Deadlines set for JC's Doyle scholarships

High school seniors throughout the Redwood Empire can turn good grades into cash with little difficulty if they plan to enroll at Santa Rosa Junior College in September.

That's what Frank P. Doyle had in mind when he included generations of SRJC students in his will. His action established the Doyle Trust, which is Exchange Bank's majority stockholder. Trust funds provide "worthy young men and women attending SRJC" Doyle Scholarships ranging from \$400 to \$1,500.

Doyle, president of the bank until his death in 1948, provided a \$500,000 dividend to the college in 1985 from the Frank and Molly O'Meara Doyle Scholarship Fund. March 1 is the deadline for high school' seniors and continuing SRJC students to apply for Doyle Scholarships for next fall. However, students preferring to have financial need considered toward the Doyle amount they could receive must submit a Student Aid Application for California by Feb. 11 at the college's Financial Aid Office.

Doyles are awarded non-competitively and are based first on academic standing.

Applications are available at all Sonoma County high schools. Seniors outside the county may call the college and ask for the Scholarship Office to have applications mailed. The office is in Bailey Hall.

SRJC criticized for ack of King holiday

A representative of the National ssociation for the Advancement f Colored People told Santa Rosa unior College trustees Monday light black people feel like second-class citizens" because he college is not observing Martin uther King Jr's. birthday as a oliday.

Loretta Williams first demandd the board close all operations ext Monday to honor King, "a reat American," then asked why he holiday was excluded from the chool calendar.

"You all knew it (the holiday) vas coming," Williams said.

The day celebrating the birth of he late civil rights leader, Jan. 20, las been declared a federal holilay for the first time this year, ind is a state holiday as well.

At the college, however, it will e another day of finals and also he first day of spring semester egistration for new and continung students.

Board members and SRJC Presdent Roy Mikalson said the holiay was not up to the board or dministration to declare. He said t was a decision of the Legislature nd is subject to contract negotiaions with employee organizations.

Mikalson said the college system's Board of Governors could not declare the birthday a holiday this year because state lawmakers had authorized it as a school holiday only for those in kindergarten through 12th grade.

Williams was told there's a possibility, however, King's birthday will spread beyond kindergarten through 12th grade schools to two- and four-year colleges next year.

Gilbert Gray, also an NAACP representative in Santa Rosa, asked for an assurance King's birthday will be a holiday next year.

"I know you have to negotiate the holiday. That can be resolved too," he said.

"If it isn't a holiday next year," he said, "we'll be back."

When the Legislature was mentioned again, he added, "We'll go there too."

SRJC students and staff members held school-day observations for King's birthday Monday, a week ahead of the national holiday. The school had speakers, gospel music and other events in honor of the late civil rights leader.

oppose regional boards

Community college officials in Santa Rosa and Ukiah are among those against a proposed change in the governing structure of two-year colleges that could strip the districts of most of their remaining control.

Under study is a proposal to create regional boards around the state that would eliminate individual college district boards of trustees.

Not only would it take away the power those boards have in hiring presidents like Roy Mikalson at Santa Rosa Junior College and Leroy Lowery at Mendocino Community College in Ukiah, it could end local responses to student, employee, community, business and industry needs, officials said.

Today, community colleges are run by a professional staff answering to elected trustees and a superintendent-president.

Individual college districts receive direction from and report to a state chancellor and a state Board of Governors of the community college system.

Under study and headed for a final report later this month or early March is a proposal to divide the college system into several regions, each directing several community colleges. The regions would be headed by a chief executive officer, answering to the state-level Board of Governors.

The proposal, part of an overall study of the mission and master planning for two-year colleges, has been pursued by a special state Master Plan Review Commission that eventually will send its recommendations to a joint legislative committee. There the regional plan will be adopted, altered or shelved.

Mikalson said the regional governing approach is being pushed by state officials who believe "some local boards have lost

control to special interest groups, such as (employee) bargaining units."

Most of those boards are in Southern California, he said.

"We hope the commission will take the regional concept out of its report on a master plan for higher education," Mikalson added. "Community colleges want to stay the way we are because most boards provide continuity, perform many useful functions and represent their communities since they are familiar with local needs."

