- 1. <u>College Day (Spring)</u>---Associated Students contribution to "All College Day" to be held on May 6th, 1978.
- 2. Welcome Back(Fall)---would pay for entertainment, free hot dogs and sodas for ASB members as a Welcome Back gesture by the ASB.
- 3. Hospital and Insurance---would be the monies needed to pay the extra premiums we might need to pay in the event of larger sales of cards, and the monies to make up the difference in claims not paid by the insurance company for intercollegiate athletic injuries.
- 4. Revolving Book Loan Fund---would increase balance in this fund.
- 5. Dean's Loan and Grant Fund---would increase balance remaining in this fund.
- 6. Super 8 Camera---would purchase new super 8 camera with macro adjustment to replace camera broken during the last year.
- 7. <u>Student Employees---would provide a source of funds for paying student employees for jobs that we have no other source of funds for .</u>
- 8. Entertainment---would add money to the assemblies budget to cover the cost of bands, etc.
- 9. Photo Supplies---pays for chemicals, film and paper for use in the dark room and for photo jobs for ASB.
- 10. <u>Poster Board---</u>pays for the poster board and ink used in the publicity bunker for the advertising of ASB functions.
- 11. Robin Whitney Film Grant---already approved by Spring Executive Cabinet.
- 12. IBM Self-Correcting Typewriter (Selectric)——There seems to be a need for an additional IBM-Self-Correcting Selectric. The self-correcting feature speeds up typewritten material and guarantees a more professional appearance.
- 13. <u>Idea Awards Program</u>—--started by Spring Executive Cabinet. These funds would allow us to continue the program.
- 14. Spirit Team---would pay for part of team expenses.

- 15. Slide Copier---would be an addition to our photo materials and would facilitate production of Associated Student/Student Activities slide show.
- 16. S.R.J.C. Recruiting Posters---would pay for the cost of printing a limited run, 4-color poster for our office use in recruitment.
- 17. S.R.J.C. Color Photo Prints & Framing Enlargements——we have an abundance of attractive slides of the campus and activities. These funds would allow us to have them enlarged and framed to hang in the Student Activities Office.
- 18. Employees (Fisher/White) --- contingence fund-to allow or anticipate any increases in district pay raises that we have not foreseen.
- 19. <u>Club Seed Money Project</u>——funds to help clubs start money making activities for "All College Day".
- 20. Special Lenses---would add to our public relations and photo capabilities.
- 21. Legal Aid---increase time (1 month) attorney is available for counseling.
- 22. Closeup Lens---same as 20.
- 23. <u>Student Services</u>—— super-miscellaneous. Used as a cushion for next year's Student Services budget item. Used for items such as conferences, printing expenses, funding special projects, etc.
- 24. <u>T-Shirts---would</u> pay for the purchase of a large supply of T-Shirts so that when we need them for jobs like RTC, Registration Volunteers, etc. we do not have to pay such an exorbitant price. By purchasing in volume we can get a better unit price.
- 25. Band T-Shirts---would provide funds to pay for purchase and silkscreen-ing of T-Shirts for pep band for football and basketball.
- 26. Rooters T-Shirts---Would provide funds to pay for purchase and silkscreening of T-Shirts for rooters as a device to produce a committed rooting section for football games.
- 27. <u>Video equipment---</u> Would purchase a video camera, video recorder (reel to reel type, and a tripod. This equipment would be used to tape meetings and serve as a tool to increase or improve group interaction.

- 28. Off-campus printing --- this item gives us a cushion against rising costs of printing of our publications (Calendar of Events, Picayune, Student Handbook, Discount Booklet, etc.)
- 29. <u>Ticket-crew</u> --- Since we prepared the budget for next year, another football game has been added to the schedule. This figure would pay for the additional costs of another game's ticket crew and security.
- 30. Popcorn machine --- Would pay for the purhcase of a popcorn machine and cart (like the one in the bar a Lyon's) This item could be used as a money making device by clubs, spirit teams, etc.

