SUBJECT: Recommendations on Space Usage

The sub-committee consisting of Betty Goulart, Dennis Maxson, Hal Walker and Jack Healy was assigned the task of reviewing the space available in the Doyle Student Center and making recommendations back to the Clearing House Committee on the future use of that space. The sub-committee issued a campus-wide notice of the availability of the space and solicited proposals from all campus sources. The following proposals were received:

- 1. From the Library a space for approximately eight typewriters to be relocated from the Library.
- From Mr. William Smith a space to use for storage and a workroom area for items removed from the Museum.
- 3. From Theatre Arts Department the bookstore space for use as a costume workshop-classroom.
- 4. From the Art Department the bookstore space for use as a classroom-storeroom to be used primarily for sculpture.
- 5. From Dr. Patricia Smith the bookstore space for use as a Psycho-educational Clinic to serve children with learning problems.
- From the Police Science Department the bookstore space for use as the campus police patrol headquarters.

- 7. From the Graphic Arts Department the bookstore space for relocation of the graphic arts department.
- 8. From the College Student Assembly and the Student Affairs Committee:
 - a. The cid soudent activities office for use as an FM Sadio Station in cooperation with the Speech Department.
 - b. A free-floating space for use of a variety of student activities to be changed as needs change.
 - c. A student lounge
 - d. An extension of the food service in a variety of ways.
- 9. From the Woman's Concern Committee a "Woman's Survival Center."

As a preliminary step, the sub-committee reviewed the blueprints of the Doyle Student Center and determined what, if any, restrictions existed as to the use of the available space. One structural restriction appears to exist in respect to the storeroom attached to the Bookstore. That structure does not meet the requirements of the State of California Field Act relating to structural requirements for buildings used for instructional purposes. In short, it is not "earthquake proof." That one room cannot be used as an area where students work as part of an instructional program or where they gather for other purposes. No other structural restrictions exist.

Several reports reached the committee concerning restrictions on the use of all of the facilities in the Doyle Student Center. The opinion was expressed that because of the method of finance used to construct the center, that the facilities must not be used for anything other than direct student services. Direct student services apparently means activities other that instruction or activities directly supporting the

instructional program.

Our investigation included interviews with various campus administrators and as a result, we reached the following conclusions:

- 1. All of the buildings on the campus, including the Doyle Student Center, are the property of the district and under the control and direction of the trustees.
- 2. The method of finance used to construct the buildings took advantage of the fact that the majority of the activities housed in them were income producing. Although the primary purpose of the buildings was to house cafeteria, bookstore and student activities, the method of finance does not appear to preclude the use of portions of the buildings for other purposes on occasion as the need arises. There has never been a serious suggestion that buildings or portions of them built with tax funds be restricted to direct instructional services.

The recommendations of the committee are strictly the members' evaluation of the relative needs at the present time. Other factors will have to be taken into consideration before any of the recommendations are finally implemented. Factors such as costs of remodeling, equipment and personnel were beyond the scope of this committee and, except in cases where costs were obvious and would preclude the suggested use, were not considered in detail.

One other obvious point should be mentioned. It was assumed that the following suggested uses are of a temporary nature. As the needs of the campus change and additional facilities become available, new studies should be initiated to reallocate space.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. The old Bookstore sales area be assigned as an Art classroom. A note of caution should be given along with this recommendation. Assigning this area as a classroom could have a negative effect on the "use formula" as mandated by the State. If the use of the Bookstore area as a classroom would jeopardize State funding for planned construction, this use would have to be considered.

- 2. The storeroom area attached to the Bookstore be used for storage by the Art Department in connection with the classroom and also by the Theatre Arts Department for costume storage. Hopefully, this use would help relieve the congested conditions in Burbank Auditorium.
- 3. The former student activities offices be used to house an FM radio station. This suggestion is contingent upon the implementation of an agreement between the Associated Students and the Speech Department and the availability of adequate instructional staff.

If this suggested use cannot be realized, consideration should be given to the use of this area to house the campus police patrol office and related service activities.