Lowery said Mendocino Community College and many others — including the California Community College Trustees and the California Chief Executive Officers — have endorsed a statement against the regional concept.

"We don't see any gain from a regional structure," Lowery said. "We feel we could get lost in a larger district." As for a larger governing structure, Lowery said today's multicollege districts are the ones having problems.

SRJC Trustee Larry Bertolini is an outspoken foe of the regional concept.

"Local control is being eroded. The value of that control is the response to community needs," he said. "We also need local boards to watch the use of taxpayer dollars."

Bertolini believes the regional concept ultimately will be rejected. He agrees with state Chancellor Joshua Smith, who also opposes the regional plan, that community colleges face some changes because of the study, however.

A statewide salary schedule for community college teachers, changes in statewide curriculum standards and a little more power to the system's Board of Governors are among those changes, Bertolini said.

Students offer a safe ride home

A group of Santa Rosa High School students is teaming up with the American Red Cross and the Boy Scouts exploring program to offer their friends an alternative to drinking and driving.

It's called the Safe Ride Program and it is being offered by the school's chapter of Students Against Driving Drunk.

Jennifer Tarver, who started the chapter, said the idea is to offer Santa Rosa High students who have been drinking a safe ride home. No questions asked.

The young person need only to call the program's number from 10 p.m. to 2 a.m. on Friday and Saturday and give his or her location. The group will send a member to drive the person home.

Parents and teachers are volunteering to supervise the work in case emergencies arise. But Tarver said students will answer the phones and pick up their fellow students.

Tarver is trying to get the program rolling by Dec. 13 and

certainly before the holidays.

Before that happens, however, the group still needs to raise funds to buy a two-way radio and to offset costs for gas.

Those interested can send donations to the Santa Rosa High Safe Ride Program, in care of Santa Rosa High School, 1235 Mendocino Ave., Santa Rosa 95401.

The Red Cross and the Boy Scouts have agreed to sponsor the group and to provide insurance coverage. The safe ride program was developed for the exploring program, said Tracie Parker, exploring executive for the Boy Scouts in Sonoma County.

The Santa Rosa High program will serve only that school's students. But Tarver said students from various schools may work together to eventually provide the safe ride program to students around the county.

Students at El Molino High School in Forestville are seeking funds for a similar program.

As we discussed prior to the basketball season, Wolcott's Concessions is discontinuing food and beverage operations at Santa Rosa Junior College, effective immediately, as we are between basketball and track seasons.

Wolcott's has been the concessaire at the J.C. for many years and we have enjoyed our relationship with the school and, for the most part, the students from the various clubs who provide manpower for the concession stands. It is with some regret that we end this relationship; however, we feel that we have been unable to provide the services required to the events at Baily Field and Haehl Pavilion. Our business at the Sonoma county Fairgrounds has grown to the point where we are faced with more and more conflicting dates with J.C. events, which stretches manpower and equipment. Numerous problems with the student clubs over the past two years has been a problem as their failure to show up, operating short handed and non business approach to food and beverage sales reflects on sales and our image as a business in Santa Rosa. The most serious matter has been the failure of the J.C. to improve the conditions of the concession stands at Bailey Field. Major improvements are necessary on the east side concession stands and hot water and a sink are needed for the west side. Said needs have been described in detail in previous letters to the J.C. The full potential of sales and service at Baily Field cannot be realized until said improvements are made.

Bill Trumbo was something of a legend in North Bay sports. Fans here came to believe he could coach winning basketball at any level. In 11 years at Sonoma State University and Santa Rosa Junior College, Trumbo made championships and 20-win seasons commonplace and built a reputation for teams which played with style and discipline.

Trumbo waved away several opportunities to take the next step up the coaching ladder, saying he preferred to remain in Santa Rosa. Then three years ago, he surprised junior college fans by accepting the coaching job at faraway University of Idaho where recruiting top players might be politely described as a challenge.

Santa Rosa Junior College now has its school calendar approved through the 1987 summer session, but it was the move of next year's spring break that captured most attention at last week's Board of Trustees meeting.

The board approved a shift of the spring recess from the week before Easter Sunday to the week after.

College officials recommended moving the break to after Easter Sunday in 1987 because they believe most school districts in the county plan to make the same switch.

