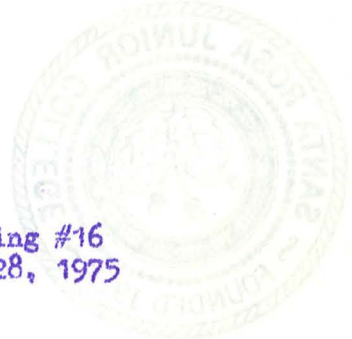

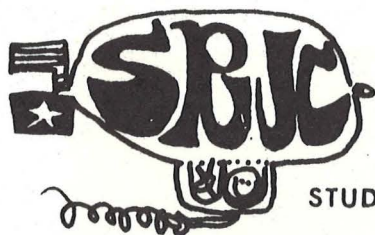
- 3) Approval of the Working Drawings -- Building Remodeling, Los Guilucos

# Faculty changes announced

A number of faculty additions and changes have been announced for the Fall semester at Santa Rosa Junior College, with more than 25 new people expected to be on hand for the opening of school on Sept. 10.

The total includes replacements for retirees and those who have resigned, additions in several areas, and sabbatical leave replacements who will be at the college either for a semester or an entire school year. In addition, there have also been several transfers, with several staff members assuming new positions at the college.

At the administrative level, there are no staff additions, but two persons already at SRJC have new assignments.

Ernest Martinez, who has been coordinator of the educational opportunity program for the past several years, has been designated Coordinator of Special Education. In his new role, Martinez will oversee EOP, COIL (The Center for Independent Learning), educational development programs and the growing program for the physically handicapped at the college.

Leaving the business education department to become Assistant Dean of Adult and Continuing Education is Jim Churchill, who is replacing Dr. Joseph Gerber. In his new role, Churchill will be in charge of off-campus classes and the various community service programs offered by the college. Gerber resigned the position to become a full-time psychology instructor at the college.

Ron Schuelke, who has been employed by Bank of America as an agricultural economist, will divide his duties between Economics and agri-business courses. Holding his Masters degree from the University of California, Davis, Schuelke is also a graduate of California State College, Sonoma. He previously served as a sabbatical leave replacement at SRJC.

An addition to the art department is Will Collier, who previously taught part-time for the college. A Berkeley resident, he is a graduate of the University of California and a practicing artist who has taught at a number of institutions. At SRJC, he will teach painting and drawing, including classes at the Petaluma Center.

Joining the art department for a year as a sabbatical leave replacement for Jim Rosen is Kathryn Misch, who will teach art history. A PhD candidate at Berkeley, she previously taught evening courses at SRJC and served for one year as docent coordinator at the Oakland museum.

Joining the chemistry department as a staff addition is Anthony Taylor, who has previously served as a sabbatical leave replacement at SRJC. He holds his Masters degree in chemistry from the University of Utah and has four years experience as a teaching assistant.

Coming to SRJC from Chaffey College, Frank Gleason will be a new member of the life sciences department. His background includes two years of research work. He also holds a PhD from the University of California, Berkeley.

Kenneth Christensen, who previously was a faculty member at SRJC, is returning to the electronics program as a full-time instructor. He also taught at Ventura College and was employed as a research specialist in the electronics industry. He is a graduate of the San Jose State University and the University of California, Berkeley.

Replacing Lagressa Cross as a full-time instructor in the ethnic studies area is John Henry, who was a 60 per cent staffer in the department during the Spring semester. Henry holds his Juris Doctor degree from Boalt Hall at the University of California and has been a member of the Berkeley City Art Commission. In addition to teaching, he also owns a small publishing firm in Berkeley.

Joining ethnic studies on a part-time basis is Allen Wilson, also a Berkeley resident and a graduate of Boalt Hall. Wilson also holds a master of Public Administration degree from California State University, Hayward, and previously taught at community colleges in the east bay.

Elizabeth Avakian will be a new instructor in the learning skills development program. She previously taught English at SRJC and language arts for five years at Berkeley High School. She was a sabbatical replacement at SRJC during the Spring semester. Avakian holds her Masters degree in English from California State College, Sonoma.

Becoming a full-time photography instructor is John LeBaron, who has been employed in a dual capacity at SRJC since 1968, serving as photography instructor in the evening program and as part-time Public Information Officer. LeBaron has some 20 years experience as a professional photographer and is currently completing degree work through the external degree program at California State College, Sonoma. In his new capacity, he will instruct expanded photography classes in the day program.

Replacing LeBaron will be Michael N. Kilpatrick, who will become full-time Public Information Officer at the college. A graduate of the University of California, Davis, where he majored in Rhetoric and Public Administration, Kilpatrick has been employed for the past three years as the Research and Information Technician for the Chico Unified School District. He also previously served in a PIO capacity in the United States Army. Married, Kilpatrick will assume his duties at SRJC on Sept. 3.

A new full-time counselor, assigned to the Evening College, is Noel Adams, coming to SRJC from a counseling position at Sauk Valley College, Dixon, Illinois. Adams has 15 years counseling experience, including nine years at the community college level.

Replacing Ted Hawkins, who retired as journalism instructor, is Catherine Mitchell. A Pt. Reyes Station resident, Mrs. Mitchell holds a journalism degree from Stanford University, has six years experience as a working journalist, and has taught part-time at Columbia Junior College. Locally, she was assistant editor of the Sebastopol Times for several years, while her husband, David, was editor. The Mitchells recently purchased the Pt. Reyes Light, a weekly newspaper published in Pt. Reyes Station.

Among sabbatical leave replacements are Norman Shinkle, who will spend a year on campus as a physics instructor; and Kathryn Werner, who will temporarily replace Harvey Hansen in the history department. Shinkle, presently assistant professor of physics at Sam Houston State University, Huntsville, Texas, will replace Wesley Kendall during the Fall semester and Sally Heath in the Spring. Werner, who will be at SRJC for the Fall semester, previously taught at San Francisco State University, the College of Notre Dame and San Francisco City College.