RELATED RECOMMENDATIONS:

 The Graphic Arts Services should be relocated. In view of the space needs of the Registrar, the continued use of the space now used by Graphic Arts appears to be inappropriate. It is suggested that the College consider the addition of a relocatable building to house this service. This addition could be located next to the relocatable housing the Data Processing service.

- 2. The College consider the reallocation of the space adjacent to the Cafeteria presently used by the Switchboard. It appears to the committee that far too much space is being used for that purpose now. A re-study of the space could result in the continuance of the Switchboard activity and an allocation of space for the "Woman's Survival Center."
- 3. It is recommended that the Bear Cub Den be re-designed and re-furnished to provide a more acceptable student lounge.

PROPOSAL FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A WOMEN'S SURVIVAL CENTER ON CAMPUS

-

The Women's Concerns Committee sees the need for a Women's Survival Center on campus. Our goal is to provide a place where women can feel free to get to know one another and discuss their various interests and concerns. We envision such a Center as soon serving as a matrix for numerous women-related activities on campus; in this sense it would be an active, growing process, a framework to reflect our changing needs.

What would we need for the Center?

- (1) A large room. The space which the bookstore now occupies be ideal.
- (2) A few pieces of furniture, such as a desk, counter, and bookshelves. We will provide the rest of the furnishings to make the Center attractive.
- (3) One full-time, paid receptionist-overseer to answer the phone and remain in the center from ll--a.m. daily. (We choose these hours purposely in order that women with no place to go between afternoon and evening classes can use the Center, especially because of the hitchhiking/transportation difficulties.) At \$2.20/hour, this staffing salary would be approximately \$380/a month.
- (4) A budget. Besides salaries, we would have certain incidental expenses such as duplicating and telephone, which would be carefully monitored by staff to prevent abuse. These expenses might amount to another \$200 or so per month, so we request a total budget for the Center of approximately \$2700/semester.

What would be the core function of the Center?

 Counseling services: Several faculty women have already volunteered to provide psychological/vocational guidance. We hope that the Center's counseling service will encompass such areas as career guidance, pregnancy counseling, advice about the Re-Entry Program (for women returning to school), and family problem-solving.

- (2) Referral service: We plan to establish a network of concerned women and agencies who will offer guidance to those in need, perhaps simply by allowing their phone numbers to be given to someone wanting to discuss a problem with which they've had experience. Other areas of referral could include housing, skills exchange, job openings, religious guidance, therapy groups, child care, and carpools. It is primarily for this service we will need the telephone.
- (3) Lounge: One of the main purposes of the Center would be to provide a place for women to meet each other, relax, drink coffee, and generally share their interests and problems.
- (4) Educational Center: The Women's Survival Center would also serve as a conduit for educational materials and information. For a start, we would provide in the room, shelves for books and a table with relevant literature. Eventually the Center might sponsor women speakers to come and visit us, such as writers, lawyers, or doctors.

Although these are the basic services we believe a Women's Survival Center should provide, we hope it will also serve as a nexus for a variety of other women's concerns which might arise. WHY INVITATIONS TO THE PRG & DRV?

It is important that these invitations be issued for a number of reasons. First and foremost is that The Agreement on Ending the War and Restoring Peace in Vietnam specifically states that there are two political forces, with armies in southern Vietnam, and a third neutralist element, without political definition or an armed force. They are: The Provisional Revolutionary Government(the political arm of the National Front for Liberation-NLF), the Saigon administration, and those individuals and organizations(Buddhists, Catholics, intellectuals, etc.), who favour peace.

This is what the whole war(as far as America is concerned) has been about, that a popular and independent movement for liberation, and not an "invasion" from the north, was being fought.

Chapter 1, Article 1, of the Agreement says:"The United States and all other countries respect the independence, sovereignty; unity and territorial integrity of Vietnam as recognized by the 1954 Geneva Agreements on Vietnam."

Chapter V, Article 15(a): "The military demarcation line between the two zones at the 17th Parallel is only provisional and not a political or territorial boundary, as provided for in paragraph 6 of the Final Declaration of the 1954 Geneva Conference."

