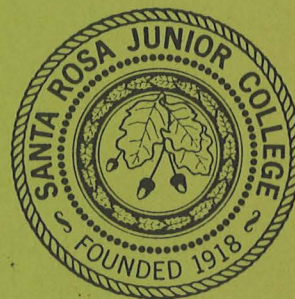

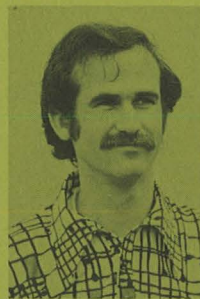

- B. If by the fourth meeting of the Assembly the appointments have either not been made or approved, the President of the association shall assume the responsibility of appointing the representatives to the committees. All appointments made by the President must be approved by the College Student Assembly.

Section 3. The composition of any Student Standing Committee may at any time be changed by the Executive Vice President upon approval of the College Student Assembly.

- A. The Executive Vice President shall act as the official liaison between the committees, the Assembly and the Executive Cabinet at such times ~~as~~ that the committee does not delegate a spokesman for it.
- B. All meetings are to be called by the chairman of the committee except for the first meeting which will be called by the Executive Vice President and any time the Assembly calls for a committee meeting to be held.

HANDBOOKS & CALENDARS - pays for 5,000 Student Handbooks and two sets of 5,000 (10,000) Calendar of Events.

HOCKEY, WOMEN'S INTER-COLLEGIATE: (see Baseball)

HOSPITAL & INSURANCE - pays for accident insurance for all student card holders as well as all costs for students injured in inter-collegiate athletics. (See Insurance Brochure)

INTER-CLUB COUNCIL - expenses of the I.C.C., including Best Club Award.

INTRA-MURAL - pays student referees and other miscellaneous costs of Intra-Mural program.

LEGAL AID - professional legal advice made available on campus to student card holders.

MINORITY PROGRAMS - funds allocated by the Associated Students for use by on-campus minority groups for projects for minority students and for the campus community at large (example - financial support of the Black Theater Workshop).

MISCELLANEOUS - a little of everything -- represents less than one percent of the projected budget.

OAK LEAF - pays for approximately one-half of cost of publishing Oak Leaf. Income is from advertising.

OFFICE SUPPLIES - pays for office supplies used by the Associated Students - includes purchase of office equipment.

POSTAGE - Associated Students' mail.

PROFESSIONAL SERVICES - for independent audit of financial records.

PUBLIC RELATIONS & PUBLICITY - pays for student photographers and supplies for Calendar of Events, Student Directory, and Student Handbook. Pays for materials and student salaries for poster printing.

SALARIES - pays salaries -- Student Activities Secretary and the Associated Students' Accounts Manager.

SICKNESS BENEFIT - for employees of Associated Students

SOCIAL SECURITY - for employees of Associated Students

SOFTBALL, - WOMEN'S INTER-COLLEGIATE: (see Baseball)

STUDENT HEALTH CARE - pays for drugs, X-rays, and tests for those students who cannot afford needed health care.

STUDENT CARDS - pays for student card sticker costs.

STUDENT FILM PROJECTS - funds student film makers with equipment, film, and processing. All A.S.B. members are eligible.

STUDENT PROJECT GRANTS - funds for special student projects which are awarded each semester to students submitting applications. All A.S.B. members are eligible.



- C. The Executive Vice President may lose all power granted to him/her by this code by a two-thirds majority vote of no confidence by the College Student Assembly at which time the President shall assume all the duties delegated to the Executive Vice President by this code.

Section 4. The committees provided for by this code shall stand as finally composed and approved for the period of one semester.

- A. The chairman of each committee shall be appointed at the first committee meeting by the members of that committee.

#### IMPLICATIONS OF THE PROPOSED CODE

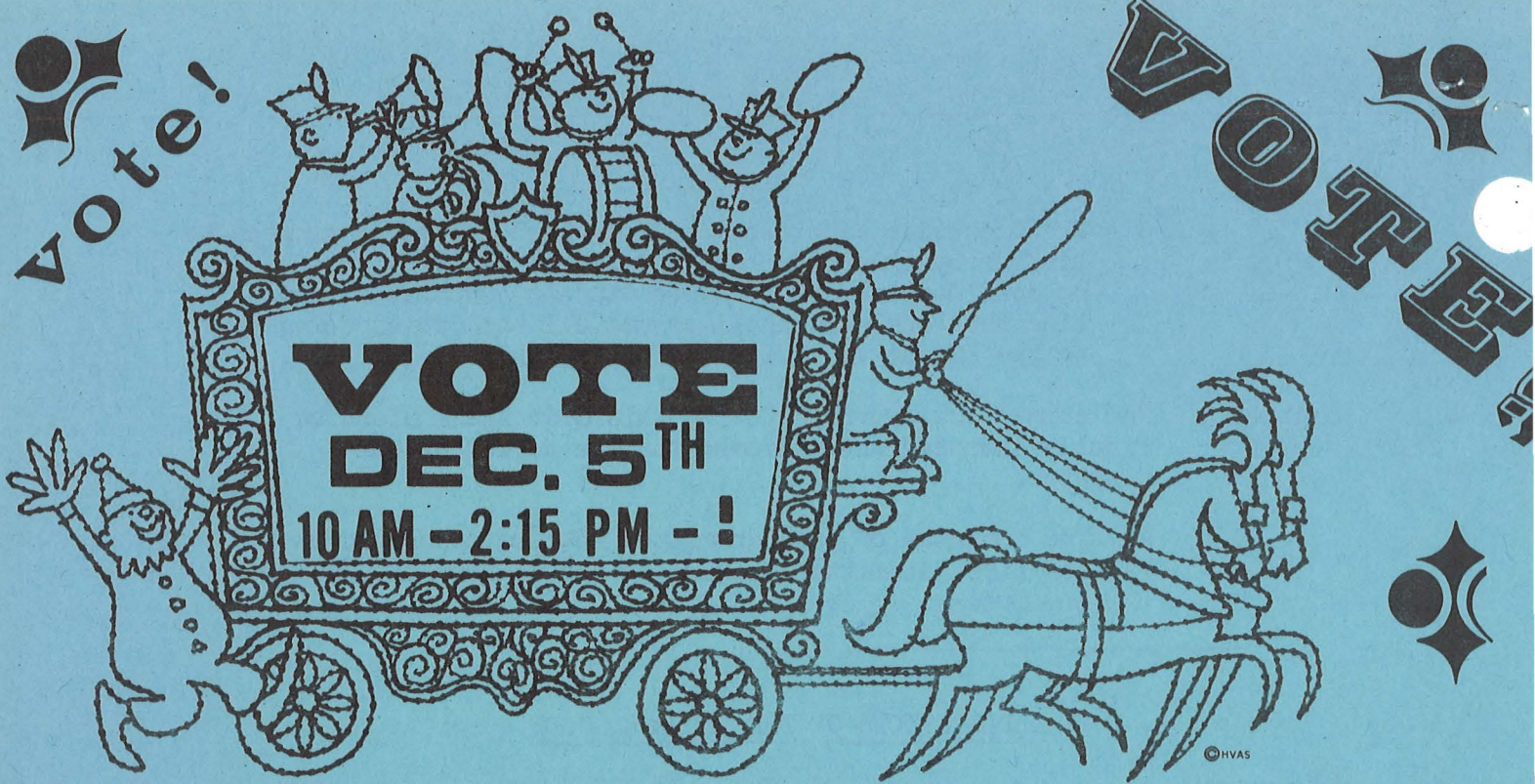
##### Advantages

1. With such a committee set-up, problems can be presented to the College Student Assembly without a solution to them or even any ideas for a solution. The problem can simply be referred to a standing committee for investigation and future recommendation.
2. Saves the hassle of creating a special committee for each item that is brought to the Assembly and appointing members to it, all of which is time consuming and often limits the effectiveness of the Assembly on other matters.
3. Creates a bureaucracy that would sustain the formation of ideas and recommend action on ideas that formally could only be sustained by the persistence of someone in power.
4. Such a system would be a direct means of access into the policy formation process as opposed to the process of policy approval, for both elected student representatives and non-association members of the student body both of whom are greatly affected by the policies of the student government.

##### Disadvantages

1. The short period of one semester greatly limits the amount of work any one committee can accomplish.
2. Committees present a possible source of dissention within student government.



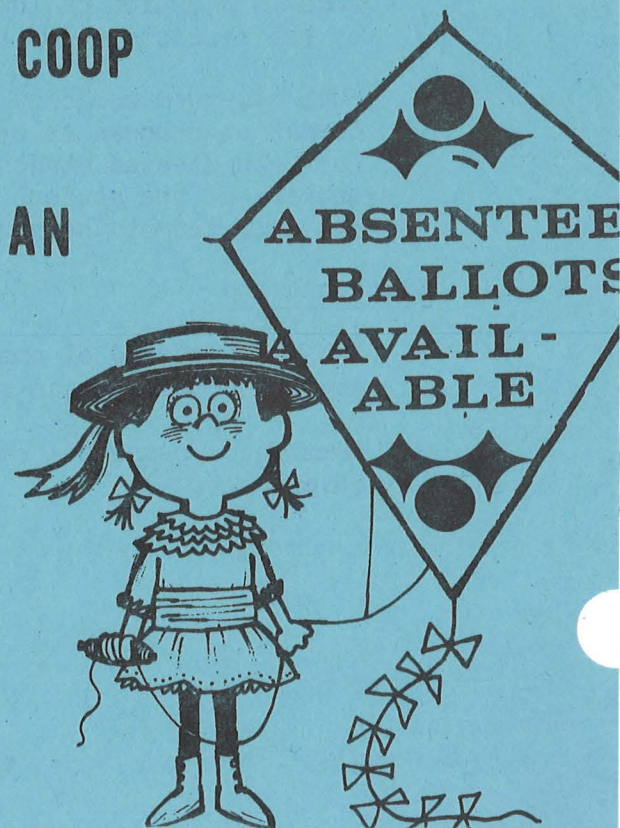

# SRJC trustees, students in parking fee compromise

Agreement has been reached on spring semester student parking fees at Santa Rosa Junior College.