Julie Enochs will assume a part-time position in the child development program, coming to the college with five years experience in kindergarten and primary teaching. She was graduated from SRJC and the

University of California, Davis.

Matha Gunter, who previously taught at SRJC part-time, will be a sabbatical leave replacement in the business education department. Also joining the department as leave and sabbatical replacements on a part-time basis are Antoninette Cannizzaro and Hilda Hazelwood.

Other part-time additions for the coming year include William Sonnenschein, speech; Patricia Finnegan, counseling; Doreen Fisher and Leigh McCarthy, mathematics; Marvel Gardner, music; and Majorie Grossman, library.

Joining the faculty for a year under a special federally funded training program for Licensed Vocational Nurses are Cecilia Estrada and Patricia Gonzalez. Estrada, a graduate of the nursing program at California State College, Sonoma, will be the nursing instructor in the program. 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EDUCATIONAL DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMPLANNING PROPOSAL

I. In Sonoma County today there are no public service or self-help programs which, on an on-going basis, directly and specifically addresses the concerns of black youth and young adults, low-income or otherwise. Community Baptist Church at this time serves as the only source of direction for black youth in this area. Pilipino Community Center, Ya-Ka-Ama, and Alianza del Pueblo provides needed assistance to youth of other ethnic minorities. The YWCA, Boy's Club, Scouts, public recreation centers, etc., service the needs of majority white youth, and only a miniscule number of blacks participate in these programs.

Even considering that some, perhaps many, of the programs have been successful in achieving their goals, the fact remains that some of the most basic problems that confront large segments of Sonoma County's black youth population simply cannot be solved within the framework of existing programs. An approach geared to the concerns of black youth is needed.

II. The planning phase of this Educational Development Program will survey and analyze the black environment of Sonoma County. The results of the survey and analysis will be arranged into a "General Plan for Sonoma County Black Youth and Young Adults" and will incorporate the inputs of black youth and other concerned persons into projects and activities to begin in October of 1975. Actual implementation of the proposed "Plan" will be the responsibility of a group formed for that purpose at a later time.

This planning phase proposal assumes that the major problems of black youth in Sonoma County remain unchanged - that these problems are primarily economic and educational. Thus, the hypothesis upon which study and

- ✓ #6. Hospital and Insurance \$4000.00  
*Approved 6/23*  
During the last two years the insurance claims have exceeded the premium we have paid. The quality of our insurance program's coverage has been great. Do to the fact that we have run in the red with the insurance company we will be forced to pay a higher premium for an insurance policy that isn't as attractive as our former policy. We are obligated to pay the bills for injuries to intercollegiate athletes of SRJC. This figure would pay for any bills that our new program doesn't cover and for some of the increase in premium.



- #7 Discount Program \$500.00  
This item would provide for a work study student (or students) to work during the summer in personally contacting merchants for discounts. In addition, this item could partially defray the cost of printing the discount booklets for one semester.
- #8 Student Film Print \$150.00  
Mr. John Bigby of the Speech Department requested this item. For several years the ASB has been assisting in the creation of a library of films produced by SRJC students. There is currently one outstanding student film of which we do not have a print.

EXCERPT FROM MINUTES OF SENATE MEETING OF JUNE 4, 1975:

Whereas, It has come to the attention of the Academic Senate that vehicles have been towed away by SRJC campus police this year for reasons other than those set forth in the SRJC Traffic and Parking Regulations originally approved by the Academic Senate and other appropriate campus bodies (recorded on page 58, 1974-75 Faculty Handbook);

And Whereas, The document distributed to students in the academic year 1974-75 under the heading "SRJC Traffic and Parking Regulations" is not in fact the set of regulations approved by the Senate and appropriate campus policy-recommendation bodies and, in particular, provides for the removal of vehicles for reasons other than those originally approved by appropriate campus bodies;

And Whereas, The administrative alteration, without Senate consultation, of campus policy originally approved by the Senate serves to further undermine faculty confidence in academic governance and the committee system;

Be It Therefore Resolved, That the Academic Senate requests the administration, through the Office of Student Personnel and Campus Police, to publish for students in the Fall 1975 semester the towaway regulations originally approved (recorded on page 58, 1974-75 Faculty Handbook) and to enforce only those specific regulations concerning towaway.

SANTA ROSA JUNIOR COLLEGE TRAFFIC & PARKING REGULATIONS - FALL 1974

REGISTRATION OF VEHICLES: All students who operate a motor vehicle on campus must be registered at the Campus Police Office. Vehicle registration cards must be completely filled out.

PURCHASE OF PARKING PERMITS AFTER REGISTRATION: Parking permits are available after registration at the Campus Police Office. Evening College parking permits will be available in Bailey Hall in the Board Room, from 6:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m. The Evening College Office in Bailey Hall will be issuing Evening College parking permits from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.

DAY PARKING PERMITS: All registered students parking a vehicle on campus between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. will pay a \$7.00 parking fee for the semester. This parking permit also entitles Evening College parking (3:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m.). Purchasers of an Associated Student Body Card are permitted to purchase a \$7.00 parking permit for \$2.00.

EVENING COLLEGE PARKING PERMITS: All registered students parking a vehicle on campus from 3:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. will pay a \$2.00 parking fee for the semester. Evening College students purchasing a \$9.00 Associated Student Body Card will be able to buy a \$7.00 day-evening parking permit for \$2.00.

VISITOR/TEMPORARY PARKING PERMITS: Permits are available at the Campus Police Office when the registered vehicle cannot be driven to the campus.

MOTORCYCLE PERMITS: All motorcycles must be registered at the Campus Police Office. The Motorcycle Compound is in Analy Lot. There is no charge for these permits at this time. If motorcycles are parked in other than the Bike Compound, they will be cited.