These three equal segments will have the monumental task of "..Achiev(ing) national reconciliation and concord, end(ing) hatred and enmity..", through the National Council of National Reconciliation and Concord, which will supervise until "genuinely free and democratic general elections under international supervision.." are held.

This is the crux of the whole Agreement, the Vietnamese renember only too well the promise of free elections from the French colonialists as they left their country, and how they were never held. All of us who want a truly genuine peace for an independent Vietnam, must see to it that these three segments of the Vietnamese people get equal representation and recognition.

Over 60 of the world's countries have recognized the Provisional Revolutionary Government officially, and have established working diplomatic relations. The US is not one of them.

President Nixon, through word, and deed, has provided support only for the government of General Nguyeh Van Theiu, who has been described, even by the moderate press, as a "dictator who rules through terror and force", and who once said that he didn't think the Vietnamese people should have "too much democracy, too soon."

Chapter 1V, Article 6(c), of the Agreement: "Foreign countries shall not impose any political tendency or personality on the South Vietnamese people."

The White House said yesterday that the U.S. will continue bombing in Cambodia until the Communist forces in that country stop their military operations and agree to a cease-fire.

The Nixon administration's position was outlined. by White House press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler in response to questions as to how long the U.S. intends to continue air operations in Cambodia and what the President's constitutional authority is for ordering such raids.

Ziegler did not directly address the question of presidential authority. Rather, he emphasized that the operations are being conducted in response to a request from the government of President Lon Nol.

"The Cambodian government has asked for our air support to assist Cambodian forces in resisting the Communists' offensive," Ziegler said at the daily White House news briefing. "At such time as there is a cease-fire in Cambodia, the United States will adhere to that cease-fire agreement."

Ziegler put the main burden for the continuing American military operations in Cambodia upon the failure of the Communists to respect the Vietnam peace agreement or a cease - fire offer made by the Lon Nol government.

North Vietnam, he said, "has not withdrawn its forces from Cambodia in accordance with the agreement."

Furthermore, he said, the Communists in Cambodia have failed to respect a unilateral cease + fire declared by the Lon Nol government at the time the Vietnam peace agreement went into effect January 28.

"The situation in Cambodia is that Communist forces are conducting offensive operations and the United States is responding to a request for assistance," Ziegler said.

Ziegler declined to specify whether the "Communist forces" he referred to were North Vietnamese or Cambodian insurgents.

Students In Stands On Two Issues

The College Student Assembly of Santa Rosa Junior College has taken official positions on two national issues — one in support of a nationwide boycott against Safeway stores for its policy of buying non-union lettuce and the other condemning actions of the federal government in its treatment of the American Indians.

In action at its March meeting the Student Assembly adopted the following statement:

"Recently, our brothers and sisters in Wounded Knee, S.D., have been victimized by the U.S. Government. We, the Santa Rosa Junior College — College Student Assembly, feel strongly about the way the whole affair was handled and offer our solidarity to all the Native Ameri-

ins as well as all the innocent ictims involved in past, as well as present, movements in this country.

"In light of this incident, we . . . condemn the actions of the U.S. government and ask that a full unconditional pardon be given to those at Wounded Knee; and that an unbiased committee review all grievances that the Native Americans have in thiscountry. We also urge all those who are upset by the government's recent actions to write to their congressmen."

Earlier, the student group adopted the following statement on the supermarket boycott:

"The College Student Assembly would like to congratulate Caesar Chavez and the United Farm Worker's Union for helping to liberate the farm workers.

"In regard to the nationwide boycott against Safeway's policy of buying non-UFW union lettuce, the . . . College Student Assembly has decided it is time to take a vocal and economic action against their stores.

"Therefore the College Student Assembly has endorsed the UFW union and will also observe the nationwide boycott a g a i n s t Safeway stores. We urge the community to also take part in this boycott."

Kent Hall At SRJC To Be Coed

Kent Hall, the dormitory on the Santa Rosa Junior College campus, will go coeducational. The request by the Kent Hall Council, made earlier this year, was approved by the SRJC board of trustees Monday night with the understanding it would be on a trial basis and no more than three of the housing units be assigned to women.

This would provide dormitory facilities for 12 females, presumably starting with the f a l l semester.