Approved last night by the board of trustees was a compromise plan which satisfied both the Associated Students and the college administration.

It calls for the Associated Students to buy into the parking program for \$750 and allows the organization to sell a parking sticker for \$2 to each purchaser a student body card.

The district will sell parking stickers to day students who do not purchase student body cards for \$5 and to evening college students for \$2.

In the past SRJ has charged

a \$5 per semester fee to all students who park on campus. The Associated Students asked for a change in policy to allow holders of student body cards to benefit.

Under the new plan, anticipated revenue for the spring semester is \$14,750.

The agreement also calls for the regular parking sticker to cost \$7 for the fall 1974 semester, with the cost to student body holders and evening college students to remain at \$2. During that semester the Associated Students will pay \$1,000 to become a parking partner.

In other action last night the SRJC board:

— Was handed a \$43,000 check

representing the latest dividends from the Doyle trust by Exchange Bank president Andrew Sheppard. The money will go toward Doyle Scholarships, making a total of \$140,000 in the scholarship fund this school year. Doyle Scholarships, first awarded in 1949, passed the \$1 million mark last year.

— Approved filing project planning guides for two building projects, the Analy Hall remodeling and the new environmental science building. Some art faculty members indicated they were unhappy about the square footage available in Analy Hall, which will become the campus art facility. The building contains a little less than 16,000

square feet, whereas the instructors project their needs through 1978 at about 26,000 square feet. The board was sympathetic to their problem but agreed with trustee Albert Maggini, who commented: "All you can do is do the best you can with the existing building." Size is restricted because the \$879,000 project will be under state aid. The environmental science building will include 19,720 square feet plus an adjacent greenhouse and be located in a current parking lot on the west side of the campus. Preliminary sketches for both projects will be presented to the board in the fall.

— Approved applying for

\$225,000 in 1974-75 funding for the Extended Opportunity Program, which assists needy students through grants and scholarships, work study programs and tutorial and counseling services. A total of \$91,322 was allocated to serve 450 students during the current school year. Next year's program would serve an additional 500.

— Was notified that the Harrison Mecham Relief Fund of Petaluma has contributed \$2,000 to the SRJC Foundation for scholarships to Petaluma area students.

— Agreed to advertise for proposals for district insurance or to the Feb. 10 expiration date on the current policy. It

was also agreed to call for bids every three years.

— Agreed to contractor Ralph Palmberg's request to call a special meeting next week between a board committee, legal counsel, college officials, Palmberg and his attorney relative to the complicated legal issues involved in the long-delayed swim center.

— Heard a brief progress report on Lake County annexation from college president Dr. Roy Mikalson, who indicated that so far the discussion has been "all emotional" and has not delved into the educational aspects for the students. The first hearing will be held tonight in Middletown, with additional hearings

set for Kelseyville and Lakeport.

— Received a preliminary report on offering an Associate of Science degree from dean of instruction Brook Tauzer, who indicated initial reaction has been "positive." It will be acted upon later by the board.

— Approved the establishment of a campus facility planning committee.

— Approved changing the physical education requirement from "units" to "courses" to eliminate a technical problem "of numbers."

— Unanimously rejected compensation for board members as provided by AB 1489. President

Ben Race commented he felt it defeated the idea of a lay board.

— Approved an amendment to the contract with Steele & Van Dyk for remodeling Analy Hall, subject to approval of county counsel.

— Approved paying a \$1,000 connection fee for a 1½-inch water lines for the farm property.

— Formally approved "Law of the 70s" and "Family Risk Management" as the two courses to be offered in the TV consortium program.

— Set a special meeting for Jan. 21 to review bids on computers and decide on ground rules for classified salary comparisons.

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FINANCIAL CODE  
ASSOCIATED STUDENTS - SANTA ROSA  
JUNIOR COLLEGE

ARTICLE I - OBJECTIVES

This Financial Code is established to define those policies and procedures for the developing, approving, and expending of all money under the control of the Associated Students of Santa Rosa Junior College and its associated organizations in order to insure worthwhile educational experiences for the students and to insure that all financial transactions will be made in the best interests of the Associated Students and in accordance with all pertinent County, State, and District financial regulations.

ARTICLE II - RESPONSIBILITY OF THE COMMISSIONER OF FINANCE

The Commissioner of Finance (and the Student Activities Advisor) shall be responsible for seeing that all financial transactions of the Associated Students are in accordance with this code, and for carrying out other duties as outlined in the Constitution of the Associated Students. In the absence of the Commissioner of Finance the Assistant Commissioner of Finance, shall have the authority for carrying out the responsibilities of Commissioner of Finance.

ARTICLE III - BUDGETS

SECTION 1. All of the finances of this organization shall be administered under a budget system.

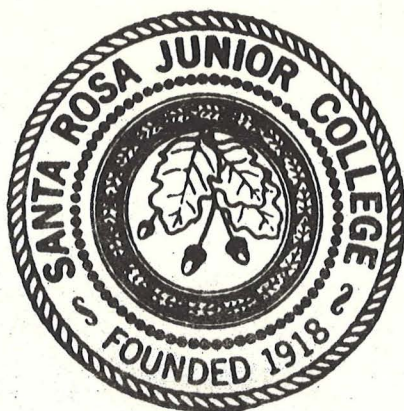
SECTION 2. Preparation of the budget:

- A. All requests for budget items must be submitted to the Commissioner of Finance no later than April 15th.
- B. The Commissioner of Finance, in cooperation with the Budget Committee, shall present this budget to the Executive Cabinet no later than May 1st of each school year.
- C. The Executive Cabinet shall review the preliminary budget and present a proposed budget to the Student Council no later than the last meeting in May of each school year.

SECTION 3. The approval of the annual budget requires a 2/3 vote of the College Student Assembly. Once the budget has been approved, changes require a one-week's posting before action may be taken and require a 2/3 majority to carry.

SECTION 4. Requests for funds in excess of budgeted amount must be submitted in advance to the Commissioner of Finance who will present the request to the College Student Assembly.

SUBJECT: PHYSICAL EDUCATION REQUIREMENT

College Student Assembly has been in recommendation of changes in the physical education requirement. At its meeting on January 7, 1974 the Board of Trustees recognized and authorized one of those adjustments - i.e., changing the word "unit(s)" to "course(s)". All segments of the college agreed. The matter of changing the age requirement from 22 to 21 years is quite a different matter because of the lack of agreement. There is not support from the physical education department or from the administration. And, however it is stated, the office of instruction strongly advocates a physical education requirement.

Therefore, and to conclude, if the issue of age change is to be sustained, the impetus must be generated from the student sector. This office has been engaged in discussion of the physical education requirement for two years. The present requirement, as recently adjusted, satisfies as many people as is humanly possible. I, personally, am not interested in further discussion at this time.

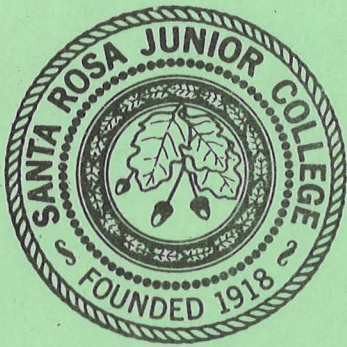

1. LEGAL AID - Professional legal advice made available on campus to students.
2. WOMEN'S CENTER - The establishment and funding of a student-sponsored Women's Center.
3. CHILD CARE CENTER - The creation and continued financial support of the S.R.J.C. Child Care Center.
4. MEDICAL SERVICES - At the request of the college's physician, the Associated Students has purchased needed equipment for the on-campus Student Health Center. In addition, the ASB is providing funds for medicine and tests to be prescribed for students at the discretion of the college physician.

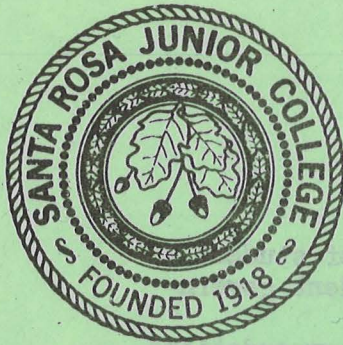

- A. The College Student Assembly shall, by a simple majority vote, approve the appointments made by the Executive Vice President, which must be submitted to the Assembly by the third meeting of that body.
- B. If by the fourth meeting of the Assembly the appointments have either not been made or approved, the President of the association shall assume the responsibility of appointing the representatives to the committees. All appointments made by the President must be approved by the College Student Assembly.

Section 3. The composition of any Student Standing Committee may at any time be changed by the Executive Vice President upon approval of the College Student Assembly.

- A. The Executive Vice President shall act as the official liaison between the committees, the Assembly and the Executive Cabinet at such times ~~as~~ that the committee does not delegate a spokesman for it.
- B. All meetings are to be called by the chairman of the committee except for the first meeting which will be called by the Executive Vice President and any time the Assembly calls for a committee meeting to be held.

- C. The Executive Vice President may lose all power granted to him/her by this code by a two-thirds majority vote of no confidence by the College Student Assembly at which time the President shall assume all the duties delegated to the Executive Vice President by this code.

Section 4. The committees provided for by this code shall stand as finally composed and approved for the period of one semester.