For example, the college move was followed a day later by Santa Rosa City Schools adopting its 1986-87 calendar showing the spring break moved from before Easter this year to April 20-24, three weeks later.

Most school officials expect the spring break to follow Easter Sunday from now on because the combined state requirement of a longer school year and longer school days makes a later spring recess more beneficial to students and employees.

SRJC's coming summer session runs from June 16, when classes start, to Aug. 11 and final examinations for eight-week classes. The 1986-87 school starts classes Sept. 2 and concludes with graduation June 13. The 1987 summer session starts June 18 and ends Aug. 13 with the last finals.

Santa Rosa city's calendar next year starts school Sept. 2 and concludes June 11 for elementary and June 12 for secondary schools.

Besides shifting the spring break, the board also approved Sept. 26 and March 6 as additional staff training days with students having the days off.

1. What can CalSACC do for me?

One of the biggest gripes that legislatures have when it comes to community college student lobbyists is "what gives you the right to voice opinions on behalf of community college students?" and "Can you honestly say that you represent all of the community college students?" Since the downfall of CCCSGA (the past community college student association) there was no unified voice for community college students. During this time, many damaging pieces of legislation and financial cutbacks were impacted on the community college students. One of these was the dreaded \$50 tuition fee. Many student organizations voiced opposition to this particular piece of legislation, but they were not considered legitimate because legislators viewed them as "special interest groups" and charged that they did not really represent all community college students. I am happy to say that CalSACC can resolve these charges. Due to CalSACC's structure, we can say that we do officially represent all of the community college students throughout the state. We now have a unified voice. CalSACC plans to utilize this voice by impacting legislation in favor of community college students. Members of CalSACC are preparing testimony based on Student Services, Financial Aid, transfer programs, and many other areas directly affecting students. These testimonies will be delivered at Commission For Review of the Master Plan committee hearings, Joint Legislative Committee hearings, Educational Committee hearings, and at Legislators home and capitol offices. Massive letter writing campaigns are being formulated now in support of pieces of legislation that are beneficial to community college students. I hope this answers the question, "What can CalSACC do for me?" It is very obvious that our efforts benefit each and every community college student in this state.

2. What has CalSACC got to offer?

Along with full representation in the legislature, CalSACC can also offer:

- A. Statewide newsletter to keep you abreast on the activities of CalSACC both on the regional level, and statewide level.
- B. Legislative updates, information direct from the Chancellor's Office on differential funding, transfer programs, financial aid, etc.
- C. Participation at Regional meetings, State Governing Board meetings, Regional and State committee meetings, and semi-annual conferences.
- D. Opportunity to voice out your concerns regarding student issues in a forum of your peers and advisors (your comments are well received).
- E. Opportunity to meet other student leaders from throughout the state (you can exchange information about success and failures that associations have experienced), almost like a library of information at your disposal.

3. How is CalSACC structured?

CalSACC is a grass roots organization. There are 107 community colleges, each campus has the ability to elect, or appoint, two voting members to their respective regions (more than two students can become involved from your campus, only two may vote). In turn, each Region shall elect two Governing Board members, and Regional officers. Each Region shall also elect Regional Committee Directors. CalSACC has 10 Regions, therefore, there are 20 Governing Board members. The 20 Governing Board members elect 6 Executive Officers from within the 20 Governing Board members. As you can see, each school has direct involvement in CalSACC.

4. How can I become involved in CalSACC?

Becoming involved with CalSACC is very easy. Simply attend a Regional meeting, or Governing Board meeting. Regional chairmen generally forward meeting information to all colleges in their respective Regions. It is never too late to become actively involved in CalSACC, we encourage participation from any and all students who are representatives from any of the 107 community colleges throughout the state. However, when contemplating involvement, please consider the fact that CalSACC demands sincere committment and follow-up throughout the year. You may become as involved as you'd like, just be sure you have the time available in order to fulfill your active role in CalSACC. Proposal to College Student Assembly April 14, 1986

HYDE PARK CODE ** SANTA ROSA JUNIOR COLLEGE

Section I PURPOSE AND INTRODUCTION

In accordance with the provisions of the College Policy Statement on Speakers, Solicitation of Funds, and Dissemination of Information on Campus, the College Student Assembly, in cooperation with the Dean of Students, establishes this code for the conduct of a campus Hyde Park.

