- II. Absent were Suzanne Gunther, Kye Osti, Debbie Ficsher, Frank Gordon-Quiroga, Dawn Allen, Adryenn Ashley, Crystal Bridges and David Van Slyke.
- III. The agenda was approved as corrected.

- V. Reports:
 - A. Susan Solstice reported that the ASB discount issue was given an "okay" by College Council and was to be taken to the Board meeting that night.
An informal poll was taken on the smoking policy. CSA voted 12 to 6 that smoking should be banned on campus in general, in cafeteria 9 to 7 and in private offices 5 to 7, with an overwhelming decision that smoking in private offices was fine if door was kept closed.
Susan also mentioned the Cinco de Mayo celebration which brought over 100 High School students this year.
Lastly, she reminded people to report on their semester projects next meeting.
 - B. Bob Flores spoke about his hand-out material regarding the swim team, math team, re-entry and "The China Experience."
He also talked about the word "apathy."

We are writing to you to express our concern regarding Poppy Creek's 1987-88 budget allocation from the Associated Students. We were unhappy to learn that our budget request was cut by 40%. Although we do understand that you face a difficult situation with uncertain and decreasing revenues, we feel that Poppy Creek is deserving of a level of support at or near what it has been for the last ten years.

Poppy Creek School serves the campus and the community in several different ways. The provision of child care enables low-income student parents to pursue an education and develop job skills which helps them to break their welfare dependence. In addition to providing child care services to low-income student families, Poppy Creek is the largest single employer of work study students on the campus.

Although it may not appear that \$3,000.00 is a substantial amount of Poppy Creek's budget, it about equals the cost of caring for one pre-school child for two semesters. Even with the increase which we received from the District last year, we have found it necessary to do considerable active fund-raising this year to meet increasing costs. With staff and parents working diligently on fund-raising activities, the most we have ever raised in one year is \$1,500.00.

We realize that this action was a difficult one for you to make and it concerns us that future student governments may interpret it as a lack of support for child care and for Poppy Creek. We would like to request, therefore, that you perhaps prioritize excess revenue above your anticipated amount to augment Poppy Creek's allocation for 1987-88 with the objective of coming as close as possible to the \$7,500.00 which was originally requested.

Math team tops U.S.

Santa Rosa Junior College's math team and a Piner High School student taking math at the college won top awards in the recent 1986-'87 American Mathematics Association of Two-Year Colleges Student Mathematics League contest.

Held at 42 colleges across the country, SRJC's team placed first and team member Chance Beaube, the Piner student, posted a total of 96 points, the highest score in the nation.

Pierce College, another California school, was second and Miami-Dade in Florida was third.

Hal Andersen in SRJC's Mathematics Department commended Beaube and the other students for their performances on three separate examinations taken in December, February and March.

Students had an hour to answer 20 short-answer, pre-calculus-level questions.

Other members of the SRJC team were Nancy Leong, Francis Moraes, Scot Myers, Seongwn Jo, Eric Bohn, David Collis and Jeff Clark. Beaube, Leong and Moraes participated in all three examinations during the contest.

In the past seven years, SRJC has been very successful in the only mathematics contest open to two-year colleges, finishing in the top three each year. The first three places in several contests were decided by .5 to 1.5 points.

Other former SRJC students finishing with the top scores in the country were Jeff Aguilera, 1980-'81; Giao Pham, '82-'83, and Jolene Patterson, '84-'85 and '85-'86.

Scoring in the top 10 in the nation this year along with Beaube were Leong and Moraes. Past SRJC top 10 students were John Rainwater, '81-'82; Greg Spooner, '82-'83, and Pham, '83-'84.

China trip

Santa Rosa Junior College Behavioral Science Department plans "The China Experience," a 20-day study tour June 27 to July 16.

The tour begins in Shanghai, China's most European city, and goes to Beijing and Xian, where the Qin Shi Di Tom with its life-sized terra cotta army will be on the itinerary.

Other stops on the tour include the Hunan Provincial Museum, in Changsha; a cruise down the Li River in Guilin; Kinming, the "city of eternal springtime;" the Stone Forest; Guangzhou (Canton), China's trade center and most Westernized city, and Hong Kong.

Up to three units of college credit is available for tourists. The cost is \$2,894, and includes all lodging and most meals.

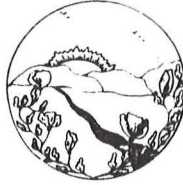

Dear Mr. Bertolini:

As you are aware, the issue of parking fees and the parking plan will be coming to you in May and June respectively. College Student Assembly has been following the parking issues closely. Students have sat on the committees that have been dealing with the parking issues.

The Associated Students, as you know, has been suffering from declining card sales since the advent of mail-in registration. The proposed fee plan includes a \$7.00 discount for ASB members, an increase of \$2.00 over our present discount. Currently, the discount is \$5.00 out of an \$8.00 parking fee.

The Associated Students feels strongly that if the ASB discount remained at the \$5.00 level it would have a serious negative impact on our card sales, since if approved, the new parking fees will be \$20.00. A \$5.00 discount would not be nearly as attractive as a \$7.00 discount if the fees are \$20.00. With the new plan, the district's increase in revenue would be \$405,587 for a total parking revenue of \$535,467.

College Student Assembly has come out very strongly for the discount increase. We feel that the negative impact of the district revenues will be negligible, while the impact on Associated Students would be great if the increase is not approved. I have met with Frank Pugh of the Academic Senate, April Chaney of SCOPE and Dr. Mikalson. They have all given their support for the discount increase. I hope that when the proposal is voted on in the May Board meeting that you will support the new fee structure as well.

College Student Assembly is in complete accord with the parking plan that will be presented to you in June. Associated Students is pleased that the administration has made parking a high priority. I think Curt Groninga is doing a great job presenting parking options and coordinating everyone's efforts.

There are also many student clubs at the Junior College such as the Engineering Club, the Global Studies group, the Medieval Arts Club and the Sonoma Screen Writers Guild. By becoming involved in a particular club, a student is surrounded by other students who share his/her special interests. The Associated Students sponsors and assists these clubs with their activities.

In summary, the role of the associated students at the junior college is not simply that of sponsor and activity director. We are also a governing body, actively participating in campus politics concerning the students and the school. Each member is either an elected officer, or a commissioner appointed by the A.S.B. president. The commissioners serve as coordinators for specialized programs such as Arts and Lectures, Entertainment, Drug and Alcohol Abuse or International Relations (my area of focus).

Our student body is especially interested in making contact with the student groups at your school. We'd like to find out what kind of activities you plan, what type of students attend, what possibilities there might be for students from our campus to attend your school through an exchange program and any other interesting information regarding your school.

WILL STUDENT GOVERNMENT SUCCUMB TO APATHY?

Why should a student get involved in campus governance? Certainly the physical benefits of staff parking privileges, keys to their own office on campus, easy access to campus and district officials and administrators can be an initial motivation. However, if we were to think in terms of just the physical benefits we are underestimating our student populations.