- A. The chairman of each committee shall be appointed at the first committee meeting by the members of that committee.

#### IMPLICATIONS OF THE PROPOSED CODE

##### Advantages

1. With such a committee set-up, problems can be presented to the College Student Assembly without a solution to them or even any ideas for a solution. The problem can simply be referred to a standing committee for investigation and future recommendation.
2. Saves the hassle of creating a special committee for each item that is brought to the Assembly and appointing members to it, all of which is time consuming and often limits the effectiveness of the Assembly on other matters.
3. Creates a bureaucracy that would sustain the formation of ideas and recommend action on ideas that formally could only be sustained by the persistence of someone in power.
4. Such a system would be a direct means of access into the policy formation process as opposed to the process of policy approval, for both elected student representatives and non-association members of the student body both of whom are greatly affected by the policies of the student government.

##### Disadvantages

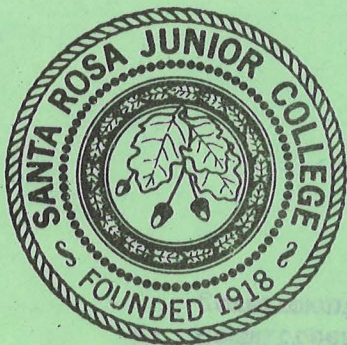
1. The short period of one semester greatly limits the amount of work any one committee can accomplish.
2. Committees present a possible source of dissention within student government.

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## REPORT

## A system conducting general polls of students

If C.S.A. is to fairly represent all students on this campus, it needs a system by which it can accurately gauge student opinion. Objective, well designed polls can be of great aid in this.

A guideline for such a poll follows:

1. The sample will consist of the first class listed in the college schedule of classes which meets on Wednesday, and every thirtieth class listed thereafter which also meets on Wednesday.
2. Wednesday classes have been selected because a greater number of students attend college on Wednesday than any other day of the week.
3. By taking polls of classes according to how they randomly appear on a list a cross section of the student body is reached with a minimum of subjectivity.
4. Also, by taking the poll all in one day, fewer uncontrollable factors enter into comprehending of results.
5. The poll will be administered at various times of the day according to when the selected classes meet, ensuring that students ~~from~~ with different living patterns will be represented.
6. A class in nursing, automotive mechanics, machining shop, and welding will also be polled. None of these courses were selected by random. Since they have been historically under-represented in campus affairs they must be included on the poll.
7. This system will ensure the representation of students over twentytwo years. A system based on polling physical education classes would practically ignore this large segment of the student population.
8. Aboutfourteen classes (500) students will be included in this type of polling.

Proposed Change to the Student Project Grant Guidelines

Item 1 of the Student Project Grant Guidelines as found at present:

Student Project Grants will be granted by a majority vote of the Student Project Grant Committee. The committee shall consist of five (5) members of the College Student Assembly, elected by a majority vote. The committee shall remain in existence for the entire semester.

Item 1 with proposed change:

Student Project Grants will be granted by a majority vote of the Student Project Grant Committee. The committee shall consist of the Executive Vice President of the Associated Students and four members appointed by him/her and approved by the College Student Assembly. The committee shall remain in existence for the entire semester.

Proposed Change to the Student Film Project Guidelines

Item 1 of the Student Film Project Guidelines as found at present:

The Film Project Committee will consist of the Executive Vice President of the Associated Students and four members appointed by him and approved by C.S.A. Two appointed members and the chairman will constitute a quorum.

Item 1 with proposed change:

Student Film Project Grants will be granted by a majority vote of the Student Project Grants Committee.

Implications of the Proposed Changes:

1. Eliminate the need for two separate committees to dispende Association Grant money.
2. Would make the establishment of the Project Grant Committee the direct responsibility of an individual student government member while still calling for C.S.A. approval and control.
3. Would allow for expertise not found among C.S.A. members to be taken advantage of through the use of non-student government personnel on the Project Grants Committee.



## 2. FINALS

The final examination policy, as it now appears in the Faculty Handbook, was corrected to read as follows:

The final examination schedule is included on the schedule of classes printed in May and December. Instructors are asked to report conflicts or room change requests to the Dean of Instruction.

Final examinations are to be held in all courses (except certain activity classes). They shall not be held on a day designated for instruction.

Only in cases of emergency is a student permitted to petition the Scholarship Committee to take final examinations at a time other than that scheduled. If a student is unable to make the final examination the Registrar's Office and the instructor should be notified.

1. The final examination testing period will be seven days; two hour examinations will be held in courses of two units or less, and three hour examinations will be required for those of more than two units; not more than two examinations per day will be schedule for day college classes.

This change is effective IMMEDIATELY.

## Recycling center receives approval from SRJC board

Sonoma County Recycling Inc. of Healdsburg will conduct a one-day-a-week recycling center on the Santa Rosa Junior College campus at a date to be announced later.

In approving the proposal last night, the college's board of trustees indicated it was "not granting exclusive rights to one organization" and could revoke permission at any time.

The proposed site is at the south end of the Bailey Field parking lot.

Under the terms of the agreement, Sonoma County Recycling will provide a truck and containers and hire a work-study student to man the center. The company will also be responsible for keeping the area clean, a major concern voiced by the trustees.

The board agreed to college president Dr. Roy Mikalson's request to allow the starting date and hours of the center to be worked out by the staff after spring semester parking patterns are more firmly established.

In other action last night the SRJC board:

—Was informed the California Congress of Parent-Teacher Associations will be awarding two scholarships of \$150 each to full-time second year occupational students — one in the inhalation therapy program and the other in nursery school education.

—Authorized entering into a contract with the state Cooperative Personnel Services for a salary review and classification study.

—Adopted an animal control policy barring animals, includ-

ing those on leashes, from campus.

—Approved submitting a preliminary application for \$209,988 in federal funds under Improvement of Postsecondary Education for learning laboratory equipment for the tutorial center. Also approved was an application for \$20,000 for the purchase of equipment under the Higher Education Act.

—Heard a report on Lake County annexation from Dr. Mikalson, who indicated the matter will be put to a vote in the five Lake County districts. He said the general feeling was that voters would turn it down the first time around and that

new studies would be required.

—Approved sending 10 students and two coaches to the national speech tournament at Omaha, Neb., in April at a cost of \$4,000. Instructor Jack Perala indicated the forensics team has won 21 trophies and placed in the finals 44 times and was more than ready for national competition.

—Heard a preliminary report on spring semester enrollment indicating just over 4,800 day students have registered so far. Dean of students Garth Dougan said he felt there were many more students preparing to enroll and that the college is "hoping" to reach its projection of 5,300.

## Dogs banned from campus

The board of trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College last night banned dogs from the campus.

The board adopted an "animal control" policy ordering that no animals, including those on leashes, are to be allowed on campus.

The only exceptions will be guide dogs for the blind and animals used in the instructional program.

The move was prompted by

problems with sanitation and dog fights.

The policy calls for violations to be handled by citation or impounding of dogs by authorized college officials, including Sonoma County Humane Society officers.

To enforce the policy the board approved hiring a Humane Society employee to be on campus three to four hours a week at a rate of \$5 per hour.

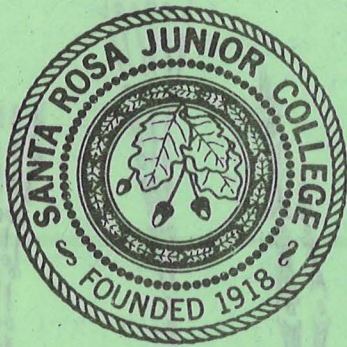

## Recycling center receives approval from SRJC board

Sonoma County Recycling Inc. of Healdsburg will conduct a one-day-a-week recycling center on the Santa Rosa Junior College campus at a date to be announced later.

In approving the proposal last night, the college's board of trustees indicated it was "not granting exclusive rights to one organization" and could revoke permission at any time.

The proposed site is at the south end of the Bailey Field parking lot.

Under the terms of the agreement, Sonoma County Recycling will provide a truck and containers and hire a work-study student to man the center. The company will also be responsible for keeping the area clean, a major concern voiced by the trustees.

The board agreed to college president Dr. Roy Mikalson's request to allow the starting date and hours of the center to be worked out by the staff after spring semester parking patterns are more firmly established.

In other action last night the SRJC board:

—Was informed the California Congress of Parent-Teacher Associations will be awarding two scholarships of \$150 each to full-time second year occupational students — one in the inhalation therapy program and the other in nursery school education.

—Authorized entering into a contract with the state Cooperative Personnel Services for a salary review and classification study.

—Adopted an animal control policy barring animals, includ-

ing those on leashes, from campus.

—Approved submitting a preliminary application for \$209,988 in federal funds under Improvement of Postsecondary Education for learning laboratory equipment for the tutorial center. Also approved was an application for \$20,000 for the purchase of equipment under the Higher Education Act.

—Heard a report on Lake County annexation from Dr. Mikalson, who indicated the matter will be put to a vote in the five Lake County districts. He said the general feeling was that voters would turn it down the first time around and that

new studies would be required.

—Approved sending 10 students and two coaches to the national speech tournament at Omaha, Neb., in April at a cost of \$4,000. Instructor Jack Perella indicated the foensics team has won 21 trophies and placed in the finals 44 times and was more than ready for national competition.

—Heard a preliminary report on spring semester enrollment indicating just over 4,800 day students have registered so far. Dean of students Garth Dougan said he felt there were many more students preparing to enroll and that the college is "hoping" to reach its projection of 5,300.

## Dogs banned from campus

The board of trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College last night banned dogs from the campus.

The board adopted an "animal control" policy ordering that no animals, including those on leashes, are to be allowed on campus.