PROPER PARKING OF A VEHICLE: All day students may only park their vehicles in spaces designated by two white lines or markings. Evening College students may only park in spaces designated by the two white lines or markings in all parking areas except Analy Lot. Evening College students may park in Analy Lot in spaces designated by yellow or green lines or markings. White lines indicate student parking, yellow lines indicate reserved parking, and green lines indicate visitor parking. Authorized visitors to the campus can park in Analy Lot as directed by the attendant. Parking is not permitted on campus from 11:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. daily.

TOW-AWAY: Vehicles parked illegally, ~~or in red zones, or in unmarked zones, or parked~~ so as to impede the flow of traffic on the campus streets, lot entrances, and driveways, in front of fire hydrants, or in other areas where the passage of emergency vehicles might be hindered, are subject to being towed away at the owners' expense and inconvenience. ~~Unauthorized vehicles (vehicles without valid SRJC parking permits) parked on campus may also be subject to tow-away. Registered vehicles and parked on campus may be subject to tow-away if the student is found to be a repeated and delinquent violator (three or more citations) of the SRJC traffic and parking regulations. Any vehicle not properly parked between two lines or markings is out of zone and will be cited and is subject to tow-away.~~ *and vehicles*

PLACEMENT AND CARE OF PARKING PERMITS: The permit must be mounted within a seven-inch square on the inside right corner of the front windshield. The permit must be placed right side up so that the number is readable and must be adhered to the windshield with its own adhesive. PARKING PERMITS ARE NOT TRANSFERABLE. Maintain the permit in its original form, do not cut or alter the permit. Remove all invalid SRJC permits. If you sell your vehicle, you must return the valid permit to the Campus Police Office for a free replacement for your new vehicle.

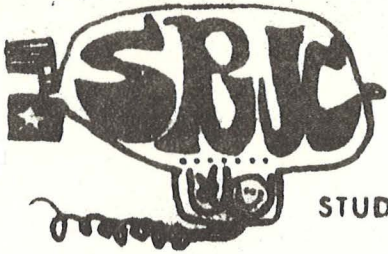

The Board of Trustees of the Sonoma County J/C District convened in regular session at 7:30 p.m. in the Board Room, Bailey Hall, with President Jacobs presiding. Members present were Trustees Race, Maggini, Haehl, Call and Button. Trustee Lounibos was absent. Also present were President Roy Mikalson, R. Maggiora, B. Tauzer, R. Nazarian, C. Belden, J. Healy, R. Hollingshead, E. Pollard, J. Thomson, A. Hankla, G. Canevari, J. Wion and P. Broderick.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

On a motion by Trustee Maggini, seconded by Trustee Haehl and carried the minutes of April 7, 15, 21 and May 5, 19 and June 2, are approved.

APPROVAL OF WARRANTS:

On a motion by Trustee Race, seconded by Trustee Call and carried, special reserve warrants #190-195 in the amount of \$107,037.07 are approved.

On a motion by Trustee Race, seconded by Trustee Call and carried, general fund warrants #4443-4679 (general operations) in the amount of \$131,177.10 and #4467-5376 (student payroll) in the amount of \$88,419.23, totaling \$219,596.33, are approved.

On a motion by Trustee Race, seconded by Trustee Call and carried, payment as specified on payroll order forms for regular and supplemental salaries for the period ending May 31, 1975, is approved in the amount of \$617,312.30.

APPROVAL OF FINAL PRELIM.  
PLANS - EARTH SCIENCES BLDG.:

On a motion by Trustee Race, seconded by Trustee Button and carried, the final preliminary plans for the Earth Sciences Building presented by Lawrence Simons & Associates are approved.



APPROVAL OF FINAL PRELIM.  
PLANS - ANALY HALL:

On a motion by Trustee Maggini, seconded by Trustee Race and carried the final preliminary plans for remodeling Analy Hall presented by John van Dyk, Architect are approved.

CORRESPONDENCE was reviewed and acknowledged as follows:

1. CSEA Salary/Research Committee request for salary adjustment of 12.1% cost of living increase for 1975-76 and recommendations of the fringe benefit committee apply to the classified staff.
2. Interim report of 1975 legislative measures sponsored by the Board of Governors.
3. Social Committee proposal the rose garden be named for Harold Moore, retired Buildings and Grounds Superintendent.
4. Letter of appreciation from the Woman's Aux. to S.C. Med. Assoc. re Special Olympics.
5. Student Affairs Committee memorandum regarding refurbishing Doyle Student Center. Larry Simons is making a study and will submit cost estimates.

REPORT & DISCUSSION:

1. Judy Sonnenschein and Judy Freeman were present on behalf of the funding proposal for the Day Care Center for 1975-76 including an increase in students from 60 to 90 and to limit parents to 25 hours per week. It was also suggested the infant program be housed in a separate location. Action was deferred on this matter to the next meeting for recommendations.
2. Evelyn Pollard and Ed Buckley reported on the conference they attended in South Carolina and visit to Developmental Studies Program in Texas.
3. Manual Skills Training request for support for 1975-76 and Workshop of the Redwoods. Rae Pivonka and Howards Moes were present in support of these programs.
4. Report on Lake County election. Dr. Mikalson reported that Konocti and Middletown voted to join the Yuba C/C District and Mendocino and Fort Bragg voted to join College of the Redwoods.



5. Report on legislation - Dr. Mikalson reported on the following bills:
- a) SB 276 Behr - was passed by the Governor and allows community colleges to lease non-field act facilities.
  - b) SB 199 is a move to limit C/C growth limit in 1975-76.  
The latest version limits each C/C to 5% in growth funds after the S.B. 6 inflation factor is included.
  - c) A.B. 465 limits ROP and Occupational Ed. programs in C/C's to 5%.
6. Revised S/L proposal for Ray Calmer.
7. 1974-75 revenue limits for C/C districts range from Marin \$1,315 to Solano \$927 - the revenue limit is frozen into SB6.
8. Analy Hall renovation and the Earth Science Buildings are on the Chancellor's priority list, however, the last information received was that the Earth Science Building was included and Analy was not. Senators Dunlap and Behr have been contacted in an attempt to have Analy included.