How many students are even aware that they have their own organization which can make their needs and concerns known to the college administration? Are students aware that student government serves as the central coordinating body which plans, organizes and finances a rich and broad program of activities and services for the entire student population? Are students aware that they can sit on and participate in vitally important campus committees which make decisions as to what courses will be offered?--how much parking will cost?--where bookstore funds go?--the hiring of major district and/or campus officials?

Student government on any college campus is an integral part of the educational program. It gives students the opportunity to develop leadership, to gain academic credit for volunteer efforts, to provide practical experience in management and getting things accomplished, to learn and work with others in informal and social situations, to make friends, to pursue special interests and to develop critical thinking and evaluation skills. It is not intended to take the place of academic work, but provide an opportunity to enrich the students' total college experience.

The leadership training is priceless, in that students are exposed to an experiential process of learning. Students are given the opportunity to develop skills in such areas as: goal setting; problem solving; time, meeting and conflict management; delegation, group dynamics/team building and communication. Students are given the opportunity to assume positions in student organizations, as well as participate and create their own social, cultural and recreational events and programs for the

JC student nabs suspect in bank holdup

Santa Rosa police say it's not a good idea to keep your money in the same bank you plan to rob.

Michael Andrew Wright, 38, was pursued and caught by a college student shortly after witnesses said he tried to make one withdrawal too many at Exchange Bank's branch at Mendocino Avenue at Steele Lane.

Police said Wright demanded money and checks from three different tellers at about 12:50 p.m. but was recognized by one of the tellers from an earlier morning visit when he withdrew money from his own account.

He also caught the eye of another customer, Christopher Torrance, 21, a Santa Rosa Junior College student.

Police said Torrance followed Wright when he left the bank and then chased him north on Rowe Drive, off Steele Lane.

As he chased Wright, Torrance yelled at two nearby women to call police.

Torrance told officers Wright turned long enough to ask, "You want your head blown off?" He then turned and continued his flight.

Torrance followed the suspect onto Schurman Drive and into a park on the north side of Steele Lane School.

Finally catching Wright, Torrance pushed him down, made a citizen's arrest and sat on him until officers arrived a few minutes later, police said.

Bank employees told police they did not see a weapon during the robbery. The suspect got cash from one teller and some checks from another.

Police Lt. Rodney Sverko said bank officials did not disclose the amount taken.

Wright was booked on suspicion of armed robbery.

PROPOSAL FROM COLLEGE STUDENT ASSEMBLY

On Monday, March 30, CSA passed the following recommendation:

"CSA recommends that the ASB discount be raised to \$7.00, when the parking fee is raised to \$13.00."

BACKGROUND

Currently the ASB gives members a \$5.00 discount off of the \$8.00 fee. The percentage of the discount amounts to 62.5%. If ASB were to retain its current percentage rate of discount, when the parking fees are raised to \$13.00, the discount would be a little over \$8.00. However we are asking for only \$7.00.

ASB's biggest benefit that brings in card sales has always been our parking discount. The members of CSA are very concerned that if the discount remains at \$5.00, ASB's proportion of discount will become smaller and will represent less of a savings to prospective ASB members. Additionally, CSA is concerned that the increased parking rate will mean less ASB card sales as the amount students must pay to get parking and join ASB will be higher. If the fees are raised again in the future, as seems likely, these concerns will become magnified. The ASB discount needs to be raised as parking fees are raised if we are to simply retain the card sales we currently have.

ASB has approached members of the administration asking for help with our funding situation. Card sales have been declining since the advent of mail-in registration. Administrators have been sympathetic and have indicated they would like to see ASB's funding base stabilized. The request for the ASB parking discount to be raised is an opportunity for the district to assist ASB in its financial crunch.

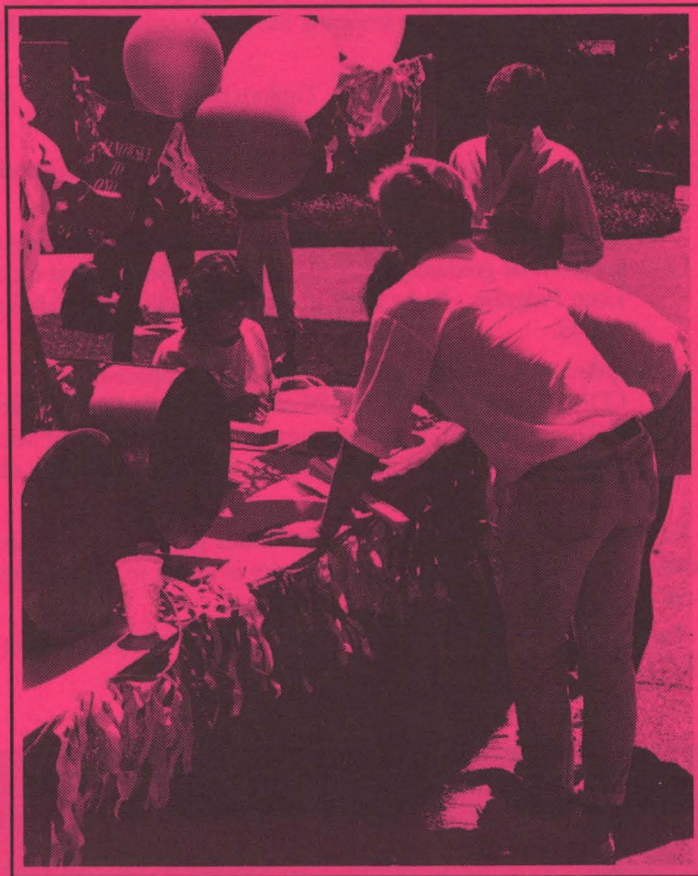

CUTTING OUT YOUR EDUCATION!

Following are highlights of the Reagan Administration's newly proposed cuts in Education for the '88 fiscal year:

- 1) Pell Grants- The proposals would DISQUALIFY ONE MILLION STUDENTS from the program by lowering the yearly family income limits from about \$28,000 to \$20,800.
- 2) Supplemental Education Opportunity Grants- The new budget cuts would ELIMINATE THESE PROGRAMS COMPLETELY.
- 3) College Work Study Program- The Reagan Administration's 1988 budget would ELIMINATE THIS PROGRAM ENTIRELY.
- 4) Guaranteed Student Loans- The Reagan Administration has proposed that this program be gradually ELIMINATED and be replaced by the Income Contingent Loan Program. Reductions in program funding of 96.6% are projected for the 1990's.
- 5) Other cuts affecting students have been proposed.
COMPLETE ELIMINATION of aid to public libraries (about \$132.5 million/year) and discontinuation of federal support of vocational education programs (about \$880 million/year) are two of the main changes suggested by the Administration.

Student Aid cuts are second only to health programs in cutbacks for fiscal year 1988. As one Washington expert said, "Congress is going to be looking for every way they can to cut the budget..."