The only exceptions will be guide dogs for the blind and animals used in the instructional program.

The move was prompted by

problems with sanitation and dog fights.

The policy calls for violations to be handled by citation or impounding of dogs by authorized college officials, including Sonoma County Humane Society officers.

To enforce the policy the board approved hiring a Humane Society employee to be on campus three to four hours a week at a rate of \$5 per hour.



### Proposed Guideline for Conducting Polls

- Item 1. All polls must be discussed with the Corresponding Secretary before being distributed to students.
- Item 2. The results of all polls will be analyzed by the Corresponding Secretary and/or other person conducting a poll. A summary of this analysis will be reported to C.S.A. in meeting.
- Item 3. The summary of the poll will be recorded in the minutes of C.S.A.
- Item 4. The Corresponding Secretary will keep records of the results, analysis, manner of distribution and sampling of students for each poll.

#### Implications:

- 1. Although any member of C.S.A. may conduct a poll, all polling efforts will be co-ordinated by one person. Thus the combined expertise gained in taking polls may be shared in every poll.
- 2. The Corresponding Secretary is very interested in the use of polls. He has already developed some expertise about their design and use. Also, since his office is responsible for keeping C.S.A. informed of things affecting it, that office should be responsible for overseeing polls.



## REPORT

### A system conducting general polls of students

If C.S.A. is to fairly represent all students on this campus, it needs a system by which it can accurately gauge student opinion. Objective, well designed polls can be of great aid in this.

A guideline for such a poll follows:

1. The sample will consist of the first class listed in the college schedule of classes which meets on Wednesday, and every thirtieth class listed thereafter which also meets on Wednesday.
2. Wednesday classes have been selected because a greater number of students attend college on Wednesday than any other day of the week.
3. By taking polls of classes according to how they randomly appear on a list a cross section of the student body is reached with a minimum of subjectivity.
4. Also, by taking the poll all in one day, fewer uncontrollable factors enter into comprehending of results.
5. The poll will be administered at various times of the day according to when the selected classes meet, ensuring that students ~~from~~ with different living patterns will be represented.
6. A class in nursing, automotive mechanics, machining shop, and welding will also be polled. None of these courses were selected by random. Since they have been historically under-represented in campus affairs they must be included on the poll. *Some more advanced classes also to be polled.*
7. This system will ensure the representation of students over twenty-two years. A system based on polling physical education classes would practically ignore this large segment of the student population.
8. About fourteen classes (500) students will be included in this type of polling.

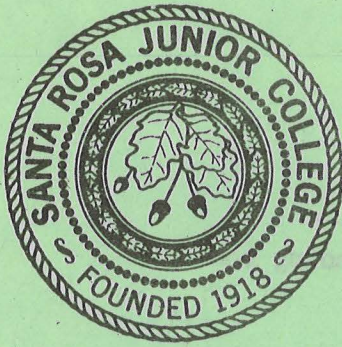

10. **SCHOLARSHIPS** - Last year the ASB awarded \$2100 in scholarships to students who were continuing their education in the upper division of a college or university.



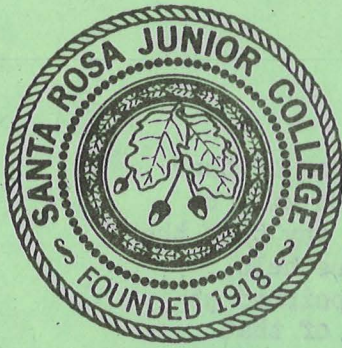

# **4 SRJC students in semi-finals**

Four Santa Rosa Junior College students are first-round winners in the Bank of America's 1974 Community College Awards program.

The winners and their study fields are: Ron Malnati, business; Tina Medosch, science and engineering; Donna Courtney, social science and humanities; and Harry Zabel, technical-vocational.

## POLICY ON FULL-TIME CERTIFICATED STAFFING

December 10, 1973

Discussion Document

INTRODUCTION

The instructional program and its attendant student personnel services constitute the essence of Santa Rosa Junior College. Therefore, certificated staffing procedures are governed by the highest standards. Contributory to those standards are several general considerations from which result the specific process to be delineated below. First, Santa Rosa Junior College subscribes to an Affirmative Action policy which provides for equal employment opportunity, and which prohibits employment discrimination because of race, color, religion, sex, or national origin. Recognized is a disparity in some departments between the number of ethnic minority and women certificated personnel and their actual populations in the district. An effort toward equity, where it does not exist, is hereby declared. Good faith efforts must be made by those departments in which the disparity exists. Second, adequate departmental participation on selection committees is absolutely vital in maintaining and perpetuating a certificated staff characterized by excellence. Third, the broadest possible representation on selection committees provides for different perspectives leading to appointment of the most qualified certificated staff members. Therefore, consideration for inclusion of classified personnel and/or students on selection committees is appropriate.

PROCEDURES1. Affirmative Action

Every effort will continue to be made to attract ethnic minority and women applicants for certificated positions. Employment announcements will be sent regularly to appropriate organizations. The active assistance of present ethnic minority and women employees of the district will be sought to attract additional applicants. College placement officers will be alerted regularly to the desire of Santa Rosa Junior College to attract ethnic minority and women candidates. Advertisements of employment opportunities will be placed in local and/or state, and/or national publications whenever the action offers promise of securing additional ethnic minority and women applicants.



## 2. Staffing Committee

- a. A staffing committee composed of the academic senate president, dean of adult and continuing education, dean of business services, dean of instruction, and dean of student personnel services receives certificated staffing requests from the several departments, reviews them, and makes recommendations to the college president. After conferring with the committee, the president prepares a list of recommended positions and priorities which is distributed to department chairmen/area representatives for review and appeal. Following the appeals procedure the president prepares a list of recommended positions for authorization by the board of trustees.
- b. Authorized positions, appropriately described, are submitted to placement agencies by the dean's office.
- c. Applications are received by, and applicant files are assembled in the dean's office. They are then sent to the department chairmen/area representatives concerned.

## 3. Screening Committee

At the option of each department a screening committee, separate from a selection committee, may be utilized to determine the interviewees. In this instance, the same general commitments apply as those appropriate to the selection committee -- i.e., every effort should be made to adhere to the Affirmative Action policy, and to the concept of breadth of participation in terms of committee membership. In the absence of a separate committee, it's assumed that the function of screening will be performed by the selection committee. In any event the same guidelines apply as follows:

- a. With counsel from the department, the instructional office will advertise the position to an extent consistent with possible available candidates.
- b. The instructional office will also serve the department by:
  1. receiving and disbursing letter of inquiry;
  2. developing folders of information on candidates;
  3. requesting professional files on the most promising candidates;
  4. making interview appointments for screened candidates; and,
  5. performing any other necessary clerical functions.



- c. At the earliest possible date after a position is authorized, the department will determine a time-table for screening, interviewing, and eventually choosing nominees.
- d. The number of applicants screened for interview will be determined by the department. A wide choice of candidates for screening will insure appointment of the most qualified candidate, and thereby perpetuate the quality of excellence among an outstanding certificated staff.

4. Membership of Selection Committee

- a. Upon authorization of a position, the department will meet to determine selection committee membership. Any department member who desires to be a selection committee participant will serve.
- b. For small departments participation of all full-time faculty members is advisable. For larger departments participation of three (3) full-time faculty members is considered to be a minimum number.
- c. Each department exercises its option to include classified staff members, ~~and/or students on selection committees.~~
- d. An appropriate dean serves on each selection committee.

e. *The student will be appointed by the department chairman.*

5. Voting

Each selection committee member receives one (1) vote in determining the prospective appointees.



## 6. APPOINTMENT

The actual appointment process assumes the following format:

- a. Prior to presenting its chosen candidate to the president, the selection committee will:
  1. designate the dean to make a personal contact (in person or by telephone) with at least one (1) reference whose name is contained in the professional file of each of the leading candidates. Individuals for contact may also be identified from sources other than the professional file.
  2. schedule an interview for leading candidates with the president. It's assumed that both of these procedures can occur as integral aspects of the on-going screening process, and they need not be reserved actually to conclude the procedure.
- b. The selection committee's choice is referred to the president by the department chairman, dean and other members of the selection committee, as appropriate. On this occasion there is a general review of all applicants who have been interviewed. Before committing himself to a particular candidate, the president will make a personal contact (in person or by telephone) with at least one (1) reference whose name is contained in the professional file of the selection committee's choice. Additional individuals for contact may be identified from sources other than the professional file.
- c. Concurrence with the selection committee choice leads to presentation of the name to the board of trustees.
- d. In the absence of concurrence with the department's choice, the president, dean, and chairman meet with departmental selection committee to arrive at a consensus. In the absence of consensus the position may be re-opened.
- e. The board of trustees makes all appointments.

### Administration Version

#### 6. Appointment

All new full-time certificated faculty members shall be appointed by the board of trustees upon recommendation by the college president.

The president shall make his recommendation to the trustees after completion of the following procedures:

- a. The dean shall make a personal contact (in person or by telephone) with at least one (1) reference contained in the professional file of each of the leading candidates. Inquiries also may be directed to individuals whose names do not appear in the professional file.
- b. The committee shall schedule and conduct interviews of the leading candidates. At the time of these interviews, the committee also schedules appointments for the most outstanding candidates with the president (in order to avoid the necessity of bringing candidates back to the campus at a later time.)
- c. The names of three (3) acceptable candidates shall be submitted to the president. They may be ranked in order of preference as determined by the committee.
- \*d. Before committing himself to a candidate, the president shall:
  1. have interviewed each of the three (3) acceptable candidates;
  2. make a personal contact with at least one (1) of the references in the professional file of each of the three (3) candidates. Inquiries also may be made of other individuals whose names do not appear in the professional file; and,



3. meet with the department chairman (and screening committee chairman, if different) and dean to review candidate rankings.
- e. Concurrence with the selection committee's first choice results in presentation of that name to the board of trustees.
- f. In the absence of concurrence with the selection committee's first choice, the president will meet with the committee to review his action and to select from the remaining two (2) candidates.
- g. If the list of three (3) candidates received by the president is not ranked in order of the committee's preference, the president shall make his choice and refer it to the trustees.