CONSENT ITEMS:

On a motion by Trustee Race, seconded by Trustee Maggini and carried, the following consent items are approved:

- 1) No Smoking policy in the Bears Den during the day, 7 a.m. to 5 p.m.
- 2) Approve the May, 1975 SRJC School Emergency Disaster Preparedness Plan and make it part of the official handbooks of the college.
- 3) Authorize travel expenses from District funds for Karl Smith to attend the Nat'l. Council of Math. Teachers in El Paso, February 1976 as speaker at the meeting, authorization not to exceed \$300.00
- 4) Approve the intra-budget transfer request of May 8, 1975 approving transfer of \$5,080 from the Undistributed Reserve.
- 5) Authorize the release of \$4,000 from student funds as a loan to the SRJC Day Care Center.
- 6) January 28, 1976 be added to the Spring Semester, 1976 Calendar as the beginning date for classes.



1) APPR. OF WORKING DRAWINGS-REMODELING  
AND PARKING LOT AT LOS GUILUCOS:

On a motion by Trustee Call, seconded by Trustee Haehl and carried, the working drawings for building remodeling and the parking lot at Los Guilucos presented by Felciano-Jeffries are approved to forward to O.A.C. for review.

2) APPR. TO GO TO BID - BAKER HALL  
BIOLOGY LAB:

On a motion by Trustee Race, seconded by Trustee Haehl and carried, approval to go to bid for remodeling greenhouse to a biology lab and one room to an office complex, on plans prepared by Lawrence Simons & Associates is granted pending O.A.C. approval.

3) MUSEUM BUDGET APPROVED - 1975-76:

On a motion by Trustee Maggini, seconded by Trustee Call and carried, the budget for the museum totaling \$6,300.00 is approved for 1975-76. The museum collection will be divided into separate display areas allotted to the bird collection and Indian collection in the remodeling process taking place during the summer.

4) PUBLIC RESPONSE TO MEET & CONFER  
ITEMS OF C.E.C.:

The public hearing was declared open for public response to Meet and Confer items of C.E.C. which were reviewed by Jack Healy. As there was no response from the audience, the public hearing was declared closed.

On a motion by Trustee Button, seconded by Trustee Maggini and carried, the Board's public response to C.E.C. proposals is as follows:

1. Rejection of concept of extending fringe benefits to retirees.
2. Rejection of complete prorata fringe benefits for all p/t day instructors proposing instead that p/t, day or night, continue to be eligible for medical and dental benefits if they teach a minimum of 6 hours per week and if their income from the district is their major source of income.
3. Agreed to pay an additional 8% for health insurance under present plan.
4. Agreed to continue dental insurance at increased premium.
5. Agreed to continue life and salary continuation insurance.
6. Rejection of orthodontia, optical and pharmaceutical.

A counter offer of 6% across the board to the faculty proposed 12.1 % cost of living increase continues to be a negotiable item.



AB 1821 MONTOYO BILL:

Jack Healy reported that Assemblyman Montoya has introduced AB 1821 which mandates combining Adult Continuing Ed. Coordinating Councils with Area Vocational Ed. Committees. The restructured group would be called Regional Ed. Councils and would be no smaller than a community college district.

The responsibility of the Regional Educational Council would be to review and recommend to local boards approval of occupational and adult ed. courses and programs.

As currently written AB 1821 distributes membership on the Regional Educational Councils as follows: 4 - secondary district; 3 community college and 2 - ROP.

On a motion by Trustee Call, seconded by Trustee Haehl and carried, it was agreed the Board express opposition to AB 1821 - the Montoyo Bill.

REVISION OF SABBATICAL  
LEAVE POLICY:

Recommended changes to the sabbatical leave policy for the district were reviewed in detail as proposed by a committee consisting of Marg Ling, Don Emblen and Don Freed:

1. Insertion on page 4 following sentence following the first sentence of "c", ending "in which the sabbatical leave is to be taken."  
  
"The request should set forth how the proposed study or project would enhance the individual's worth in his or her work at this college."  
  
2. Page 5, add the following sentence to be labeled "e" immediately following the last sentence of section "d".  
e.  
" Should the recipient of an approved sabbatical leave make significant changes in the proposed study or project after it has been approved by the Board, the altered proposal must be re-submitted to the Sabbatical Leave Committee who will make recommendations to the President, who will present it to the Board of Trustees."  
  
3. Change letter designations of remaining sections on pages 5 and 6, following the new section "e".  
  
4. Page 6, add the following sentence after the present section "k".

"The report should explain how the study or project has enhanced the individual's work in his or her work at this college."



On a motion by Trustee Call, seconded by Trustee Maggini, the revisions as outlined are approved as recommended.

It was agreed a survey be made of the S/L policies at other community colleges and the Board and committee meet to discuss the sabbatical leave policy in further detail based on the results of the study.

SONOMA STATE HOSPITAL  
TRAINING PROGRAM FOR M.R. PATIENTS:

There has been an Attorney General's opinion that programs for patients at State Hospitals cannot claim State reimbursement which also means there would be no local matching funds from the district. The Campbell Bill, A. B. 749 would make such reimbursement legal ; however, if the Campbell Bill or a similar bill is not passed and signed there will be no income from the present program which enrolls over 450 students.

On a motion by Trustee Race, seconded by Trustee Haehl and carried, the administration is instructed to terminate the Sonoma State Hospital program for training M.R. patients as of June 30, 1975 if no legislation is passed authorizing state reimbursement.