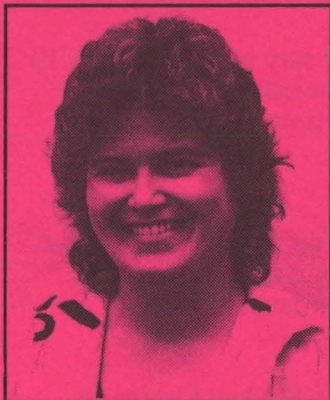

I appreciate the enthusiasm and initiative of these students.

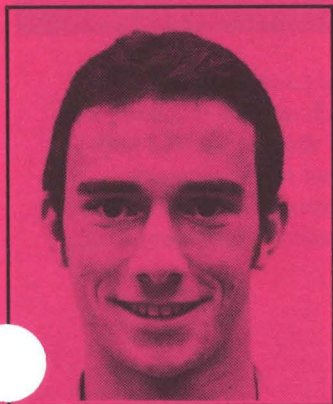

I appreciate the enthusiasm and initiative of these students.

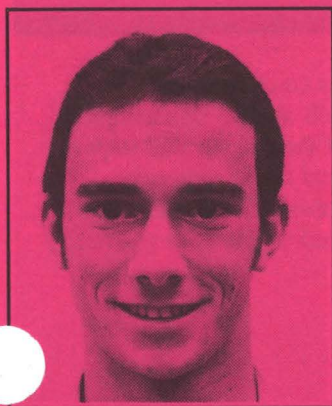

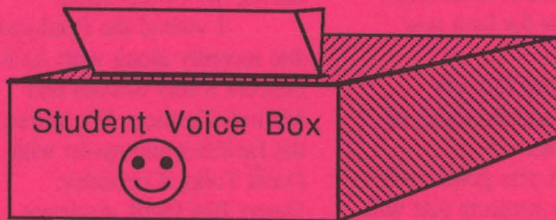

A community college

A report commissioned by Sen. James Nielsen, R-Rohnert Park, makes Santa Rosa Junior College officials nervous.

The study finds plenty wrong with California's 106 community colleges and recommends sweeping changes, including possible state control of community colleges.

The problem is Santa Rosa Junior College doesn't suffer from the financial and instructional deficiencies common to other community colleges. A local board of trustees sees to that.

Consider this example, among many: The state report recommends that community colleges eliminate part-time faculty members who are hired, the commission says, to save money.

But that's not the reason SRJC hires part-time faculty. The main reason is that part-time faculty members — whether they be business people, artists or professionals — bring an extra dimension to the college and attract thousands of part-time students. These evening classes help make SRJC a true *community* college.

We trust Sen. Nielsen, the governor and legislature will recognize the achievements of Santa Rosa Junior College. The risk is that statewide controls will drag the junior college down to the level of other community colleges.

SRJC Debaters Shine In Modesto Tourney

Educators cool to Nielsen's j

Major reforms recommended

Sweeping changes in the state's community college system are recommended in a state report commissioned by Sen. Jim Nielsen, R-Rohnert Park, but the report — and legislation to carry it out — are being greeted coolly by educators.

The report said the 106-campus system isn't well prepared to meet educational needs of Californians in the next century, when more than half the college-age population will be minorities.

It recommends beefing up academic programs for university-bound students, vocational education and remedial training, including English as a second language. It calls on community colleges to rely

less on part-time faculty and to toughen their standards for teachers.

The report of the Joint Committee for Review of the Master Plan for Higher Education also suggests changing the method for financing community colleges and says that state authorities should have a greater voice in college policies. One state panel is studying a recommendation that California's 70 community college districts be combined under a single administration, like the University of California and state university systems.

Santa Rosa Junior College President Roy Mikalson said Tuesday

that while some of the report's conclusions are justified, others are not.

"It still has some bugs in it," Mikalson said.

Assemblyman John Vasconcellos, D-Santa Clara, chairman of the joint committee, introduced legislation March 5 to carry out the report's major provisions.

Nielsen, a member of the committee, is a co-sponsor of the bill. He was author of legislation in 1984 that ordered a four-year study of California's public higher education system. He called the report "a good start" and said he hopes some of the proposals can be implement-

ed.

But Rita Mize, 1st vice president of the California Community College Association, doesn't think the report will carry out the policy recommendations. She said the \$100 million to implement them is considering a change for districts.

She noted that Deukmejian is the governor. She said the \$23 million in emergency community college bond measure approved by the legislature she doesn't expect to change his position. She said funding levels are low.

Major provisions of the bill include financial incentive for colleges to reduce

Attached is the first draft of the AIDS policy and guidelines statement. This draft was developed by the following representatives at the request of College Council:

It is our hope that this draft will be carefully reviewed and approved for adoption. A AIDS policy statement once adopted by the Board of Trustees will guide the District in dealing in an intelligent, compassionate manner with issues related to the AIDS Epidemic.

1. Why a policy for this disease and not others?
 - A) This disease is an epidemic and a public health issue.
 - B) There is a tremendous amount of anxiety and fear surrounding this disease.
 - C) Effective written policies regarding AIDS provides for the establishment of adequate safety measures to maintain a safe working and educational environment for students and employees.
 - D) Lack of effective written policies and guidelines can lead to unfair discrimination and lack of protection for the rights of students and employees.
 - E) Adopted policy statements on AIDS serve as operational guidelines to the District in dealing with routine and unanticipated AIDS related issues.
2. Why provide information or education on AIDS?
 - A) We are an educational institution.
 - B) AIDS information is our only defense against this disease at this point.
 - C) There is a mandate from the American College Health Association to provide information.
 - D) There is an urgent need for information from organizations that are credible to the entire population.

The AIDS Policy Drafting Committee is committed to continuing to assist College Council as needed in the development of an AIDS policy statement.

POLICY AND GUIDELINES

ON

AIDS

-DRAFT-

The following policy and guidelines are provided in order to prevent the spread of the virus, to reduce myths, to protect the rights of persons with AIDS virus infections, and to create an informed and supportive campus community. The policy and guidelines are based on current information obtained from sources, including the American College Health Association, Surgeon General's Report on AIDS, and the Center for Disease Control, as well as policy examples from UC, CSU and other California Community Colleges. The guidelines are based upon current knowledge and are intended to provide direction for dealing with AIDS-related issues. It needs to be recognized that policy and guidelines related to AID/ARC are based on the current medical - legal information. As new developments occur the policy and guidelines need change to reflect the most up-to-date recommendations.

POLICY ON AIDS

-DRAFT-

The Sonoma County Junior College District is committed to providing a safe as well as a fair, sensitive and non-discriminatory environment which is in compliance with federal, state, and local regulations. According to medical evidence, individuals with AIDS/ARC, do not present a health risk to others in the classroom nor in the workplace.

The Sonoma County Junior College District will treat all employees and students equally, regardless of whether they have AIDS/ARC, are preceived to have AIDS/ARC, belong to a group thought to be particularly susceptible to AIDS/ARC, are related to or reside with persons having AIDS/ARC, or have tested positive for the HTLV-III antibody. The district will not deny a person who has AIDS/ARC any benefits for which he/she is eligible. An individual with AIDS/ARC will not be denied employment or enrollment for instruction in the District as long as he/she is able to perform in accordance with the respective standards of each position. Furthermore, the District will not require an individual to undergo antibody testing, nor other AIDS/ARC medical screening, as a condition for employment or enrollment.