\*This section to be expanded to include an arrangement by which candidate #2 can be selected in the event candidate #1 is not chosen or is not available.

## SANTA ROSA JUNIOR COLLEGE DAY CARE CENTER

The SRJC Day Care Center has been funded by Title 4-A funds for Campus Day Care Centers with additional support from the SRJC Associated Student Body and the SRJC Foundation.

The Center will offer no-cost and low-cost day care to SRJC students with children aged 3 months-6 years (no transportation will be offered to schools). The recipients of the day care services must have a low family income. Positions will be offered first to current, former or potential AFDC recipients. Priority will be given to single parent families. Following those admissions, other children will be admitted, low incomes having priority. These families will have to pay an hourly cost for child care with a fee determined by a sliding scale provided by the State Department of Education.

Center Hours: 7:45 a.m. to 4:15 a.m.

Services offered: morning and afternoon snacks, lunch, rest time, toileting, outdoor physical activities, and a variety of educational and creative opportunities.

Course credit to parent volunteers. Soc. Sci. 51

The Center will be located at the First Congregational Church at 2000 Humboldt (the corner of Humboldt and Silva). The Church is providing, at no cost other than utilities, 3 classrooms, outdoor play area and the use of the kitchen.

To enroll children parents should fill out an Enrollment form. If the parent can be certified, a health, required services, waiver of liability, and emergency forms should be completed.

# Black studies teacher loves life . . . 'I keep my head to the sky'

When I asked a student of John Ray why she thought I should interview him, she grinned. "He's sumpin' new to me: Big and black and beautiful!"

She's right. He is. And as he came sauntering up to me, the noonday sun flashed from the diamond in his right ear lobe.

His wife, Cater Lee, and I were waiting for him in front of La Fontana Restaurant and, as we went inside, I noted what a handsome couple they are. Lee is slender, chicly at ease and seems always on the point of good natured laughter. When John was recounting some details of his life, he said, "I met Lee in 1960 and we fell in love and got married."

In mock surprise, Lee interrupted: "Oh, is that what it was?" and laughed merrily while John tried to preserve a semblance of seriousness, not letting a smile break through that was lingering on the surface.

He does that a lot; he looks as though he is laughing underneath but he is very serious on the surface. I don't think he is laughing at one — he simply seems to be brimming over with good spirits and the love of living.

"I'm gonna ride the hell out of life!" he said later. "Look at the day out there — that's happiness!"

And if some think he is arrogant and proud, he admits he is. He wants others to know his black heritage is close to his heart. "I keep my head to the sky. That's where my momma said to put it," he says.

Both Lee and John, a Black Studies teacher at Santa Rosa Junior College, think Santa Rosa is filled with prejudice.

"Atlanta (Georgia) should be here and Santa Rosa there," they said. John, who holds a Master's Degree in community organizing from the University of California, Berkeley, and helped organize the Ethnic Studies Program at SRJC, was refused a loan at a Santa Rosa bank although he and Lee and their four boys have lived here two years and he is a full time teacher.

"I was supposed to act like a nigger and I didn't," said John. "But when they refused the loan I screamed and hollered!" He tried another bank and got the same treatment until Assemblyman Barry Keene intervened with a telephone call. John was given the loan.

"What's a black researcher with a Ph.D.?" he asked. "He's only a nigger if he's trying to buy a house in a white neighborhood." He himself had difficulty finding a house to rent in Santa Rosa. Often a house would be available when the Rays telephoned, only to be told it was "unavailable" 15 minutes later when the landlord saw the color of their skin, they said.

In his Black Families class he tries to point out the unique features of the black family.

"One thing: black children have to learn the difference between being poor and being bad, and being poor and bad and being black. There are a lot of poor in America but the black child has to recognize that he is poor because he is black."

Toying with his earring (the significance of which he would not tell me) he continued: "I try to make the point that all blacks are human beings. You see, blacks have to grow up tight as a family or they don't survive . . ."

"The family must make people aware of their responsibility to self and to society . . . they must be aware of, first, their human rights as human beings, and second, their civil rights . . . It's always been my idea that to better understand the blacks, you must understand the family . . ."

John also teaches classes in Black Psychology, Black Political Perspectives and Racism. He grew up in Vallejo after his family moved from Colorado and he attended Solano Junior College and California State College, Hayward, where he earned a B.A. Degree in social science. He has worked as a psychiatric technician at Napa State Hospital, taught at California State University, Sacramento, and was administrative assistant to legislator John Dunlop in Sacramento.

He was in Oakland working for Western Community Action Training when he was asked to come to SRJC and help organize the Ethnic Studies Program. He applied for a job and served as chairman of Ethnic Studies, now in its second year.

"I like teaching because I don't believe in work! It's better to do the things you like to do and get paid for it," he said.

"I stress thinking . . . there are no pat answers . . . pat an-

swers don't work . . . I try to get my students to question things, to get the facts, not opinions — there's a big difference between opinion and fact . . .

"No, I don't lecture — Oh, God, no — my opinion is they have things to say . . . In fact, no talker, no grade!"

Lee is an instructional aid at Lincoln Elementary School and is co-chairman of the Parent Advisory Group in compensatory education (ESEA—Elementary and Secondary Educational Act, Title I) and along with John, feels she must teach

their boys an awareness of their black ancestry.

She herself was discriminated against when she was growing up in Louisiana, but her grandmother, who has a lot of spirit, influenced Lee. "She waited on the whites, but when they delivered things to her, she made 'em go to the back door," Lee chuckled.

"She and my aunt and first cousin were in the television special, The Autobiography of Miss Jane Pittman. Yes, they were in the church scene."

She sipped her glass of white

wine, her expressive almond eyes dancing.

"The other day a girl at school called my son a nigger. So he socked her. When he told me about it he said, 'Nobody is gonna call me names. I am somebody.'"

John had taken off his earring and was readjusting it. He was eyeing a pretty girl who had walked in. Some of the people at the tables around us looked at us curiously.

Then John talked about the need for education "in the streets" to combat racism.

"There are still folks here who care enough," he said. "There's lots of talent in Santa Rosa." And he told me how he organized a program for "pen pals" to write prisoners in jail.

I asked what he meant by "education in the streets."

"My business is people," he replied. "Droppin' in on a guy's house. If somebody's in jail, go and see him . . ."

He put his earring back in his ear. "I try to teach my students that what counts is what is, not what it ought to be. One of the

big things is to get away from simplistic answers. For instance, I asked them 'How are you going to get along?' They answered, 'We'll love each other.'"

John frowned, looking fierce. "What's love? Do they know what love really means? I try to point out different alternatives and make them think."

When I told my student friend that I was going to interview John Ray, she was enthusiastic. "I went by his class and I could hear him yelling," she said happily.

# CSA Notes

## Club Problems

After almost an hour of discussion, the College Student Assembly voted last Monday to appropriate an additional \$350 to the Ethnic Department and Black Students Union. The money is to be used for Black Culture Week, which is this week, March 18-22.

The BSU made the request for the money after finding that what they thought was a \$500 appropriation to them was actually only \$249. \$100 has already been spent on films, while \$300, coming from the Arts and Lectures Fund, has been spent for an African dance presentation.

Many CSA members voiced a fear that if the BSU's request was granted, this would set a precedent for other clubs or organizations to come in and ask for additional funds.

It was then pointed out that the Drug Awareness and Conference fund has a near \$1000 surplus. At this a motion was made to grant \$350 from this fund to the BSU. The motion was approved, officially allocating the extra \$350 to the Ethnic Department and the BSU for Black Culture Week.

It was generally felt among the assembly that any problem of precedent-setting would be dealt with when and if that situation arises.

In other action, the CSA:

ICC Report: was told by the ICC representative to the CSA that ICC will be deciding what to do with seven clubs which have continually failed to participate in the Inter-Club Council. It was reported that

ICC is leaning toward dropping these clubs from the campus club roster, and thereby from campus support.

One of the seven clubs is the Black Students Union. How this matter might affect monetary appropriations to these clubs was not discussed.

Kent Hall: was told that Kent Hall is now officially coed. A coed experiment had been made involving four rooms housing women, and evidently the Board of Trustees was satisfied with the results of the experiment. Total transition to a coed situation has been approved. Rentals at Kent Hall are on a first-come, first-serve basis.

Campus Police: Praised the campus law enforcement police for their fine work, and for their aid in keeping a low vandalism and burglary rate on campus. Also voted to send a letter of commendation to the force for its part in aiding city police in the arrest of a burglar who has been operating on the campus and in the surrounding neighborhoods.

Teacher Evaluations: heard a report that communication is now going on with the teachers, and that evaluation will start right after April 1.

College Hearing Board: Voted to appoint Candy Tarske to the College Hearing Board. This is the board, composed of administration, faculty, and two students, which handles campus violations which are neither of a civil nor a criminal nature. The ASB President is automatically a member of the board.

## ICC Drops Support For 4 Clubs

The Inter Club Council (ICC), governing body for all officially sanctioned campus clubs, took action against three clubs Tuesday for failure to properly represent themselves at ICC meetings.

