Students are in accordance with this code, and for carrying out other duties as outlined in the Constitution of the Associated Students. In the absence of the Commissioner of Finance the Assistant Commissioner of Finance, shall have the authority for carrying out the responsibilities of Commissioner of Finance.

ARTICLE III - BUDGETS

SECTION 1. All of the finances of this organization shall be administered under a budget system.

SECTION 2. Preparation of the budget:

- A. All requests for budget items must be submitted to the Commissioner of Finance no later than April 15th.
- B. The Commissioner of Finance, in cooperation with the Budget Committee, shall present this budget to the Executive Cabinet no later than May 1st of each school year.
- C. The Executive Cabinet shall review the preliminary budget and present a proposed budget to the Student Council no later than the last meeting in May of each school year.

SECTION 3. The approval of the annual budget requires a 2/3 vote of the College Student Assembly. Once the budget has been approved, changes require a one-week's posting before action may be taken and require a 2/3 majority to carry.

SECTION 4. Requests for funds in excess of budgeted amount must be submitted in advance to the Commissioner of Finance who will present the request to the College Student Assembly.

ARTICLE IV - TYPES OF ACCOUNTS

SECTION 1. Associated Students Accounts: All income and expenditures designated in the annual Associated Students Budget.

SECTION 2. Organization Accounts: Income and expenditures of recognized clubs, organizations, and associations.

SECTION 3. Trust Accounts: Accounts established for special purposes outside the Associated Students Budget.

ARTICLE V - DEPOSITS

SECTION 1. All money collected from any source should be substantiated.

SECTION 2. No part of the expenses of any event may be paid from money collected but must be paid for in the manner described under purchase orders and requisitions. (Article VI)

SECTION 3. Banking of all funds and all official bookkeeping records shall be the responsibility of the Accounts Manager.

SECTION 4. All Associated Students and student organization funds collected from any source whatsoever shall be deposited immediately with the Accounts Manager--individuals and groups should avoid keeping money overnight.

SECTION 5. The Accounts Manager shall issue a receipt for all money received.

ARTICLE VI - EXPENDITURES

All expenditures of Associated Students, Trust, or Organization accounts shall follow the procedures outlined below.

SECTION 1. The person seeking the funds shall fill out a requisition. Each organization shall have on file with the Accounts Manager a current signature card signed by the organization's faculty advisor.

A requisition for an organization's funds must have the two authorized signatures which appear on the organization's signature card. It must also have the signature of the Activities Advisor. (In case of emergency the Activities Advisor or the Dean of Students may authorize an expenditure.)

SECTION 2. The approved requisition shall then be presented to the Accounts Manager.

SECTION 3. Upon receipt of an approved requisition indicating that a check is necessary, the Accounts Manager shall prepare the check. Ordinarily checks shall be made out to the vendor.

Any goods or services paid for by check must be validated by receipted bills which must be returned to the Accounts Manager indicating that delivery

(Art. VI, Section 3 - Con't.)

has been made.

In the event that the check is made payable to a student officer or faculty member (himself not the vendor), it is the duty of this person to obtain receipts for all money paid out and to return these immediately to the Accounts Manager. Individuals obtaining goods or services without authorization will be held personally responsible for the payment of them.

ARTICLE VII - TICKETS

SECTION 1. Tickets to be sold for Associated Students approved events may be secured from the Accounts Manager. All unsold tickets must be returned.

ARTICLE VIII - MAINTENANCE OF RECORDS

Every club or organization should maintain accurate records of all income and expenditures.

An annual audit of all Associated Students organization accounts, and trust accounts shall be made by a certified public accountant or a public accountant employed by a certified public accountant or a public accountant employed by the School District. A report of the audit shall be made to the Commissioner of Finance, Activities Advisor, and to the Board of Trustees of the District.

ARTICLE IX - FINANCIAL REPORTS

SECTION 1. The Commissioner of Finance shall give a financial report to the College Student Assembly every month.

ARTICLE X - CONTRACTS

Contracts for orchestras, dance halls, entertainers, athletic events, speakers, etc., must be signed in triplicate: one copy shall remain with the faculty advisor or the Activities Advisor and one copy shall be filed with the Accounts Manager. Payment on contracts must be initiated by the regular acquisition procedure.

ARTICLE XI - FUND RAISING EVENTS

SECTION 1. Approval for any fund raising event must be secured from the I.C.C. (InterClub Council) The solicitation of funds or donations, or sponsorship of fund raising activities either on or off campus is permitted only upon approval of the I.C.C. Any campus organization which collects funds

(Art. XI, Section 1 - Con't.)

from its members or other sources will maintain an account with the Associated Students so proper records are kept for all deposits and disbursements. Use of the funds shall be at the discretion of the organization.

SECTION 2. Any activity sponsored by a campus organization after approval by the I.C.C. is the exclusive financial responsibility of the organization. Any such activity for which the organization does not have required funds on deposit and which involves a commitment of \$50 (?) or more shall be subject to the approval of the Dean of Students. Approval will involve filing by the parties involved of a written statement releasing the college and Associated Students from any financial claim or responsibility.

ARTICLE XII - STUDENT BODY CARDS.

SECTION 1. The cost of membership in the Associated Students of Santa Rosa Junior College shall be determined by the College Student Assembly with the approval of the college President.

SECTION 2. Lost or stolen student body cards may be replaced by the Activities Advisor at a replacement charge to be determined by the College Student Assembly.

KIM WENDY ALLEN

The Search for Her Killer

A Memorial Mass for Kim Wendy Allen was held yesterday at Ursuline High School's boarding residence where she lived until graduation in 1970.

The event, attended by students and friends, was the only service requested by the girl's father, Kimball W. Allen of Mill Valley.

Kim's nude body was found Sunday near a creek on Enterprize rd., off Bennett Valley rd. Authorities said the 19-year-old Santa Rosa Junior College student had been raped and murdered.

Lt. Charles Kishbaugh, Sonoma County Sheriff's office, yesterday said several Sonoma County detectives, in cooperation with Marin County authorities, spent several hours in

the Larkspur area attempting to locate anyone who may have seen Kim in that area last Saturday.

Lt. Kishbaugh said the investigation thus far indicated the girl was last seen wearing a three-quarter-length coat and an aluminum-frame backpack. That was about 5 p.m. last Saturday when she left Larkspur to hitchhike to Santa Rosa.

Investigators have asked that anyone who believes he saw Kim between Larkspur and Santa Rosa to contact the office, 527-2511.

Meanwhile, a Kim Allen Reward Fund has been established in hopes of finding the rapist-killer.

Fred Samia, a JC student, teacher's aide and friend of

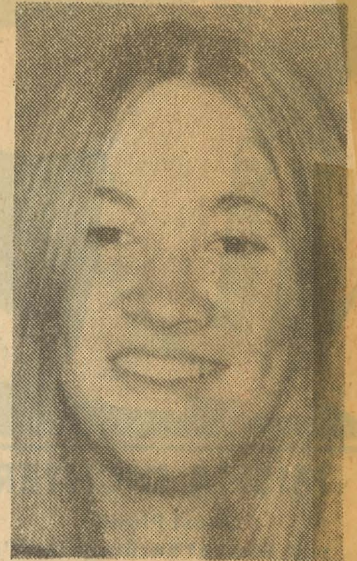
Kim's, told The Press Democrat he is starting the reward fund with a \$50 donation and hoped for more from students and others grieved by the incident.

Mr. Samia arranged a post office box number where reward fund donations may be mailed. It's the Kim Allen Reward Fund, P.O. Box 251, Santa Rosa, 95402. Any information sent to the box number will remain confidential.

Also, a Kim Allen Memorial Scholarship is being established at the request of Kim's father for a future boarding student at Ursuline. Mr. Allen said, "I want some other girl to enjoy what Kim enjoyed at Ursuline for four years."

While at Ursuline, Kim was

she wanted it to be — a beautiful ending for a beautiful life. she served as "big sister" to Robin Wilkey, daughter of Robin Wilkey of Santa Rosa.

Robin described Kim as "The most unique person I've ever known. We spent a lot of time together during my freshman year and it still bothered me after her graduation that she loved me so well and I didn't know exactly how she thought about things."

But her values were easily understood and she took great interest in telling me the things that meant the most to her. She was the first person to come close to me, her all-out enthusiasm for things she was interested in, something that I will always admire.

She hadn't changed at all. I saw her only three weeks ago and she acted the very same. Only a little more interested, a little more enthusiastic, but still distant."

Shirley Shannon, Kim's sister, mentioned that only the day before, she and Kim had talked about death and Kim had mentioned how joyful an event

she wanted it to be — a beautiful ending for a beautiful life.

Prior to Saturday's liturgy at Ursuline, Sister Mary Xavier McPhee, Ursuline principal, said: "Kim was such a happy person always. The Eucharistic Celebration our girls are planning must have joy as its theme. This has been a difficult day for all of us, but we are so grateful that the family came to us to arrange the memorial."

Kim was born in Oakland.

She also is survived by her mother, Roberta Allen, Oakland, and her brother, Robert Stevens, Oakland.

Engen & Lance Mortuary handled the funeral and is in charge of local arrangements.

Murdered Girl Was JC Student

Sonoma County Sheriff's officials identified the young woman whose nude body was found Sunday 10 miles southeast of Santa Rosa as Kim Wendy Allen, a Santa Rosa Junior College student.

Capt. Charles Kishbaugh said the girl was identified late yesterday by a sister from San Rafael.

San Rafael after her identity was tentatively established earlier by her roommates.

The 19-year-old junior college student, who lived at 2298 Guerneville rd., was last seen around 5 p.m. Saturday when she left a health food store in Larkspur where she worked to hitchhike to Santa Rosa, according to officials.

She had been raped and strangled with a wire or cord before her body was dumped down a 20-foot embankment on Enterprize rd. sometime early Sunday morning.

The coroner's office said pathologists' reports showed she died around midnight Saturday.

Her tentative identification was made from photographs at the sheriff's office and relatives were notified to view the body at the mortuary.

Sheriff Don Striepeke said investigation of the case will now focus on tracing the dead girl's activities after she left the store in Larkspur.

He asked that anyone who saw a young woman hitchhiking from Marin County after 5 p.m. Saturday to call his office at 527-2511.

THE OPEN UNIVERSITY

Considerable controversy exists over a university's proper function, with various demands and positions being taken in a move to fill the apparent vacuum of established principle. The following statements succinctly outline Young Americans for Freedom's position on what the citizen should require from an institution of higher education.