The twelve positions on the new SRJC College Council have been filled and the

Council will begin meeting twice monthly starting in September, according to Brook Tauzer, new Vice President of Academic Affairs and secretary to the Council.

Named to the new policy recommending body are: faculty representatives, Dean Frazer, Lois Mazzucchi Claudia Turner-Busching, and Courtenay Anderson (serving as President of the Academic Senate); administrative representatives, Duane Blackwill, Jack Healy, Gene Canevari, and Brook Tauzer; classified representatives, Marie Francescutti and Annette Nelligan; and student representatives, Jim DeManche and Santiago Tarantino.

The Superintendent/President serves as an ex-officio non-voting member of the Council and as a resource

person to the Council.

All office holders will be elected to two-year terms with the exception of the students who hold one-year terms and the Vice President of Academic Affairs and President of the Academic Senate who are permanent members.

Faculty representatives were selected by the Academic Senate and administrative appointments were made by the Administrative Association. CSEA selected the classified members, while the Associated Students' Executive Cabinet named the student members.

Chairperson for the Council will be elected by the membership for a one-year term and except for the first chairperson, must have served on the Council for one year prior to serving as chairperson.

The College Council was established by the Board of Trustees as part of the District's reorganization. Except for the Board and the Superintendent/President, the Council is the highest policy recommending body at SRJC. In addition to policy formation, the Council will coordinate and give direction to all

committee actions on the campus.

All campus committees will become subcommittees of the Council. The Council is charged with reviewing the structure of all college committees and establishing the scope and function of all committees.

The Academic Senate, Student Government, and other such bodies are not part of the committee system, and the Council is charged with routing policy changes to them, the President's Cabinet and classified employees prior to taking final action.

ENERGY SAVINGS

ANNOUNCED

Natural gas consumption at SRJC dropped 37% during the month of April over 1976,

according to John Thomson, Superintendent of Buildings and Grounds.

The Swim Center, which uses natural gas to heat the swimming pools, showed a reduction of 42% over last year.

"These large savings have been the result of the resetting of thermostats, lowering of pool temperature, and nightly use of the pool cover," explained Thomson. "But the most important is an awareness by the entire campus community of our country's energy shortage."

Electrical consumption is continuing at a lower level which was achieved a year ago. Further reductions in electrical consumption will depend on the individuals awareness of the light switch and its use at ever opportunity, says Thomson.

LOSE SUIT

Superior Court Judge Joseph P. Murphy, Jr. has denied a petition by SRJC part-time

instructors requesting that they be

classified regular or contract employees.

In handing down the opinion, the Judge stated, "Section 13337.5 when read together with Section 13346, manifests a legislative intention that certificated instructors employed for not more than 60% of a full-time assignment. . . are classified as temporary employees."

Therefore, explained Murphy, "the Board of Trustees is under no duty to classify the individuals as

or contract employees."

The part-time employees represented by California Teachers Association indicated they would appeal the decision.

ACCOUNT CODES CHANGING

Staff members will soon be receiving a packet describing the new account coding

system for 1977-78 purchase orders, according to Dick Hollingshead, SRJC Business Assistant and head of purchasing.

The ars at Santa Rosa Junior College have taught them skills not found in any classroom. They learn experience, but you are now offered an opportunity to learn by reading this publication. There ll be times (like when you are late for a mid-term) when you will consider your parking skills hally or more important than your study skills.

ery student who parks on campus has to purchase a parking sticker. It normally costs seven dolors, but by joining the Associated Students, you can get a sticker for only two bucks. We don't commend trying to park without a sticker because you will get ticketed and after a few tickets, a can pick your car up at Swift's Garage where towed vehicles are taken.

RKING PROBLEM?: Why is there a parking problem? Obviously, because at certain times, there more people trying to park than there are spaces. Although the college is making an effort to more room for parking, recent construction has eliminated quite a few spaces. If they were to evide enough spaces for everyone on campus, the lot would run from Bailey Hall to the Mendocino erpass. Another alternative would be to eliminate classroom buildings. Some students have adated selling only as many permits as there are spaces, on a first-come, first-served basis. Is would be fine for the lucky few, but would be a waste because no one goes to school all day a persons with different schedules can use the same parking space with no conflict.