ICC voted at their regularly scheduled meetings this week, to remove the following clubs from the list of official campus organizations: NSA, Black Student Union, Ski Club, and Native American.

The clubs were banished for failure to send a representative to ICC meetings.

### ATTEMPTS

It was noted by ICC head Cheryl Matteri, that repeated attempts, including announcements in the Bear Facts, were made to contact the leaders of the removed clubs.

The ICC action will result in the dropping of support from the ASB and the clubs "official" title. At press time word was not available regarding this year's findings.

The move will not, however, affect the funding of Black Culture Week.

Funds for the event were appropriated jointly to the Ethnic Studies program and the BSU.

## Campus Issues

It's interesting to note that a couple of familiar discussion topics of campus interest resurfaced at a recent CSA meeting. It's reassuring to know that the early semester schedule plan and smoking regulations are still being kicked around by the school's legislative body.

Regarding the former it seems that the plan intending to make the SRJC school year more closely resemble those of universities and state colleges has still not been adopted for this institution.

### A MORE SENSIBLE SCHEDULE

The early semester plan is obviously more workable, efficient and more sensible than the current high school type set up. The fall semester would begin the final week in August and the spring semester would conclude in the latter part of May, enabling an earlier vacation for students and a better chance to land limited summer jobs.

More significantly it would eliminate that academically worthless school period between Christmas vacation and final exams by pushing the rigors of finals out of the way before the holiday break.

Actually it's a mystery as to why this proposal, which has been floating around the administration halls more than a few semesters, has not been accepted as a marked improvement over the current schedule. One thing is certain, it's not the students who are voicing the strongest objections to the early semester plan. On the contrary, in the number of polls taken to date, students have overwhelmingly favored the new schedule. So by simple deduction one would have to conclude that a large portion of the faculty and the administration are opposing it.

CSA is considering taking another poll but for this student the early schedule plan will never be a reality since it has been stalled four too many semesters already.

### A SMOKELESS DEN

The other issued pursued by CSA, smoking in the Coop, has proved a slightly more scalable barrier. Thanks mainly to the efforts of CSA President Donna Courtney a petition banning smoking was passed around and as a result the Bear's Den has been declared a smokeless region from 8 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.

Obviously if you are allergic to cigarette smoke or just get sick to your stomach upon inhaling the toxic fumes the cafeteria is not the place for you. It seems strange that smokers have top priority in the Coop but anyone wishing to eat in non-stagnant air must ultimately retreat to the lawns across from Pioneer Hall.

### SMOKEE BEWARE

A study printed in the Journal of the American Medical Association a couple of years back described the smoke from an idling cigarette as containing almost twice the tar and nicotine of smoke inhaled while puffing on a cigarette.

Thus it seems reasonable to imply that smoke from an idling cigarette may be twice as poisonous as smoke inhaled by the smoker. The report also mentioned that "although the concentration of harmful substances inhaled by the non-smoker is less than the concentration inhaled by the smoker, the non-smoker's exposure will be for a greater period of time." Smoking is not only hazardous to the smoker's health but to the smokee's as well.

A non-smoking ban in the Bears Den may be viewed by some as only a compromise but it's progress in the right direction, away from air pollution.

## STUDENT FILM PROJECT GUIDELINES

1. The Film Project Committee will consist of the Executive Vice President of the Associated Students and four members appointed by him and approved by C.S.A. Two appointed members and the chairman will constitute a quorum.
2. A film project may not exceed \$50.00. However, a film project which shows exceptional promise may be granted additional assistance.
3. Members of C.S.A. and/or members of the Film Project Committee may not apply for assistance under this program.
4. Applications for assistance will be made through the Student Activities Office. Forms will be provided for this. Each application will include a detailed description of the proposed project, a detailed budget breakdown, and a short personal resume about the applicant.
5. Students must have a faculty advisor to assist them with the project.
6. All financial matters pertaining to student film projects will be handled through the Student Activities Office.
7. All student film projects must be completed by Dead Week of the semester of the application, unless an extension is granted by the Film Project Committee.
8. Film project recipients will be required to meet periodically with the Film Project Committee.
9. Not more than one-half of all funds allocated to Student Film Projects will be spent in the fall semester.
10. At the discretion of the Film Project Committee certain items of equipment purchased with Student Film Project funds will be required to be returned to the Associated Students.
11. A student receiving Student Film Project assistance must be a current member of the Santa Rosa Junior College Associated Students.
12. Student Film Projects not meeting the requirements of the committee will not be considered. The committee is not obligated to disperse all monies.
13. A Student Film Project Applicant is required to be interviewed by the Film Project Committee before the project is approved.

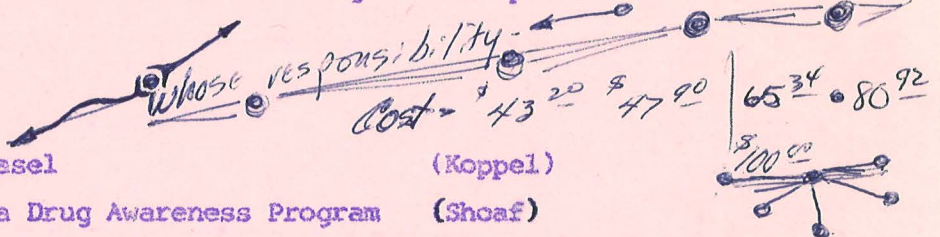

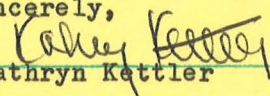

Dear Mr Canevari,

I want to take a moment to express my appreciation of the child care center whose service are funded, in part, by the ~~college~~ <sup>Associated Students</sup> and by the school district. My daughter has been coming to the center since I enrolled at the college this spring and it has been a fine experience for both of us. The staff (and especially her teacher Helen) have made the center a convenience not just for me, but for my daughter who is thoroughly enjoying her first experience with other kids, with painting, climbing and socializing with her first friends. I should correct myself in calling the center a "convenience" to me: without it I should not be enrolled in school at all. But the center is convenient in the sense that it is near the college, meals are more nutritional than they are at home, the staff is warm and supportive of parents and children alike, and the required parent participation has been a great pleasure for me.

It worries me that because money is so scarce in so many quarters, the services that the center provides will be cut back, or even dropped. At registration time, I was told that there was a good chance that Rose would not be able to attend the center because so many need its services. If the center were to be dropped for lack of funding it would be a great misfortune to students who are parents and their children too. All the parents I have met at the center are in school to provide a better living for themselves and their children; most of us work to make ends meet while we are attending school and most (at least in the Infant Room) are looking after their children on their own. Losing the excellent care and service that the center provides would mean leaving school for me and I am most likely not alone. I can not afford private child care or nurseries and the care at the center is more than the equal of private ones. I should like to urge you to press for continuance of the child care center for the college; it is a vital and excellent service for those of us fortunate enough to send our children there....

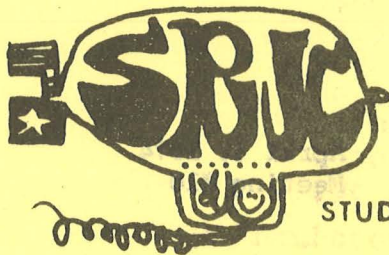

(Art. IX, Sect. 1, Con't.)

D. Ratification of an amendment shall require two-thirds of all votes cast at a special or regular election.

(1) Copies of proposed amendment(s) must be made available to all registered students at least one week prior to being voted upon.

SECTION 2. A code shall be designated as an area of activity deemed necessary to perpetuate and comply with the purposes of this Constitution. It shall contain only ratified statutes.

A. All codes shall be separate from but subordinate to this Constitution.

B. The establishment of a code shall require a simple majority vote of the College Student Assembly.

SECTION 3. A statute shall be that specific regulation or function deemed necessary to expedite and perpetuate the purposes and functions contained within this Constitution and included within the scope of a Code title.

A. No statute may be in conflict with an article or section of this Constitution.

B. No statute may violate a superior regulation or code.

C. A statute may be enacted by the approval of a simple majority of the total voting membership of the College Student Assembly.

D. All statutes shall be binding upon the students of Santa Rosa Junior College.

E. Proposed statutes shall be voided by petition if such petition is signed by a simple majority of the Associated Students voting in the last general election and submitted to the College Student Assembly prior to the Adoption.

#### ARTICLE X -- ENABLING CLAUSE

This Constitution shall become effective when approved by a simple

BRIEF EXPLANATION OF S.R.J.C. - ASSOCIATED STUDENTS' BUDGET

- AGGIE JUDGING TEAM - pays for food and lodging for the team.
- ART AWARDS - provides purchase awards for the student art show.
- ARTS & LECTURES - shares with the District the funding of Mid-Day Series programs, Open Forum presentations and Sunday Night Movies.
- ASSEMBLIES - pays for noon band concerts, mini-film series and other special entertainment.
- BAND - pays for some travel expense and uniform care.
- BASEBALL - pays for food and lodging for athletes and for home game officials. SRJC Student Card holders admitted to all home games free. Associated Students receive income from football and basketball game receipts. Conference rules require that all athletes belong to the Associated Students.
- BASKETBALL - Men's Inter-Collegiate: (see Baseball)
- BASKETBALL - WOMEN'S INTER-COLLEGIATE: (see Baseball)
- CHILD DAY CARE CENTER - shares with the District the funding of local shares of the operation of a Child Care Center.
- CONCESSIONS - income from concessions at Bailey Field.
- CONFERENCE FEES - fees charged by Inter-Collegiate Athletic Conference. Conference rules require that all athletes belong to the Associated Students.
- CROSS COUNTRY - Inter-Collegiate: (see Baseball - Intercollegiate, above)
- EQUIPMENT REPAIR - Associated Students own some 20 pieces of equipment: Typewriters, adding machine, tape recorders, cameras, etc.
- EXECUTIVE CABINET - pays expenses of the Executive Cabinet of C.S.A.
- FIRST LEAVES - pays one-half of the cost of publishing First Leaves (Student literary magazine) One-half of copies free to student card holders, while they last.