Section II OPERATION

Having been delegated the responsibility for operating a Hyde Park program by the Dean of Students, the College Student Assembly vests the control of the program in the Arts & Lectures Commissioner acting in cooperation with the Student Activities Director and his/her designee. Ultimate responsibility shall be that of the College Administration through the Director of Student Activities.

Section III ACTIVITIES COVERED

"Hyde Park activities might include debates, prepared or spontaneous statements, or simple, informal discussion"

Section IV PLACE

While realizing that freedom of speech can be exercised by individuals at various places around campus the designated area for HYDE PARK activities indicate the college's commitment to monitor these activities at the site and during the times indicated. The place designated for these activities shall be the podium located on the northeast corner of the Analy lawn.

Section V TIME

- A) Facilities shall be made available on all days of regularly scheduled classes.
- B) The time for these activities shall commence at noon and remain available for one hour unless there is a pre-scheduled activity that conflicts with Hyde Park activities.

Section VI EQUIPMENT

Equipment for Hyde Park shall consist of the following:

- A) Podium
- B) A sign denoting "HYDE PARK" to designate the place
- C) No amplification equipment shall be permitted. This includes any artificial means of amplification such as battery and/or electrical powered address systems, megaphones or other such items judged to be amplification aids by the Student Activities Director or his/her designee.

Page #2 Hyde Park Code

Section VII PRIVILEGES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

In order to insure the proper use of a Hyde Park Policy, users of this means of communication are guaranteed to rights of free speech andcare shall be taken to see that these rights are not abused. Additionally, the rights of other members of the community shall not be abused by the users of Hyde Park in the name of free speech. Hours designated for use must be adhered to.

It is expected that the privileges, responsibilities, and limitations imposed by the Hyde Park Code will be observed by all users of the facility. Lewd or obscene conduct violates the report of free speech. It is the obligation of the President of the Associated Students, the Activities Advisor, and the Dean of Students, or their duly designated representative, to require observance of the Hyde Park Code.

Section VIII RULES OF COURTESY

- A) Five minutes shall be deemed a maximum courteous time for speaking if others desire to use facilities.
- B) Persons should show care for the equipment provided, not damaging, altering or removing.

Section IX MISCELLANEOUS POLICIES

- A) Activities are not required to be scheduled; however, notification of planned speeches, etc., to the Assemblies Commissioner can be made for coordination purposes to prevent conflicts with college sponsored activities previously scheduled.
- B) Any eligible person may commence to use Hyde Park facilities at any time during its operation, on a first come, first serve basis.

Section X ADOPTION, REVISION, AND REPEAL

This code shall be effective the first Monday following its adoption by the College Student Assembly and the Dean of Students. Its contents may be revised or repealed by joint action of the College Student Assembly and the Dean of Students.

Staff Writer A traumatic thing happened to thousands of high school seniors throughout the state headed for the University of California, Berkeley, this fail.

About 14,000 of them found Berkeley's doors closed, even though they qualified for admission,

The problem, as always, was lack of space. The prestigious university quickly filled its fall freshman quota of 6,000 to 7,000 students.

This is the first year university officials allowed applicants to submit multiple-campus choices within the system. Berkeley officials said some of those turned away could be accepted at other. UC campuses, but that number is unknown at this time.

For those who still want a crack at Berkeley, however, a ray of hope exists through Santa Rosa Junior College and 16 other community colleges.

Under a program worked out between the university and the two-year schools, this fall's freshmen can gain guaranteed entry to the Berkeley campus as juniors by succeeding at the community colleges first.

SRJC and the others are designated "alternative" schools for overflow students through Berkeley's Co-operative Admissions Program, said Evelyn Pollard, the junior college's assistant dean of student services.

Through a mix-up, however, SRJC's name was left off published lists of alternative two-year campuses for the transfer program. "It is ironic our name would be left off since our reputation for the quality of students who transfer to UC and California State Universities is excellent," Pollard said.

Students will be accepted as juniors in the university's College of Letters and Sciences if they complete two-year lower division units in any of the recognized community colleges.