The District shall establish a coordinating AIDS committee to:

- A) Develop administrative procedures that address campus issues related to the AIDS virus.
- B) Plan a comprehensive AIDS education program for students and staff.
- C) To analyze individual circumstances and respond to persons with AIDS or AIDS-related conditions by evaluating each case based upon the individual's ability to function, the needs of the campus community, and the legal obligations involved.

The committee should be broadly representative of the campus community in order to be able to address the medical, personal, administrative, and legal issues associated with the disease. Where appropriate and necessary, procedures developed should be consistent with provisions specified in collective bargaining agreement for employees duly covered.

GUIDELINES

-DRAFT-

The following guidelines are based on current epidemiological data indicating that students or employees with AIDS, AIDS Related Complex, or a positive HTLV-III antibody test do not pose a health risk to other students and employees in an academic setting.

1. In accordance with existing District procedures and requirements, an employee's or student's medical record is confidential information, and such information may not be released without the individual's permission except as otherwise provided by law and/or legally required reporting.
2. There is no medical justification for restricting the access of employees or students with AIDS, ARC, or a positive HTLV-III antibody test to student unions, theatres, cafeterias, gymnasiums, swimming pools, recreational facilities, or other common areas.
3. Those who are known to be immunologically compromised should be excused from institutional requirements for certain vaccinations, notably measles and rubella vaccines, as those vaccinations may lead to serious consequences in those with poorly functioning immune systems.
4. Students and employees with AIDS, AIDS Related Complex, or a positive HTLV-III antibody test should be afforded normal classroom attendance, working conditions, and participation in cocurricular and extracurricular activities in an unrestricted manner as long as they are physically and psychologically able to do so.

5. District will provide reasonable accomodation to employees and students with AIDS and related illnesses in a manner consistent with those provided for other medical problems.
6. The District will take necessary steps to ensure the safety of individuals participating in laboratory experiments involving blood, blood products, and body fluids.
7. Students participating in field work experiences or community health care settings should be provided assurance by the training facility that it is in compliance with the California Public Health Service's guidelines for the handling of blood, blood products, and body fluids.
8. If an employee or student has concerns about the presence of a person with AIDS virus, that individual should be directed to a knowledgeable counselor or administrator to help allay fears. It should be understood that refusal to work with a person with the AIDS virus does not excuse an employee from fulfilling assigned responsibilities. Appropriate educational programs and/or counseling services should be provided on campus, or referral should be made to appropriate community agencies for those persons with continuing fears or concerns about the disease.
9. The District will establish communication links with county health agencies and, where available, community AIDS centers in order to obtain current medical and referral information.

10. Health Services will be familiar with sources for testing for AIDS, AIDS Related Complex, or the HTLV-III antibody test, and will refer persons requesting such testing to appropriate community agencies.
11. Health Services and other areas of the District handling blood or body fluids will review its protocols to ensure that they are consistent with the guidelines proposed by the California Public Health Service for the handling of blood, blood products, and body fluids for persons with AIDS, AIDS Related Complex, or a positive HTLV-III antibody test.
12. Regular medical follow-ups should be encouraged for those who have AIDS, AIDS Related complex, or a positive HTLV-III antibody test. Special provisions to protect the health of persons with the AIDS virus should be considered during periods of prevalence of such contagious diseases as measles, rubella, and chicken pox.

NOTE: THIS GLOSSARY IS PROVIDED HERE AT THE TIME FOR REFERENCE TO THOSE REVIEWING THE DRAFT OF POLICYS AND GUIDELINES.

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

This glossary is taken, from "All About AIDS", The Student Body, November 1985 (Volume 6, Number 2), a publication of the Cowell Student Health Center at Stanford University. Terms included in this glossary are defined as they relate to their specific use in discussions regarding AIDS and not necessarily to their general use.

AIDS (Acquired Immune Deficiency Syndrome):

ACQUIRED - a condition which is not inherited.

IMMUNE - the body's defense systems responsible for fighting disease.

DEFICIENCY - a breakdown or inability of certain parts of the immune system, making a person more susceptible to certain disease to which the person would not ordinarily be susceptible.

SYNDROME - a group of symptoms and diseases that together are characteristic of a specific condition.

ANTIBODY - protein substance developed by the body to fight disease organisms. Not effective against virus which is inside cells.

ARC - (AIDS Related Complex) - characterized by a prolonged (two weeks) history of fever, unexplained weight loss, swollen lymph nodes, and/or fungus infection of mouth and throat. It is not known what percentage of people with ARC of LAS (below) will go on to develop full-blown AIDS.

ARV (AIDS Related Virus) - same as HTLV-III.

CARRIER - virus-infected individuals with no symptoms. Most of these people are unaware that they are infected. These individuals represent a major potential source of new infection since they are fully capable of transmitting the virus to others.

COFACTORS - other characteristics of individuals which may make them more susceptible to the AIDS virus.

FALSE NEGATIVE - a negative test in someone who in fact has been infected by the virus but for some reason has not developed the antibody.

FALSE POSITIVE - a positive test for HTLV-III antibody, usually a result of an artifact of the laboratory test, in someone who has not in fact been exposed to the virus. All persons with positive results should have tests repeated at least once.

HTLV-III (Human T-Lymphotropic Virus Type III) - the virus that causes AIDS.

INCUBATION PERIOD - the time between infection with the AIDS virus and the onset of symptoms. Seems to range from 6 months to 5 years. Not everyone exposed to the virus develops the disease.

INVOLVED CELLS - the HTLV-III virus changes the protein on the surface of T-4 lymphocytes (helper cells) in such a way to prevent them from activating B lymphocytes and killer T-cells. B- and T-cells are responsible for fighting the virus, but will not go into action unless the T-4 system is intact. HTLV-III destroys the T-4 cells.

KAPOSI'S SARCOMA (KS) - a type of cancer usually occurring on the surface of the skin or in the mouth. KS may also spread to other organs of the body. Normally found as a slowly progressing cancer in elderly men.

LAS (lymphadenopathy Syndrome) - disease of the lymph nodes - part of ARC.

LAV (Lymphadenopathy Associated Virus) - same as HTLV-III.

OPPORTUNISTIC INFECTIONS - illnesses which would not be a threat to anyone whose immune system was functioning normally.

PNEUMOCYSTIS CARINII PNEUMONIA (PCP) - a parasitic infection of the lungs. One of the two rare diseases that affect 85 percent of AIDS patients. PCP has symptoms similar to any other form of severe pneumonia: cough, fever and difficulty breathing. This infection rarely if ever affects individuals with normal immunity.

POPULATIONS AT HIGHEST RISK (descending order of risk) - 1) sexually active homosexual men with multiple partners; 2) sexually active bisexual men with multiple partners; 3) present or past abusers of intravenous drugs; 4) prostitutes; 5) female partners of bisexual men; 6) heterosexual men and women with multiple partners.

