Item 1 concerning application date was postponed until the arrival of Dr. Mikalson.

Item 2: Gene Canevari moved to rescind last weeks action concerning advance registration. It was seconded. After much discussion the motion was withdrawn in favor of a motion by Paul Peterson to change the definition of registration worker, as discussed last week, to include the waiver workers from the Associated Student Body. Duane Blackwill moved to amend the motion to include all volunteer workers. The amendment passed 4-3. The motion passed 5-3.

Item 1: Evelyn Pollard reported on the meeting with Dr. Mikalson last week. Possible dates for application deadline are:

- February 11, 1976 (If day and evening are combined)
- February 6, 1976 (Day) and February 13, 1976 (Evening) if separate

If separate dates are used, control will be needed to stop students from registering at night, adding a day class, then dropping the night class. Because Dr. Mikalson had to leave, this item was postponed to next week.

Item 3: Mr. Rooney has been acting on petitions. Mr. Nazarian suggested that the Petitions Committee be reactivated, and that these petitions be referred to it.

Item 4: Evelyn Pollard distributed a proposal to grant the self-counseling option to all students who have completed 12 units and have clear status. This will be acted on in the future.

Item 5: Spring dismissal. Will be Item 1 next week.

M. Platt informed us that he still needs a Sophomore or Freshman Rep. to serve on the Arts & Lectures Committee. If anyone else is interested in serving on a committee, see Michael Platt.

b. Advisors Report - (Canevari)

Mr. Canevari advised us that the only time to challenge a vote is immediately after the vote is taken. Otherwise, the item must be brought up for reconsideration and discussion. Section 6. D. of the Constitution of the Associated Students of Santa Rosa Junior College states that the Recording Secretary must 'Administer attendance regulations for the College Student Assembly and initiate charges of non-attendance.' This enables us to 'clean house'. The difference between appointed and elected officers is that the President may dismiss an appointed officer, where an elected officer must be removed by a vote from C.S.A. (cont.)

Accrediting commission wants JC students to have lounge

Over the years, there has been a steady clamor for a student lounge. There is, as yet, no lounge.

A newly released accreditation report again calls for the creation of a student lounge.

The 1975 report by the Accreditation Sub-committee on Student Personnel Services said that, although Pioneer Hall has been completed, "it in no way meets the recommendation for additional recreational space mentioned in the last two accreditation reports."

(The Accrediting Commission for Junior Colleges of the Western Association of Schools and Colleges makes an evaluation every five years and determines whether or not course credits acquired at SRJC are acceptable for transfer to other colleges and universities.)

Pioneer Hall, as envisioned by the previous (1970) accreditation report, was to "provide for a student lounge, recreation rooms, student government offices, etc."

The recently released 1975 accreditation report says that Pioneer Hall fails to meet previous recommendations.

"In fact," adds the report, "the small student lounge was turned over to office uses, and there is NO student lounge."

"We had plans for a student lounge in the old bookstore," said Eugene Cannavari, Student Activities Advisor. "We got aced out of it."

The planned student lounge was "aced out" by sculpting classes, which

now occupy the site of the old bookstore.

There is some hope that this site will become available once again, in two years when the new Liberal Arts building is slated for completion.

"My understanding is that we don't have an absolute claim on it," said Mark Stegeman, CSA Executive Vice-President, commenting on the future availability of the sculpture classroom.

SRJC concert moves; legality still uncertain

Rock concert promoters today moved a planned Saturday night concert from the National Guard Armory, to the Piner Pub after warnings they might be shut down by Santa Rosa City Police or prosecuted by the Alcoholic Beverage Control commission.

A rock concert scheduled for the National Guard Armory tomorrow night will instead be held at the Piner Pub, the promoters said today.

However, Santa Rosa Police Chief Sal Rosano said today he is checking with the city attorney to determine whether the advance sale of some 500 tickets constitutes a public dance, which would require a city permit at the 968 Piner Road Club.

"If that is the case, we will have to inform the owner that she does not have the right to hold a publicly subscribed dance," Rosano said.

"Autumn Jam '75", billed as a benefit for the Associated Musicians Guild at Santa Rosa Junior College, was organized by Doug McCallum, commissioner of assemblies at SRJC, and the Light House Production Co.

The promoters applied for city permission to hold the dance at the armory this Monday, Rosano said.

"Normally applicants should come in about 30 days before a planned event," he said.

Several sections of the city ordinance define standards for promoters, Rosano said.

The standards include fire regulations, parking, and crowd control.

Rosano said one section of the ordinance requires that officers appointed by the police chief supervise all public dances.

"The problems in this case are compounded by indications the promoters are going to serve beer, which creates a monumental supervision problem, especially with that age group. There has been no approval from the Alcoholic Beverage Control board, and the ABC will prosecute if they serve beer without a permit," Rosano said.

Capt. Jerrold Jurin of the National Guard said the promoters had paid a license fee of \$169 for use of the armory and approval had been given by the state, contingent on local approval.

McCallum said today if the concert is shut down by the police tomorrow night he will return the money from advance ticket sales.

Police mute rock concert, students plan to try again

The Santa Rosa Police Department last night shut down a planned rock concert-dance at the National Guard Armory.

Sponsors Light House Productions and the Associated Musicians Guild at Santa Rosa Junior College said they had sold some 500 advance tickets.

Norm Najar of Light House said information on ticket refunds will be released Monday morning. Doug McCallum, of the student musician group, said he has contacted the Veterans Memorial Building and hopes to stage the event there Nov. 10.

Police chief Sal Rosano had indicated Friday that the concert could not take place for several reasons. Those included inadequate security, plans to serve beer in a crowd including minors, inadequate parking space and failure to apply for a city permit in time.

The promoters first contacted the pol-

ice department last Monday about permits, although tickets were sold before then.

McCallum reported Friday that the dance would be held at the Piner Pub, but Pub owner Maryanne Speciale said Friday afternoon she doubted fire regulations would allow the crowd. (See related story on entertainment pages.)

"I think there has been some irresponsibility both on our part and on the part of the police department," Najar said Saturday night. He added that he hopes the non-event has not hurt future chances for concerts in Santa Rosa.

Three city police officers at the armory reported there had been no violence or demonstrations by disgruntled ticket-holders.

A group of about 20 stood quietly outside the building in a light rainfall at 8:30, discussing where to go from there.

"The city can't endorse an illegal act, and we're being asked to endorse it or ignore it. The facts exist — kids are drinking and killing themselves. We have a tremendous number of alcohol-related accidents involving minors."

Distressed and angry, Santa Rosa Mayor Murray Zatman made those comments during a Friday furor over a rock concert planned as a benefit for a junior college student musician group Saturday night.

Police Chief Sal Rosano had "suggested" that the event be postponed.

The Alcoholic Beverage Control commission indicated it would prosecute if the event were held and beer given out with no license.

And organizer Doug McCallum, SRJC student and commissioner of assemblies for the school, had speculated that other concert promoters tried to stop the event.

The concert originally was planned for the National Guard Armory, but at this writing has been transferred to the Piner Pub — where the problems of too little parking and drinking minors are not unknown. Friday afternoon, Rosano was trying to determine whether a "public dance" with advance tickets sold, could legally be held at the Pub without city permits.

And Pub owner Maryanne Speciale was puzzling over whether she had space for the reported 500 ticket holders. Fire department regulations limit her occupancy to 150.

So — it was all very much up in the air. But a couple of issues seemed pretty clearcut.

The first is Zatman's outrage at alcoholic beverages being passed out free in a crowd which was sure to include many minors.

"You know people are going to be getting beer for their underage friends. There's just no way to check in a crowd that size," he said.

The other straightforward issue is the need for solid advance planning and organization.

Rosano reports that no one approached him about city permits for the rock concert until last Monday — and it generally takes about a month to clear such things as fire department regulations and crowd supervision by the police.

There's no question in most Santa Rosa minds that young folks like to get together, and they prefer a musical accompaniment.

There's also no question that you can have a rock concert without booze. Bill Graham does it all the time.

And, in 1973, we did it right here. Press Democrat clippings on the Rose Festival rock concert in memory of young Tom DeMeo report that 5,000 or more turned up at Sonoma County fairgrounds to hear Tower of Power, Elvis Duck and others.