AGREEMENT WITH STATE DEPT.  
OF REHABILITATION FOR REMOVAL  
OF ARCHITECTURAL BARRIERS:

On a motion by Trustee Maggini, seconded by Trustee Race and carried, the president and clerk are authorized to execute an agreement with the State Dept. of Rehabilitation for the removal of architectural barriers.

CRIMINAL JUSTICE TRAINING (1975-76)  
PROGRAM - RES. OF INTENT TO CONTINUE:

On a motion by Trustee Call, seconded by Trustee Button and carried, a resolution of intent to continue development of the Northern California Training and Education System (Criminal Justice Training Program) is approved and the Clerk is authorized to execute same on behalf of the district.

PERSONNEL - CERTIFICATED:

On a motion by Trustee Button, seconded by Trustee Maggini, the following certificated changes in personnel are approved:

## **Battle for the bands; struggle for student hour**

400 students crowded around the COOP patio to catch the local rock group Starfire Express. The large crowd may have been a last hurrah for the noontime bands.

Student hour has traditionally been held Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays from 12 to 1 pm as a cultural break for the college student.

Exhibits, speakers, concerts and bands have been scheduled for this time period so students could get more out of college than units and beer bellies.

The student hour is being steadily eroded away by increasing student enrollment, however.

Brook Tauzer, Dean of Instruction, feels that this gradual erosion is

unavoidable. Tauzer points to the overall growth of the community college, over 7,000 day students, and the particular growth of occupational classes and laboratory sciences.

There are currently 34 classes scheduled for the M/W/F 12 to 1 slot. Although there is a plan to cut these back to 30 for the Spring Semester, Tauzer doesn't see any immediate relief in sight for the Student Hour.

When the new Environmental Science Building is completed, the demand for science classes is expected to be so great as to nullify the additional lab space.

Tauzer however doesn't want to see the student hour come to a

grinding halt. Working with the ASO, Tauzer is trying to hold back the number of classes scheduled during student hour, and states teachers must have a "Compelling reason to schedule at noon."

Eugene Caneverri, advisor to the ASO, admits that some classes may have to be scheduled during the student hour. Without some type of non-scheduled period during the week, the Santa Rosa Junior college would become nothing more than a "Factory."

Caneverri says that the student hour was created at JC a number of years ago, and that the need is as great now as it ever was. In the past

ten years he has had to fight for the continuation of student hour twice, and has received faculty support both times.

As more teachers move into this formerly restricted time slot, they may be reluctant to support a program that might possibly disrupt their classes.

Doug McCullum, Commissioner of Assemblies and rallies, is also fighting hard for the student hour. Citing the fact that live bands seem to be restricted for people over twenty one in this area, he doesn't feel there is a viable alternative to student hour.

Without the student hour, McCullum doesn't feel the bands will "make a damn bit of difference."

Proposed resolution supporting faculty evaluation:

"The College Student Assembly of the SRJC Associated Students supports and urges creation of a new College Committee on Faculty Evaluation, with members representing the students, faculty, and administration of SRJC, comprising at least as many student members as faculty members or administration members.

"The Committee would conduct regular annual or biannual surveys of students for the purpose of compiling and publishing faculty evaluations by students."

*Approved 9-29-75*

If this concept is supported by the Deans and the Academic Senate, as well as CSA, it will be presented to the Clearing House Committee, which has the authority to create new committees. Under these conditions, Clearing House would probably approve creation of the committee. The student members of the committee would be nominated by the Student Body President and approved by CSA.

In the past, several College Student Assemblies have wrestled with the issue of faculty evaluation. The first one was conducted in 1970. Two of the major problems were

- 1) Consistency, organization, and general competence in the conducting of the survey.
- 2) Faculty acceptance of the validity of the survey, mostly because of the questionable procedures used.

Despite these problems, a second survey was conducted in 1973. The general opinion seems to be that this survey was better than the first, although it had many of the same problems. We could try the same thing again. We would probably be able to do a better job, since we have the experience of the other two surveys to draw on.

However, doing it through a college committee would solve most of the problems, in addition to producing a better survey, at a lot less work for us. In addition, the survey would be conducted in substantially the same way year after year, making the results much more useful for comparison.

If this year is like other years, there is considerable support for this idea among the general student body. In the administration, Dean Tauzer and President Mikalson have already expressed their support. If the survey is conducted constructively, not vindictively, the majority of the faculty will probably/hopefully approve. The majority of the faculty approved printing the results of the last survey, despite the questions concerning its validity.

The Committee would decide how the survey would be conducted. Most likely, if the survey was conducted annually, about a third of the classes would be surveyed each time, on a rotating basis. In each class that was surveyed, for example, Mr. Coombs Math 1B, all of the students in the class would answer several questions about the quality of the teacher's instruction on computer cards. The results would be compiled and averaged by computer.

The resolution would in no way commit the CSA to funding or supervising the project.

## Student government--the oil between the gears of change

What is Student Government? How does it work? What do the representatives who are elected do?

They give money away, for one thing.

The nine dollars that are paid to become a member of the Associated Students may have gone to fund women's sports, varsity football, child day care, the Aggie judging team, Black Culture Week. . . even this newspaper. And these are only a few of the things that the College Student Assembly has voted to help support.

Part of the budget of \$71,300 is available to students who need money to make films or finance other projects. There is a committee organized to make films or finance other projects. There is a committee organized to review grant requests - and \$1800 has been allocated to the Student Project Grant Fund.

Much of the budget goes to provide services for the entire Associated Student Body such as insurance which covers eighty percent of the cost in case any associated student is injured on campus. Other services include a free telephone in the Student Activities Office (for local calls) and free tickets to Theater Arts productions. Also funded through the budget is free legal aid for Associated Student Body members.

How does student government work?