"SAFE SEX" - relatively "safer sex" is condom-protected sex with the use of spermicidal foam. Sexual practices involving tissue injury are extremely dangerous and should be avoided. Oral sex carries the potential of viral transmission.

VIRUS - minute, parasitic organism which depends on nutrients inside cells for its metabolic and reproductive needs. These organisms cause a variety of infectious diseases and stimulate host antibodies. Unlike bacteria, unable to survive long on its own. Not affected by antibiotics.

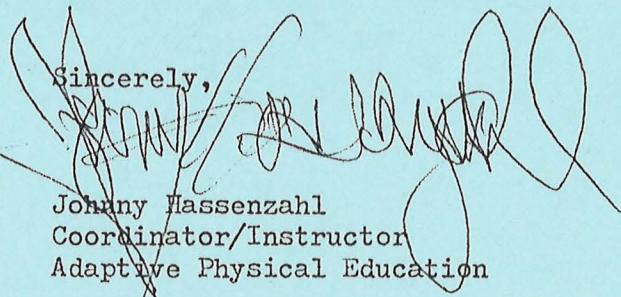

SUBJECT: THE SACRAMENTO - STATE - LOCAL SCENES

Sacramento

The Governor and Department of Finance restored the \$8,900,000 equalization funds (\$210,000 for SRJC) to the 1986-87 budget, thus freeing \$6,000,000 in funding for declining enrollment districts. The money came from outside the California community college funding.

The Governor sent a letter to the remaining Brown appointees on the Board of Governors that they were "no longer eligible to serve." So we essentially have a new Board of Governors.

Chancellor Smith told us in Los Angeles last Wednesday he is not joining State Superintendent Honig in bringing media and public pressure against the Governor over funding for education. Instead he will try to persuade the Governor that California's community colleges are necessary to the State's vitality and badly in need of adequate funding. He has been working diligently "behind the scenes."

The battle of the budget will be fought between the Legislature and the Governor's Office from now through May, with the key date of May 17, when the "May" Revise" is announced. This is the final fiscal analysis for the 1986-87 year and the time when the official predictions of revenues are made for 1987-88. Our hope for a better COLA depends a great deal on a favorable "revise."

Concerns in Sacramento:

1. That the Democratic Caucus in the Assembly may try to eliminate tuition for community colleges, thus starting a head-to-head battle with the Governor;

2. That lottery revenue has decreased 35%!
3. That the Legislature will still directly control community colleges after the Master Plan revision;
4. That the Governor will not fund community colleges to the level recommended by the Joint Legislative Committee in their "Reform Package."

Matriculation has become the key emotional issue with the Master Plan Review Commission, the Joint Legislative Committee, and Governor Deukmejian.

The Legislative Analyst's Office believes that revenues for the last four months of 1986-87 and all of 1987-88 may improve -- if not the Governor's blue pencil will be active.

Points to Remember

Our task is to convince the Governor that community colleges are viable and should be adequately funded. Tell him the good things we are doing. We need to keep thanking our legislators: Nielsen, Keene, Hansen, Hauser and Filante -- they are all strongly supporting community colleges and SRJC.

Meanwhile Back At Santa Rosa Junior College

We are well positioned for whatever happens with the revisions of the Master Plan. Most important is the maintenance of quality, serving well our students -- the 26,775 who enrolled in Fall and the 25,470 enrolled thus far this Spring (3,108 over the enrollment last year at this time).

Our first period report (Summer and Fall) was up 766 ADA (572 which were credit) and our first census for Spring is up approximately 234 ADA.

We are serving our community well, and our community has a high regard for the College.

What about funding for 1987-88? It is too early to predict accurately, but restoring equity funding for 1986-87 and next year is a big plus. Three unknowns will affect funding significantly:

1. The "May Revise" as mentioned;
2. The lottery funding (now in a sharp decline); and,
3. The allocation for equipment from Proposition 56. There are legal aspects that have to be settled. We will not get the whole \$35 million but hope to get \$20 million plus.

All three are beyond our control.

But we can keep working to convince the Governor and those revising the Master Plan for Higher Education of our needs. With our excellent position, we should fare well.

**** E L E C T I O N C O D E ****

SECTION 1 The Elections Committee shall be composed of the following: Elections Commissioner as chairman, Executive Vice President, one Representative-At-Large and other members deemed necessary by the Committee Chairman.

A. If any members of the committee shall be a candidate in an election, the president shall appoint a temporary replacement to serve only for that election.

SECTION 2 The Elections Committee shall serve as the governing body over all general and special elections.

A. A general election is that in which candidates for Associated Student offices are elected.

B. A special election is that in which the College Student Assembly announces an election for purposes other than the above.

SECTION 3 Any duly enrolled Santa Rosa Junior College student shall be eligible to cast one ballot for each Office, Constitutional Amendment or Referendum issue at each election.

SECTION 4 A. Elections for the Associated Student President, Executive Vice President, Vice President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Sophomore & Freshman Representatives-At-Large shall not be later than three weeks prior to the end of the semester or before eight weeks prior to the end of the semester. All students may vote for all officers.

B. Except for Representative-At-Large, any candidate receiving the majority of the votes cast for a given office will be declared the winner.

In the event no candidate receives a majority of the votes cast, the candidate with the most votes shall be declared the winner if said candidate has 10% more votes than the next closest candidate. In the event that no candidate wins a majority of the votes cast and the leading candidate does not win 10% more of the votes cast for the next closest candidate, a runoff election will be declared between the two candidates with the highest number of votes received.

- C. The five candidates for Sophomore Representative receiving the most votes for that office will be elected.
- D. The five candidates for Freshman Representative receiving the most votes for that office will be elected.

SECTION 5 Casting of the votes shall take place over a two (2) day period consisting of the following two (2) days and two (2) evenings: Wednesday & Thursday from 10 a.m. to 3:15 p.m. and 6 p.m. to 9 p.m. The polling places may be moved under nearby shelter at the discretion of the Elections Commissioner or Activities Advisor.

- A. Any student registered for the semester during which the election is occurring may obtain an absentee ballot in lieu of casting a ballot during the regularly scheduled election hours.
- B. Absentee Ballots may be obtained by filing the SRJC Associated Students' Absentee Ballot Request Form" with the Student Activities ^{Office} ~~Secretary~~. Both the Request Forms and the Ballots will be available starting five (5) school days prior to the first day of the election. Absentee Ballot Request Forms must be picked up in person and identification will be required. All Absentee Ballots must be returned to the ^{Associated Students Election Poll Booth} ~~Student Activities Advisor~~ by 9 p.m. on the last day of the election in order to be counted as valid ballots.

SECTION 6 A candidate for all offices must be in regular attendance.

- A. All elected members of the College Student Assembly must be able to attend College Student Assembly meetings as scheduled.