The concert was "Clean, impeccably straight and unmarred by any of those nasty little episodes that conjure up nightmarish visions of Altamont and Santa Clara," Diane Morgan wrote then.

She reported that some three dozen police officers were present and make periodic sweeps through the grandstand. There also were uniformed men at the outside gates and "The result was that afterwards there was no evidence among the post-concert debris that a single bottle of Red Mountain or Boone's Farm had made its way into the grandstand area."

Autumn Jam blooper

Like the aftershocks of an earthquake, the AUTUMN JAM reverberations give us reason to hold our breath. "What's next?" is the question of the day—yet the issue is not so much what will be done as what should have been done.

We have found that as junior college students, we were given a very one-sided view of the whole matter. We were led to believe that the AUTUMN JAM was sponsored by Santa Rosa Junior College. When the event fell through we were led to believe that the fault lay in police chief Sal Rosano's hands.

Only people with inside information knew that in actuality, Lighthouse Productions and the Associated Musician's Guild were the sponsors—the only sponsors. Validity was lent to the occasion by the backing of Doug MacCallum. As commissioner of assemblies and rallies and as a member of the Associated Musician's Guild, he SEEMED to be representing the junior college.

The Santa Rosa police might have been more cooperative. With good public relations, they could have come off as the "good guys"—yet they seemed to make no attempt for this impression. Alternatives were suggested, but there was no attempt at sitting down and figuring out just what the police could let the concert get away with.

And, except for a certain lack of consideration, the Santa Rosa police had every right to stomp on the proposed rock concert.

Not only was the AUTUMN JAM poorly organized, but poorly disguised pressuring of public officials gave Sal Rosano in particular just the excuse he needed to keep his best interests in mind.

There is no conceivable reason for the promoters of the AUTUMN JAM to have thought they could by-pass the "channels" a person must go through in order to get something of this nature done.

Instead of applying for a permit 30 days in advance, Lighthouse Productions and the Associated Musician's Guild waited until less than a week before the concert to check out the legality of the event.

As it happened, they were not in accordance with city ordinances pertaining to security, plans to serve beer, parking, over-crowding, and fire hazards. On top of this was the failure to apply for a city permit on time—a failure which would have resulted in considerable rushing at the very least.

Among the post mortem confusion, two things stand out. One is the misrepresentation of the junior college as having had something to do with the concert. The other is the fact that as of last Friday, Oct. 24, the students on campus had been led to believe that the police were causing unnecessary difficulties—where in fact, many problems were the fault of the producers.

It is our hope, as students who would like to see the AUTUMN JAM come off successfully, that the promoters will put up with red tape in the future.

when they met with opposition.

As far as future events in the Santa Rosa area are concerned (such as a concert whereat no alcoholic beverages are served), the police department's stance seems to be one of cooperation.

"We are more than willing to help them organize future events," said Sverko. "They went about it backwards, that's all."

Mark Stegeman, executive vice-president of the College Student Assembly, looked at it from a ticket-holder's view.

"I thought it was a good idea," said Stegeman. "I'd like to see it happen in the future...if it was better organized and they got their stuff together before they sold a lot of tickets."

"They really shouldn't have continued to sell tickets after they knew there was a chance it wasn't going to come off."

After MacCallum received word that the police department was not going to approve the Armory as the site for the Autumn Jam, he tried to secure Piner Pub as an alternative site.

After the site change had already been announced over the campus P.A. system, Maryanne Speciale reported that fire regulations would not allow that large of a gathering at the pub.

Although MacCallum made attempts to get last-minute approval for a permit, a process which included petitioning and a Saturday night drive to the mayor's home, he reluctantly conceded defeat at the Armory the night of the Autumn Jam, where about a hundred hopeful participants gathered.

Reflecting on the events of the past few days, MacCallum feels strongly about the Santa Rosa police and their actions.

"I feel that that Santa Rosa police were very uncooperative," said MacCallum, "in that when we eliminated the beer on Monday, they started working against us instead of trying to solve the problem of 500 unhappy people who were expecting a musical event they paid for."

There seems to be a popular misconception that SRJC was involved in planning the Autumn Jam, a misconception that stems from MacCallum's CSA position as assemblies and rallies commissioner.

"We had nothing to do with the concert," said Carla Flaherty, CSA commissioner of publicity. "Doug MacCallum was not acting in his capacity of CSA assemblies and rallies

commissioner."

A little over a week prior to the Autumn Jam, MacCallum approached Michael Herman of Sunrise Productions for publicity aid.

Herman, unhappy with the fact that beer was to be served, wrote letters of non-support for the Autumn Jam, calling it a "beer bash."

Copies of this letter were sent to Santa Rosa Police Chief Sal Rassano, MacCallum and 25 other persons and organizations.

Norm Najar, who as head of Lighthouse Productions co-sponsored the event, said that tickets are being refunded at both the Student Activities Office and Stanroy's Music Center.

'All it was supposed to be was a kegger party'

"Why was the Autumn Jam cancelled?" This question is one being asked both on and off campus in the wake of the four-band concert's cancellation Saturday night.

At the center of this issue is Assemblies and Rallies Commissioner and Associated Musicians Guild member Doug MacCallum.

MacCallum promoted the "Jam" from the start. According to MacCallum, "All this the Autumn Jam was a kegger party with three bands."

"Everybody should have realized in the first place," MacCallum said, "that this was going to be an illegal thing."

MacCallum stressed that the Autumn Jam "was going to be a party, not a concert."

Whether party or concert, over 500 advance tickets were sold at \$2.50 apiece and the promotion for the event was extensive.

The Santa Rosa Police Department stepped in, notifying MacCallum that the event would have to be cancelled.

"The concert was never okayed to begin with," said SRPD Lieutenant Rodney Sverko.

Sverko explained that the Autumn Jam's organizers applied for a permit on Oct. 20, with the Jam set to happen on Oct. 25.

"That is just not enough time for this kind of event," said Sverko.

"We like to have at least 30 to 60 days advance notice," said the lieutenant, "so we can plan for crowd control and things of this sort."

The lieutenant said he did not believe that the site planned for the Autumn Jam, the National Guard Armory on Armory drive, was a good location.

"There is not enough parking," said Sverko, "not enough exits out of the building and the selling of beer, I'm sure, would present a problem."

Autumn Jam promoters had originally planned to serve beer at the event but altered this to soda pop



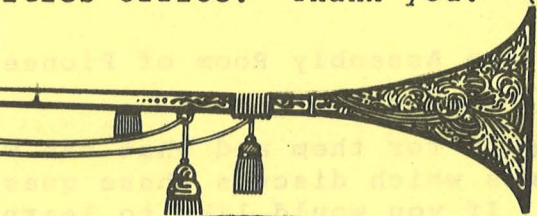

~~This statement is directed at those and only those who show dissatisfaction, disbelief, and distrust in me and any and all clubs, events, organizations and people affiliated with me.~~

On September 8th, 1975, at the first Associated Musicians Guild meeting, the idea for a party with live music was brought up. We were going to rent a small grange hall, but none were available. I flashed on the idea of the National Guard Armory, because on September 1st, 1973, a local promotion company, "Omniproductions" held a "Public Dance" at the Armory.

As I remembered, no permits were needed, and I was assured by the Armory staff none were needed. No trace of a "permit" issued to Omniproductions is on record at the Santa Rosa Police Department.

Contrary to many beliefs, I didn't get to the police on Monday, October 20th, to ask for a permit. My purpose for the police visit, was to hire two "off duty policemen", for security.

I wasn't then and am now not trying to hide a thing. All I'm trying to do is to provide as inexpensively as possible, entertainment for the majority of the students attending SRJC.

Another thing many people don't take into consideration is the fact that I'm a student of SRJC, as a paying member I would like to see inexpensive entertainment sponsored by my contributions.

I don't attend football games, use the day care center, or belong to the Spirit team and it's my opinion that an entertainment program should be established with an Entertainment Commissioner or Director appointed and/or hired.

An entertainment program, once established, could very well provide student employment, possibilities as well as fund raisings for Campus Clubs and Community Charitable organizations.