It's primarily made up of three bodies: College Student Assembly, Executive Cabinet, and Inter-Club Council. The College Student Assembly consists of elected representatives (such as the Student Body President and Vice-President) and commissioners who are appointed by the President and approved by the Executive

Cabinet, and one Inter-Club Council representative who is appointed by the ICC.

The CSA is there to hear student ideas and grievances, and to allocate the money from the student body card sales.

The Executive Cabinet is made up of elected representatives and is a policy-making organization.

Inter-Club Council consists of representatives of all the clubs, and governs all the money-making activities on campus, such as Country Faires, auctions, and sales.

"A lot of people have bad-mouthed student Government," says Eugene Canevari, Student Activities Advisor. "But when they take on a project, when they're willing to do the work -- to see it through...They're universally successful."

What is Student Government all about, anyway?

Clarence Hagins, Student Body President, summed it all up when he said, "My main concern is that students realize their tremendous potential as individual human beings and as members of society."



## Setting the record straight: the student budget breakdown

There was some pebble-tossing last week over the typographical errors in the OAKLEAF's lead story. "Battle for the bands; struggle for student hour."

If one were to believe the 'typos', the College Student Assembly (CSA) budgeted \$900 for bands and speakers, nearly \$16 thousand for various athletic pursuits and (only) \$1500 for cultural activities.

The correct information, taken from the 1975-1976 CSA-adopted budget (which, hopefully, contains no more irritating little 'typos') follows:

Budgeted for 14 sports and men's and women's conference fees is \$12,800. An additional \$300 is targeted for intramurals (see "Sports Shorts" on pg. four); \$850 goes to the student ticket crew; \$800 for game security; and \$1,000 is budgeted for the spirit squad (cheerleaders).

Since there are those who would say that sports are cultural, let us say that CSA has budgeted even more money for other cultural activities at SRJC. A total of \$20,350 has been allocated for these additional cultural items, broken-down as follows: theatre arts, \$3,500; forensics (e.g., debating team), \$3,000; arts and lectures, \$2,500; The OAKLEAF, \$2,000; ethnic programs (Black Culture Week, Martin Luther King Day, Cinco de Mayo, Chicano Enrichment Program, others), \$2,000; aggie judging team, \$1,600; the school band, \$1,000; assemblies, \$900; FIRST LEAVES (student literary magazine), \$350; student film projects,

\$300; Inter-Club Council, \$100.

In addition to the above, the CSA has budgeted monies for the following student services: hospital and insurance premiums, \$8,000; student project grants, \$1,800; child day care, \$5,500; student parking fees, \$2,000; handbooks and calendars, \$1,000; Women's Center, \$850; handicapped program, \$800; legal aid (a lawyer on campus two hours per week), \$800; student health care, \$250; and student services-at-large, \$1,300.

Black Youth Research and Development Project

In Sonoma County today, 1975, there are many, many public and private social service programs. There are no programs, however, which directly address the specific needs and concerns of black youth and young adults on an on-going basis. On one hand, these programs may be unreceptive or hostile to significant participation by black youth. On the other side, black people often find themselves uneasy or unable to relate because of cultural differences between themselves and the dominant group. Thus, while many existing programs may be successful in achieving their goals, the fact remains that most of the basic problems that confront large segments of Sonoma county's young black population simply cannot be solved within the framework of existing programs and services. Clearly, an approach geared to the concerns of black youth and young adults is needed.

BLAC/BYRD assumes that the major problems of black people remain unchanged -- that these problems are primarily economic and educational. Our basic hypothesis is that:

"Black youth are receiving an inadequate and inequitable share of the instruction, resources, services, funds, and other opportunities available in the schools, colleges, economic market, and general community of Sonoma county because of a breakdown of communication among blacks on campus, between blacks on campus and those in the community and between young and old."

As a community-based group, the goal of BLAC/BYRD is to identify and personally contact young black people and community services in Sonoma county. The needs and concerns of black youth, as expressed by them, will be compared with existing programs and services. The results of our investigation will then be drawn together into a two-fold plan of action which will: 1) increase and improve utilization of existing programs and services by young blacks; 2) develop an on-going community-based and directed program of services and activities for those needs which we suspect are not and will not be met by existing programs.

To be successful in what we are doing, BLAC/BYRD needs the support and assistance of you -- the black people of Sonoma county, and all other concerned persons or groups.

BLACK YOUTH RESEARCH AND DEVELOPMENT

(BYRD)

Statement of  
Purposes and Goals

Black Youth Research and Development is a program of training and instruction for people of junior and senior high school and college age.

The goal of BYRD is to improve young people's understanding and ability to develop themselves and their community through collective activity.

BYRD seeks to combine both academic and socio-political aspects to provide a more integrated and complete educational experience.

BYRD is designed to provide a basic introduction and orientation to: self-awareness and interpersonal relations; intercultural relations; problem solving; field research and use of reference materials; leadership and decision-making; strategy politics; community organization and resource mobilization.

Black Youth Research and Development is open to anyone, regardless of age or cultural background, who can or want to relate to black youth, and at the same time enjoy a positive experience.

BYRD consists of: meeting every two weeks for instruction and critique; writing a questionnaire and interviewing at least ten persons; finding out about one local public service agency; putting together and working on a short-term group project.

BLAC/BYRD  
COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT CENTER

When a young person is troubled, or in trouble, where can he go, or what can he do, to get help? . . Parents? Teachers? Police? Friends? Many times, instead of help, the problems of youth are made worse by adult chauvinism, confused bureaucracies, miseducation by the school systems, and an emphasis on treating symptoms, instead of causes, of problems. Instead of help, the youth is given a label, a put-down, or the run-around.

For the young black person who may be troubled in Sonoma County, the situation is even more acute. Of all the agencies and programs that are supposed to help the people in need, none seem to be working for the needs of young black people. It is therefore necessary for black youth and young adults in Sonoma County to create and develop for themselves solutions to their problems. One such solution is the BLAC/BYRD Community Development Center (CDC).