1. Student Fees: The days of social "in loco parentis" are past. It is time now to end economic "in loco parentis," which continues to exist in the form of mandatory student activity fees. YAF holds that students are mature enough to spend their own money and that activities which cannot support themselves through voluntary fees or in the open market are activities which do not contribute enough to the university to warrant continued subsidy. Campus newspapers should be financed by advertising and by subscriptions, rather than by forcing all students to subsidize papers even if they do not choose to read them. Student government, speakers programs and entertainment functions should likewise be supported by voluntary activity cards which allow admission to sponsored events. Those who do not wish to attend may spend their money as they choose, rather than as campus administrators dictate.

2. End Campus Disruption—Preserve Academic Freedom: Academic freedom requires order; free speech and all political rights can exist only when rules protecting those rights are enforced. We urge campus administrators to take disciplinary action against students who violate the rights of others by disrupting classes or meetings, or by preventing access to campus buildings. We favor free and unrestricted picketing and demonstrations which express views of student groups—but only so long as the freedom of other students is not suppressed. The preservation of order on the campus is one of the duties of the administration by contract with the students. We oppose the administrative abdication of that responsibility which has occurred where discipline is turned over to student groups, thus injecting political considerations into what should be a judicial and administrative function.

3. Stop NSA: We oppose participation in the so-called National Student Association, on the grounds that NSA purports to speak for the large majority of students on political issues. We do not believe that all students share a common viewpoint on political issues. We believe that the proliferation of political groups on campus, such as the YR's, YD's, YAF and SDS, testify to the wide range of student opinion. Any organization that claims to speak for all students is arrogant in its pretensions and fraudulent in its representations.

4. "50-50": We favor increased education standards, including consultation of student opinion over faculty hiring. However, we reject completely the demands that students participate with an equal voice in hiring decisions. The student point of view is undoubtedly relevant to hiring decisions and should be expressed, but we recognize

that students attend college precisely because they lack, and seek, knowledge. We, as students, deny that we are competent to make final decisions on the professional qualifications of our faculties.

5. Politicization: We reject the trend toward requiring the university to respond *as an institution* to political and social problems. We acknowledge that students and faculty members, as individuals and members of groups, have the right to express their concern. We do not agree that the classroom is a proper place for such politicization, nor that the university has the right to hold such views in the name of its students and faculty. Judgement is a function of the individual mind and cannot be usurped by any agency.

6. Diversity: Since the purpose of a university is to expose students to the varied world of ideas and to stimulate individual thought, we believe that it is the duty of the universities, especially state-supported schools, to provide diversity within each department. A diverse presentation of ideas which relate to the political realm is particularly important. An economics department that lacks a representative of the free market persuasion teaching undergraduates is guilty of indoctrination, regardless of the good will of the department members. Government, philosophy and history departments are likewise frequently monopolized by advocates of one theory or approach.

7. Cancellation of Classes: Cancellation of university classes is an appropriate response when it is in recognition of a near unanimity of opinion, such as the cancellation which occurred upon the death of President Kennedy. We affirm that the university has the primary duty of continuing classes and providing them in accord with its basic contract and that this duty can only be modified by such a unanimity. It is therefore improper to cancel classes when none exists, as was the case in the wave of Vietnam moratoria.

8. Voucher Plan: Recognizing that students at public institutions are subsidized in tuition by the taxpayer, and recognizing further that the growing dependence upon public institutions undermines the diversity which has traditionally been present in our higher education system, we urge the adoption of a voucher plan, whereby each student would receive a voucher representing the cost of the state subsidy to higher education, which could be presented to any school, public or private, of the student's choice. This would restore freedom of choice to the individual and revitalize private education, making private schools more readily available to all qualified students.

The foregoing statements represent a point of view that traditionally has been dominant in the institutions of higher learning and in the human mind in general: freedom of intellectual expression and investigation. Should this principle be suppressed or lost, Academia would settle into the dust of destruction—for knowledge and the pursuit of truth cannot survive the enslavement of the mind.

STUDENT OF THE MONTH GUIDELINES

I. Purpose

The purpose of the Student of the Month program is to recognize and honor outstanding students whose scholastic attainment and sense of responsibility and leadership give most promise of future success in and services to society.

II. Committee Membership

The Student of the Month Committee shall consist of:

A. One Freshman Representative from the College Student Assembly, not to be a member of the Executive Cabinet;

B. One Sophomore Representative from the College Student Assembly, not to be a member of the Executive Cabinet;

C. One elected officer from the Executive Cabinet, excluding the Freshman and Sophomore Representatives.

D. Members of the Student of the Month Committee shall be appointed under the rules regarding committee membership as stated in the constitution of the Associated Students of the Santa Rosa Junior College.

III. Committee Duties

The duty of the Student of the Month Committee shall be to pick student of the month from those applications submitted for that month. The applicants will be judged on the following criteria:

A. Only those students with a 2.5 overall grade average or better will be eligible.

B. School activities will be judged on a 60 point basis, broken down as follows:

1. Citizenship(club, committee member, etc.)-20 points
2. Leadership(student government, club or

4. Grade Point Average - ~~20 per~~ 10 points -

committee offices held, etc.)-20 points

3. Service(special projects, volunteer work, etc.)-20 points

C. Community activities will be judged on a 30 point basis, broken down as follows:

1. Citizenship(Lions, Rotary, Grange, etc.)-10 points
2. Leadership(Chamber of Commerce, Jaycees, offices held in community organizations, etc.) 10 points
3. Service(Red Cross, Ecology committee, volunteer work, etc.)-10 points

D. The winner in each area will be selected according to the number of activities in that area. First place in an area will be awarded maximum points for that area, second place will be awarded one half points. In case of a tie, third place in areas will be considered, and will be awarded one fourth points.

IV. Dissemination of information

A. Within the first two weeks of each semester, a copy of the Student of the Month guidelines will be placed in all staff, faculty, committee, CSA, and any other mail boxes deemed necessary by the committee.

B. On or about the fifteenth of each month, application forms will be placed in the above mentioned mail boxes to be returned to the Student of the Month mail box in the Student Activities Office by the last day of the month.

C. The judging committee will meet for the purpose of selecting a student of the month on or about the first day of the next month.

V. Award and Presentation

A. The award shall be a personal letter, not to be a form letter, from the associated students, written by the judging committee, to be added to the selected student's transcripts, commending him for his outstanding contributions to the school and to the community.

B. The award shall be presented to the selected student by the president of the associated students at the second meeting of CSA following the selection by the judging committee.

C. An Oak Leaf photographer will be present at each presentation, and a photograph of the presentation and a brief article will be placed in the first following edition of the Oak Leaf.

Vote NO On Proposition No. 9

WHY WE ARE OPPOSED TO THE POLLUTION INITIATIVE

The following is our interpretation of the issues, based on fact:

Section 1 - The Pollution Initiative will appear on the June 6 ballot as Proposition No. 9.

Section 2 - 39281 - The Bromine number relates to Olefin content. Olefins are active hydrocarbons and therefore a significant element in photochemical smog. There is little beneficial impact on exhaust emissions from reducing Bromine numbers below 25 or 30. A Bromine number of 10 would help a little in reducing Olefins from fuel spillage and evaporation, but as evaporative controls on vehicles become more widespread (required on all 1970 and later automobiles and 1973 and later trucks), even this benefit will disappear.

The 1970 legislature passed a bill establishing a maximum Bromine number of 30 for the South Coast Basin (in this area more than one-half of the gasoline in the state is sold).

Most gasolines in the state would meet this requirement if the Bromine number were reduced. Yet, as Olefins are reduced, current refining methods increase aromatics and saturates.

If one reads Section 39281 and sub section (b) carefully, he will see the desired goal of the ASTM number is made void by the double negative.

Section 2 - 39281.1 - Lead increases a gasoline's octane number, which enables the engine to run without knocking, but such auto pollution control systems as the catalytic converter cannot run on a leaded gasoline because of its corrosiveness. These new engines will run on 90 or 91 octane lead-free gas. California has passed a law requiring that 1972 and future automobiles sold in California must be able to operate on gasoline with an octane number not in excess of 91, to facilitate the introduction of this octane of lead-free gas.

The Initiative's proposal for lead reduction is more stringent than the recommendations of the Air Resources Board or the proposed Environmental Protection Agency guidelines. It is apparent that within a short time lead will be removed because of its effect on pollution devices and the atmosphere. To meet the Initiative's requirements and still maintain an adequate octane count would not be possible for a year or more. Refineries are simply not designed for that kind of gasoline. Older

POLLUTION. INITIATIVE. SPECIFIES PERMISSIBLE COMPOSITION AND QUALITY OF GASOLINE AND OTHER FUEL FOR INTERNAL COMBUSTION ENGINES. AUTHORIZES SHUTTING DOWN OF BUSINESSES AND FACTORIES VIOLATING AIR POLLUTION STANDARDS. IMPOSES RESTRICTIONS ON LEASING AND EXTRACTION OF OIL AND GAS FROM TIDELANDS OR SUBMERGED LANDS, OR ONSHORE AREAS WITHIN ONE MILE OF MEAN HIGH TIDE LINE. PROHIBITS CONSTRUCTION OF ATOMIC POWERED ELECTRIC GENERATING PLANTS FOR FIVE YEARS. ESTABLISHES RESTRICTIONS ON MANUFACTURE, SALE, AND USE OF PESTICIDES. PROHIBITS ENFORCEMENT OFFICIALS FROM HAVING CONFLICTING INTERESTS. PROVIDES FOR RELIEF BY INJUNCTION AND MANDATE TO PREVENT VIOLATIONS. IMPOSES PENAL SANCTIONS AND CIVIL PENALTIES. IF THIS PROPOSED INITIATIVE IS ADOPTED, UNDEFINED ADDITIONAL FINANCING FROM STATE SOURCES IN THE APPROXIMATE AMOUNT OF \$135,000 ANNUALLY PLUS THE TOTAL LOSS OF REVENUE IN THE APPROXIMATE AMOUNT OF \$200,000,000 WILL BE REQUIRED.

An Act to add Chapters 2.6 (commencing with Section 24375), 2.7 (commencing with Section 24376), 2.8 (commencing with Section 24378), and 3.5 (commencing with Section 24399) to Division 20 of, to add Chapter 8 (commencing with Section 39280.1) to Division 26 of, and to add Sections 24246.1, 24246.2, 24303, 24304, 25711, 25712 to the Health and Safety Code, to add Article 3.5 (commencing with Section 14075) to Chapter 3 of Division 7 of, and to add Section 102.1 to, and to amend Section 12783 to the Agriculture Code, to add Section 11705.5 to the Vehicle Code, to add Sections 6828.1 and 6870 to the Public Resources Code, and to add Sections 175.1 and 13201 to the Water Code, relating to environmental protection.

The People of the State of California do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. This Initiative Act may be cited as the Clean Environment Act.

SECTION 2. Chapter 8 (commencing with Section 39280.1) is added to Part 1 of Division 26 of the Health and Safety Code, to read:

Chapter 8. Fuel Composition.