The students must master the courses in no more than five semesters in the community colleges, including college-level reading, writing, quantitative reasoning and foreign language.

SRJC counselors say they are ready to work closely with students to make sure the freshmen take the right courses to requirements.

Those who have applied to the Berkeley campus have been sent information about the new transfer program, minus the the news that SRIC is one of the accepted alternative schools.

Traditionally, the Berkeley and UC, Davis campuses are the first choices among SRJC students who transfer to the UC system, while Sonoma State University is the first choice. Pollard said, for those headed for the state university system, followed by the Sacramento, Chico and San Francisco campuses. STUDENT ACTIVITIES OFFICE REORGANIZATION Sub:

I am requesting that the Administration, SCOPE and Board of Trustees review and approve my recommendation to combine the part-time ASB Secretary and part-time ASB Accounts Manager positions into one fulltime job. This change has been presented to the Associated Students leadership and has their endorsement as the Associated Students pay the salary and fringe benefits of the two existing positions.

My rationale for this change is predicated on the changes in the administration and management of the Associated Students over the last few years. The Assoclated Students has experienced the need for a year around position to keep pace with the trend we are now reacting to no real down times in ASB promotions, event programming, registration and overall organization management. The ASB Secretary currently works under a 10 month contract and the ASB Accounts Manager works under an 11 month contract. In addition, due to the separation of the job functions, the Accounts Manager works from 8:00 a.m. - 1:00 p.m. and the ASB Secretary works from 9:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m. Though the two persons currently in the positions do some limited job task sharing as needed in each other's absence, the Associated Students do not have access to the full service of either employee throughout the day. This has resulted in communication problems, job task slipages and general stifling of effective work practices through no fault of the persons currently in the positions.

The obvious question arises as to whether one person can do the work of two. Over the period of the last year and one-half both the ASB Accounts Manager and ASB Secretary positions have experienced reduction in the work load, work flow and overall job tasks. The ASB Accounts Manager no longer has responsibility for the Oak Leaf accounts, limited Bookstore accounting and some ASB registration The ASB Secretary is no longer responsible for a major role in public tasks. relations when the Student Activities Office was involved heavily in PSA production and dissemination for the college.

It is my opinion that the Associated Students will best be served by this combined position. There are no major issues of reporting responsibilities or reporting structure to be addressed. I will work with the Personnel Department to determine an appropriate title and wage recommendation to follow this letter. Please let me know if there are any other processes or people I need to address to see this proposal through the proper steps.

captures 9 national medals

Members of Santa Rosa Junior College's Speech Team recently returned from Omaha, Neb., with two gold and seven bronze medals in the 1986 National Junior College Speech Tournament.

Those wins followed five medal performances by speakers in the Junior College State Championships at Modesto Junior College in March. SRJC sent six speakers to the national event, where competition involved 61 schools from across the nation.

Jacob Spitzer of Santa Rosa won a gold medal in Lincoln-Douglas Debate and earned a bronze medal in team debate with his partner, David Hiett.

The other national gold went to

Cochece Davis of Santa Rosa for Poetry Interpretation. This was the second consecutive year that Davis won the gold in poetry. He received the Neil Warren Award this year as the "Most Inspirational Speaker in the Nation."

Davis also came home with two bronze medals, one in Speech to Entertain and one with his partner, Samantha Cliffton of Santa

Rosa, in Duet Acting. Cliffton, in her first year on the team, also earned a bronze medal in Dramatic Interpretation.

Kenton Edwards of Santa Rosa rounded out the medal winners with bronze medals in Prose Interpretation and Communications Analysis.

In the state event, Spitzer and

Hiett won first in Oxford Debate. Hiett is a first-year team member, who attends SRJC part time while completing his high school education.

In her second tournament, Maureen Baumgartner went to the Modesto event and earned a silver medal in Oral Interpretation of Literature. Edwards took a silver in Prose Interpretation and a bronze for Dramatic Interpretation. Cliffton, also a first-year team member, won a bronze for Impromtu Speaking, her first time in the category.