In making its recommendation for approval on a "trial basis only," the staff noted that the physical facilities would "lend themselves to segregation by four-member apartments." In other action the board:

HEARD a progress report on the new swim center indicating it is open and being used for both classes and recreational swimming. In a progress report on the liberal arts building the board was informed that a committee will meet with architect John van Dyk to make revisions in the square footage in order to meet state standards.

HEARD a clarification from the Attorney General indicating that apprenticeship classes are not limited to registered apprentices.

SAW a copy of a letter from Dr. Dan Walker, superintendent-president of Yuba College in Marysville, to William Carle, superintendent of the Konocti Unified School District in Lake County, indicating Yuba would providé free room and board to Lake County students attending school at Yuba. SRJC officials noted they could not match such an offer. -DISCUSSED three acres of property on Armory Drive which are being offered for sale. The trustee felt the price of the land, located to the rear of the college maintenance yard, was "beyond reach." -AUTHORIZED Monica Ri-

Ley to attend the Army War College Seminar June 4-8 at no cost to the district and Ray Peterson of the English Department to attend the Sixth Annual Conference of the Western College Reading Association at Eastern New Mexico University at a cost not to exceed \$175.

--CORRECTED management positions designations under the Dent Bill by withdrawing the name of Eugene Canevari, student activities director.

-HELD a lengthy personnel session which included a request by Dr. Gary Squires for reconsideration of the pay rate for department chairman during the spring semester.

--APPROVED several budget transfers and deferred two agenda items---a discussion of student housing and establishment of a committee on arts and lectures.

Fellow Students, Brothers and Sisters:

For the past semester your student government has been working to protect your rights as students at Santa Rosa Junior College. We have questioned the Administration of this college continuously trying to ascertain the validity of student government and the all-campus committee system. At this point, we, the members of your student government have reached an unresoluable impasse with the administration of this college.

Student government representing your views have questioned: 1.) The use of funds from the college bookstore.

- 2.) The use of proposed parking fees.
- 3.) The use and the title of the Doyle Student Center.

4.) The use of profits from the Coop and why food prices are so high.

At this time, we, the members of your student government want you to be aware of the impasse we have reached with the administration of this college. We, the members of your student government, wish you to know that we have exhausted every legal channel of communication with the administration of this college concerning the above-mentioned real student issues. Pointed questions have been asked of the administration concerning where your money is going, and we have received nothing but the most general and vague information in response to our questions with an added statement telling us that we are only a recommending body and regardless of our input into the all-campus committee system, the administration of this college will do as it sees fit.

Some of you may be aware of the fact that a blanket \$5 per car parking fee is being proposed for next semester. When questioned about the exact uses of this fee, the administration of your college failed to justify the disbursement of your money. The administration proposed to hire a full-time person to be the Officer of Campus Safety, 80 per cent of his salary to be funded from your parking fee. When questioned about exactly what this man's duties would be, we were informed that in fact this new person would be the Chief of the S.R.J.C. campus patrol.

The new chief's duties will, in fact, be partly instructional, supervisory, and enforcement of all campus safety and security regulations.

We feel at this time that no more than 20 per cent of this man's time will be directly related to parking problems. The California Education Code specifically stipulates that all parking fees shall be spent only in the operation, maintenance, and construction of parking facilities. Now we ask you, is this where you want your money to go? Do you want to pay some \$13,000 a year for an instructor-policeman on campus?

Also, we would like to bring to your attention the use of Doyle Student Center. This is the old Bookstore, Coop, and old Student Activities Office.