As of this writing, I've scheduled 14 bands for the noon time program. I have worked with various faculty members to schedule another five and I'm planning an acoustical program in the Coop at noon, for the remainder of the semester.

Autumn Jaz sold well over 600 tickets before we stopped selling them on Wednesday, Oct. 22nd, and most people knew nothing of the "Free Beer". If that event, along with the overwhelming response to my noontime program is any indication, then in my opinion, something should be done to set up a program to benefit the majority of the ASB Card holders.

I would like some discussion on this matter today, because I've decided I haven't the time to devote to writing reports about something that is no concern to the ASB of SRJC.

If you people want to hear reports about the failures and successes of entertainment events, develop a program, research and discover that there are ways of funding such a program as early as the Spring Semester of 1976.

Police mute rock concert, students plan to try again

The Santa Rosa Police Department last night shut down a planned rock concert-dance at the National Guard Armory.

Sponsors Light House Productions and the Associated Musicians Guild at Santa Rosa Junior College said they had sold some 500 advance tickets.

Norm Najar of Light House said information on ticket refunds will be released Monday morning. Doug McCallum, of the student musician group, said he has contacted the Veterans Memorial Building and hopes to stage the event there Nov. 10.

Police chief Sal Rosano had indicated Friday that the concert could not take place for several reasons. Those included inadequate security, plans to serve beer in a crowd including minors, inadequate parking space and failure to apply for a city permit in time.

The promoters first contacted the pol-

ice department last Monday about permits, although tickets were sold before then.

McCallum reported Friday that the dance would be held at the Piner Pub, but Pub owner Maryanne Speciale said Friday afternoon she doubted fire regulations would allow the crowd. (See related story on entertainment pages.)

"I think there has been some irresponsibility both on our part and on the part of the police department," Najar said Saturday night. He added that he hopes the non-event has not hurt future chances for concerts in Santa Rosa.

Three city police officers at the armory reported there had been no violence or demonstrations by disgruntled ticket-holders.

A group of about 20 stood quietly outside the building in a light rainfall at 8:30, discussing where to go from there.

The scene

The Press Democrat, Santa Rosa, Calif., Sunday, October 28, 1975—

"The city can't endorse an illegal act, and we're being asked to endorse it or ignore it. The facts exist — kids are drinking and killing themselves. We have a tremendous number of alcohol-related accidents involving minors."

Distressed and angry, Santa Rosa Mayor Murray Zatman made those comments during a Friday furor over a rock concert planned as a benefit for a junior college student musician group Saturday night.

Police Chief Sal Rosano had "suggested" that the event be postponed.

The Alcoholic Beverage Control commission indicated it would prosecute if the event were held and beer given out with no license.

And organizer Doug McCallum, SRJC student and commissioner of assemblies for the school, had speculated that other concert promoters tried to stop the event.

The concert originally was planned for the National Guard Armory, but at this writing has been transferred to the Piner Pub — where the problems of too little parking and drinking minors are not unknown. Friday afternoon, Rosano was trying to determine whether a "public dance" with advance tickets sold, could legally be held at the Pub without city permits.

And Pub owner Maryanne Speciale was puzzling over whether she had space for the reported 500 ticket holders. Fire department regulations limit her occupancy to 150.

So — it was all very much up in the air. But a couple of issues seemed pretty clearcut.

The first is Zatman's outrage at alcoholic beverages being passed out free in a crowd which was sure to include many minors.

"You know people are going to be getting beer for their underage friends. There's just no way to check in a crowd that size," he said.

The other straightforward issue is the need for solid advance planning and organization.

Rosano reports that no one approached him about city permits for the rock concert until last Monday — and it generally takes about a month to clear such things as fire department regulations and crowd supervision by the police.

There's no question in most Santa Rosa minds that young folks like to get together, and they prefer a musical accompaniment.

There's also no question that you can have a rock concert without booze. Bill Graham does it all the time.

And, in 1973, we did it right here. Press Democrat clippings on the Rose Festival rock concert in memory of young Tom DeMeo report that 5,000 or more turned up at Sonoma County fairgrounds to hear Tower of Power, Elvis Duck and others.

The concert was "Clean, impeccably straight and unmarred by any of those nasty little episodes that conjure up nightmarish visions of Altamont and Santa Clara," Diane Morgan wrote then.

She reported that some three dozen police officers were present and make periodic sweeps through the grandstand. There also were uniformed men at the outside gates and "The result was that afterwards there was no evidence among the post-concert debris that a single bottle of Red Mountain or Boone's Farm had made its way into the grandstand area."

SRJC concert moves; legality still uncertain

Rock concert promoters today moved a planned Saturday night concert from the National Guard Armory, to the Piner Pub after warnings they might be shut down by Santa Rosa City Police or prosecuted by the Alcoholic Beverage Control commission.

A rock concert scheduled for the National Guard Armory tomorrow night will instead be held at the Piner Pub, the promoters said today.

However, Santa Rosa Police Chief Sal Rosano said today he is checking with the city attorney to determine whether the advance sale of some 500 tickets constitutes a public dance, which would require a city permit at the 968 Piner Road Club.

"If that is the case, we will have to inform the owner that she does not have the right to hold a publicly subscribed dance," Rosano said.

"Autumn Jam '75", billed as a benefit for the Associated Musicians Guild at Santa Rosa Junior College, was organized by Doug McCallum, commissioner of assemblies at SRJC, and the Light House Production Co.

The promoters applied for city permission to hold the dance at the armory this Monday, Rosano said.

"Normally applicants should come in about 30 days before a planned event," he said.

Several sections of the city ordinance define standards for promoters, Rosano said.

The standards include fire regulations, parking, and crowd control.

Rosano said one section of the ordinance requires that officers appointed by the police chief supervise all public dances.

"The problems in this case are compounded by indications the promoters are going to serve beer, which creates a monumental supervision problem, especially with that age group. There has been no approval from the Alcoholic Beverage Control board, and the ABC will prosecute if they serve beer without a permit," Rosano said.

Capt. Jerrold Jurin of the National Guard said the promoters had paid a license fee of \$169 for use of the armory and approval had been given by the state, contingent on local approval.

McCallum said today if the concert is shut down by the police tomorrow night he will return the money from advance ticket sales.

CONTRIBUTING EFFECTIVELY TO A MEETING

The success of the democratic group depends on you as much as it does the leader. To do your part, you should participate intelligently. The following suggestions may help you to be more effective.

1. Speak your mind freely- The discussion meeting is yours. It is a chance for you to say what you think. Say it! Here, everyone's ideas are worth just as much as the other fellow's. Remember that nobody else has your background and experience.
2. Listen critically and thoughtfully to others - Try hard to understand the other man's point of view---see what experience and thinking it rests on. Don't always accept ideas immediately, for they might not have sound bases. Remember, however, that there are always several points of view.
3. Don't monopolize the discussion - Try to limit your comments to a minute or so at a time. Make your point in as few words as possible and then pass the ball to someone else. Remember it doesn't matter who carries the ball, as long as it is carried in a forward direction.
4. Don't let the discussion get away from you - If you don't understand where it is going, say so! Ask for examples, illustrations, until you do understand.
5. Indulge in friendly disagreement - When you find that you're on the other side of the fence from the discussion, say so and tell why. But do it in a friendly manner. Sound conclusions are the goal, and good-humored discussion leads part way there.
6. Come to the meeting with questions in mind - Frequently your points are accepted more freely if you phrase them in the form of a question.
7. Be action-minded - Attempt to relate the discussion to possible action which might be taken; however, don't be impatient. Before suggesting possible action be sure the group is ready for such decision-making.

Weekend Conference -- Mind as Healer, Mind as Slayer

October 31, November 1 and 2

Cosponsored by University Extension, University of California, Berkely and Gladman Memorial Hospital, Oakland

Conference Overview:

For centuries, Western civilization has divided the study of man into separate parts -- mind, body and spirit -- with a different group of services for each part; physicians for the body, psychologists and psychiatrists for the mind, and clergy for the spirit. While other societies have created healing rituals that involve the whole person, our healing processes and rituals are characterized by their specialization.