39280.1. "Retailer," as used in this Chapter, means any person possessing a valid motor fuel pump license pursuant to Article 2 (commencing with Section 20766), Chapter 7, Division 8 of the Business and Professions Code, and shall apply separately to each place of business.

39280.2. "Sell," as used in this Chapter, includes offering for sale, keeping for sale, delivering for pay, offering to deliver, or selling.

39280.3. "Grade," as used in this Chapter, means a grade of gasoline, a particular petroleum product, ordinarily identified by a brand, trademark, or trade name, intended for use as a fuel for internal combustion engines and ordinarily identified by a brand, trademark, or trade name, intended for use as a fuel for internal combustion engines and ordinarily subject to the labeling requirements of Chapter 7 (commencing with Section 20700), Division 8 of the Business and Professions Code.

Gasoline dispensed from pumps described in Section 20852 of the Business and Professions Code shall be provided to the consumer in a

prescribe more stringent standards than those prescribed by this Chapter, and may prescribe standards for other components and qualities of fuel not covered or mentioned by this Chapter.

39286. Every person who violates any provision of this Chapter is guilty of a misdemeanor.

SECTION 3. Section 24303 is added to the Health and Safety Code to read:

24303. No person possessing a permit from any air pollution control district may continue to operate any source capable of emitting air contaminants if he has received four or more variances, as defined by the Health and Safety Code or an air pollution control district, within the preceeding five years with respect to such source, unless he first installs standby or other protective equipment for such sources approved by an air pollution control district.

SECTION 4. Section 24304 is added to the Health and Safety Code to read:

24304. In addition to any other definition or provision regarding variances in the Health and Safety Code or in the rules and regulations of an air pollution control district, a variance shall consist of the continuous discharge or emission of air contaminants for a period of one or more hours in violation of any provision of the Health and Safety Code or the rules and regulations of an air pollution control district. A variance may not continue for more than 3 months.

SECTION 5. Section 24246.1 is added to the Health and Safety Code to read:

24246.1. An air pollution control district may require any person who operates a source capable of emitting air contaminants to install on such source a sealed monitoring device capable of measuring and recording the contaminants being emitted into the atmosphere from such source. Any official of an air pollution control district may examine or inspect such

No one may resume any activity shut down or halted by the air pollution control officer pursuant to this Section until he receives written permission from the air pollution control officer.

Anyone injured or damaged by an unlawful order of an air pollution control officer may institute proceedings in a court of competent jurisdiction to recover actual damages against the air pollution control district.

The procedures to be followed are the same as those specified in the Government Code with respect to claims and actions against municipalities.

No injunction or restraining order shall issue to restrain or prevent an air pollution control officer from issuing any shut down order.

No air pollution control district officer shall be personally liable for any damage caused by him as a result of the issuance of a shut down order.

No one has the right to a hearing to determine the propriety of the issuance of a shut down order. The people find and declare that the critical problem of air pollution requires emergency action as provided by this Section.

Every person is guilty of a misdemeanor who violates any provision of this Section.

SECTION 7. Chapter 2.7 (commencing with Section 24376) is added to Division XX of the Health and Safety Code to read:

Chapter 2.7. Environmental Class Actions.

24376. Any person may bring a class action for the benefit of all residents of a particular air pollution control district, in any court of competent jurisdiction, against any person operating under or pursuant to a permit granted or issued by such district, to enjoin such person from violating any provision of the Health and Safety Code or any rule or regulation of the air pollution control district. Upon successful conclusion of such action, the plaintiff shall be awarded all costs and expenses of the litigation, including reasonable attorneys fees. Such action shall in no way preclude any action for damages.

SECTION 8. Chapter 2.6 (commencing with Section 24375) is added to Division XX of the Health and Safety Code to read:

Chapter 2.6. Incentive Levies.

24375. Any person who is found guilty of violating any air pollution provision of this Code, or of violating any rule or regulation of any air pollution control district, State Air Resources Board, or regional pollution board or district of this state, or who enters a plea of guilty, or nolo contendere to such provision, rule, or regulation, shall pay to the air pollution control district in which the violation occurs, a sum of money equal to .4% of its gross income for the fiscal year immediately preceeding the year in which the violation occurs.

Said payment shall be made within one day after guilt is determined, or a plea of guilty or nolo contendere is entered, and additional payments in the same amount shall be made each day thereafter until the air pollution control officer of the district in which the offense occurred determines that the violator has undertaken a program to ensure that such violation will not recur. Upon completion of such program to the satisfaction of the air

(d) Anyone who violates any provision of this Section is guilty of a misdemeanor.

(e) Any interested person may commence an action by mandamus or injunction for the purpose of stopping or preventing violations or threatened violations of this Article.

SECTION 13. Section 6828.1 is added to the Public Resources Code to read:

6828.1. Whenever, as determined by the commission, any operation conducted under lease issued pursuant to this Chapter constitutes an ultrahazardous activity, such operation shall cease upon order of the commission and shall not commence until such time as the commission determines that the operation no longer constitutes an ultrahazardous activity. As used in this Section, "ultrahazardous activity" means an activity which poses an imminent threat to the health, safety, and welfare of the public, including, but not limited to, substantial damage or destruction to lands and marine and coastal wildlife and pollution of state waters by the escape of oil or gas.

SECTION 14. Section 175.1 is added to the Water Code to read:

175.1. No official or employee of, or person with any financial interest in, any discharger of wastes in the waters of California shall serve on the board.

SECTION 15. Section 13201.1 is added to the Water Code to read:

13201.1. No official or employee of, or person with any financial interest in, any discharger of wastes in the waters of California shall serve on any regional board.

SECTION 16. Section 25711 is added to the Health and Safety Code, to read:

25711. It shall be unlawful for any person to manufacture or construct an electric generating plant which is powered by atomic energy from nuclear fission during the five year period next succeeding the effective date of this Section.

SECTION 17. Section 25712 is added to the Health and Safety Code, to read:

25712. Violation of Section 25711 of this Chapter shall be a misdemeanor. Any interested person may commence an action by mandamus or injunction for the purpose of stopping or preventing violations or threatened violations of Section 25711.

SECTION 18. Article 3.5 (commencing with Section 14075) is added to Chapter 3 of Division 7 of the Agricultural Code, to read:

Article 3.5. Persistent Chlorinated Hydrocarbons.

14075. No person may manufacture, possess, buy, sell, import, deliver, or use any form of persistent chlorinated hydrocarbons within the state, unless pursuant to a permit issued by the director.

14076. The director may issue a permit only upon authorization by

Rapp Construction Low For SRJC Pioneer Hall

Rapp Construction, Santa Rosa, was low for the Pioneer Hall Rehabilitation remodel, Santa Rosa Junior College, with a base bid of \$514,000 (alternate I plus \$18,000; alternate II plus \$7,000) Paul V. Wright, Santa Rosa, base \$511,000 (alternate I plus \$27,400; alternate II plus \$6,300) Colombini Construction, Santa Rosa, base \$510,000 (alternate I plus \$31,000; alternate II plus \$6,000) Page Construction, Novato, base \$569,855 (alternate I plus \$42,950; alternate II plus \$6,560 and Fostmeier Construction, Rohnert Park, base \$591,000 (alternate I plus \$38,500; alternate II plus \$6,400.

Teamed up with Rapp Construction include: Santa Rosa Masonry, masonry; Kauth Brothers, special metal; Western Roofing, roofing; Cloutier, sheet metal, heating and ventilating; Western Builders, glass and glazing; Les Miles, lath and plaster; Plumbing Service, plumbing and Rocco, painting, all of Santa Rosa; Jedd-co, San Rafael, reinforcing steel; Krieger, San Francisco, metal doors; Reyes Tile, Sebastopol, ceramic tile; Bobs Plastic, Vallejo, flooring; Ray-Con Tile, Sebastopol, acoustic finish and Tresch Electric, Novato, electrical.

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Approved as an alternate, should the funds become available, was Up Close, a \$300 photo project proposed by Peter Huot.

Its Rooms and Buildings

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Dr. Roy Mikalson, SRJC president, reported that an updated inventory of campus facilities, including accurate measurements of rooms and redesignation of some areas, shows the college actually has less space than previously thought.

The lower figure is beneficial because of state standards for square footage per student enrollment. It may be advantageous in increasing state funds for the SRJC building program.

Dr. Mikalson reported also on the possible formation of a new junior college district north of Sonoma County. He said Lake and Mendocino counties now bear the cost of 400 to 500 of their students attending SRJC.

If a movement by Ukiah and Lake County citizens to form their own junior college district is successful, SRJC would lose financially. Merger of the north-

ern areas with Santa Rosa Junior College District would not alter the current financial picture much, however, he said.

He speculated that creation of a separate inland district would probably mean that Fort Bragg and coastal Mendocino County would be linked to SRJC.

The board also heard a report by Robert Maggiora, dean of business services, showing the SRJC cost of education per student at \$704.44, lowest among the 13 comparable Bay Area schools and \$190 less than their average cost. He showed also that the district's tax rate of 59 cents per \$100 assessed valuation is well below the 72 cents average in the same 13-school area. He noted the Sonoma County assessment rate of 22.1 per cent of market value is reflected in lower assessment than other counties, also.

Assessed valuation per average daily attendance is \$78,950 locally, he said, compared to the state average of \$110,000.

The figures demonstrate the difficulty in raising local tax monies in comparison to other areas throughout the state, he said.

In other business, the board:

—CENTREX: Heard a proposal by Larry Clark of Pacific Telephone for installation of a 1974 Centrex communications system for SRJC, similar to those of the City of Santa Rosa, Sonoma County Schools and

Sonoma State College at a probable monthly cost of \$500 to \$600 more than current costs. No action will be taken until the next meeting.

—TUTORING: Saw a videotape presentation on the Center of Independent Learning (COIL) used by more than 1500 students during fall semester, and where 97 student tutors assisted 688 students a total of 6,814 hours. Greatest use was by students in the English, mathematics and chemistry departments.

—NEW COURSES: Approved 37 new courses including viticulture and a block of physical education courses using a new water sports facility to open in the fall; dropping several as obsolete, also.

—REGISTRATION: Approved changes in Evening College and Summer School registration, brochure changes designating enrollment limitations and naming specific registration times for working persons.

—SUMMER SCHOOL: Approved a summer budget of not more than \$110,000 and set an April 3 meeting to discuss an ethnic studies department proposal and removal of the F grade from the grading system.

—PIONEER HALL: Conditionally accepted the Rapp Construction Co. bid of \$532,000 for renovation of Pioneer Hall without the second alternate, removal of roof tile; voted to sell revenue bonds of \$500,000 before formal award of the contract

May 8.