This facility is being paid for by revenue bonds which stipulate that the Doyle Student Center will be used for noninstructional purposes and specifically noninstructional student activities. The renovation of Pioneer Hall has provided us with a beautiful new bookstore and Student Activities Office. Now we have several rooms that presently are not being used that could furnish the students with much needed space for student non-instructional activities. The renovation of Pioneer Hall has provided us with a beautiful new bookstore and student activities office. These facilities, specifically the old bookstore, and the old student activities office, have been vacant and unused for over a month. This clearly indicates faulty planning on the part of the administration regarding the efficient use of the Doyle Student Center. Also you should know that profits from the college bookstore have been pledged by the J.C. District to pay off the revenue bonds which made our fine buildings a reality. Your money is paying for Doyle Student Center and Pioneer Hall and therefore they are your buildings; for your use as a student activities center. The administration of this College has stated in front of many reliable witnesses that the above mentioned facilities are in fact for student activities but at this time refused to act on recommendations from your student government concerning the use of vacant space in the Doyle Student Center. Toping this all off without consultation with the students, the administration has authorized partial use of your old bookstore facility for the housing of a new telephone switching system and have already started the installation of said Centrex telephone system.

Now we ask you-- is this fair? Is the administration of this college acting in the best interests of the students? Is the administration of this college protecting your rights as students of this school? We, your representatives in student government, think not, and would like you, the students, to be aware of the very real interests you have intrusted us to protect.

Completely Voluntary Student Fee May Bring Down Walls of CSA

There may be no student government next semester if lobbying to make the Associated Student Body fee completely "voluntary" succeeds.

Two divergent views emerged in Monday's hot College Student Assembly (CSA) meeting, as debate centered around the possibility of eliminating the waiver and giving students the opportunity to Office make provisions for collectrefuse the ASB fee payment with- ing the fees and waivers only dur-

The debate started when the administration requested CSA recommend a procedure for collecting next semester's Student Body fee.

Last week, in Executive Cabinet. a request was made to the administration asking that fees and waivers be processed during pre-registration and registration.

At the CSA meeting, Michael Harris, Fred Samia, and several other students charged CSA with making the student fee involuntary and a form of coercion.

Greg Cosko, Executive Vice-President, and Robert Reagan, Finance Commissioner, asked CSA to give the next "representative government a chance to work with as much money as we had."

Reagan and Cosko contend that making the fee too easy to reject would "eliminate the budget." Greg Cosko estimated a loss of 75% in revenues if the new system is put into effect.

If the fee were voluntary, David Chun said, the student would not have to obtain a waiver. Dennis O'Malley added that students would purchase their ASB card if they felt the government was credible in dealing with the budget.

Harris and Samia reminded Greg Cosko, who headed a drive last semester to make the fee voluntary, that he had forgotten his "whole trip to get the word out."

Cosko and Reagan asked that student government be given a fair chance to explain the budget and talk to students not wishing to purchase the card.

Samia said the whole system is "backwards;" that students should seek out the Student Activities Office if they wish to join the Associated Students.

The purpose of the Student Affairs Commission of SRJC is to stimulate and focus all available college and non-college resources upon the goal of assisting students to attain the skills, knowledge, motivations and secure the opportunities needed for them to become fully selfsufficient, specifically,

- Significantly and meaningfully involve students in developing and carrying out student programs.
- Plan and evaluate both long-range and short range strategies for overcoming poverty in the community.
- 3. Serve as an advocate of students on matters of college policy and programs which directly or indirectly affect their status, promoting institutional improvement and desirable changes in social policies and programs.
- Conduct in it's own right or delegate to other appropriate agencies the development and conduct of programs financial through student funds or other available monies.

The above enumeration of rights, privileges, and responsibilities shall not be constrewed to deny or disparge others retained by students in their capacity as members of the student body or as citizens of the community at large.

MEMBERSHIP

Any duly enrolled students of Santa Rosa Junior College shall be eligible for regualr membership in the Student Affairs Commission.

Any non-student person of the Sonoma County Junior College District shall be eligible for honorary membership upon application by those individuals to the Student Affairs Commission. A 2/3 affirmative vote of the Student Affairs Commission shall be necessary for acceptance of an honorary member.

PRIVILEGES and RESPONSIBILITIES

Honorary members shall be -

- Eligible for reduced rates to all Student Affairs Commission sponsored home athletic events, social events and cultural programs.
- Allowed to participate in the discussion and implementation of all Student Affairs Commission activities except that of policy making.
- Prohibited from direct participation in the selection of the members of the Student Affairs Commission Exec. Comm.