## Bear's Den Lounge Is Abandoned

Remodeling part of the Bear's Den as a student lounge is temporarily down the drain it was discovered this week.

In discussions held last summer, it was originally hoped the old book store at the Doyle Student Center would be used for this purpose. However, the student lounge lost out to the Art Department whose need for space was more critical. The Women's Center and Career Center were next in priority.

The only place left was the Bear's Den. Or, more specifically, half the Bear's Den.

Last fall, proposals for money were made to the CSA and the Board of Trustees. Both approved the sum of \$10,000 to redecorate the Bear's Den as a student lounge.

Then came the snag! The CSA committee wanted a permanent divider while the district wanted a movable divider so the whole room could also be used for other purposes.

Meanwhile, the cafeteria was taken over by new management. They didn't want any divider because they feared loss of sales which might leave them operating in the red.

Since no agreement could be reached the project has been temporarily abandoned. Meanwhile the money is still sitting in the Frozen Reserve awaiting future developments.

Eugene Canevari, Student Advisor, commented, "The more I looked at it and thought of half the space, the less it looked like a very workable idea as a lounge anyway."

He hopes when the new science wing is built they'll be able to get the old book store. He envisions using the patio area as an eating space. And possibly glassing in the west end of Doyle Center and utilizing space heaters out there for year-round use.

## **SRJC coed gains Lions scholarship**

Christina Medosch is the recipient of a \$600 scholarship presented at Santa Rosa Junior College annually by the Montgomery Village Lions Club to a graduating sophomore.

Majoring in bio-chemistry, Christina will continue her education at the University of California, Santa Cruz and Berkeley campuses.

Active in student government affairs at SRJC, as well as the Social Advocates for Youth program, she was selected from five candidates on the basis of her leadership abilities, contributions to society, and her scholastic record. 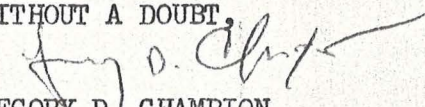

## ARTICLE V -- EXECUTIVE CABINET

Decisions voted upon under these conditions are subject to being over-ruled by a two-thirds vote of the College Student Assembly.

## ARTICLE VI -- INTER-CLUB COUNCIL

SECTION 1. The Inter-Club Council shall be composed of the Associated Student Vice President as chairman and one representative from each official Associated Student club or association.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Inter-Club Council to comply with the Inter-Club Council Code.

SECTION 3. No actions of the Inter-Club Council shall be in conflict with rules, regulations or policies of the College Student Assembly.

## 1948 SRJC student body chief running again in SR

By PETE GOLIS

Jerome Waldie walked by the scene of one of his earliest campaign successes yesterday and talked about his more recent political activities.

The 1948 student body president at Santa Rosa Junior College insisted he still has an excellent chance to win the Democratic nomination for Governor, and predicted the House would agree with his resolution to impeach President Nixon.

Waldie, who has walked a good portion of California in his gubernatorial campaign, made tracks yesterday along Mendocino Avenue and Steele Lane.

He was joined by a small band of sign-carrying supporters.

The candidate waved at passing cars and greeted other pedestrians during the brisk hour and 15 minute walk. Earlier he walked through Petaluma.

Waldie, a member of the House Judiciary Committee hearing impeachment charges,

predicted the Committee will approve the impeachment resolution by a "substantial majority" and the full House will agree.

Whether the Senate convicts the President will depend on the mood of the country and the size of the House majority, he said.

A bearded man, between bites on a taco, said he thought the Congress should "get on with it."

"Everybody except the President agrees," said the Contra Costa Congressman. "The President just hasn't ever cooperated."

"Do you know something we do not know?" wondered a woman.

"No," Waldie said. Testimony taken in closed committee sessions had been heard before or has since been leaked to the press.

Waldie said there's a "good chance" the committee will agree with his view that hear-

ings should be open, now that the White House has also called for open meetings.

"My own view is that we ought not to do anything of this nature behind closed doors," he told questioners.

Waldie said he doesn't want the President to resign.

He called "nonsense" the view Congressmen should remain silent on impeachment until a formal presentation of the evidence.

He said he would vote impeachment unless the President produces substantial new evidence in his defense.

Waldie also said polls showing him fifth among Democratic gubernatorial candidates are wrong.

There is apathy, and most Democratic voters still haven't decided, he said.

The race, he said, will be decided in the last ten days.

Waldie was joined by his wife. The couple met while they were students at the junior college.

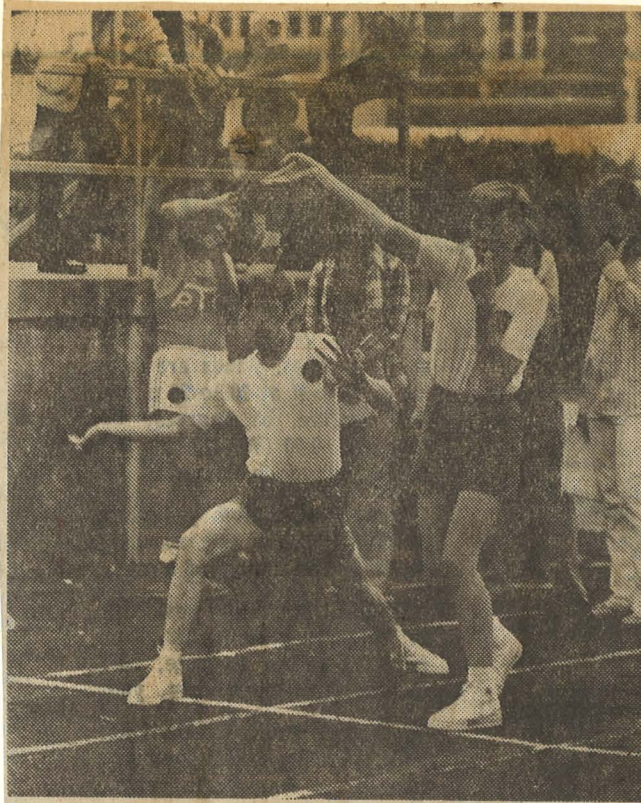

**ELDRIDGE** — More than 400 mentally retarded and developmentally disabled persons from Sonoma and Napa counties participated in the fourth annual Special Olympics.

Congressman Don Clausen, R-Crescent City, and Sonoma Mayor Henry Riboni were

among the more than 2,000 spectators at the day-long athletic competition at Santa Rosa Junior College.

Participants who qualified in the events last Saturday will go on to the state Special Olympics at the University of California, Los Angeles, June 26 to 28. A total of 32 residents of Sonoma State Hospital qualified, and will attend the meet in Los Angeles, if there are enough funds available.

The Special Olympics were originated from a grant by the Kennedy Foundation almost 10 years ago. The goal of the program is the creation of year around sports training and athletic competition to help the retarded person gain self-confidence, and develop a more positive self image.

Over the years the program has expanded so that physically disabled and mentally retarded persons can also participate. The events at the meet included races for those in wheel chairs, walking aids, and a 50-yard dash which included competitors who were nearly totally blind.