AK HOURS AND SEMESTER SWELLING: Almost everyone wants to go to school only on Monday, Wednesday, I Friday mornings (but not too early!). This means that it is hardest to get a place for your on MWF from about ten to noon. Nine and one can also be a problem. The first three weeks of the parking situation easier for those of us who do go to classes. The last two weeks of the er will also see an increase in traffic as everyone tries to prepare for finals in classes ch they have never attended.

KING STRATEGY & TACTICS: Knowing that you have a ten o'clock class, you should try to arrive least a half hour early. This will let you take a quick tour of all parking lots and maybe and an empty space.

en you make up your schedule, consider an eight o'clock class. No one likes to wake up early, it is easier and less frustrating than trying to park an hour later.

ley lot faces Mendocino Avenue and is the most visable of the parking lots. Therefore, the art parker bypasses it and checks the back lots first. Not only are they less crowded (until new students finally find them), but depending on your class location, they might be more evenient (especially Bech lot for science classes). Also, don't forget the temporary lots right of Armory Drive. The walk is longer, but.....

le you're looking at the back lots, keep the far rows in mind too. While the blind optomists cle around the first two rows waiting for a space to open, those in the know sail right into a ce in the back corner and can sit in the Coop drinking coffee while those too lazy to walk a further keep burning gas.

chough your day is just beginning, some students finish early. When classes let out, watch for ople walking toward their cars. Some are just changing books, but some are ready to surrender age of the elusive asphalt.

all else fails and absolutely no space exists on campus, there is some legal parking on streets r the campus. Nearby businesses frown on students using their lots during classes and some l tow! Also be considerate of our neighbors and don't block their driveways, park on the ubs, etc.

't it be nice to zoom right into a parking space at anytime on anyday? And you know, it just be possible if we all Car Pooled. Not only would it be easier to park but we could e on expenses. Just in case you're interested in a Car Pooling Program there is a ride board e located in the Student Activities Office, Pioneer Hall, or just check around.

LETING AND TOWING: Ticketing and towing are phenomenon that occur when cars are parked illely, so be sure to read your parking rules which you receive with your sticker. Otherwise, you hat find your car ticketed or maybe even towed away. If you happen to be the unlucky recipient a ticket which you feel was unjustly given, the solution is to appeal it. SRJC has an appeals rd made up of students but you must file an appeals form at the Campus Police Office no later in five days after you get the ticket.

MORE RULES: Finally, remember two more rules which will help you in parking on campus. st, stay patient. A space will open up sooner or later and probably before your class starts. and, "Courtesy is contagious" or "An accident in Elliot Lot will make you later than looking a space in Bech Lot". Good Luck. Now Ready...Set...Go!

SSC return of student

government?

ROHNERT PARK

Forums this week may determine whether student government will return to Sonoma State College.

Graduate student James Hershey, one of four students trying to revive student government, said the forums are to stimulate student interest and gather input on what students want.

Student government was abolished in 1970 when students, feeling their influence on campus had severely diminished, voted out the fees which supported it.

Since then numerous attempts have been undertaken to reinstitute some kind of collective student voice but none successfully.

Hershey, however, feels "optismistic" about his group's chances.

Robert Joseph, of the campus Student Resource Center, agrees, doubting this new effort "will get bogged down" as did previous attempts.

Joseph said this new group is setting a "midrange goal" more easily attainable.

Joseph said the group is planning to scheduled an election, probably in November, where students will elect a committee to draw up a proposed student government.

Later, students would vote on the government and elect representatives to it.

Joseph said students, at least 70 per cent of those polled in a survey last year, want some kind of student government.

Reeling off a nember of past controversial campus issues, Hershey said students, because of a lack of a collective voice, are nearly powerless in the campus decision making process.



Santa Rosa Junior College trustees took actions Monday night:

SCOR - Approved \$100,000 funding for 1977-78 for Sonoma County Organization for the Retarded (SCOR) while deciding the organization must pay the college \$36,149.87 over the next four years. The district forgave an additional \$13,406. The vote was 5-1, with trustees John Jacobs opposed.