Regular members shall be:

- Eligible for reduced rates to all Student Affairs Commission sponsored home athletic events
- Eligible to particiapte in Student Affairs Commission sponsored athletics.
- 3. Allowed to hold office on Student Affairs Commission Exec. Comm.
- 4. Have free, or reduced, rates literary publications, rallies, dances, assemblies, social events, and allow Student Affairs
- Commission supported events.
- 5. Allowed to cash checks at the Bookstore, Cafeteria or the Accounting Office with proper identification.
- Eligible to participate in all phases of Student Affairs Commission activities, including discussion, policy-making and implementation.
- Eligible to participate in the selection of the members of the Student Affairs Commission, Exec. Comm.
- Others.suchiprivileges and responsibilities as determined by the Student Affairs Commission.

ADMINISTRATION and COORDINATION

The Student Affairs Commission, Exec. Comm. shall be the primary policy making, administration and coordination organ of the S.A.C.

1. Act as chairman at all SAC meetings

Act as chief administrative person of SAC, including direction and coordination

Serve as chairman and appoint the members of the Standing Committee on Administration and Procedure.

 Finance - Verify, sign and authorize requisitions and purchase order forms for the disbursement of funds of SAC as budgeted.

Authorize all payments of bills against the SAC With the approval of the SAC, Exec. As officers of the Associated Student Body of Samia Ross Junior College, we have been involved since the beginning of the Sall semester, through the system of student participation in the All-College Committee structure, in the formulation and review of the administrative policy of this Community College. Our active participation in this system, as well as the experience of governance of the Associated Students' organization has been of great educational value to us; unfortunately, the experience thus far has left us far from hopeful regarding the efficiency, candor, truthfulness, and sound democratic procedure with which this college is administered.

In the course of our efforts to deal with such student-centered issure as parking regulation, compus security, ellocation of vacant space in the Doyle Student Center, and Rockstors- Cafeteria policy, our proposals and investigations have often net with arguments and answers of a most ambiguous nature. Much we have attempted to objain "hard" information in any form, from back minutes of the Parking Committee meetings to a legal opinion regarding titles to and appearants. The above mentioned real property, to the use of undistributed income from the service concessions, we have emcountered not only the routine labyrinth of ad hoc committees, but what seem to us to be great geps either in the record keeping ability of the Administration or in hts sheet credibility.

The record of our actual accomplishment within the system has been one of which any tampayer would approve. In the present situation, however, we find ourselves faced ultimately with two alternatives; the betrayal of these whom we represent, or leadership of an aroused student population.

For the past semester your student government has been working to protect your rights as students at Santa Rosa Junior ^College. We have questioned the Administration of this college continuously trying to ascertain the validity of student government and the all-campus committee system. At this point, we, the members of your student government have reached an unresoluable impasse with the administration of this college.

1.) The use of funds from the college bookstore.

2.) The use of proposed parking fees.

3.) The use and the title of the Doyle Student Center.

At this time, we, the members of your student government want you to be aware of the impasse we have reached with the administration of this college. We, the members of your student government, wish you to know that we have exhausted every legal channel of communication with the administration of this college concerning the above-mentioned real student issues. Pointed questions have been asked of the administration concerning where your money is going, and we have received nothing but the most general and vague information in response to our questions with an added statement telling us that we are only a recommending body and regardless of our input into the all-campus committee system, the administration of this college will do as it sees fit.

Some of you may be aware of the fact that a blanket \$5 per car parking fee is being proposed for next semester. When questioned about the exact uses of this fee, the administration of your college failed to justify the disbursement of your money. The administration proposed to hire a full-time person to be the Officer of Campus Safety, <u>80 per cent of his salary to be funded from your parking fee</u>. When questioned about exactly what this man's duties would be, we were informed that in fact this new person would be the Chief of the S.R.J.C. campus patrol.

The new chief's duties will, in fact, be partly instructional, supervisory, and enforcement of all campus safety and security regulations.

We feel at this time that no more than 20 per cent of this mon's time will be directly related to parking problems. The California Education Code specifically stipulates that all parking fees shall be spent only in the operation, maintenance, and construction of parking facilities. Now we ask you, is this where you want your money to go? Do you want to pay some \$13,000 a year for an instructor-policeman on campus?