—ATTENDANCE: Heard Dean of Students Dr. Garth Deugan's report showing a favorable flow of 586 students from outside the district compared to 200 local students attending other junior colleges, resulting in a local \$9,609 advantage in average daily attendance support.

The only areas where outward flow of students outnumbers inward flow are to junior colleges

in Napa and Eureka and to Butte College, now attended by 11 local students.

Dr. Mikalson said it was impossible to project next year's attendance because of three factors: 18-year-olds may now legally establish residency where they choose, there is no restriction on flow of out-of-state students into California schools and no preference can be given to local students, according to the law.

RECOMMENDED GRADING SYSTEM
March 1, 1972

I. LETTER GRADES

Letter grades shall be assigned to courses taken at Santa Rosa Junior College on the basis of positive achievement as follows:

- A - Outstanding achievement
- B - Above average achievement
- C - Average achievement
- D - Below average; minimum acceptable achievement for the awarding of units of credit
- G - Requirement met by examination; no units or grade awarded
- H - Medical excuse for physical education
- CE - Ungraded Units of Credit awarded by examination with Level of Achievement "C" or better.
- W - Withdrawal - a non-penalty notation indicating the student has officially dropped out of a course within predetermined deadline dates
- I - Incomplete - requirements for the course not completed within designated time. Upon application by the student and approval by the instructor, an extension of not more than one semester will be granted. The "I" grade will change into an "NC" at the end of the semester following the one in which it was awarded if the requirements have not been completed
- CR - Successful completion of minimum requirements for a course where the student has elected the CR/NC option or where, by college policy, all grades in certain courses are given "CR" or "NC" grades
- NC - No Credit - Minimum requirements not completed. To be given for courses where the student has elected the CR/NC option; where, by college policy, all grades in certain courses are given "CR" or "NC" grades; or where, for any other reason, minimum requirements for a course are not completed
- CX - A grade awarded in English 100 recommending a student for advancement to English 1-A

II. GRADE POINTS ARE AWARDED AS FOLLOWS:

- A - 4 points per unit
- B - 3 points per unit
- C - 2 points per unit
- D - 1 point per unit
- CE - Units earned not counted in computed G.P.A.
- H - Not counted as units attempted in computing G.P.A.

II. GRADE POINTS AWARDED (Continued)

- I - A temporary notation, not counted as units attempted or completed for any purpose
- CR - Not counted as units attempted in computing G.P.A.
- NC - Not counted as units attempted in computing G.P.A. on permanent record
- CX - Not counted as units attempted in computing G.P.A.

III. ADMISSION

- A. High school graduates and students whose previous college work has resulted in a G.P.A. of 2.0 or better will be admitted with clear status
- B. A student whose G.P.A. from previous college work is less than 2.0 may petition for admission on probation
- C. A student who has been dismissed or disqualified from another college may petition for admission on probation after the lapse of one regular semester.
- D. Non-high school graduates may be admitted on probation upon approval of the Office of the Dean of Students.

IV. PROBATION

- A. Probationary status is imposed on all students:
 - 1. Upon admission, whose past college academic performance has resulted in a G.P.A. of less than 2.0 as computed by the previous institution.
 - 2. Who have been academically dismissed or disqualified from another college.
 - 3. Whose academic performance at S.R.J.C. results in a G.P.A. of less than 2.0.
 - 4. Who are not high school graduates.

V. REMOVAL OF PROBATION

A student will remain in the probationary status until he has raised his G.P.A. for work undertaken at S.R.J.C. to 2.0. While on probation, a student's academic load should be limited to a maximum of 12½ units.

VI. DISQUALIFICATION

- A. In determining disqualification, the units assigned to a course where the grade "NC" was given will be counted as units attempted.
- B. A student may be disqualified at the end of a semester even though he has not been on probation.
- C. Disqualification standards apply to all students who have attempted at Santa Rosa Junior College, a total of 12½ or more units in one or more semesters.

VI. DISQUALIFICATION (continued)

- D. A student will be disqualified if his cumulative grade point average at Santa Rosa Junior College falls below the following:

- E. No student will be disqualified at the end of a semester in which he earned a 2.0 or better grade point average for units attempted.

VII. READMISSION

- A. A student is eligible for readmission on probation as follows:

1. After a first disqualification and upon the completion of 5 or more units in summer school with a grade point average of 2.0 or higher in those units.
2. After first disqualification and after an absence of one or more semesters.
3. After second or more disqualifications and after an absence of two semesters or more.

- B. The grade of "I" will be disregarded in determining probation and disqualification.

- C. Readmission shall be by petition.

- D. A readmitted student shall be limited to a 12½ unit load and he shall continue on probation until he has raised his G.P.A. for work undertaken at Santa Rosa Junior College to a 2.0.

RELATED RECOMMENDATION RELATING TO DROP AND WITHDRAWAL DEADLINE

- I. It is recommended that the present system of attempting to determine the academic standing of a student at the time of withdrawal be abandoned as unworkable.
- II. It is recommended that the deadline for dropping a course and for withdrawing from college be uniformly set at the end of the twelfth week of instruction. Students dropping a course or withdrawing from college after the deadline date will be given an NC grade for the courses in which they were enrolled. Exceptions will be by petition.
- III. It is further recommended that the "Credit, No-Credit Policy" be amended to show that the units assigned to a course where the grade of "NC" is given will be counted as units attempted for purposes of disqualification only.

Re: supplementary budget

I have delayed writing you until this time because I had hoped that our present budget would be adequate to complete our schedule of tournaments, and also because until two days ago I did not have in fee schedule for the State Championship tournament. Now I find that there is no way for us to attend the State tournament, or Nationals, without additional student funding.

It is now my best estimate that to send a delegation of 14 students to the state tournament (the size we should send) will require \$800.00; \$150.00 registration fees, \$350.00 for food, and \$300.00 for rooms. The State tournament will be held at Bakersfield April 13, 14, 15, and 16. Most of the members of our squad are freshmen, and if they are to compete next year on even terms they need the experience which only a State tournament can give them. Also, I would like to point out that our original budget was projected on the basis of a 15-member squad. In fact, we now have 20 on the team. In each of the four years our program has been in existence we have attended the State tournament. By the tradition of these four years it is a supplementary appropriation from the Associated Students.

The junior college "Nationals" will be held this year in Los Angeles. We should send a small delegation, perhaps 6 people, in recognition of achievements which several of our more successful students have made this year. Last year the National tournament was in St. Louis and our expenses were paid by the District. It was agreed at that time that when Nationals was "out-of-state" funding was a District responsibility, but when Nationals was "in-state" it was an Associated Students responsibility. My best estimate for a delegation of 6 to Nationals is \$700.00. *DATE 5-APRIL 24-29.*

As of this moment we have some \$900 in our account. The San Luis Obispo tournament this weekend will cost about \$500.00. The NCFA Spring tournament (May 12-13 in Turlock) will cost about \$300.00 That leaves about \$100.00 towards the cost of State and Nationals. Therefore I am requesting a supplementary appropriation in the amount of \$1400.00 for the Forensics program.

I would be delighted to appear before you to discuss this matter further, and would hope that a decision could be reached the first week in April.

STUDENT OF THE MONTH GUIDELINES

I. Purpose

The purpose of the Student Of the Month program is to recognize and honor outstanding students whose scholastic attainment and sense of responsibility and leadership give most promise of future success in and services to society.

II. Committee Membership

The Student of the Month Committee shall consist of:

A. One Freshman Representative from the College Student Assembly, not to be a member of the Executive Cabinet;

B. One Sophomore Representative from the College Student Assembly, not to be a member of the Executive Cabinet;

C. One elected officer from the Executive Cabinet, excluding the Freshman and Sophomore Representatives.

D. Members of the Student of the Month Committee shall be appointed under the rules regarding committee membership as stated in the constitution of the Santa Rosa Junior College.

III. Committee Duties

The duty of the Student of the Month Committee shall be to pick a student of the month from those applications submitted for that month. The applicants will be judged on the following criteria:

A. Only those students with 10½ units or more at the time of application are eligible. A member of the judging committee is not eligible.

B. School activities will be judged on a 60 point basis, broken down as follows:

1. Citizenship (club, committee member, etc.)-20 points.
2. Leadership (student government, club or committee offices held, etc.)-20 points
3. Service (special projects, volunteer work, etc.)-20 points

C. Community activities will be judged on a 30 point basis, broken down as follows:

1. Citizenship (Lions, Rotary, Grange, etc.)-10 points
2. Leadership (Chamber of Commerce, Jaycees, offices held in community organizations, etc.)-10 points
3. Service (Red Cross, Ecology Committee, volunteer work, etc.)-10 points

D. Each Applicant will receive points equal to his last semester's grade point average, multiplied by a conversion factor of 2.5. Maximum possible points for GPA will be 10.

E. The winner in each area will be selected according to the number of activities in that area, with the exception of Section "D" above. First place in an area will be awarded maximum points for that area; second place will be awarded one half points. In case of a tie, third place in areas will be considered, and will be awarded one fourth points.

IV. Dissemination of Information

A. Within the first two weeks of each semester, a copy of the Student of the Month guidelines will be placed in all staff, faculty, committee, CSA, club, and any other mail boxes deemed necessary by the committee.

B. On or about the fifteenth of each month, applications will be placed in the aforementioned boxes to be returned to the Student of the Month mail box in the Student Activities Office by the last day of the month.

C. The judging committee shall meet for the purpose of selecting a student of the month on or about the first day of the next month.

V. Award and Presentation

A. The award shall be a personal letter, not to be a form letter, from the associated students, written by the judging committee, to be added to the selected student's transcripts, commending him for his outstanding contributions to the school and to the community.

B. The award shall be presented to the selected student by the president of the associated students at the second meeting of CSA following the selection of the judging committee, or at the honored student's convenience.

C. In Oak Leaf photographer will be present at each presentation, and a photograph of the presentation and a brief article will be placed in the first following edition of the Oak Leaf.

RESOLUTION

In support of captured and missing Americans of the Indochina War

WHEREAS, the overwhelming majority of American citizens, regardless of their individual beliefs about the Indochina war, are deeply concerned about the treatment of all prisoners of war held by both sides in that conflict; and

WHEREAS, notwithstanding solemn promises ratified at the International Conference at Geneva that the Convention provides that it "shall apply to all cases of declared war or any other armed conflict which may arise between two or more of the High Contracting parties, even if the state of war is not recognized by one of them"; and

WHEREAS, the government of North Vietnam acceded to the Convention on June 29, 1957, no pretense of compliance has been advanced by North Vietnam, the Viet Cong, or the Pathet Lao, despite requests to do so by the International Red Cross and numerous appeals by International humanitarian organizations, and

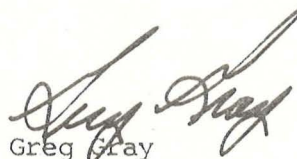
WHEREAS, repeated appeals in behalf of those unfortunate men through diplomatic and humanitarian channels have proved ineffective;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT, We; The Inter-Club Council of Santa Rosa Junior College, petition to the Geneva Convention, to which it is a signatory, and:

1. Release names and physical condition of all prisoners held.
2. Immediately release sick and wounded prisoners.
3. Provide for medical treatment of all prisoners.
4. Provide for regular flow of mail, food, and comfort items.
5. Cease using prisoners for propaganda purposes and political gain.
6. Provide for impartial inspections of prisoner of war facilities.
7. Agree to immediately negotiate through International Humanitarian Organizations for the fair and equitable release of prisoners on both sides.