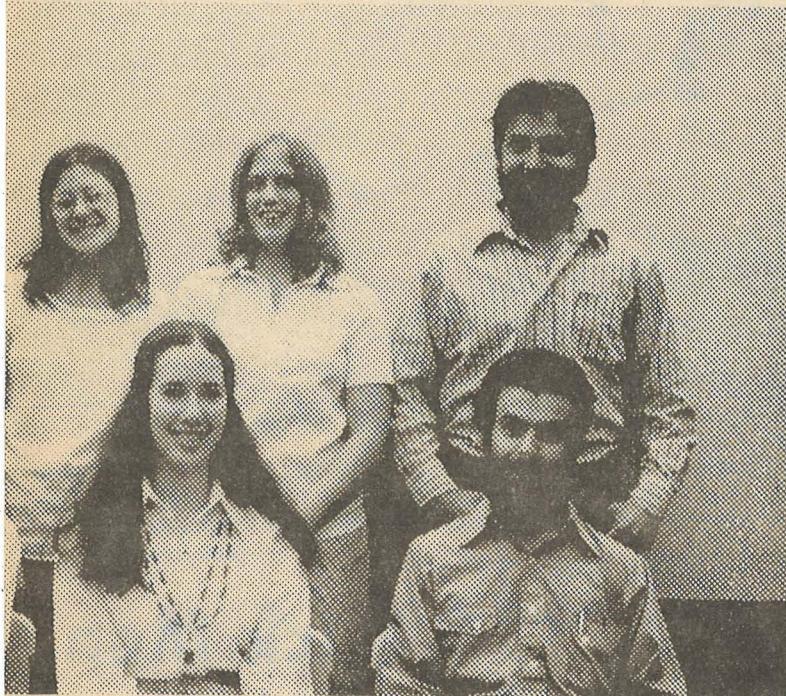

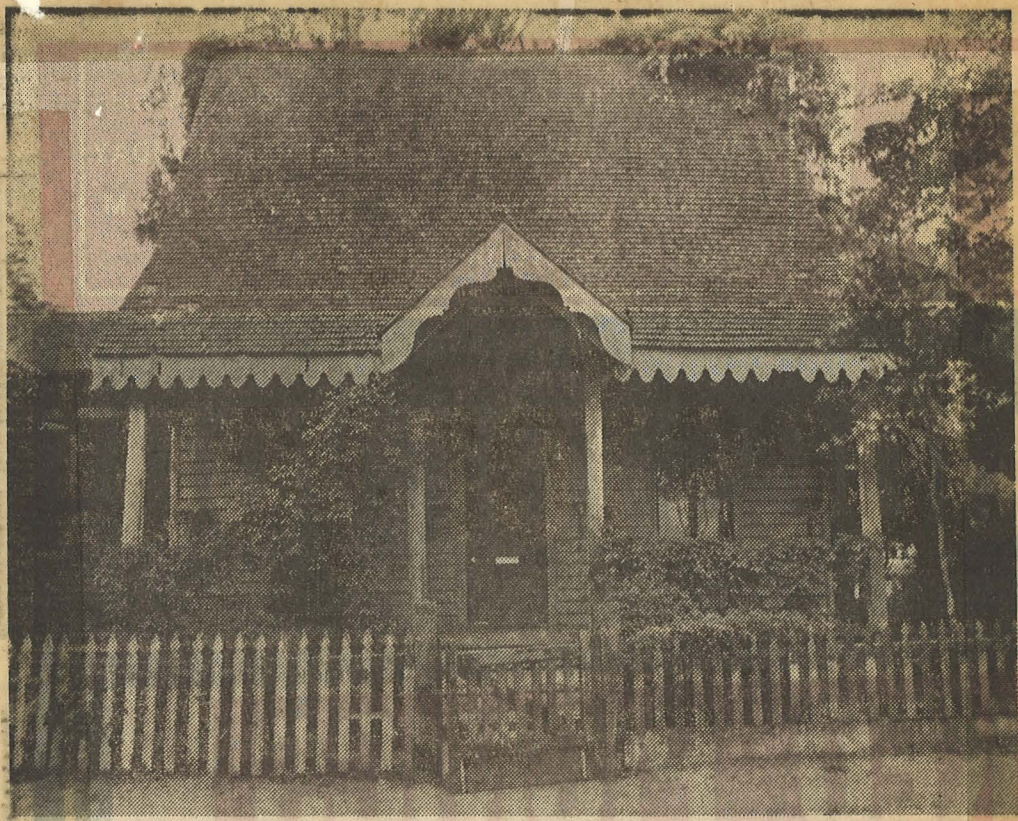


**GREGORY CHAMPION**

## 1948 SRJC student body chief running again in SR

Jerome Waldie walked by the scene of one of his earliest campaign successes yesterday and talked about his more recent political activities.

The 1948 student body president at Santa Rosa Junior College insisted he still has an excellent chance to win the Democratic nomination for Governor, and predicted the House would agree with his resolution to impeach President Nixon.

Waldie, who has walked a good portion of California in his gubernatorial campaign, made tracks yesterday along Mendocino Avenue and Steele Lane.

He was joined by a small band of sign-carrying supporters.

The candidate waved at passing cars and greeted other pedestrians during the brisk hour and 15 minute walk. Earlier he walked through Petaluma.

Waldie, a member of the House Judiciary Committee hearing impeachment charges,

predicted the Committee will approve the impeachment resolution by a "substantial majority" and the full House will agree.

Whether the Senate convicts the President will depend on the mood of the country and the size of the House majority, he said.

A bearded man, between bites on a taco, said he thought the Congress should "get on with it."

"Everybody except the President agrees," said the Contra Costa Congressman. "The President just hasn't ever cooperated."

"Do you know something we do not know?" wondered a woman.

"No," Waldie said. Testimony taken in closed committee sessions had been heard before or has since been leaked to the press.

Waldie said there's a "good chance" the committee will agree with his view that hear-

ings should be open, now that the White House has also called for open meetings.

"My own view is that we ought not to do anything of this nature behind closed doors," he told questioners.

Waldie said he doesn't want the President to resign.

He called "n o n s e n s e" the view Congressmen should remain silent on impeachment until a formal presentation of the evidence.

He said he would vote impeachment unless the President produces substantial new evidence in his defense.

Waldie also said polls showing him fifth among Democratic gubernatorial candidates are wrong.

There is apathy, and most Democratic voters still haven't decided, he said.

The race, he said, will be decided in the last ten days.

Waldie was joined by his wife. The couple met while they were students at the junior college.

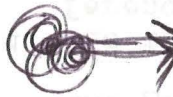

## Staff Comment

The present controversy over the Elections article which appeared in The Oak Leaf is one which merits some contemplation. On one side there is student government, complaining of irresponsibility and poor journalism on the part of The Oak Leaf, and on the other side is The Oak Leaf, professing freedom of expression, and of the press. After a careful look at the situation it would seem that both sides are somewhat right and wrong.

First of all, the College Student Assembly is justified in its attack on Mike Kelly's article pertaining to the elections, in that as a NEWS STORY the article should have been totally objective. Though it is sometimes a difficult thing to do, the journalist is constantly admonished to write objectively.

On the other hand, however, a newspaper has the constitutionally guaranteed right to comment on, opinionize, and/or editorialize any topic it wishes to. Granted, if Mr. Kelly wished to reflect the campus' sense of apathy and unconcern for the elections and for student government as a whole, then it should have been done on the editorial page. The fact remains, though, that once an individual goes public, be it as a movie star or a politician, he is open to the opinions and characterizations, short of libel, of the various media. Herein lies one of the consequences of a free press.

\* \* \* \*

Yet there is another, possibly more serious problem implied in this controversy, and one which I feel should be laid out in the open.

The CSA spent more than an hour Monday discussing the Elections article, and much of that time was dedicated to criticizing The Oak Leaf, both for its lack of good, interesting news reporting, and for its poor writers. Though some attempt was made to commend certain aspects of the campus weekly, for the most part the discussion was vindictive and disparaging. Then looking at the Elections article itself, we see a sarcastic attempt to portray student government as a pointless joke. What is wrong here?

Basically, we are presented with two groups which know little about each other, and which both suffer from a very grave problem—apathy. Being a writer for the Oak Leaf, and a weekly observer of student government, I can attest to this. I have seen student officers come and go, and calls to the campus public for aid and volunteer work go unheeded. In all the CSA meetings I have attended, there have been very few visitors. Really, one starts to wonder who these people are serving. Yet I have seen a surprising degree of receptivity and willingness to work on the part of student officers. And though its actions may have no universal significance, when one considers that the CSA has control of ASB funds, and has a hand in the hiring of teachers, one realizes that it is not a farce.

Then, in the case of The Oak Leaf, we have a campus newspaper which is understaffed because, just as with student government, there are not enough students who wish to spend as much time as is necessary to be even a passable writer. It takes time to get the information for a story, write, edit, and type it up, lay out pages, write the headlines, and so on. As a result of minimal student interest, the campus gets a small weekly paper, sometimes not so well laid out, often not thorough, which is open to criticism. Yet the student newspaper is a very important organ, and in many ways The Oak Leaf is doing its job well.

It seems clear to me that our student government and the student newspaper should not be at odds with each other. Rather they should work, both separately and collectively, to surmount their common plight, apathy.

## Election Story Stirs Anger Within CSA

At its regular Monday meeting the College Student Assembly came very close to declaring an all-out war on The Oak Leaf. The cause of all the commotion was an article, written by Feature Editor Mike Kelly, pertaining to this week's ASB elections. The article, which appeared in last week's Oak Leaf, included several subjective statements about the candidates, and was generally written in a sarcastic tone.

The Assembly took immediate offense to the weekly newspaper's lack of concern not only for student government, but for what many of the Assembly members referred to as "journalism principles." Several individuals voiced the opinion that the article was actually an attack on and a threat to the CSA, since it could not help but discourage voter-turn-out in an election admittedly marred by apathy.

### POSSIBLE STEPS

The good full hour of discussion on possible steps to take in this situation started with Mark Sobel moving that the article be given a "pot shot" award. Mr. Canevari, Student Activities Advisor, quickly responded that he saw a "pot shot" award as "too high on honor." At this, Craig Paul, who as Elections Commissioner had charge of this week's election, told of his encounter with the Oak Leaf Editor Rich Rupprecht, and Faculty Advisor Ted Hawkins, where he was told that the article had been retained because it was seen as a "learning experience" for the writer. Mr. Paul then stated that he definitely wished for something to be done with more serious implications than a joke award. He moved that Mike Kelly, Rich Rupprecht, and Mr. Ted Hawkins be reprimanded for their inadequate work regarding the Elections article.

From here the discussion gave way to a host of amendments to motions and just straight opinions, which went so far as to suggest that the CSA strike \$1000 from the Oak Leaf's '74 budget. Many assembly members felt that if such an article was allowed to be published, then journalism was not being properly taught. In response to this, however, the point was made that Mr. Kelly had editorialized in his news story, and thus his article was on the wrong page—not on the editorial page.

### FINAL DECISION

When a final motion was approved, the CSA had voted that Mike Kelly, Rich Rupprecht, and Ted Hawkins be reprimanded for the Elections article, and had directed the Corresponding secretary to write a letter to the Oak Leaf "demanding" that Mike Kelly retract his statements ridiculing the candidates.

In other action, the CSA:

Candidates: voted to allow undeclared Sophomore Rep. candidates Janis Glatzer and Gayle Feldman each a spot on the Wednesday ballot. According to the constitution, the CSA has the right to approve candidates for office after deadlines, in the event that there is no, or one sole candidate for a particular seat. It was made clear that such a move in no way constitutes a recommendation.

Bus Stop: passed unanimously a request to the Maintenance Dept. that some sort of shelter be built at the Mendocino Avenue bus stop, provided that there is adequate security. The need for security was stressed, since there had been cases of women being attacked in other similar structures.