Also, we would like to bring to your attention the use of Doyle Student Center. This is the old Bookstore, Coop, and old Student Activities Office.

Toping this all off without consultation with the students, the administration has authorized partial use of your old bookstore facility for the housing of a new telephone switching system and have already started the installation of said Centrex telephone system.

Now we ask you-- is this fair? Is the administration of this college acting in the best interests of the students? Is the administration of this college protecting your rights as students of this school? We, your representatives in student government, think not, and would like you, the students, to be aware of the very real interests you have intrusted us to protect.

WHY WE NEED A NEW CONSTITUTION!

This constitutional change is but another part of the overall efforts of the December Coalition to remove student government from the control of the Student Activities Director and make it independent and responsible to the students. And as expected, we have run into much opposition from the Activities Director and a small group of his personal friends. The primary objection to these Constitutional changes is that they will allow a student to **perform** Associated Students checks along with the Activities Director. This is the first attempt in many years in which students have said, "We are going to do something that is beneficial to us without first asking the college Administration if they will allow us to do it."" Thile we realize of course that the opinions and policies of the college must be considered, it is of much more importance to see that the rights of the students are not ignored by the college Administration in their efforts at expediency.

The December Coalition holds that the only student government is one which is \cancel{a} independent of the other forces of the college. Under the current ASB Constitution the College Student Assembly cannot even meet UNLESS THE STUDENT ACTIVITIES DIRECTOR IS PRESENT!!! Is this <u>student</u> government? The faculty needs and has an independent collective voice in the form of the Academic Senate, and the President of the college, an administrator, does not have to be present for it to meet. Are student rights and student needs any less important?

These Constitutional changes, if passed, would;

- 1. Allow the chairperson to sign ASB checks with the Activities Director
- 2. Make all members of the Student Affairs Board elected, rather than half being appointed
- 3. Increase the term of office to one year to allow more time for completion of projects
- 4. More clearly identify the duties and responsibilities of the student officers
- 5. Involve more students in student government through use of the committee system

SRJC Rejects Student **Pleas, OK's Parking Fees**

the few large campuses in the state without a parking fee. Most are substantially higher: for instance, \$15 at California State College, Sonoma.

The college administration proposal projects a \$30,000 budget with revenues of \$27,000 from fees and \$3,000 from fines. It proposes spending the monev for:

60 per cent funding of a new Co-ordinator of Campus Parking and Safety, \$9,158; additional personnel from the SRJC police association, \$10,905; operating expenses. \$7,396; and reserve for maintenance, \$2,541.

Trustee Walter Haehl of Cloverdale, without comment, cast the lone dissenting vote.

The plan was a modified version of the campus parking committee proposal which suggested \$5 fee for evening college students as well.

Mark Caro, a member of the college Student Assembly, told the board the plan is "totally unreasonable . . . not really intelligently put together.'

He said the actual cost of maintaining the 1,368 campus parking spaces is \$13,000 annually, and that trustees were, in effect, asking students, to finance an unnecessary, selfsustained system.

Student Activities Advisor, Asst Involved in MASIY Scandal

Student Activities Advisor Eugene Canevari, and his assistant, David Herrington, have been involved in forming the Positive Action Team (PAT), confidential sources stated last week.

The PAT, whose membership includes members of the SRJC Vet's Club and a few hand-picked people, is opposing the December Coalition for Action (DCA) in Wednesday's elections.

The sources have proof that explicitly implicates Canevari and Herrington.

They claim Herrington asked one of the SAO's secretaries to give him a list of the members of CSA who have missed enough meetings to be removed from office.

He asked for the list before a woman called all these members and made false claims that they were possibly going to be kicked out of office and should come to the next meeting to fight.

The woman refused to identify herself on the phone, but has since been identified as Kathy Lazarus, PAT candidate for Vice-President,

The sources also state that Canevari advised Ron Edwards, a member of the Vet's Club and the PAT, of methods to defeat the DCA.

The SAO officials apparently have used their time as paid administrators for these purposes.