FROM: Sub-Committee on Grading

The material attached to this memorandum recommends a basic change in the grading system as practiced at S.R.J.C. Presented along with this changed pattern are related recommendations on admission, probation and disqualification.

The sub-committee has worked on this proposal for well over a year now, and we feel that all significant avenues have been explored.

Title V of the Administrative Code was amended during the past year to allow for "non standard" grading patterns such as the one proposed.

Several campuses of the University have adopted non-standard grading systems.

The State Colleges that responded to our request for evaluation of our proposal have indicated no problem in accepting the transfer student.

The Registrar's Office and the Data Processing department have reviewed the proposal and both indicate that there would be no problem in implementation. If given sufficient lead time to write and test the program, the present computer can handle the system quite adequately.

Because there are substantive changes in the recommendations contained in the attached document from those in the document presented to the faculty last fall, we recommend that this proposal follow relatively the same avenues as the original document. Opinion of other committees, the faculty, and students should be sought as directed by the Clearing House Committee.

It is our hope that if substantial support is present from students and faculty that the proposal will be forwarded to the Board of Trustees for final disposition.

RECOMMENDED GRADING SYSTEM
March 1, 1972

I. LETTER GRADES

Letter grades shall be assigned to courses taken at Santa Rosa Junior College on the basis of positive achievement as follows:

- A - Outstanding achievement
- B - Above average achievement
- C. - Average achievement
- D - Below average; minimum acceptable achievement for the awarding of units of credit
- G - Requirement met by examination; no units or grade awarded
- H - Medical excuse for physical education
- CE - Ungraded Units of Credit awarded by examination with Level of Achievement "C" or better.
- W - Withdrawal - a non-penalty notation indicating the student has officially dropped out of a course within predetermined deadline dates
- I - Incomplete - requirements for the course not completed within designated time. Upon application by the student and approval by the instructor, an extension of not more than one semester will be granted. The "I" grade will change into an "NC" at the end of the semester following the one in which it was awarded if the requirements have not been completed
- CR - Successful completion of minimum requirements for a course where the student has elected the CR/NC option or where, by college policy, all grades in certain courses are given "CR" or "NC" grades
- NC - No Credit - Minimum requirements not completed. To be given for courses where the student has elected the CR/NC option; where, by college policy, all grades in certain courses are given "CR" or "NC" grades; or where, for any other reason, minimum requirements for a course are not completed
- CX - A grade awarded in English 100 recommending a student for advancement to English 1-A

II. GRADE POINTS ARE AWARDED AS FOLLOWS:

- A - 4 points per unit
- B - 3 points per unit
- C - 2 points per unit
- D - 1 point per unit
- CE - Units earned not counted in computed G.P.A.
- H - Not counted as units attempted in computing G.P.A.

II. GRADE POINTS AWARDED (Continued)

- I - A temporary notation, not counted as units attempted or completed for any purpose
- CR - Not counted as units attempted in computing G.P.A.
- NC - Not counted as units attempted in computing G.P.A. on permanent record
- CX - Not counted as units attempted in computing G.P.A.

III. ADMISSION

- A. High school graduates and students whose previous college work has resulted in a G.P.A. of 2.0 or better will be admitted with clear status
- B. A student whose G.P.A. from previous college work is less than 2.0 may petition for admission on probation
- C. A student who has been dismissed or disqualified from another college may petition for admission on probation after the lapse of one regular semester.
- D. Non-high school graduates may be admitted on probation upon approval of the Office of the Dean of Students.

IV. PROBATION

- A. Probationary status is imposed on all students:
 - 1. Upon admission, whose past college academic performance has resulted in a G.P.A. of less than 2.0 as computed by the previous institution.
 - 2. Who have been academically dismissed or disqualified from another college.
 - 3. Whose academic performance at S.R.J.C. results in a G.P.A. of less than 2.0.
 - 4. Who are not high school graduates.

V. REMOVAL OF PROBATION

A student will remain in the probationary status until he has raised his G.P.A. for work undertaken at S.R.J.C. to 2.0. While on probation, a student's academic load should be limited to a maximum of 12½ units.

VI. DISQUALIFICATION

- A. In determining disqualification, the units assigned to a course where the grade "NC" was given will be counted as units attempted.
- B. A student may be disqualified at the end of a semester even though he has not been on probation.
- C. Disqualification standards apply to all students who have attempted at Santa Rosa Junior College, a total of 12½ or more units in one or more semesters.

VI. DISQUALIFICATION (continued)

- D. A student will be disqualified if his cumulative grade point average at Santa Rosa Junior College falls below the following:

12½ - 29½	1.0
30 - 44½	1.5
45 - 59½	1.75
60 or more	1.9

- E. No student will be disqualified at the end of a semester in which he earned a 2.0 or better grade point average for units attempted.

VII. READMISSION

- A. A student is eligible for readmission on probation as follows:

1. After a first disqualification and upon the completion of 5 or more units in summer school with a grade point average of 2.0 or higher in those units.
2. After first disqualification and after an absence of one or more semesters.
3. After second or more disqualifications and after an absence of two semesters or more.

- B. The grade of "I" will be disregarded in determining probation and disqualification.

- C. Readmission shall be by petition.

- D. A readmitted student shall be limited to a 12½ unit load and he shall continue on probation until he has raised his G.P.A. for work undertaken at Santa Rosa Junior College to a 2.0.

RELATED RECOMMENDATION RELATING TO DROP AND WITHDRAWAL DEADLINE

- I. It is recommended that the present system of attempting to determine the academic standing of a student at the time of withdrawal be abandoned as unworkable.
- II. It is recommended that the deadline for dropping a course and for withdrawing from college be uniformly set at the end of the twelfth week of instruction. Students dropping a course or withdrawing from college after the deadline date will be given an NC grade for the courses in which they were enrolled. Exceptions will be by petition.
- III. It is further recommended that the "Credit, No-Credit Policy" be amended to show that the units assigned to a course where the grade of "NC" is given will be counted as units attempted for purposes of disqualification only.

SONOMA COUNTY JUNIOR COLLEGE DISTRICT

A STATEMENT ON AFFIRMATIVE ACTION

I Introduction

Following introduction and discussion of the subject the Clearing House Committee agreed an Affirmative Action Policy and Program Statement should be developed for Santa Rosa Junior College. It assigned the responsibility to a three-man Ad Hoc Committee. The committee began its work by surveying other institutions to determine the nature and content of programs in effect. The findings indicated great variance. The committee then proceeded to review what has transpired at the college since 1968, to gather relevant statistical data, and to develop the form and content of a statement for submission to the Clearing House Committee.

II Definitions

Affirmative Action is a program conceived and implemented to bring the ethnic composition of student enrollments and classified and certificated staffs of schools into a close approximation of that of the population of their districts, to cultivate an awareness and understanding of the nature and effects of racism, and to develop a program to counteract racism.

Equal Employment Opportunity is a policy to provide equal opportunity for employment for all persons, to prohibit discrimination in employment because of race, color, religion, sex or national origin, and to promote the full realization of equal employment opportunity through a continuing affirmative action program. *

III Developments at Santa Rosa Junior College Since 1968

Since 1968 Santa Rosa Junior College has aggressively undertaken a program to expand its services to minority and low-income residents of its district.

* Assurance of Compliance to the Civil Rights Act of 1964 was readopted by the Santa Rosa Junior College Board of Trustees January 10, 1972.

Its efforts have been specifically directed at increasing enrollments, extending its curriculum through the introduction of course offerings in ethnic studies, and increasing the number of minority personnel on its certificated and classified staffs.

In the spring of 1968 the president of the college called an open meeting of interested students and employees to discuss the deficiencies and shortcomings of the college with reference to its services to minority and low-income groups. An outcome of the meeting was the establishment by the president of an Educational Opportunity Committee which reported its findings and recommendations directly to him. The committee became one of the standing committees of the college in 1970.

During the ensuing years these have been the results of joint student, faculty, administrative and board efforts.

1. A half-time coordinator of E.O.P. was appointed in spring of 1968, and the position was made full-time beginning in the 1969-70 year.
2. A College Readiness Program was organized and offered the summer of 1968 for disadvantaged youth who had made no prior plans to attend college. The program included special classes in English and the social sciences, one-to-one tutoring, free textbooks, and employment opportunities. Sixteen students were enrolled, and of these, fourteen completed the session and twelve continued in the fall semester.
3. To enlarge college-wide understanding, a week-end conference on problems of ethnic minority and low-income students was held in the winter of 1968. Special speakers were featured and small discussion groups organized.
4. The E.O.P. tutorial program was expanded and refined during 1968-69, and student tutors reimbursed for their services.
5. In the spring, 1969, a day-long college-wide convocation was held on racism.

6. An Ethnic Studies sub-committee of the Curriculum and Instruction Committee was formed in 1968 and in 1971 became in itself a standing college committee. From the beginning in the summer of 1968 with the offering of several basic courses in Black and Mexican-American History a comprehensive ethnic studies curriculum has been evolved in the interests of, but not exclusively for, ethnic minority students. Enrollment figures speak for themselves:

7. Special housing and furniture was provided for E.O.P. in spring, 1969, with rental of a 900 square foot Speedspace Building, expanded to 1500 square feet in fall, 1969. Offices in Analy Hall were remodeled in the summer of 1971 to house E.O.P. personnel and ethnic studies instructors.
8. Special efforts have been made to communicate with members of the Mexican-American and Black Communities through advisory committees only one of which has continued to function.
9. College Readiness Programs were again offered in the summer of 1969, 1970, and 1971 with programs and curriculum reorganized in the light of past experience.

10. For many years the college has sought to add minority personnel to its staff, and since 1968 it has vigorously carried out a recruitment program. It has experimented with diverse methods including national advertising, solicitation through ethnic minority staff members, word-of-mouth through students, listing of positions with black colleges.

12. The college recognized regular procedures would have to be adjusted if ethnic minority students were to be effectively served. Accordingly, special procedures were developed for recruitment, admission, registration, and retention of these students. Additionally; grants, tutoring, and special counseling have been provided.
13. As a result of the efforts described above, day enrollment of ethnic minority students has almost doubled from 276 in 1968-69 to 542 in 1971-72.