ASSOCIATION - Approved the concept of Redwood Empire Industries (REI) associating with California Human Development Corporation with REI's same services in vocational training for the handicapped and disadvantaged to con-

tinue as before.

FUNDING - In both SCOR and REI situations, the college provides support by funding employee positions approved by the trustees.

BID - Awarded the bid for construction of the Salem Avenue parking lot to Ghilotti Brothers for \$33,080. There were five bids. The estimate was \$35,000.

NAMED - Trustees Lianne Reynolds and Lawrence Bertolini to review the board of governors fiveyear plan with college President Roy Mikalson and to prepare a comment from the local level.

ENROLLMENT - First days of enrollment show 6,551 day students with the peak expected to reach about 7,100. Night students, including some day students attending both sessions, number 8,876 - also expected to increase.

STATUS - Received a progress report on funding, applications, construction and completion schedules on a variety of campus building and

remodeling projects.

BROADCASTS - Praised Eugene Canevari, assistant dean for student activities, for his continuing campus-oriented broadcasts via Radio KSRO as an extra activity.

APPRENTICESHIP - Scheduled Oct. 24 for a special meeting to discuss continuing some apprenticeship classes as open enrollment or as closed courses only for apprentices.

Out of the ASB closet

There is a mysterious, nameless figure on the SRJC campus. He is the attorney that is working for the Associated Student Body (ASB) to provide legal services for student body card holders.

The reason the legal advisor's name is kept quiet is because he is only allowed to work on student legal problems two hours a week for his \$100 monthly salary. The campus attorney is also a faculty member and apparently finds himself overloaded if he takes on more than his allotted two hours. At present a student must make an appointment through the student activities office in order to get legal aid. The present waiting list is backed up almost to the end of the semester.

We appreciate the legal service program that the ASB offers, but it is cearly not enough. When the campus attorney has to keep a low profile to avoid an overload of calls during his off duty hours then the

current legal program is failing.

In the past, the ASB pushed for expanded legal services but were refused by the board of trustees. The board was reluctant to grant the small fee that was given for legal services. If the board feels that providing legal services is not part of giving students an education, they should reconsider. The chances of a person having to go to court are many, and few people at the junior college level or beyond are prepared to face such circumstances. There is a clear need for students to have a place to go for legal assistance in case of car accidents, law suits, rent disputes or other court related problems.

Section I - Purpose and Introduction

In accordance with the provisions of the College Policy Statement on Speakers, Solicitation of Funds and Dissemination of Information on Campus, the College Student Assembly in cooperation with the Dean of Students, establishes this code for the conduct of a campus Hyde Park.

Having been delegated the responsibility for operating a Hyde Park program by the Dean of Students, the College Student Assembly vests the control of the program in the Arts and Lectures Commissioner acting in cooperation with the Student Activities Advisor.

Section III - Activities Covered

"Hyde Park activities might include debates, prepared or spontaneous statements, or simple, informal discussion"

Section IV - Place

The place designated for these activities shall be in front of the Doyle Student Center (coop).

Section V - Time

- A) Facilities shall be made available on all days of regularly Scheduled classes.
- B) The time for these activities shall commence at noon and remain available for one hour.

Section VI - Equipment

Equipment for Hyde Park shall consist of the following:

- A) Lectern or podium
- B) A sign donating "HYDE PARK" to designate the place
- C) No power amplification equipment is to be permitted.

Section VII - Privileges and Responsibilities

In order to insure the proper use of a Hyde Park Policy, users of this means of communication are guaranteed the rights of free speech and care shall be taken to see that these rights are not abused. Additionally, the rights of other members of the community shall not be abused by the users of Hyde Park in the name of free speech.

It is expected that the privileges, responsibilities, and limitations imposed by the Hyde Park Code will be observed by all users of the facility. Lewd or obscene conduct violates the report of free speech. It is the obligation of the President of the Associated Students, the Activities Advisor, and the Dean of Students, or their duly designated representative, to require observance of the Hyde Park Code.