The CDC is located within easy access of the target areas to be served (Roseland, Wright, South Park, West Ninth, and Northcoast). The interior is being redecorated and furnished. There is one small room for individual consultation, two larger rooms to be used for group work and meetings, a small room to be used for office space, and a large kitchen which we plan to develop as an economic base.

The need for a Community Development Center is based on our belief that if a young person has a secure, supportive, and constructive environment, he will be better prepared to develop into a strong, whole, productive adult. The CDC is to be emphasized as a service and counseling facility, and not as a drop-in or casual gathering place. The atmosphere will be that of a relaxed and hip social service center.

The CDC will assume responsibility for all youth who have, who have had, or who might have trouble in the demographic service area. It will have three main areas of responsibility:



1. Advice, Information, Referral (AIR)

The BLAC/BYRD Center will serve as a neighborhood center sharing advice, information, and referrals with youth and their families. People from school, family, police and courts, the medical world, the church, public and private health and welfare agencies, businesses, and the youth himself can drop in or call the Community Development Center for AIR.

2. Diversion, Intervention, Prevention

CDC staff who give AIR will also be responsible for inter-reach (out-grab), going into the community and its serving institutions to find youth who might need help. They will thereby be in a strategic position to provide diversion, intervention, and prevention. The Community Development Center will attempt to direct the youth's energy into constructive channels: educational, social, cultural, vocational, artistic, recreational, and athletic.

3. Diagnostic Evaluation

There are a wide variety of causative factors in delinquent and pre-delinquent behavior. Once the youth and the CDC begin to relate, the youth may be referred to the Community Diagnostic Team. From there, further referrals or recommendations may be made, depending on the troubled youth and the conditions which are troubling him.

1. KEEP YOUR GROUP TIGHT: Make sure everybody knows what to do, how to do it, and gets out and does it. Don't be vague with each other: plan action step-by-step; report to each other in detail.
2. GET THE BLACK PEOPLE TOGETHER: We're going to create groups, clubs, activities, and organizations OF black youth, BY black youth, and FOR black youth. We're going to be recognized in this county and see to it that this community makes some changes for our benefit.
3. WISE UP: to what's happening in this town. Keep listening, keep asking and keep talking to everybody until you find specific people to get behind a specific activity. Let them know that if they stand up they'll be counted: To work together is to make a DIFFERENCE.
4. GET IT ON: Be at those meetings and GO to those activities so you can tell the people about BLAC/BYRD and what it can do for them.
5. HELP THE BROTHERS AND SISTERS: find programs they dig and turn them on to people and places that can help them get into their trip (or out of it).
6. DIG THE PROGRAMS already happening here in Santa Rosa and check them out to see if they're right on, and work to improve them if they're not: (Knock first, if nobody answers, kick the door).
7. STAY ON TOP OF IT: Condense, Organize, and File the facts, statistics and reports of your group members. Be Sharp. Be Fast. Write it all down, don't let anything slip past you.
8. SPREAD THE WORD about BLAC/BYRD. We want everybody to know what it is and what it's doing. Spread the word and BLAC/BYRD will spread its wings.
9. BE SMART: Just like anything else, planning, organizing, talking and listening take know-how and practice. If you don't know how, you have to learn. If you're not too good, you have to get better, so hang-out at the training sessions and pick up on it. If you miss out, you lose. REFUSE TO LOSE.
10. HANG IN THERE: Expect to work. To make a good thing happen of course, means TIME, EFFORT, DEVOTION, CONCENTRATION, PERSISTENCE, AND PATIENCE on your part. Remember Aesop's fable about the grasshopper and the ant. If you don't remember it, go to the library and find out. (P.S. Aesop was a black dude.)

\*LET IT SHINE\* Show some ENTHUSIASM. If you're turned on by what you're doing, you'll turn other people on. If you're excited about the project, other people will get excited about it too. Nothing spreads like enthusiasm. BLAC/BYRD's going to make it happen here. We've got the power: We can do it if we keep it together. EVERY PLAN carried out brings us a little closer to getting what we want.

ENJOY YOURSELF! Remember, you're working to create a place where you can have a lot of fun, meet a lot of people, get some new ideas and see some changes.

- b. When the income to the SRJC Associated Students from Oak Leaf advertising reaches the level indicated in the 1975-76 ASB Budget, any additional advertising revenue will be apportioned with 10% remaining in the ASB general fund and 90% utilized as additional funds for the operation and production of the Oak Leaf (it is to be understood that the Oak Leaf business manager will still be receiving 20% commission of revenues received on advertising sold by him before the above apportionment takes place.)
- D. Beach seconded the motion. R. Narad moved to amend the motion to delete the figure 10% and make it 30%, which would change the 90% to 70%. M. Von der Porten seconded the amendment to the motion. The amendment to the motion failed. The main motion passed.
- b. Election of Soph. Rep to Exec. Cab. - (Hagins/Canevari) M. Platt moved to elect M. Bard as Sophomore Representative to the Executive Cabinet. R. Narad moved for postponement of this issue until the next CSA meeting when the Freshman Reps would be present. M. Stegeman seconded R. Narad's motion. Motion passed.
- c. Used Book Faire Volunteers - (Herrington) D. Herrington needs volunteers to pick up books for the Book Faire. All proceeds from the Book Faire go to the Revolving Book Fund. Books will be sold for 5¢ each. Volunteers see D. Herrington.