- B. All candidates must have a ^{minimum of} 2.0 ^{cumulative} grade average ^{at the end of} during the semester in which elected in order to take office the following ^{year} ~~semester~~.
- C. Candidates for all offices, except Representatives-At-Large, must have completed twelve units (12), or more, at Santa Rosa Junior College prior to taking office.
- D. Candidates for President shall have ~~had~~ ^{completed} at least two ^{within the last two academic} ~~successive~~ semesters of academic work and twenty units ^{years} (20), or more, at Santa Rosa Junior College prior to ~~taking office.~~ ^{the end of the Spring Semester in which the candidate was elected.}
- F. All appointments made to fill vacancies must meet the election criteria requirements for the appointments for the appropriate office. →

SECTION 7 All candidates must have read and be familiar with the Associated Students of Santa Rosa Junior College Constitution and all Codes and Statutes.

- SECTION 8 A. No person may run for more than one Associated Students office in a given election.
- B. Any person running for an Associated Students office must be a current member of the Associated Students.

SECTION 9 Nominations for office shall be by petition.

- A. Official petitions must be obtained from the Student Activities Office, during normal working hours, by the candidate running for office. The candidate must give the name under which he/she is registered, Social Security Number, address, phone number and office for which he/she is running. Official petitions will be available no earlier than twenty (20) school days before the election and returned to the Student Activities Office no later than eleven (11) school days before the election.
- B. Petitions shall include the name under which the student is registered, address, phone number, office sought and must be signed by at least seventy-five (75) Santa Rosa Junior College students.
- C. All petitions shall be checked by the Elections Commissioner to be sure the candidate is eligible.

- D. In the event a minimum of two petitions is not filed for one office with the Activities Office by deadline date, the College Student Assembly may, by a majority vote, nominate eligible candidates for that office.
- E. In the event that only a minimum of six candidates file for Sophomore Representative or Freshman Representative by the deadline, the College Student Assembly may place additional candidates on the ballot by a majority vote.

SECTION 10 All elections shall be by secret ballot.

- A. The order of candidates' names on the ballot will be in the order in which the petitions are returned for each individual office (first received, first on the ballot), in the following manner: LAST NAME, First Name, Middle Initial, Nickname (space permitting on ballot).
- B. The order in which offices shall be placed is: President, Executive Vice-President, Vice-President, Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, and Representatives-At-Large.
- C. Candidates running for re-election shall have "incumbent" placed with their names.
- D. The names of any candidate for a given office nominated by the College Student Assembly shall appear below the names of all other candidates for that office and shall be arranged in alphabetical order.
- E. Two or more candidates wishing to run together as a "slate" will be designated on the ballot by the same single letter or numeral after each name. Candidates wishing to run on a "slate" must file a request, in writing, with the Student Activities Office, by the last day for filing petitions.

SECTION 11 Write-in votes may be written in for a write-in candidate, for an office with no nominated candidate, must have at least fifty (50) write-in votes for one office in order to be declared elected. Write-in votes will not be counted in a run-off election.

- SECTION 12 Ballots will be locked up daily and counted as soon as possible after the closing of the polls. On the final day of the election. The Activities Advisor shall be responsible for the safe-keeping of the ballots for two (2) weeks after the election at which time the ballots will be destroyed.
- SECTION 13 Election results will be posted at the Student Activities Office and shall include the amount of votes cast for each ballot issue.
- SECTION 14 The Elections Commissioner and one other Elections Committee member shall send to the President the names of the elected candidates and their respective offices along with one blank ballot with the votes cast for each candidate within twenty-four hours after the election.
- SECTION 15 Nominees for the elected Associated Student Offices shall be allowed to make a campaign speech at a regular assembly of the Association.
- A. The assembly will be fifty (50) minutes in length. The length of time each candidate will be allowed to speak will be equal to 50 minutes divided by the number of candidates wishing to speak.
- B. Candidates may have one other student speak before ~~and/or~~ in place of the candidate.
- C. The Elections Commissioner shall preside at the assembly.
- SECTION 16 Candidates may use the Activities Office *Ditto Machine* at no cost.
- SECTION 17 There will be no campaigning the day of the election within fifteen feet of the polls, or in the Student Activities Office during early balloting.
- SECTION 18 No more than \$ ⁷⁵~~50~~, including contributions, gifts and services rendered may be spent for one campaign for one candidate. The value used for the above shall be that of the present retail value, with volunteer labor excepted. The price ceiling will be adjusted annually to reflect the change in the consumer price index.

- A. All candidates, or their campaign managers, must file in writing, to the Elections Commissioner within three weeks after the election, a detailed report of expenses of their campaign.
- B. If a candidate is found to have spent more than the approved amount, or has filed a false statement of expenses, this shall be sufficient grounds for either disqualification or, if candidate is removed from office under this Section, the provisions of Section 19 shall apply.
- C. Candidates in a run-off election may spend an additional 1/3 of the amount approved for the general election.

SECTION 19 It shall be the duty of the Elections Commissioner to regulate the campaign and to disqualify any candidate found by the Commissioner to be in violation of any rules or regulations of the Associated Students.

- A. Any candidate disqualified may appeal the decision of the Commissioner to the College Student Assembly within eight days after the decision of the Elections Commissioner. A two-thirds vote of the College Student Assembly members voting shall reinstate the candidate.
 - (1) If a candidate is disqualified and then reinstated, after the election, the President shall declare the election for the office void and a special election shall be held within ten days after reinstatement.
- B. The Elections Commissioner shall inform the President, in writing, of any protests of violations by any student to the Elections Committee, within twenty-four hours after the protest has been made.
- C. In the event that the results of an election are challenged, the College Student Assembly will act as the final arbiter.

SECTION 20 The following rules shall apply to initiative, referendum and recall elections.

- A. An initiative measure may be proposed by a petition signed by a number of members equal to one-third of the votes cast in the last Associated Students election. A valid petition must state the issue of the petition on each page and must include the signature, student body card number, Social Security Number, address and phone number of the student signing. Petition forms are available in the Student Activities Office and forms will be dated when they are taken out. Petitions must be returned within two weeks after they are taken out from the Student Activities Office.
- B. Any measure may be submitted for referendum by a two-thirds vote of the College Student Assembly, which shall set an election date not more than two weeks after the measure has been submitted for referendum. Approval of a referendum measure shall require a two-thirds majority of the votes cast.
- C. A recall measure may be proposed by a petition signed by a number of members equal to one-half of the votes cast in the last Associated Students election. A valid petition must state the issue on each page of the petition and must include the signature, student body card number, Social Security Number, address and phone number of the student signing. Petition forms are available in the Student Activities Office and forms will be dated when they are taken out from the Student Activities Office.

SRJC STUDENT MEMBER ON BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Guidelines for Election

A Qualifications

The student who serves as the representative of the general student body on the Board of Trustees in this District shall:

1. Be a registered student in good standing with a minimum 2.0 cumulative grade point average the semester in which elected.
2. Be a resident of the Sonoma County Junior College District.
3. Be a citizen of the United States.
4. ~~Give every indication possible of pursuing an educational program through out the year of the term of office.~~ Be enrolled in a minimum of 6 units during the semester that they run for office and enrolled in a minimum of 10 units during the semester that they serve.
5. ~~Be qualified by virtue of being enrolled at Santa Rosa Junior College and elected by all students enrolled at SRJC who choose to vote.~~ Be elected by a plurality vote of all students enrolled at SRJC who choose to vote.