Section VIII - Eligibility

The use of Hyde Park facilities shall be limited to the following persons:

- A) Any student enrolled in at least one course in which at least one unit of credit is given at Santa Rosa Junior College.
- B) Any member of the Santa Rosa Junior College faculty.
- C) Any member of the Administration or Board of Trustees.
- D) Any member of the classified staff of the College.

Section IX - Rules of Courtesy

- A) Five minutes shall be deemed a maximum courteous time for speaking if others desire to use facilities.
- B) Persons should show care for the equipment provided, not damaging, altering or removing.

Section X - Miscellaneous Policies

- A) Activities are not required to be scheduled; however, notification of planned speeches, etc., to the Assemblies Commissioner can be made for coordination purposes.
- B) Any eligible person may commence to use Hyde Park facilities at any time during its operation, on a first come, first serve basis.

Section XI - Adoption, Revision, and Repeal

This code shall be effective the first Monday following its adoption by the College Student Assembly and the Dean of Students. Its contents may be revised or repealed by joint action of the College Student Assembly and the Dean of Students.

FINANCIAL CODE

ASSOCIATED STUDENTS - SANTA ROSA

JUNIOR COLLEGE

ARTICLE I - OBJECTIVES

The Financial Code is established to define those policies and procedures for the developing, approving and expending of all money under the control of the Associated Students of Santa Rosa Junior College and its associated organizations; in order to insure worthwhile educational experiences for the students and to insure that all financial transactions will be made in the best interests of the Associated Students and in accordance with all pertinent County, State, and District financial regulations.

ARTICLE II - RESPONSIBILITY OF THE COMMISSIONER OF FINANCE
The Commissioner of Finance (and the Student Activities Advisor) shall be responsible for seeing that all financial transactions of the Associated Students are in accordance with this code, and for carrying out other duties as outlined in the Constitution of the Associated Students. In the absence of the Commissioner of Finance, the Assistant Commissioner of Finance, shall have the authority for carrying out the responsibilities of Commissioner of Finance.

ARTICLE III - BUDGETS

SECTION 1. All of the finances of this organization shall be administered under a budget system.

SECTION 2. Preparation of the budget:

- A. All requests for budget items must be submitted to the Commissioner of Finance no later than April 15th.
- B. The Commissioner of Finance, in cooperation with the Budget Committee, shall present this budget to the Executive Cabinet no later than May 1st of each school year.
- C. The Executive Cabinet shall review the preliminary budget and present a proposed budget to the C.S.A. no later than the last meeting

in May of each school year.

- SECTION 3. The approval of the annual budget requires a 2/3 vote of the College Student Assembly. Once the budget has been approved, changes require a one-week posting before action may be taken and require a 2/3 majority to carry.
- SECTION 4. Requests for funds, in excess of budgeted amount, must be submitted in advance to the Commissioner of Finance, who will present the request to the College Student Assembly.

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- SECTION 3. Banking of all funds and all official bookkeeping records shall be the responsibility of the Accounts Manager.
- SECTION 4. All Associated Students and student organization funds collected from any source whatsoever, shall be deposited immediately with the Accounts Manager--individuals and groups should avoid keeping money overnight.
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All expenditures of Associated Students, Trust, or Organization accounts shall follow the procedures outlined below.

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- SECTION 2. The approved requisition shall then be presented to the Accounts Manager.
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 Any goods or services paid for by check must be validated by receipted bills, which must be returned to the Accounts Manager, indicating that delivery has been made. In the event that the check is made payable to a student officer or faculty member (himself not the vendor), it is the duty of this person to obtain receipts for all money paid out and to return these immediately to the Accounts Manager. Individuals obtaining goods or services without authorization will be held personally responsible for the payment of them.

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ARTICLE VIII - MAINTENANCE OF RECORDS

Every club or organization should maintain accurate records of all income and expenditures.

An annual audit of all Associated Students organization accounts, and Trust accounts, shall be made by a certified public accountant or a public accountant employed by a certified public accountant, or a public