Within the healing professions today, a new focus that recognizes the inextricable interaction of body, mind and environment is emerging. According to this view, health exists when body and mind function in harmony; illness results when stress and conflict disrupt the harmony. Treatment of the whole person emphasizes the psychological factors in the prevention of illness and in the healing process. Often these psychological factors are the basis of the so-called miraculous recoveries brought about through an individual's "will to live" by an "act of faith" or by ingesting a placebo dosage of vitamins or other organic compounds. Basic to these instances is one common factor -- the capacity of the mind to play a vital part in healing.

This weekend conference addresses the concept that individuals have certain psychological patterns that predispose them toward health and others that predispose them toward disease. In addition, consideration is given to the role of stress in the induction of illness, the use of self-regulatory techniques in alleviating stress disorders and promoting healing, the applications and limitations of chemical agents to promote healing, the reorganization potential in psychotic turmoil, meditation and its effects on cancer, and an Eastern perspective on the functions of the mind in illness and health.

Conference value to us:

We are taking Psych 771 - Contemporary Research and Experimentation in Parapsychology. As a group the class has decided to investigate biofeedback potentials. This convention will give us much insight and information in the techniques and applications of biofeedback to enhance our work as a class.

I am doing a special study on the relationship between biofeedback and hypnosis. Since there has been limited research done in this field this particular convention is one of the few resources for information. I will be able to explore the latest techniques and advancements in the field of biofeedback. Of particular interest to me is the work of Elmer and Alyce Green (members of the conference faculty) who are the foremost explorers in both biofeedback and hypnosis in the United States.

My special studies is "research and in-depth study of self-hypnosis, meditation and bio-feedback to determine the effects and correlations, if any, upon the physical and mental states". Attending this conference will give me background in contemporary work in the field particularly as it is applied to reduction of stress and the attending results of this reduction.

SRJC students urge continued investigation of intelligence gathering

A resolution calling for the U.S. Senate and House Intelligence Committees, chaired by Senator Frank Church and Representative Otis Pike respectively, to "continue their mandated investigation of the intelligence gathering community" was passed at the Santa Rosa Junior College Student Assembly Oct. 16.

The resolution, introduced by Michael Platt (CSA Commissioner of Committees), also called for the establishment of "permanent committees" because, as stated in the CSA resolution, "the CSA believes that to end these investigations now for political reasons would only continue 'cover ups' which may have occurred and which continue to deceive the American (United States) citizens."

There was considerable debate on this proposal.

The resolution was passed by a vote of 23 to one, with one abstention. An earlier vote on a motion to postpone action on the resolution for a period of one week, made by Freshman Representative Larry Gruver, was defeated by an overwhelming majority.

The text of the resolution, as it was sent to the Senate and House committees, follows:

"The College Student Assembly of Santa Rosa Junior College, Santa Rosa, California, urges the United States Senate and House committees, chaired by Senator Church and Congressman Pike respectively, to continue their mandated investigation of the 'intelligence gathering community' and

establish permanent committees; the CSA believes that to end these investigations now for political reasons would only continue 'cover-ups' which may have occurred and which continue to deceive the American (United States) citizens."

Giving blood is a lifesaver

Donating blood is one way to have a personal role in saving lives.

Donors at the Sonoma County Community Blood Bank may be solving a crisis for someone else.

Yet the blood bank has shortages of even common blood types. Regular donors are kept on an emergency call list.

And volunteers maintaining business, club or family accounts often feel like vampires when they have to urge members to donate.

A pint of blood serves many purposes including use through hospitals for accident victims and surgery cases and laboratory removal of cryo or clotting factors for use by hemophi-

liacs or bleeders.

Another benefit through the blood bank is establishment of school, business, club and family accounts. Donors then credit their donation, no more than five times a year, to the account.

As the number of donations or credits increases, members and families are guaranteed units of blood toward the possibility of need in the future. The major requirement to maintain an account is at least one donation to the account per year, but it pays to build up the number.

Many businesses, families and groups have their own accounts through the blood bank.

Santa Rosa Junior College Associated Students and the Campus Police Association, for example, held a blood drive on the campus today. The blood bank, 1428 Montgomery Drive, will send a mobile unit for such drives.

No appointment is necessary to visit the blood bank or donate. It's an easy way to have blood pressure checked and learn one's blood type.

RESOLUTIONS FOR KENT HALL COUNCIL

1. The Kent Hall Council realize that as a home for 72 college students, the residents of Kent Hall concern for their own safety is greater than any involved administrator on campus, and that the action taken by the administration in searching our rooms as being abusive of our rights, inconsiderate, and over-reactive.

2. That Kent Hall Council go on record to support the resolution now before the College Student Assembly, which would recognize the action taken by the administration in searching our rooms as being "inconsiderate and over-reactive."

After three days of fact finding hearings the College Student Assembly of Santa Rosa Junior College recognizes that the Administration was negligent in the fact that no attempt was made to communicate with the residents of Kent Hall concerning problems that arose before the search of Kent Hall on October 27th, 1975.

Resolved: In order to provide better understanding between the Kent Hall residents, the SRJC Administration, and the College Student Assembly, the CSA recommends the following:

- 1) The contract for Campus Housing should be revised to give a clearer definition of the word "enter".
- 2) A Kent Hall Association be formed.
- 3) The Kent Hall Association have a constitution with procedures for the election of the Kent Hall Council firmly established.
- 4) The Kent Hall Association be recognized by the Inter-Club-Council and have all the privileges of a club on campus including the right to send a voting member to the ICC.
- 5) The Kent Hall Association receive recognition from the Board of Trustees as the official group representing Kent Hall and the Kent Hall Council as the governing board of the Kent Hall Association.
- 6) Before any search of rooms be taken, the Administration shall consult with the Kent Hall Council, except in the case of extraordinary circumstances when it is impossible to contact members of the Council.

The College Student Assembly offers it's assistance in the formation of the Kent Hall Association, and invites the Kent Hall Council to send a liason representative to College Student Assembly meetings.

The committee met with residents of Kent Hall in the Bear's Den Weds. evening. The residents present (40-45) expressed their dissatisfaction with the way the search was carried out (with three holding that the search was alright).

The residents backed and, both verbally & by show of hands, strongly supported a measure passed by the Kent Hall Council condemning the college's "invasion of privacy." (Two were opposed.)

The consensus of the Kent Hall residents present was to ask CSA for a supportive resolution, aid in setting-up a more valid Kent Hall Council, and to take legal action, if necessary, to protect their rights.

All but two of the Kent Hall residents present stated that they interpreted the clause in their rental agreement, stating that the college had a right to enter, as meaning to enter to inspect for damage, cleanliness, etc. --not to search the rooms, go through personal belongings or confiscate "contraband."

The following day, a meeting was held between the committee (~~xxxxxx~~
~~xxxxxx~~ and Mr. Nazarian, Mildred Batey & a rep. from campus police*) who gave their side of the issue (essentially that as reported in the 11/6 OAK LEAF). Nazarian was concerned about the students' safety & stated that he was willing to work with students to create a better way of dealing with such crisis situations. He said that he was convinced that there were two guns on campus (a rifle, verified; and a pistol, hypothesized) that had been removed due to the search. After the first report of a gunshot, there was no search as there was conflicting evidence (firecracker or gunshot?). Nazarian reported that the lease in question was negotiable.

A more complete report (which hopefully will make more succinct/sensible..oh fergit it) will be printed in the Dec. 4 OAK LEAF (under "Old Bus.").

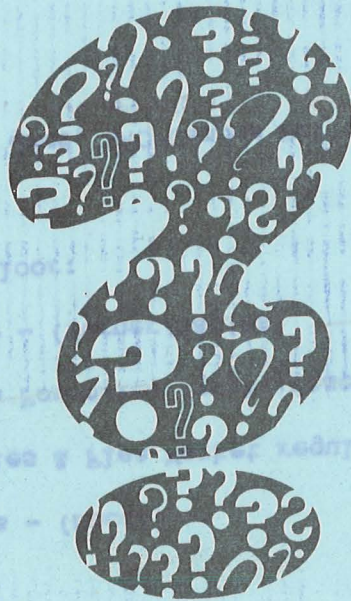

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Investigation

CSA enters Kent Hall dispute

Four spokespersons and a small contingent of supporters who stated they represented 72 per cent of the Kent Hall residents presented a resolution to the College Student Assembly (CSA) on Nov. 17.