2. In three years time from 1968 to 1971 Santa Rosa Junior College has increased its day enrollment by 1294 students from 4247 to 5541 for a growth of 30.4%. At the same time it has tripled that rate of growth for minority students by increasing its day enrollment of ethnic minority students by 266 from 276 to 542 for a growth of 96%.

3. The percentage of ethnic minority day students of the total day enrollment at Santa Rosa Junior College has risen from 6.5% in 1968 to 9.8% in 1971.
4. Santa Rosa Junior College is close (9.8%) to achieving a goal of an ethnic minority day enrollment at least equal to the ethnic minority percentage (10.8%) of the total population of Sonoma County.
5. In four segments of ethnic minority day student enrollment at the college in 1971 -- Black, Oriental, Native American, and Other Minority -- the percentage figures these segments comprise of the total day enrollment each exceeds the percentages these four segments comprise of the total population of the County.

6. In one segment of ethnic minority day student enrollment at the college in 1971 -- Spanish Surname -- the percentage figure this segment comprises of the total day enrollment (3.2%) is less than the percentage this segment comprises of the total population of the County (7.4%). An increase of 131% in the ratio is required to reach at least the minimum goal.
7. In three years from 1968 to 1971 Santa Rosa Junior College has increased the number of its full-time employees by 80 from 205 to 285 for a growth of 39% while at the same time it has increased the number of ethnic minority employees from 2 to 21 for a growth of 1050%.
 - a. Whereas in 1968 2 of 205 employees were members of ethnic minorities (1.0%)

In 1971 21 of 285 employees were members of ethnic minorities (7.4%)

- b. Whereas in 1968 0 of 14 administrators were members of ethnic minorities (0%)

In 1971 0 of 15 administrators were members of ethnic minorities (0%)

- c. Whereas in 1968 2 of 116 teachers were members of ethnic minorities (2%)

In 1971 14 of 167 teachers were members of ethnic minorities (8%)

- d. Whereas in 1968 0 of 75 classified personnel were members of ethnic minorities (0%)

In 1971 7 of 103 classified personnel were members of ethnic minorities (7%)

- 8. Santa Rosa Junior College has made substantial progress (7.4%) towards achieving a goal of an ethnic minority percentage of full-time employees closely approximate to the ethnic minority percentage of the population of its district (10.8%).

- a. No progress has been gained in adjusting the percentage of minority administrators. The figure was zero in 1968 and is zero in 1972. If the administrative staff continues to number 15, as replacements occur, one ethnic minority member would establish a percentage figure of 6.6%, two a percentage of 13.3%.
- b. The ratio of ethnic minority full-time day teachers to total full-time day teachers (8%) is approaching the ratio of ethnic minority population of Sonoma County to the total population of Sonoma County (10.8%). For the existing staff of 167 full-time teachers, for example, an increase of four minority teachers from 14 to 18 would establish a percentage of 10.7%.
- c. The ratio of ethnic minority full-time classified personnel to total full-time classified personnel (7%) is also moving upwards toward the ratio of ethnic minority population of Sonoma

County to the total population of Sonoma County (10.8%). For the existing staff of 103 full-time classified personnel, an increase of four minority employees from 7 to 11 would establish a percentage of 10.7%.

V Proposed Affirmative Action Policy Statement

Santa Rosa Junior College in fact has pursued an Affirmative Action Policy and Program since 1968. Evidence exists in the increases achieved in ethnic minority student enrollments and numbers of ethnic minority employees as well as curricular adjustments. A comprehensive policy and program does not exist in written form, however, except for the Educational Opportunity Program.

Policy Statement

Affirmative Action is a concept and a program at Santa Rosa Junior College designed to achieve these goals:

1. To bring and at a minimum keep the ethnic composition of student enrollments at the college and all segments of its certificated and classified staffs to a close approximation of the ethnic composition of the population of its district.
 - a. The college is aware this goal takes a special dedication and persistence.
 - b. While access to junior college programs and services is intended to be equal, an historic imbalance has existed in the exercise of the rights of admission by ethnic minorities. The college has a continuing responsibility to correct the imbalance.
2. To provide education for its students, its employees and the community at large which reveals the fundamentals and consequences of racism, as well as the contributions and accomplishments of ethnic minorities.
3. To place the college in a leadership role in the community to assist in the redress of inequity that has existed in the provision of rights, privileges, and opportunities for ethnic minorities.

Program of Action

Student Enrollments

1. The Educational Opportunity Program will continue to be the agency of the college assigned the responsibility of giving primary attention to increasing day enrollment of ethnic minority students and serving their special needs.
2. The Evening College through its own discernment as well as consultation with ethnic minority organizations or agencies will also offer courses or curricula at the college or elsewhere in the district which will be

of particular assistance to ethnic minorities.

Employment Practices

1. Hiring Policy

Santa Rosa Junior College will formally declare and announce itself to be an Equal Opportunity Employer and record the fact in its pertinent manuals and application forms for employment. While application forms by federal law cannot contain ethnic information, an appropriate question to include henceforth is "Do you have qualifications which especially equip you to work with culturally or economically disadvantaged and/or minority groups?"

2. Classified Job Description and Requirements

Existing statements for classified positions will be carefully reviewed to ensure content is expressed in terms of what a person must be able to do and that arbitrary standards are not included such as "must be intelligent" or "must be able to assume responsibility".

3. Employment Tests

The only tests used for classified positions will continue to be those which measure skills required, such as typing or shorthand.

4. Recruitment

Every effort will continue to be made to attract minority applicants for classified and certificated positions. Job announcements will regularly be sent to minority group organizations. The active assistance of minority employees will be sought to attract additional applicants. College placement officers will regularly be alerted to the desire of this institution to appoint minority teaching and administrative personnel. Advertisements of employment opportunities will be placed in local, State, or national publications whenever the action offers promise of securing additional minority applicants as necessary.

5. Promotions

The practices followed will continue to include announcement of an opening on campus and an invitation to present personnel to apply, review of qualifications in terms of the job requirements, and determination whether an appointment can be made from on-campus applicants. In the event the position remains unfilled, applications will be invited and adopted recruitment practices pursued.

6. Upgrading

The college will review at least annually the qualifications of present minority employees for the purpose of determining the employees' possibilities of upgrading as well as lateral movement into other job classifications. Specific training programs will be outlined for interested minority employees so they can develop the necessary qualifications for higher ranked positions and be eligible for promotion.

7. Human Relations

In-service training classes will be developed to sensitize employees, at all levels, in the area of human relations and communications as they relate to minority communities and sex discrimination. The training will be regularly scheduled, released time provided, and employees urged to participate.

Special Programs

1. Cultural events focusing on minority contributions including but not confined to art and craft exhibits, plays, concerts, lectures, dance programs, and films will be regularly scheduled by the Public Service Program both at Santa Rosa and other locations in the college district.
2. The Open Forum, Mid-Day Series, and Associated Students will regularly present programs which will contribute to a general understanding of the character and scope of contributions made by ethnic minorities to their

own as well as the common welfare.

3. The college will undertake through its Public Service Program to organize and sponsor, by itself, or cooperatively, conferences which concern the topic of racism.

4. The college will solicit civic, county, commercial, and industrial agencies of the county for appropriate opportunities to conduct in-service training classes to sensitize their employees in the area of human relations and communications as they relate to minority communities.

5. The college will organize evening or week-end seminars on racism to which it will invite selected political, business, union and other community leaders.

Contract Compliance

In its invitations for bids for construction projects, the college will announce to prospective bidders:

1. It is an Equal Opportunity Employer.
2. It expects the skilled work force of the successful bidder and his sub-contractors on the job will at a minimum closely approximate in ethnic composition that of the population of the county as a whole.
3. It will receive monthly through its building inspector a statement of the degrees of compliance with its expectation.
4. It will publicize the facts of the reports widely throughout its district.

Evaluation

1. The Clearing House Committee will create a sub-committee charged with the continuing responsibility of evaluating the progress of the college in attaining its Affirmative Action goals.
 - a. The composition of the sub-committee will include at least one administrator, two teachers, one classified employee from the secretarial/

clerical category, one classified employee from the maintenance/operations category, two students and two laymen. Of these nine persons at least 3 must be women and 3 representative of the ethnic minorities resident in Sonoma County.

b. The sub-committee will make a written report to the Clearing House Committee at least annually. After review of the report and appropriate consultation, the Clearing House Committee will refer the report to agencies of the college for comment or action, and then submit the report through the president of the college to the governing board.

c. Following review of the written report by the governing board of the college, the Clearing House Committee will undertake its widespread dissemination throughout the district.

ELECTION CODE

- SECTION 1. The Elections Committee shall be composed of the following: Elections Commissioner as chairman, Executive Vice President, one Representative-At-Large and other members deemed necessary by the committee chairman.
- A. If any members of the committee shall be a candidate in an election, the President shall appoint a temporary replacement to serve only for that election.
- SECTION 2. The Elections Committee shall serve as the governing body over all general and special elections.
- A. A general election is that in which candidates for Associated Student offices, Homecoming and Bear Fair queens and Bear Fair Ugly Man are elected.
- B. A special election is that in which the College Student Assembly announces an election for purposes other than the above.
- SECTION 3. Any Santa Rosa Junior College student who has purchased an Associated Student membership card shall be eligible to cast one ballot.
- SECTION 4. The College Student Assembly shall determine the exact dates of the regular and special Associated Student elections.
- A. Elections for Associated Student President, Executive Vice President, Vice President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary shall not be later than three weeks prior to the end of the semester or before eight weeks prior to the end of the semester.
- B. The election for Head Song Leader and Head Yell Leader shall be during the Spring semester preceeding the term of office and held on the same day as the general election for other Associated Student offices.
- C. Election for Representatives-At-Large for the Fall Semester shall not be later than four weeks and not before two weeks after the Fall semester begins. Spring semester election for Representatives-At-Large shall be conducted on the same day as the general election for other Associated Student officers for the Spring semester. All Associated Student members may vote for eight Representatives-At-Large, four to be Sophomores and four to be Freshmen.
- SECTION 5. Casting of the votes shall take place over a one day period, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. and not less than two polling places will be in operation during this time. At the discretion of the Elections Committee one polling place may be located inside the cafeteria.

SECTION 6. A candidate for all offices must be in regular attendance.

- A. All elected members of the College Student Assembly must be able to attend College Student Assembly meetings as scheduled.
- B. All candidates must have a 2.0 grade average during the semester in which elected in order to take office the following semester.
- C. Candidates for all offices, except Representatives-At-Large must have completed twelve units or more at Santa Rosa Junior College before taking office.
- D. Candidates for President shall have had at least two successive semesters of academic work and twenty units or more at Santa Rosa Junior College prior to taking office.