B Election and Term of Office

1. The student member of the Board of Trustees shall be elected ~~early in the Spring of each year.~~ semester of each year held in conjunction with the Associated Students elections.
2. ~~The term of office shall be for one year, commencing on July 1 and ending on June 30 of the following year.~~
3. Termination of office occurs when:
 - a) The student no longer meets the listed qualifications.
 - b) The student resigns or otherwise becomes unable to serve.
 - c) The student is recalled at an election which is called for through a petition vote of 5% of the electorate.
4. Replacement of vacated position.
 - a) The Dean of Student Personnel shall actively seek out applicants to fill an unexpired term of office. (appointed by the Dean)
 - b) The Dean and his Election Advisory Committee (see C-4 below) shall interview the candidates and make a recommendation to the Board.
 - c) The Board of Trustees shall make the appointment to fill the unexpired term.

C Method of Election

The student member of the Board of Trustees shall be elected through procedures similar to those of regular Trustees except as applied to the campus environment. the Associated Students Officers and conform to all rules and regulations of the

1. Filing for Office Associated Students Election Code.

Any student, meeting the qualifications for service, must complete and file a "notice of candidacy" with the Office of the Dean. This notice must be filed no earlier than the first census date (the Monday of the fourth week of instruction). Each candidate will submit a statement of one hundred and fifty (150) words or less, giving his qualifications for the position and why he desires the position. *The 150 words or less statement MUST accompany the notice of Candidacy when it is filed*

NOTE: These dates are not applicable for the Spring of 1978. It is suggested that the filing dates, for this year only, commence on Monday, April 17 and end on Monday, May 1. The election will occur during the week of May 15-19.

2. Campaign

Candidates for office are responsible for their own campaign. The conduct of all campaigns shall be coordinated with the Office of the Dean of Student Personnel Services and shall conform to existing College rules and regulations for normal student body elections.

3. Election to Office shall be by a plurality vote.

4. An Election Advisory Committee, composed of members of the electorate, shall be appointed by the Dean to assist him in the conduct of the campaign and election.

INCLUDE

- a) Membership on this Advisory Committee will be five (5) in number and represent, as much as is possible, all segments of the campus community. 1 from Admin, 1 Faculty, 1 SCOPF, 2 students
- b) The term of office of this committee is for that period of time deemed appropriate by the Dean.
- c) The duties of the committee shall include advising and assisting in all matters having to do with the filing period, campaign, and election. It shall include, but is not restricted to: publicizing the position, supervising the campaign rules and regulations, establishing and supervising polling method and place, counting the ballots and announcing the outcome, plus any other duties as assigned by the Dean.

D All costs of the election shall be borne by the District.

From Student to Promoter

As a student at Sonoma State University in the late 1970s, Bruce Berkowitz was bored. To counteract that feeling he began putting on events on campus.

His cure-all eventually turned into a full-time job as Program Coordinator for the Sonoma Student Union and has culminated in his earning the 1986 outstanding staff award of the National Association of College Activities (NACA), a national association which promotes networking and unity among college activities boards.

"What made me most proud," Berkowitz commented, "was that I was nominated by my students — the Associated Students Programming (ASP) Board and Associated Students President Katie Hanson.

The way I found out was by sitting at our table at the awards dinner and I heard the nomination being read and it began to sound familiar to me. I couldn't believe it.

"I was totally taken by surprise. I was speechless, which for me is something. I felt really good about it because I didn't expect it."

As program coordinator for the Sonoma Student Union, Berkowitz serves as an adviser for individual students, ASP members and club leaders who want to put on events on campus. His work as promoter has brought SSU events such as major concerts, dances and a performing arts series.

When he began as coordinator at SSU, Berkowitz says he "helped

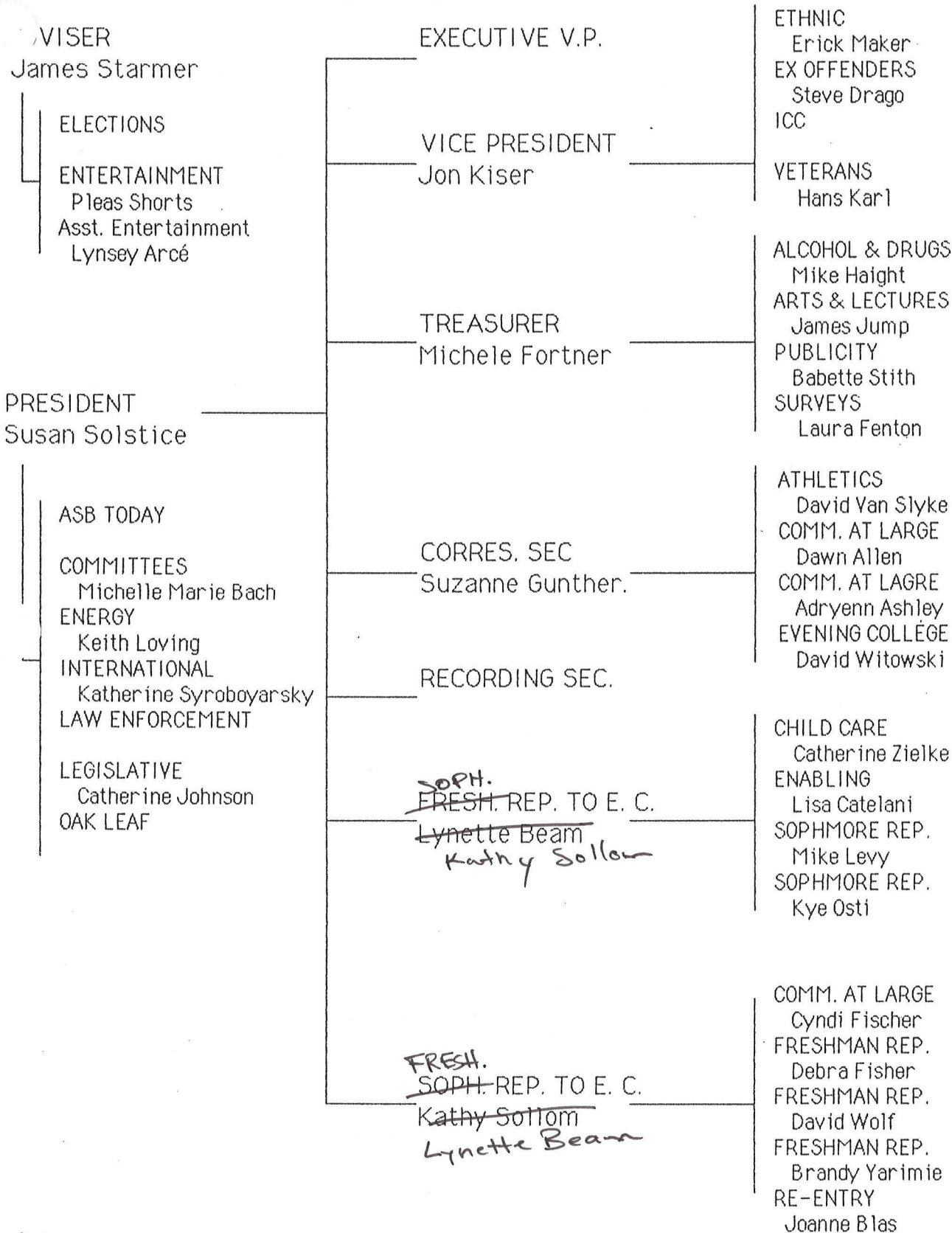
break the ground for student activities by showing the administration the importance of having an active student life at SSU. Now the most important thing is having the students produce and promote the events themselves."