Canevari is paid \$21,800 a year by the District, and Herrington is paid half by student government and half by the District.

These flagrant abuses of power raise two serious questions:

--Do the Student Activities Advisor and his assistant have the right to become personally involved in the students' government?

--And will the PAT, if elected, represent the students or the administration?

The first question smells of the same power-mad drive that has crumpled the Nixon Administration via the Watergate affair.

Two paid officials are using their time and positions to defeat a government that has threatened their power.

Canevari has always held on to CSA with a firm grip. In the past, students rarely contradicted what he had to say.

The DCA, on the other hand, has been attempting all semester to give the control of student government to the students. When former assistant student activities advisor Bob Marmor resigned a short time into the semester, Canevari hired Herrington without asking any students, even though they pay half his salary.

Herrington, a former SRJC student body president, immediately set to work helping to organize the PAT. He was seen time and time again with the PAT's leadership, advising them on various matters.

In fact, many people speculated that Herring' was picked because, as a former ASB Presion he would have some status in forming an oppo. political party.

The student activities advisor and his assistant are supposed to help the student government in power. That is what they are paid to do.

They are not paid to become directly involved in student elections or to use their positions of power to maintain that power.

The second question is perhaps the most serious The PAT is claiming to represent student inter ests.

How can they be if they are being hand fed b Canevari, Herrington, and the college's administration?

The PAT is indeed made up of students, many o them hard-working. However, it appears they res pect the "authority" of the administration so much they are willing to be used by it.

In fact, the PAT's candidate for president is Robert Long, a member of the Vet's Club.

The Vet's Club had controlled CSA for three years prior to this year, and those years were marked by a marriage between the administratio and student government.

The only question that remains is, do student want to control their own government, or do the want the administration, via Canevari and Herrington, to control it for them?

<u>Clause IX</u> Other types of Publicity for elections are sandwich boards, open forum and outdoor stage (for speeches), small fence south of Analy Hall, Garbage cans, and posters on stakes on edge of grass.

Section IV - Bulletin Board Notices

<u>Clause I</u> Student's personal notices, such as items for sale or trade, may be placed on the bulletin board located in Analy and Burbank Halls and on the Kiosks. These signs will be removed by the Publicity Commissioner or his designated representatives, every two weeks.

Section VIII - Time Limits

<u>Clause I</u> All campaign posters within a radius of ten (10) yards of the polling place are to be taken down the day before the election.

<u>Clause II</u> All campaign posters must be taken down carefully no later than twenty-four hours after the event if the event is held after Friday noon.

<u>Clause III</u> Posters will be restricted to two weeks posting prior to the event. During elections, posters will be restricted to one week posting prior to the election day.

Based upon said Public Accountant's certificate and also upon this Board's own investigation, this Board does certify to the matters contained in this paragraph 3.

4. That the said facilities abandoned are no longer economically capable of producing net revenues.

5. The Board further certifies that the estimated net operating revenues to be derived during the 1973-1974 fiscal year from facilities of the system remaining after said abandonment shall be not less than one and three-tenths (1.3) times the net maximum annual debt reserve on the bonds.

Dear Gene,

I would like to resign as advisor to the College Community Film Guild effective June 15, 1973. I find that I cannot devote enough time to that job and still fulfill my obligations in the English Department and other college-related activities.

I also feel that any new advisor should help reorganize the concept of the College Community Film Guild to make it more workable. Television production is almost certainly beyond the possibility of a small, semi-organized group of students who have no access to equipment (even the meager amount at S.R.J.C.). Community news services cannot be run on a volunteer basis, no matter how much the local stations would like to see this done. Live, synched sound is not possible with the modest equipment and budget available to students. And finally, the constant pressure to form classes outside normal channels should be stopped.

I leave with a sense of failure, but I feel the time has come to leave under any circumstances. If necessary, I will continue to serve as advisor until September of this year, but if no other advisor can be found I suggest disbanding the organization, placing the equipment in the SAO for use by students, and the possible reorganization next fall with more modest goals in mind.

Thank you for giving me the chance this year, I hope I can be of service to the SAO in the future in a more successful venture.