SECTION 7. All candidates must have read and be familiar with the Associated Students of Santa Rosa Junior College Constitution and all Codes and Statutes.

SECTION 8. Candidates for Head Yell Leader and Head Song Leader shall declare the names of their assistants at the time of filing for nomination and present a statement of good health signed by a physician for all assistants, Head Yell Leader and Head Song Leader.

SECTION 9. No person may run for more than one Associated Students office in a given semester.

SECTION 10. Nominations for office shall be by petition.

- A. Petitions may be obtained from the Activities Office no earlier than fifteen days before the election and returned to the Activities Office no later than five days before the election.
- B. Petitions shall include the name, address, phone number, office sought and class schedule and must be signed by at least 75 Associated Student members.
- C. All petitions shall be checked by the Elections Commissioner to be sure the candidate is eligible.
- D. In the event a minimum of two petitions is not filed for one office with the Activities Office by deadline date, the College Student Assembly may, by majority vote, nominate eligible candidates.

SECTION 11. All elections shall be by secret ballot.

- A. The order of candidates' names on the ballot will be in alphabetical order under the candidates' respective offices unless the incumbent is running for re-election and then his name shall appear first.

(Section 11 - Con't.)

- B. The order in which the offices shall be placed is: President, Executive Vice-President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Head Yell Leader, Head Song Leader, and Representatives-At-Large.
- C. Candidates running for re-election shall have "incumbent" placed under their names, candidates presently holding another elected or appointed College Student Assembly office may designate that office under their name, and other candidates may state positions held in any other recognized student organization.

SECTION 12. Write-in votes may be written in pencil or pen and a write-in candidate, for an office with no nominated candidate, must have at least fifty write-in votes for one office in order to be declared elected.

SECTION 13. All properly marked ballots shall be counted no later than five hours after the closing of the polls. The Activities Advisor shall be responsible for the safekeeping of the ballots for two weeks after the election, upon which time the ballots shall be destroyed.

SECTION 14. Results will be posted at the Activities Office only after each candidate is notified by the Elections Commissioner and told of the candidates victory or defeat.

- A. The posted results shall include the amount of votes cast for each candidate and shall designate under each office the winning candidate. The posting of the amount of votes cast for each candidate shall only apply to Associated Student officers' elections.

SECTION 15. The Elections Commissioner and one other Elections Committee member shall send to the President the names of the elected candidates and their respective offices along with one blank ballot with the votes cast for each candidate within twenty-four hours after the election.

SECTION 16. Nominees for the elected Associated Student offices shall be allowed no less than five minutes each for a campaign speech at a regular assembly of the Association.

- A. Candidates may have one other student speak before and/or in place of the candidate.
- B. The Assemblies Commissioner shall preside at the assembly. In case he is running for office, the President shall appoint another student.

SECTION 17. Candidates may use the Activities Office duplication machine at no cost.

SECTION 18. There will be no campaigning the day of election within fifteen feet of the polls.

SECTION 19 No more than \$25.00, including contributions, may be spent for one campaign for each candidate.

A. All candidates or their campaign managers must file in writing to the Elections Commissioner within three weeks after the election a detailed report of expenses of their campaign.

B. If a candidate is found to have spent more than \$25.00, or has filed a false statement of expenses, this shall be sufficient grounds for either disqualification of candidacy or removal from office. In the event a candidate is removed from office under this Section, the provisions of Section 20 shall apply.

SECTION 20 It shall be the duty of the Elections Commissioner to regulate campaigning and disqualify any candidate found by the Commissioner to be in violation of any rules or regulations of the Associated Students.

A. Any candidate disqualified may appeal the decision of the Commissioner to the College Student Assembly within eight days after the decision of the Elections Commissioner. A two-thirds vote of the College Student Assembly members voting shall reinstate the candidate.

(1) If a candidate is disqualified and then reinstated, but after the election, the President shall declare the election for the office void and a special election shall be held within ten days after reinstatement.

B. The Elections Commissioner shall inform the President, in writing, of any protests of violations by any student to the Elections Committee, within twenty-four hours after the protest has been made.

SECTION 21 The following rules shall apply to initiative, referendum and recall elections

A. An initiative measure may be proposed by a petition signed by a number of members equal to one-third of the votes cast in the last Associated Students election. A valid petition must state the issue of the petition on each page and must include the signature, student body card number, social security number, address and phone number of the student signing. Petition forms are available in the Student Activities Office and forms will be dated when they are taken out. Petitions must be returned within two weeks after they are taken out from the Student Activities Office.

(Section 21 - Con't.)

- B. Any measure may be submitted for referendum by a two-thirds vote of the College Student Assembly, which shall set an election date not more than two weeks after the measure has been submitted for referendum. Approval of a referendum measure shall require a two-thirds majority of the votes cast.
- C. A recall measure may be proposed by a petition signed by a number of members equal to one-half of the votes cast in the last Associated Students election. A valid petition must state the issue on each page of the petition and must include the signature, student body card number, social security number, address and phone number of the student signing. Petition forms are available in the Student Activities Office and forms will be dated when they are taken out from the Student Activities Office.

Section 4 C.

Presently Reads: *Freshmen*

Election for Representatives-at-Large for the Fall Semester shall not be later than four weeks and not before two weeks after the Fall Semester begins. Spring semester election for Representatives-at-Large shall be conducted on the same day as the general election for other Associated Student officers for the Spring semester. All Associated Student members may vote for eight Representatives-at-Large, four to be Sophomores and four to be Freshmen.

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Section 5

Presently Reads:

Casting of the votes shall take place over a one day period, from 10a.m. to 2p.m. and not less than two polling places will be in operation during this times. At the discretion of the Elections Committee one polling place may be located inside the cafeteria.

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Casting of the votes shall take place over a one day period, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.. At the discretion of the Elections Committee the polling place may be located inside the cafeteria.

Section 6 B.

Presently Reads:

All candidates must have a 2.0 grade average during the semester in which elected, in order to take office the following semester, *or*

Changed to Read:

~~Candidates for all offices must have an over-all grade point average of at least 2.0 on a 4.0 point scale at the conclusion of the semester in which elected.~~

Section 11 C.

Presently Reads:

Candidates running for re-election shall have "incumbent" placed under their names, candidates presently holding another elected or appointed College Student Assembly office may designate that office under their name, and other candidates may state positions held in any other recognized student organization.

Changed to Read:

Candidates running for re-election shall have "incumbent" placed with their names.

Section 11 D. (addition)

The names of any candidates for a given office nominated by the College Student Assembly shall appear below the names of all other candidates for that office and shall be arranged in alphabetical order.

Section 12 A. (addition)

Write in votes will not be counted in a run-off election.

Section 14

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Results will be posted at the Activities Office, only after each candidate is notified by the Election Commissioner and told of the candidates victory or defeat.

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Results will be posted at the Activities Office.

Section 20 C. (addition)

In the event that the results of an election are challenged, the College Student Assembly will act as the final arbiter.

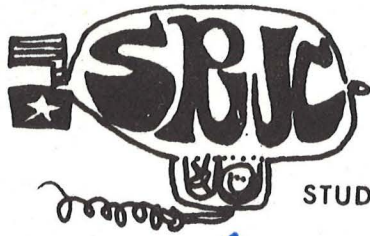

On Monday afternoon April 24 the Angela Davis Committee's five ~~illegal~~ illegal posters were taken down by Tom Boyd, Publicity commissioner, because they violated the following sections of the publicity code

O On Tuesday April 25 pressure by the Angela Davis Committee was such that the Student Activities Advisor was ~~pressured~~ into illegally paying them \$5.00 for their posters. This was in violation of the publicity code, and the powers of the Student Activities Advisor.

PART B

Between Monday April 24 and Wed April 26 at least three Angela Davis Committee posters were nailed to trees on campus. This was in violation of most of the same sections of the publicity code as listed above. Between Tuesday 23rd and today several attempts were made in person, by Bear Facts, and by notice in their club mailbox, that they obey the publicity code and also remove the nails from the trees (Section 3 Clause 5) All attempts were ignored. Whereas the Angela Davis Committee has repeatedly violated the publicity code, and whereas they have refused to make any attempt to correct these violations, Therefore I, as Publicity Commissioner, move that the Angela Davis Committee be fined \$5.00 and that such fine must be paid by them by noon May 9 or they lose all rights and privileges of a SRJC AD HOC committee.

SUBJECT: A.A. DEGREE GENERAL EDUCATION PATTERN

Attached please find a copy of the new and recommended A.A. degree general education pattern. It was developed by a General Education sub-committee, approved by the Curriculum and Instruction Committee, and is now submitted by the Clearing House Committee to various agencies of the campus for review.

Responses to the recommendation should be forwarded to the Clearing House Committee by MAY 12th.

Essentially, the proposal follows a minimum requirement, as specified in the Education Code, of 15 units to be distributed over four areas: humanities, natural sciences, social sciences, and learning skills. In general it varies little from the existing; in particular there are variances worthy of note -- i.e., American history and institutions, and health education are eliminated as requirements. English (though liberalized) is maintained as a requirement.

No ruling has been rendered by the Attorney General in regard to physical education as a requirement for those of less than 21 years of age. Therefore, physical education is retained as a requirement for 1972-1973, pending clarification from the State level.

FOR EXECUTIVE VICE PRESIDENT

Having been in College Student Assembly for two semesters I am still concerned about the ease and speed with which the College Student Assembly spends our money. The past budget for the year 71-72 included the following over spent items: Athletic Awards \$2,000 (Increased during year \$1,000 by the College Student Assembly), Banquet \$1,300 Drama Dept. \$3,000 (most lost) Forensics \$5,000 (Increased during year \$1,500 by the College Student Assembly) and Student Project Grants \$3,000. A total of over \$15,000 or about 20% of our money was spent out ~~on~~^{on these} items.

Why does money have to be spent? Why not a lower student fee or better spending of money. Money ~~could~~^{could} be spent for keeping the library open on Saturday and put into the bookstore and the coop for lower book and food prices. Money should benefit more students.

Forensics Team and Student Project Grants had less than 20 people each and yet spent \$5,000 and \$3,000. A Drama Dept (budgeted loss 2,000) that can't break even on plays should not be supported. If plays aren't good enough to be supported on merit they are not worth supporting.

I voted against increased Athletic Awards, increased Forensics Budget, most Student Project Grants and The College Student Assembly banquets, all of which my opponent voted for. I have asked my opponent to debate the issue, she declines to do so.

I would also remind students that they may not have to pay their student body fee unless they want to. I would urge all students do so as the benefits ~~of student body funds~~^{of student body funds} do outweigh the waste. Let us improve our spending priorities, let us improve our school.

Section 6, Item E Add to read:

Candidates for all offices must carry at least 10½ units during the semester in which they run for office.