The team is overseen by Forensics Director Alberta Hart; associate Director Jack Parella; Debate Coach Mike Ahern; and Individual Events Coach Lyn Clark-Klingensmith.

he 63 year old Jacobs graduated with honors from SRJC in 1942 and was active on the college's track team.

)r. Roy Mikalson, Superintendent/President, spoke highly of Jacobs saying, "Jack was one of the best board members and one of the best human beings that I have ever nown." Mikalson said Jacobs was a dedicated Board member and until his illness last fall, rarely missed a Board meeting. "He was incredibly supportive of this)istrict," he said.

Jacobs is survived by his wife Audrey and children. Services have not been announced, but arrangements are being handled by the Neptune Society. The flag on campus has been ordered flown at half mast until Monday.

Proposal to College Student Assembly April 14, 1986 REVISED: 5-12-86

HYDE PARK CODE ** SANTA ROSA JUNIOR COLLEGE

Section I PURPOSE AND INTRODUCTION

In accordance with the provisions of the College Policy Statement on Speakers, Solicitation of Funds, and Dissemination of Information on Campus, the College Student Assembly, in cooperation with the Dean of Students, establishes this code for the conduct of a campus Hyde Park.

Section II OPERATION

Having been delegated the responsibility for operating a Hyde Park program by the Dean of Students, the College Student Assembly vests the control of the program in the Arts & Lectures Commissioner acting in cooperation with the Student Activities Director and his/her designee. Ultimate responsibility shall be that of the College Administration through the Director of Student Activities.

Section III ACTIVITIES COVERED

"Hyde Park activities might include debates, prepared or spontaneous statements, or simple, informal discussion"

Section IV PLACE

While realizing that freedom of speech can be exercised by individuals at various places around campus the designated area for HYDE PARK activities indicate the college's commitment to monitor these activities at the site and during the times indicated. The place designated for these activities shall be the podium located on the northeast corner of the Analy lawn.

Section V TIME

- A) Facilities shall be made available on all days of regularly scheduled classes.
- B) The time for these activities shall commence at noon and remain available for one hour unless there is a pre-scheduled activity that conflicts with Hyde Park activities.

Section VI EQUIPMENT

Equipment for Hyde Park shall consist of the following:

- A) Podium
- B) A sign denoting "HYDE PARK" to designate the place
- C) No amplification equipment shall be permitted. This includes any artificial means of amplification such as battery and/or electrical powered address systems, megaphones or other such items judged to be amplification aids by the Student Activities Director or his/her designee.

Page #2 Hyde Park Code

Section VII PRIVILEGES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

In order to insure the proper use of a Hyde Park Policy, users of this means of communication are guaranteed to rights of free speech andcare shall be taken to see that these rights are not abused. Additionally, the rights of other members of the community shall not be abused by the users of Hyde Park in the name of free speech. Hours designated for use must be adhered to.

It is expected that the privileges, responsibilities, and limitations imposed by the Hyde Park Code will be observed by all users of the facility. Lewd or obscene conduct violates the report of free speech. It is the obligation of the President of the Associated Students, the Activities Advisor, and the Dean of Students, or their duly designated representative, to require observance of the Hyde Park Code.

Section VIII RULES OF COURTESY

- A) Five minutes shall be deemed a maximum courteous time for speaking if others desire to use facilities.
- B) Persons should show care for the equipment provided, not damaging, altering or removing.

Section IX MISCELLANEOUS POLICIES

- A) Activities are not required to be scheduled; however, notification of planned speeches, etc., to the Assemblies Commissioner can be made for coordination purposes to prevent conflicts with college sponsored activities previously scheduled.
- B) Any eligible person may commence to use Hyde Park facilities at any time during its operation, on a first come, first serve basis.

Section X ADOPTION, REVISION, AND REPEAL

This code shall be effective the first Monday following its adoption by the College Student Assembly and the Dean of Students. Its contents may be revised or repealed by joint action of the College Student Assembly and the Dean of Students.

Section XI Eligibility

The use of Hyde Park facilities shall be limited to the following persons:

- A) Any student enrolled in at least one course in which at least one unit of credit is given at Santa Rosa Junior College.
- B) Any member of the Santa Rosa Junior College facility.
- C) Any member of the Administration or Board of Trustees
- D. Any member of the classified staff of the College.