The group asked CSA for support of their resolution, which denounced the Oct. 27 search of their dormitory rooms by the administration. The four-member panel was led by Frank Hagie, resident advisor to the administration. He gave his interpretation of the search and explained the nature of the residents' appearance at the assembly.

"Our purpose in coming to CSA was to clear the air as to what really happened at Kent Hall," he said.

The other representatives, John Hagie and Will Medeiros, expressed collective and personal opinions, and the final spokesperson, George Lewis, read the Kent Hall resolution aloud to the student government.

"Our final point," he said, "is this: We request that this body adopt a resolution recognizing Kent Hall as

a home for 72 college students, whose concern is their...own...safety, more so than any involved and concerned administrator on campus, and ...we...ask this body (CSA) to recognize that the procedures and attitudes of those involved and concerned administrators toward Kent Hall as being inconsiderate and over-reactive."

Following the resolution, a debate ensued over whether movements to vote on the proposal immediately should be considered, or if an investigation into the matter through a committee before making a final vote would be beneficial.

Commissioner of Committees Michael Platt felt that the resolution was "Rather a mild one" and supported a prompt vote. Mike Underwood, Student Activities Commissioner, took a cautious stand and argued that a fact-finding body would prove advantageous to the CSA's final decision.

The question as to the actual power of the Kent Hall Council was then brought up. The council is designed to govern the dormitory through Assistant Dean of Students Richard Nazzarian. But Hagie revealed that he felt the council wields very little influence since Nazzarian has the final say.

"This is not the first time that we thought we were going to be snuffed out," Hagie commented.

The discussion whether to vote or not to vote continued and a short time later the Black Students Union (BSU) gave indirect support to the Kent Hall group.

Rod Ulmer of the BSU submitted and read a letter to the CSA. The statement voiced immediate concern for student rights, and requested "that the College Student Assembly file a formal protest of the action taken by the Administration during the 'Kent Hall Shakedown.'"

A vote was then taken and the resolution was sent to an investigative committee by a 12-4 margin. A seven-member committee, composed entirely of CSA representatives, was selected by CSA President Clarence Hagins, but a protest against the choices prompted Hagins to call a short recess.

When the meeting resumed, a new committee had been formulated and the selections went unchallenged. Serving on the panel are: CSA and BSU member Denise Woodard, Frank Hagie, Secretary of CSA Katherine de Prima, Mike Underwood, CSA Bruce Scott of the Student Affairs Committee, Dave Beech of CSA and campus police, and Rick Narad of CSA.

The commission was granted one week to research the events of Oct. 27 and will make a recommendation to the College Student Assembly Nov. 24.

After the meeting Hagie said "it is beneficial to us if the committee brings everything out in the open so they can see what we put up with."

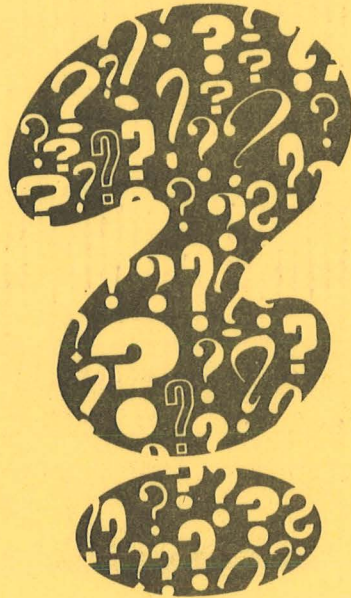

CONFERENCE FUNDING CODE

1. All applicants must be members of the Associated Student Body.
2. A written proposal must be drawn up by the applicant indicating:
 - a. Total funds needed for the Conference including a break down of the funds.
 - b. Purpose of the Conference.
 - c. Which areas of the College will benefit.
 - d. Written confirmation from instructor (preferably from department chairman)
3. Before consideration under the Conference Funding Code, the Conference must be shown to deal directly with some aspect of the college.
4. Applicant must apply to the Executive Cabinet at least two weeks prior to the Conference registration deadline. If approved by Executive Cabinet, the proposal will be heard at the next College Student Assembly meeting.
5. Applicants must sign a Policy Contract agreeing to all the requirements.
6. A full grant may be given to the College Student Assembly and Inter Club Council Representatives on Student Government business. Matching funds may be granted for all other Associated Student Body members, College Student Assembly and Inter Club Council Representatives not on Student Government business.
7. Matching funds for Conferences may be allowed as follows:
 - a. 1/2 Conference fee.
 - b. 1/2 Transportation costs.
 - c. Maximum of \$10 per person per night for lodging.
 - d. Maximum of \$5 per person per day for food expenses.

Receipts are required for all of the above, except food expenses.

The following will not be considered:

- a. Child care.
 - b. Room and Board in excess of the above.
 - c. Any other expense.
8. A written report is required to be submitted to the College Student Assembly two weeks after the Conference has ended. An oral report may be requested by the College Student Assembly. Failure to submit a report will be a factor in refusal of other grants in the future.
9. ADOPTION OF THESE GUIDELINES BY THE COLLEGE STUDENT ASSEMBLY DOES NOT IMPLY ANY OBLIGATION TO FUND A REQUEST!

ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 12 OF THE CITY CODE OF THE CITY OF SANTA ROSA, COUNTY OF SONOMA, STATE OF CALIFORNIA, ADOPTING SECTIONS RELATIVE TO THE PROHIBITION OF SMOKING IN CERTAIN AREAS USED BY OR OPEN TO THE PUBLIC

THE PEOPLE OF SANTA ROSA DO HEREBY ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Sections 12.10 through 12.19 are hereby added to the Santa Rosa City Code to read as follows:

Section 12.10. Findings.

The City Council of the City of Santa Rosa hereby finds that the smoking of tobacco, or any other weed or plant, is a positive danger to health and a cause of material annoyance, inconvenience, discomfort and a health hazard to those who are present in confined places and in order to serve public health, safety and welfare, the declared purpose of this article is to prohibit the smoking of tobacco or any other weed or plant, in certain areas which are used by or open to the public.

Section 12.11. Definitions.

"Smoke" or "smoking" as defined in this section shall mean and include the caring, holding, possession or smoking of a lighted pipe, cigar or cigarette of any kind or the lighting of a pipe, cigar or cigarette of any kind.

Section 12.12. Prohibition in Certain Public Places.

Smoking shall be prohibited in the following places within the City of Santa Rosa to the extent the same are subject to the jurisdiction or licensing

ORDINANCE NO. _____

ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 12 OF THE CITY CODE OF THE CITY OF SANTA ROSA, COUNTY OF SONOMA, STATE OF CALIFORNIA, ADOPTING SECTIONS RELATIVE TO THE PROHIBITION OF SMOKING IN CERTAIN AREAS USED BY OR OPEN TO THE PUBLIC

THE PEOPLE OF SANTA ROSA DO HEREBY ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Sections 12.10 through 12.19 are hereby added to the Santa Rosa City Code to read as follows:

Section 12.10. Findings.

The City Council of the City of Santa Rosa hereby finds that the smoking of tobacco, or any other weed or plant, is a positive danger to health and a cause of material annoyance, inconvenience, discomfort and a health hazard to those who are present in confined places and in order to serve public health, safety and welfare, the declared purpose of this article is to prohibit the smoking of tobacco or any other weed or plant, in certain areas which are used by or open to the public.

Section 12.11. Definitions.

"Smoke" or "smoking" as defined in this section shall mean and include the caring, holding, possession or smoking of a lighted pipe, cigar or cigarette of any kind or the lighting of a pipe, cigar or cigarette of any kind.

Section 12.12. Prohibition in Certain Public Places.

Smoking shall be prohibited in the following places within the City of Santa Rosa to the extent the same are subject to the jurisdiction of the City of Santa Rosa.