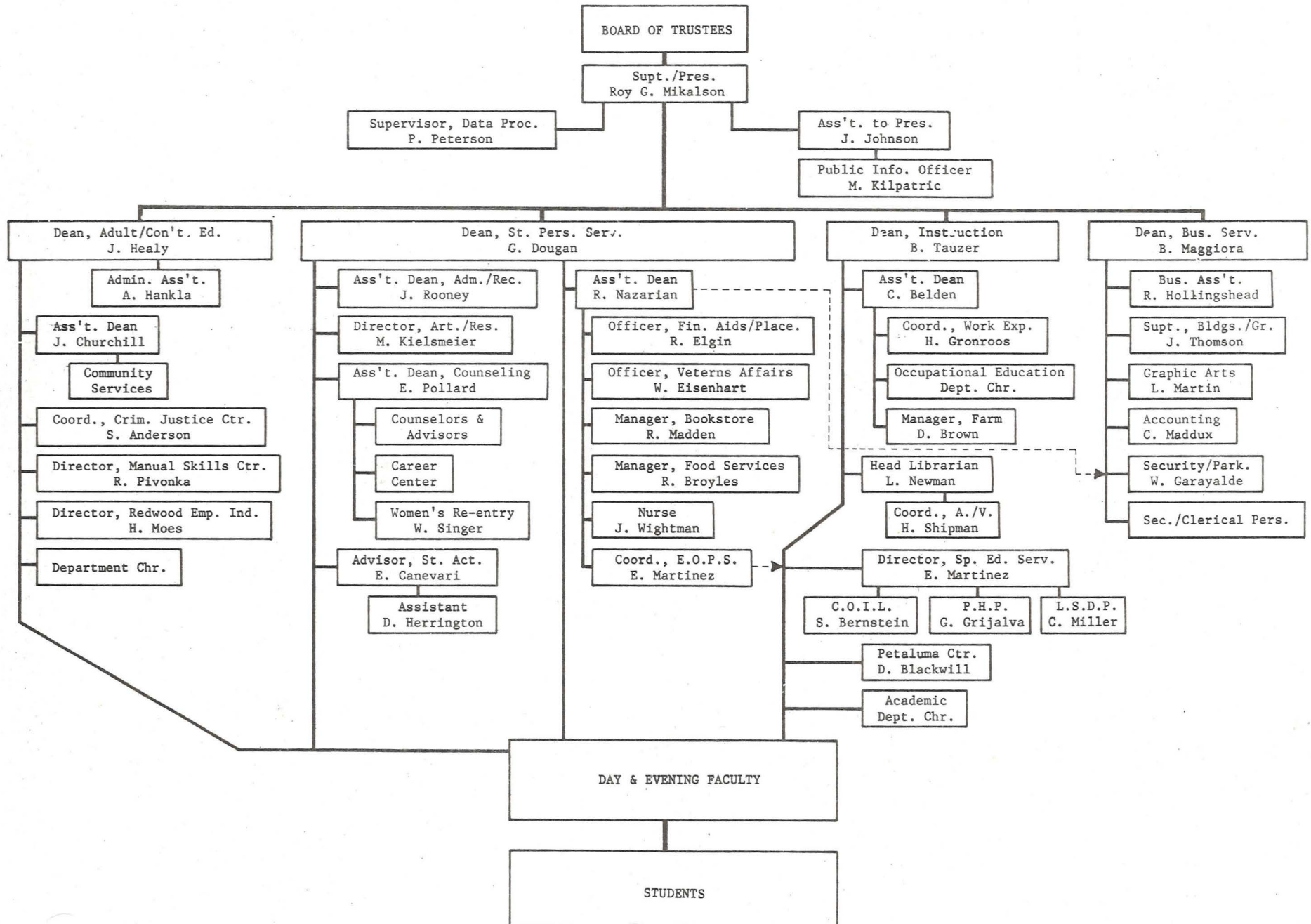

# Weekend Conference -- Mind as Healer, Mind as Slayer

October 31, November 1 and 2

Cosponsored by University Extension, University of California, Berkely and Gladman Memorial Hospital, Oakland

## Conference Overview:

For centuries, Western civilization has divided the study of man into separate parts -- mind, body and spirit -- with a different group of services for each part; physicians for the body, psychologists and psychiatrists for the mind, and clergy for the spirit. While other societies have created healing rituals that involve the whole person, our healing processes and rituals are characterized by their specialization.

Within the healing professions today, a new focus that recognizes the inextricable interaction of body, mind and environment is emerging. According to this view, health exists when body and mind function in harmony; illness results when stress and conflict disrupt the harmony. Treatment of the whole person emphasizes the psychological factors in the prevention of illness and in the healing process. Often these psychological factors are the basis of the so-called miraculous recoveries brought about through an individual's "will to live" by an "act of faith" or by ingesting a placebo dosage of vitamins or other organic compounds. Basic to these instances is on common factor -- the capacity of the mind to play a vital part in healing.

This weekend conference addresses the concept that individuals have certain psychological patterns that predispose them toward health and others that predispose them toward disease. In addition, consideration is given to the role of stress in the induction of illness, the use of self-regulatory techniques in alleviating stress disorders and promoting healing, the applications and limitations of chemical agents to promote healing, the reorganization potential in psychotic turmoil, meditation and its effects on cancer, and an Eastern perspective on the functions of the mind in illness and health.

## Conference value to us:

We are taking Psych 771 - Contemporary Research and Experimentation in Parapsychology. As a group the class has decided to investigate biofeedback potentials. This convention will give us much insight and information in the techniques and applications of biofeedback to enhance our work as a class.

I am doing a special study on the relationship between biofeedback and hypnosis. Since there has been limited research done in this field this particular convention is one of the few resources for information. I will be able to explore the latest techniques and advancements in the field of biofeedback. Of particular interest to me is the work of Elmer and Alyce Green (members of the conference faculty) who are the foremost explorers in both biofeedback and hypnosis in the United States.

My special studies is "research and in-depth study of self-hypnosis, meditation and bio-feedback to determine the effects and correlations, if any, upon the physical and mental states". Attending this conference will give me background in contemporary work in the field particularly as it is applied to reduction of stress and the attending results of this reduction.