Section 10, Item A Presently Reads:

Petitions may be obtained from the Activities Office no earlier than fifteen days before the elections and returned to the Activities Office no later than five days before the election.

Change to read:

Petitions may be obtained from the Activities Office no earlier than fifteen school days before the election and returned no later than five school days before the election.

Section 10, Item B Presently Reads:

Petitions shall include the name, address, phone number, office sought and class schedule and must be signed by at least 75 Associated Students members.

Change to read:

Petitions shall include the name, address, phone number, office sought and class schedule and must be signed by at least 75 Associated Students members.

- 1.) All Associated Students signing a petition must include their Social Security number.

Section 16, Item B Presently Reads:

The Assembly Commissioner shall preside at the Assembly. In case he is running for office, the President shall appoint another student.

Change to read:

The Elections Commissioner shall preside at the Assembly.

- ELECTION CODE -

- SECTION 1. The Elections Committee shall be composed of the following: Elections Commissioner as chairman, Executive Vice President, one Representative-At-Large and other members deemed necessary by the committee chairman.
- A. If any members of the committee shall be a candidate in an election, the President shall appoint a temporary replacement to serve only for that election.
- SECTION 2. The Elections Committee shall serve as the governing body over all general and special elections.
- A. A general election is that in which candidates for Associated Student offices are elected.
- B. A special election is that in which the College Student Assembly announces an election for purposes other than the above.
- SECTION 3. Any Santa Rosa Junior College student who has purchased an Associated Student membership card shall be eligible to cast one ballot.
- SECTION 4. The College Student Assembly shall determine the exact dates of the regular and special Associated Student elections.
- A. Elections for Associated Student President, Executive Vice President, Vice President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary shall not be later than three weeks prior to the end of the semester or before eight weeks prior to the end of the semester.
- B. The election for Head Song Leader and Head Yell Leader shall be during the Spring semester preceeding the term of office and held on the same day as the general election for other Associated Student offices.
- C. Election for Freshman Representatives-At-Large for the Fall semester shall not be later than four weeks and not before two weeks after the Fall semester begins. Spring semester election for Representatives-At-Large shall be conducted on the same day as the general election for other Associated Student officers for the Spring semester. All Associated Student members may vote for ten Representatives-At-Large, five to be Sophomores and five to be Freshmen.
- SECTION 5. Casting of the votes shall take place over a one day period, from 10 a.m. to 2:15 p.m. At the discretion of the Elections Committee the polling place may be located inside the cafeteria.
- SECTION 6. A candidate for all offices must be in regular attendance.
- A. All elected members of the College Student Assembly must be able to attend College Student Assembly meetings as scheduled.

(Section 6 - Con't.)

- B. All candidates must have a 2.0 grade average during the semester in which elected in order to take office the following semester.
- C. Candidates for all offices, except Representatives-At-Large must have completed twelve units (12), or more, at Santa Rosa Junior College before taking office.
- D. Candidates for President shall have had at least two successive semester of academic work and twenty units (20), or more, at Santa Rosa Junior College prior to taking office.
- E. Candidates for all office must carry at least 10 ½ units during the semester in which they run for office.

SECTION 7. All candidates must have read and be familiar with the Associated Students of Santa Rosa Junior College Constitution and all Codes and Statutes.

SECTION 8. Candidates for Head Yell Leader and Head Song Leader shall declare the names of their assistants at the time of filing for nomination and present a statement of good health signed by a physician for all assistants, Head Yell Leader and Song Leader.

SECTION 9. No person may run for more than one Associated Students office in a given semester.

SECTION 10. Nominations for office shall be by petition.

- A. Petitions may be obtained from the Activities Office no earlier than fifteen school days before the election, and returned to the Activities Office no later than five school days before the election.
- B. Petitions shall include the name, address, phone number, office sought and class schedule and must be signed by at least seventy-five (75) Associated Student members.
 - (1) All students signing a petition must include their S.S. No.
- C. All petitions shall be checked by the Elections Commissioner to be sure the candidate is eligible.
- D. In the event a minimum of two petitions is not filed for one office with the Activities Office by deadline date, the College Student Assembly may, by majority vote, nominate eligible candidates.

SECTION 11. All elections shall be by secret ballot.

- A. The order of candidates' names on the ballot will be in alphabetical order under the candidates' respective offices unless the incumbent is running for re-election and then his name shall appear first.
- B. The order in which the offices shall be placed is: President, Executive Vice-President, Vice-President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Head Yell Leader, Head Song Leader, and Representatives-At-Large.

(Section 11 - Con't.)

- C. Candidates running for re-election shall have "incumbent" placed with their names.
- D. The names of any candidates for a given office nominated by the College Student Assembly shall appear below the names of all other candidates for that office and shall be arranged in alphabetical order.

SECTION 12. Writ-in votes may be written in pencil or pen and a write-in candidate, for an office with no nominated candidate, must have at least fifty (50) writ-in votes for one office in order to be declared elected. Write-in votes will not be counted in a run-off election.

SECTION 13. All properly marked ballots shall be counted no later than five hours after the closing of the polls. The Activities Advisor shall be responsible for the safekeeping of the ballots for two weeks after the election, upon which time the ballots shall be destroyed.

SECTION 14. Results will be posted at the Activities Office.

- A. The posted results shall include the amount of votes cast for each candidate and shall designate under each office the winning candidate. The posting of the amount of votes cast for each candidate shall only apply to Associated Student officers' elections.

SECTION 15. The Elections Commissioner and one other Elections Committee member shall send to the President the names of the elected candidates and their respective offices along with one blank ballot with the votes cast for each candidate within twenty-four hours after the election.

SECTION 16. Nominees for the elected Associated Student offices shall be allowed no less than five minutes each for a campaign speech at a regular assembly of the Association.

- A. Candidates may have one other student speak before and/or in place of the candidate.
- B. The Elections Commissioner shall preside at the assembly.

SECTION 17. Candidates may use the Activities Office duplication machine at no cost.

SECTION 18. There will be no campaigning the day of election within fifteen feet of the polls.

SECTION 19. No more than \$25.00, including contributions, may be spent for one campaign for each candidate.

- A. All candidates or their campaign managers must file, in writing, to the Elections Commissioner within three weeks after the election, a detailed report of expenses of their campaign.

(Section 19 - Con't.)

- B. If a candidate is found to have spent more than \$25.00, or has filed a false statement of expenses, this shall be sufficient grounds for either disqualification of candidacy or removal from office. In the event a candidate is removed from office under this Section, the provisions of Section 20 shall apply.

SECTION 20. It shall be the duty of the Elections Commissioner to regulate campaigning and disqualify any candidate found by the Commissioner to be in violation of any rules or regulations of the Associated Students.

- A. Any candidate disqualified may appeal the decision of the Commissioner to the College Student Assembly within eight days after the decision of the Elections Commissioner. A two-thirds vote of the College Student Assembly members voting shall reinstate the candidate.
 - (1) If a candidate is disqualified and then reinstated, but after the election, the President shall declare the election for the office void and a special election shall be held within ten days after reinstatement.
- B. The Elections Commissioner shall inform the President, in writing, of any protests of violations by any student to the Elections Committee, within twenty-four hours after the protest has been made.
- C. In the event that the results of an election are challenged, the College Student Assembly will act as the final arbiter.

SECTION 21. The following rules shall apply to initiative, referendum and recall elections

- A. An initiative measure may be proposed by a petition signed by a number of members equal to one-third of the votes cast in the last Associated Students election. A valid petition must state the issue of the petition on each page and must include the signature, student body card number, social security number, address and phone number of the student signing. Petition forms are available in the Student Activities Office and forms will be dated when they are taken out. Petitions must be returned within two weeks after they are taken out from the Student Activities Office.
- B. Any measure may be submitted for referendum by a two-thirds vote of the College Student Assembly, which shall set an election date not more than two weeks after the measure has been submitted for referendum. Approval of a referendum measure shall require a two-thirds majority of the votes cast.
- C. A recall measure may be proposed by a petition signed by a number of members equal to one-half of the votes cast in the last Associated Students election. A valid petition must state

the issue on each page of the petition and must include the signature, student body card number, social security number, address and phone number of the student signing. Petition forms are available in the Student Activities Office and forms will be dated when they are taken out from the Student Activities Office.

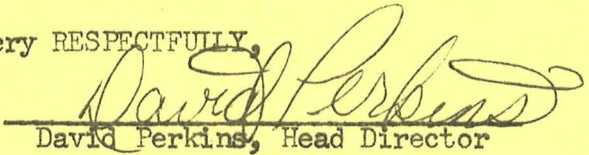

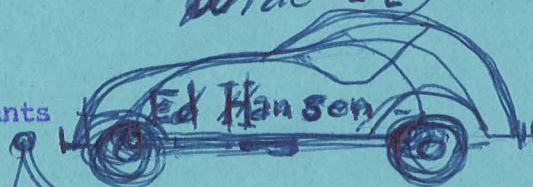

Dear Sirs:

The Sonoma County Transportation Coalition, is made up of private citizens and organizations who have become aware of and concerned over the urgent and growing need for a rapid transit system within Sonoma County.

Due to the lack of inexpensive public transportation many intolerable conditions have been allowed to exist. One area which has been made especially obvious due to recent news coverage is the molestation of hitch-hikers, including various rapes, disappearances and the murder of one SRJC coed.

If a student or young person cannot afford a car or the higher-cost housing usually found in the immediate vicinity of the colleges, her only available mode of transportation is her thumb. It is inexcusable that we should force our young people into a situation which could cost their lives.

Equally deplorable is the plight of many senior citizens and others who physically and/or financially are not able to drive. These people cannot hitch-hike. Many have become practically shut-ins, simply due to a lack of transportation. Others have been unable to maintain jobs, just because the only available work was out of walking distance.

Of course, these would not be the only beneficiaries of this service. Commuter use would provide convenient, dependable transportation while lessening the number of cars on the road, thereby decreasing many traffic and parking problems, expenses, and pollution.

These conditions should not be allowed to continue. The California State Legislature has appropriated a $1\frac{1}{4}$ cent per gallon gasoline sales tax that is meant to go directly into county transit systems. However, Sonoma County's administrators presently have no intention of using these available funds for this purpose, planning instead to channel them into other areas.

We of the Sonoma County Transportation Coalition join in urging the Sonoma County Board of Supervisors to assert themselves to assure that this money is spent on a much-needed county-wide transit system with laws that would be within the financial reach of all who need it, perhaps even following Sacramento's lead in establishing a "free" bussing system.

Especially in light of the fact that there is money available and already appropriated for this cause, we can see no moral or economic justification for the denial of a measure which would act towards the prevention of crime, help make many jobs available, and serve as a general benefit to the county as a whole.