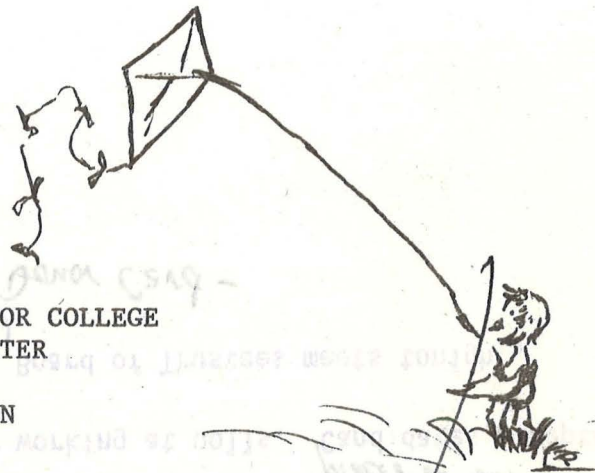
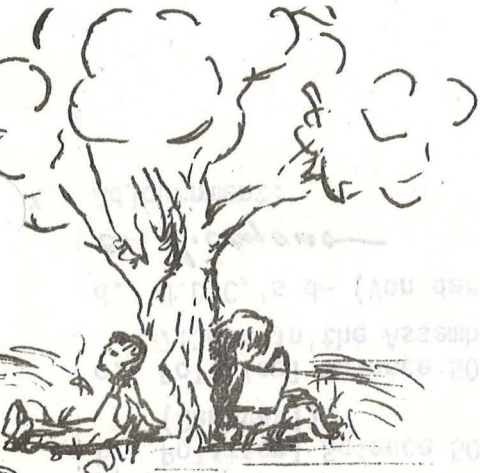

Upon your arrival at the Day Care Center on September 8, 1975, you will be given a color coded card with information based on the time of your arrival and your priority for enrollment in the Center. At this time you will be given an application that you can fill out while waiting for your enrollment interview. BRING: Study list card, SRJC I.D. with Associated Student Sticker for Fall 1975, Medical Card (if you have one).

PRIORITY FOR ENROLLMENT

The SRJC Day Care Center has received funding for the School Year 1975-76 from the State Department of Education. According to the State specifications children ages 3 months through 6 years will be admitted to the Center if their parent is: 1) a Current Welfare Recipient 2) a Former Welfare Recipient (within the last 2 years), 3) a Potential Welfare Recipient. These are listed in order of the State's priority.

The Second priority is the parent's status at the Junior College. 1) Vocational program, 2) General Education, 3) Limited student. These are listed in order of the State's priority.

The priorities mentioned above are considered together. A parent who is a Welfare recipient (currently) and enrolled in a vocational program receives first priority.

HOURS

The Center is open from 7:45 a.m. to 5 p.m. For optimum hourly usage of the Center it is preferred that parents schedule their classes in a.m. or p.m. blocks of time. One parent schedules all a.m. classes while another might schedule all p.m. classes. This also works well with Tuesday and Thursday classes and Monday, Wednesday and Friday classes. One child might be at the Center on Tuesday and Thursday while another child fills the Monday, Wednesday, Friday position. We can achieve maximum usage of the Center in this way. No child will be given more than 25 hours of child care per week.

To Whom It May Concern:

On 11 or 12 December 1975, Mr. Doug MacCallum, a proponent of Students for Students, a Santa Rosa Junior College Associated Students campaign organization, and possibly candidates of the Students for Students, were warned by Mr. Eugene S. Canevari, Student Activities Advisor, not to make any statements at the Winterfest dance sponsored by the Associated Students on 12 December 1975 mentioning the Students for Students.

The Publicity Code of the Associated Students states:

Section XIII, Clause II The interior of the cafeteria will be used on occasion by the Publicity Commissioner only, or his designated agent, for publicizing an ASB activity or event of such importance to be of interest to the campus community as a whole.

Section XIII, Clause III . . . Failure to comply with this publicity code will result in the removal of a candidate from an election. Individuals, clubs and organizations in violation of this code will be subject to a fine of not more than \$15.00.

Section XIII, Clause IV Clubs and organizations publicizing an event are responsible for their posters and publicity machines.

At the Winterfest dance, Mr. MacCallum made a statement mentioning the Students for Students organization and indicating that there was a connection between the dance and the organization.

This act is a direct violation of the Publicity Code, a direct challenge to Mr. Canevari's authority, a threat to the Elections Commissioner's and the Publicity Commissioner's ability to perform their duties, and the termination of the ability of the Associated Students to hold a fair and clean run-off election on 17 December 1975 or at any time future involving the present candidates.

This action has had a great influence on the Junior College Associated Students electorate which can not be negated by normal or emergency means.

Therefore, I demand that the Elections Commissioner and the Publicity Commissioner take any and all actions to implement the full weight of the Publicity Code in this matter including, but not limited to, removing all Students for Students candidates from the election, and fining Mr. MacCallum the maximum \$15.00.

I further demand that the Dean of Students thoroughly investigate this matter and take any and all disciplinary action found possible against all involved parties, especially Mr. MacCallum.

I take responsibility for any and all errors and omissions in the above statement.

Student Conduct

General Responsibilities: It is automatically assumed that each student will conduct himself in a manner which will reflect his awareness of common standards of decency and of the rights of others as well as his own.

College Conduct Standards: Interference with the College's educational objectives or community life, is cause for disciplinary action. All members of the College community and visitors are expected to refrain from such interference, including among others the following particular types of conduct on College premises and at College sponsored or authorized activities:

1. Obstruction or disruption of teaching, administration, or other operations or activities of the College or authorized by it; physical abuse or conduct which threatens the health or safety of any person.

2. Theft or damage to property of the College or of a member of the college community or visitor; unauthorized entry to or use of college supplies, equipment or facilities.

3. Dishonesty, such as cheating, plagiarism, misuse of college documents or identification; furnishing false information to the College.

4. Possession, use, appearance under the influence, or distribution of narcotic or dangerous drugs or alcoholic beverages; smoking in unauthorized areas.

5. Disorderly conduct or lewd, indecent, or obscene conduct or expression.

6. Failure to comply with other published college regulations or provisions of law which the College is responsible to enforce.

7. Failure to comply with directions of college officials acting in the performance of their duties.

Paragraph 6 refers to regulations pertaining to specific activities. For example, the time, place, and manner of public expression and the use of college facilities, as regulated by the policy statement on speakers, solicitation of funds and dissemination of literature on campus; and regulations on traffic and parking. Members of the campus community are expected to familiarize themselves with these regulations, which will be made available to them as they engage in the activities concerned.

I believe that paragraphs 1, 6 and 7 were violated in the actions pertaining to the Winterfest dance statement.

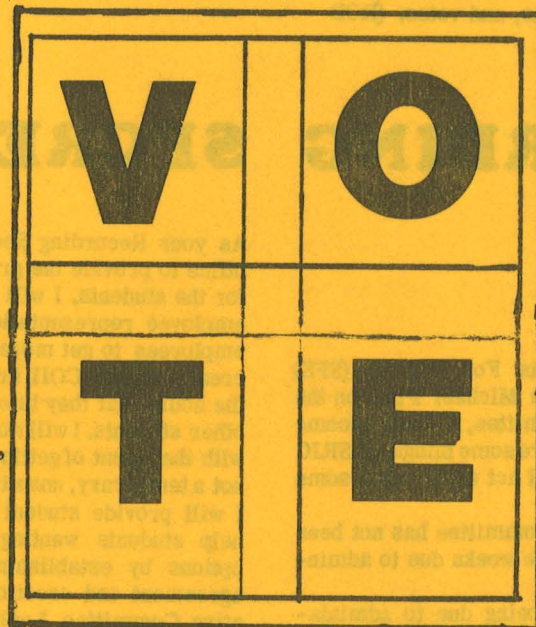

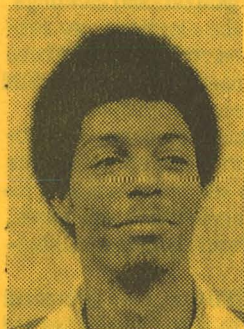

The four Students For Students candidates in the run-offs this Wednesday are:

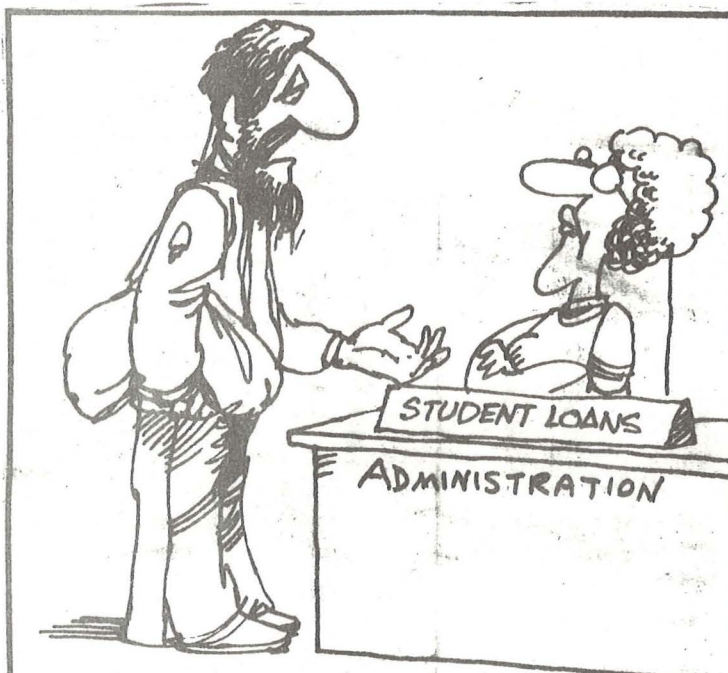

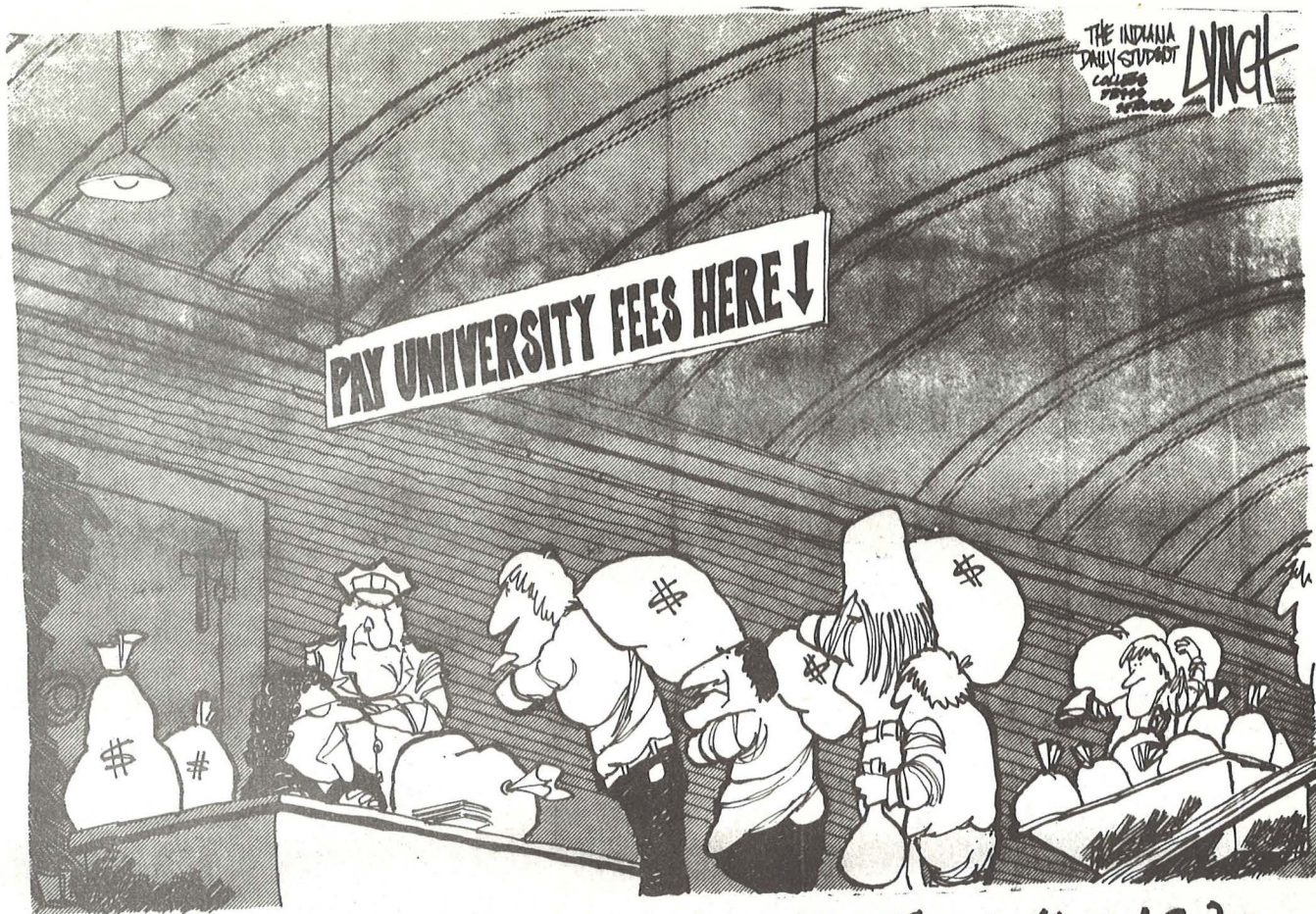
I'm writing to thank those who supported us last week for their votes ...and to ask for that support one-more-time..as well as to ask for the support of those of you who did not vote for us last week.

When the College Student Assembly (CSA) wanted to take \$10,000 of student reserve funds and re-invest them in a higher-interest bank, the action had to be approved by the SRJC board of trustees.

Rather than invest the funds in a bank that would pay higher interest, the present CSA voted to invest the money in the Exchange Bank -- a bank that the college owns 51% of.

Students For Students would question this type of move. We believe that students should invest their money in the place where they would make the most money, not simply where the administration thinks it should go.



Students For Students want to expand the SRJC intramural programs, encouraging departmental teams, club teams, free-spirit teams, etc.

We would like to appoint a Sports Commissioner to coordinate the teams' games, scout for sites, provide equipment and help with publicity.

Students For Students will expand voting membership of the CSA, and attempt to gain student control of student money, establish a county-wide student association as a voice for all of us, and transform the CSA into a real student government.

FREE Student Art

Students should have a place where they can display their own art...more than once a semester and without censorship.

As it stands now, there is one art show by students per semester...and it isn't really a student show because the works for exhibition are selected by the faculty.

Two student sculpture works, supposed to be shown in the Women's Center, were pulled (censored) by the director. (Are we junior-high students, to be "protected" from "inappropriate" art? What art is "inappropriate"?)

Students For Students are working for a permanent place on campus to display student art.



The Times, They Are A'Changin'...

The times have changed: the students of 1975-76 are a lot more aware of the real world than ever before... They're asking, demanding that student government meet real needs, human needs...

To meet this demand, Students For Students have put together the following programs:

Red Tape Cutters (RTC) -- A regular office, staffed as near round-the-clock as possible, to direct students to the right individuals, to help them accomplish what they want...or, at least, to inform them who they should see to get through the academic maze.

Expanded Referral Services -- An office staffed by CSA members, clubs and volunteers to provide referrals for services such as family planning, medical aid, food stamps --or even where to find good music on a Friday night.

Expanded Day Care -- Students For Students are working on expanding the existing day care centers and on setting up alternative types of day care. (Contact the Women's Center for details of a meeting about day care on Dec. 17).

More Night Activities on Campus -- There isn't very much for people under twenty-one to do on the weekends. Students For Students want to set-up a regular series of films, concerts and happenings (like ethnic fairs...maybe even proms) for the students --all of which will be as low-cost as possible, and geared towards meeting the needs of as many people as possible.

Barrier-free Campus -- SFS would like to make this campus as barrier-free as possible for ambulatory students. This can be accomplished by having student input on long-range college planning and plant construction.

Collective Bargaining for Students -- When the last pay raises came 'down' from the college trustees, the administrators wound-up with a 12.6% salary increase (range: \$26,496-\$33,804), the teachers with an 8.9% increase (range: \$11,490-\$22,350+), the classified employees with 7.1% (range: \$6-10,416), and the students/tutors with less than 5% (from \$2.15 to \$2.25 per hour).

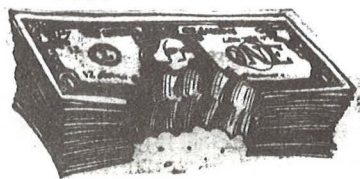

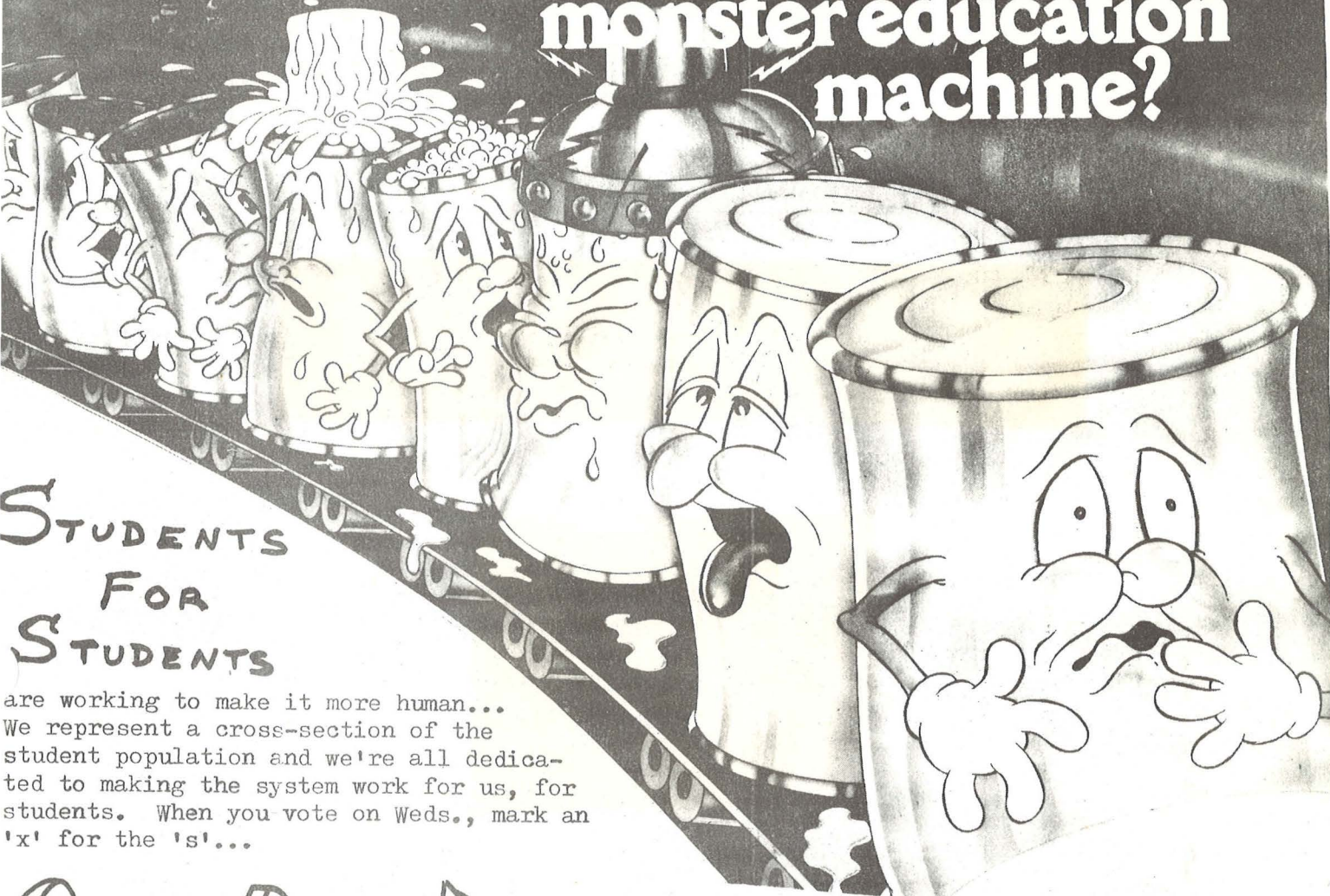

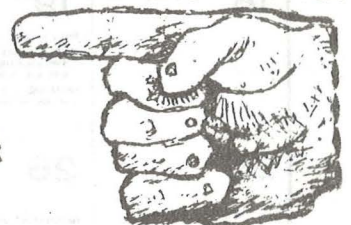

George was supported by interested organizations while he was a student at Montgomery, SRJC and later UCLA. He is currently an assistant dean in the office of foreign students and scholars at Cal State, Fullerton. His wife, Jaqueline, is a professor of Spanish linguistics at the same school.

George has not forgotten his oft-repeated pledge to return to Africa to help his people. He'll stay in this country long enough, he said yesterday, to see his younger brother, Gitonga, through school. Gitonga, a student at SRJC, lives in Healdsburg with the Jim Stanfield family.

SRJC gets \$150,000 for Doyle Scholarship Fund

A check for \$45,000 has been presented to the Santa Rosa Junior College Doyle Scholarship Fund, bringing the year's total contribution to the college to \$150,000.

Under the will of Frank P. Doyle, second president of the Exchange Bank, a trust was established providing scholarships for worthy students.

Doyle, who died in 1948, owned 51 per cent of the bank's stock, and directed the stock be placed in trust, with dividends used to provide scholarships for the college. The recent \$45,000 check represented the fourth 1975 payment. Annual contributions to the college from the 27-year-old trust now total \$1,500,000 to 3,500 students.

The trust also provides \$2,000 annual payment to the City of Santa Rosa for the maintenance of Doyle Park, a gift to the city from Doyle.

The presentation of the check was made by Andrew J. Shepard, chairman of the board and president of the bank, and other Doyle trustees Warren Dutton and Obert Pedersen, to Dr. Roy

Mikalson, Santa Rosa Junior College president.

Shepard pointed out that because of the recently de-

clared 10 per cent stock dividend, the college could anticipate larger contributions during the coming year.

This increase, he said, could run between \$10,000 and \$15,000.

Michael Platt, a 23-year old Air Force Veteran, will take over as student body president at Santa Rosa Junior College Jan. 28 with the goal of making students government more responsive to a wider range of students.

Platt ran as part of the Students for Students group, which swept the recent elections by grabbing nearly all the elected positions in the Associated Students' Government.

"More student control of student funds is one of our goals," explains Platt. "We want to have more say in the disbursement of the Dean's Loan and Grant Fund, which is financed through student funds and is currently controlled by an assistant dean in student personnel. We are also going to take a very close look at where all student funds are currently going to see that they are meeting the needs of a broad section of the student body."

The Associated Students' budget is more than \$70,000 and goes toward such things as sport events, arts and lectures, child day care, women's center, the agriculture judging team and insurance.

When asked how he expected to overcome student apathy, a constant problem of most student governments, he indicated, "We hope to provide more activities such as a film series during the week, dances and more evening activities. We also want to help students cut through the institutional red tape by creating a 24-hour information and assistance line for students."

A Sonoma County students' association, an independent association for and by students, is also planned. According to Platt, the association would be separated physically and financially from the college and would also include California State College, Sonoma students. Platt said a one-time grant from the SRJC student assembly might be needed to get the project off the ground, although details have yet to be worked out.

REPLACEMENT FOR THE MINUTES OF THE JANUARY 7 --, EXECUTIVE CABINET MEETING

The minutes for the last meeting of the Executive Cabinet for the Fall semester of 1976, held on January 7, 1976, were inadvertently destroyed. What follows is a recap of the minutes of that meeting.

All of the members of the Executive Cabinet were present with the exception of Clarence Hagins and John Denny. 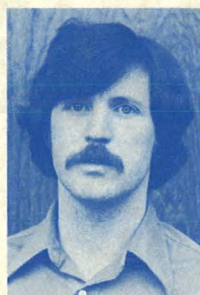