As for the future, Berkowitz hopes to formalize a working relationship with Santa Rosa Junior College resulting in both schools working together on projects. "My long-term goal, which may seem lofty, is to eventually get to the point where we and the J.C. are working together on events and then have their people transfer here to SSU and fit right in with ASP to continue the process.

"We also work well with the community. We use outside facilities such as the Luther Burbank Center and the Cotati Cabaret, and it works well for us as well as the general community," he says.

THE BILL OF RIGHTS 1791

Article I

Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of speech, or of the press; or the right of the people to assemble, and to petition the government for a redress of grievances.

Article II

A well regulated militia, being necessary to the security of a free State, the right of the people to keep and bear arms, shall not be infringed.

Article III

No soldier shall, in time of peace be quartered in any house, without the consent of the owner, nor in time of war, but in a manner to be prescribed by law.

Article IV

The right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers, and effects, against unreasonable searches and seizures, shall not be violated, and no warrants shall issue, but upon probable cause, supported by oath or affirmation, and particularly describing the place to be searched, and the persons or things to be seized.

Article V

No person shall be held to answer for a capital, or otherwise infamous crime, unless on a presentment or indictment of a grand jury, except in cases arising in the land or naval forces, or in the militia, when in actual service in time of war or public danger; nor shall any person be subject for the same offence to be twice put in jeopardy of life or limb; nor shall be compelled in any criminal case to be a witness against himself, nor be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor shall private property be taken for public use, without just compensation.

Article VI

In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the State and district wherein the crime shall have been committed, which district shall ^{have} been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the assistance of counsel for his defence.

Article VII

In suits at common law, where the value in controversy shall exceed twenty dollars, the right of trial by jury shall be preserved, and no fact tried by a jury, shall be otherwise reexamined in any court of the United States, than according to the rules of the common law.

Article VIII

Excessive bail shall not be required, nor excessive fines imposed, nor cruel and unusual punishments inflicted.

Article IX

The enumeration in the Constitution, of certain rights, shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people.

Article X

The powers not delegated to the United States by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people.

SOME ADDITIONAL AMMENDMENTS

Article XIII (1865)

Sec. 1. Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, except as a punishment for crime whereof the party shall have been duly convicted, shall exist within the United States, or any place subject to their jurisdiction.

Sec. 2. Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

Article XIV (1868)

Sec. 1. All persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the State wherein they reside. No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States; nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law; nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws.

Article XV (1870)

Sec. 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or by any State on account of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

Sec. 2. The Congress shall have power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

Article XXIV (1964)

Sec. 1. The right of citizens of the United States to vote in any primary or other election for President or Vice-President, for electors for President or Vice-President, or for Senator or Representative in Congress, shall not be denied or abridged by the United States or any State by reason of failure to pay any poll tax or other tax.

Sec. 2. The Congress shall have the power to enforce this article by appropriate legislation.

IN CONGRESS, JULY 4, 1776.

A DECLARATION

BY THE REPRESENTATIVES OF THE
UNITED STATES OF AMERICA,
IN GENERAL CONGRESS ASSEMBLED.

WHEN in the Course of human Events, it becomes necessary for one People to dissolve the Political Bands which have connected them with another, and to assume among the Powers of the Earth, the separate and equal Station to which the Laws of Nature and of Nature's God entitle them, a decent Respect to the Opinions of Mankind requires that they should declare the causes which impel them to the Separation.

We hold these Truths to be self-evident, that all Men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty, and the Pursuit of Happiness—That to secure these Rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just Powers from the Consent of the Governed, that whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these Ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Government, laying its Foundation on such Principles, and organizing its Powers in such Form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that Governments long established should not be changed for light and transient Causes; and accordingly all Experience hath shewn, that Mankind are more disposed to suffer, while Evils are sufferable, than to right themselves by abolishing the Forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long Train of Abuses and Usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object, evinces a Design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their Right, it is their Duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future Security. Such has been the patient Sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the Necessity which constrains them to alter their former Systems of Government.

Government. The History of the present King of Great-Britain is a History of repeated Injuries and Usurpations, all having in direct Object the Establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these States. To prove this, let Facts be submitted to a candid World.

He has refused his Assent to Laws, the most wholesome and necessary for the public Good.

He has forbidden his Governors to pass Laws of immediate and pressing Importance, unless suspended in their Operation till his Assent should be obtained; and when so suspended, he has utterly neglected to attend to them.

He has refused to pass other Laws for the Accommodation of large Districts of People, unless those People would relinquish the Right of Representation in the Legislature, a Right inestimable to them, and formidable to Tyrants only.

He has called together Legislative Bodies at Places unusual, uncomfortable, and distant from the Depository of their public Records, for the sole Purpose of fatiguing them into Compliance with his Measures.

He has dissolved Representative Houses repeatedly, for opposing with manly Firmness his Invasions on the Rights of the People.

He has refused for a long Time, after such Dissolutions, to cause others to be elected; whereby the Legislative Powers, incapable of Annihilation, have returned to the People at large for their exercise; the State remaining in the mean time exposed to all the Dangers of Invasion from without, and Convulsions within.

He has endeavoured to prevent the Population of these States; for that Purpose obstructing the Laws for Naturalization of Foreigners; refusing to pass others to encourage their Migrations hither, and raising the Conditions of new Appropriations of Lands.

He has obstructed the Administration of Justice, by refusing his Assent to Laws for establishing Judiciary Powers.

He has made Judges dependent on his Will alone, for the Tenure of their Offices, and the Amount and Payment of their Salaries.

He has erected a Multitude of new Offices, and sent hither Swarms of Officers to harrass our People, and eat out their Substance.

He has kept among us, in Times of Peace, Standing Armies, without the consent of our Legislatures.

He has affected to render the Military independent of and superior to the Civil Power.

He

He has combined with others to subject us to a Jurisdiction foreign to our Constitution, and unacknowledged by our Laws; giving his Assent to their Acts of pretended Legislation:

For quartering large Bodies of Armed Troops among us:

For protecting them, by a mock Trial, from Punishment for any Murders which they should commit on the Inhabitants of these States:

For cutting off our Trade with all Parts of the World:

For imposing Taxes on us without our Consent:

For depriving us, in many Cases, of the Benefits of Trial by Jury:

For transporting us beyond Seas to be tried for pretended Offences:

For abolishing the free System of English Laws in a neighbouring Province, establishing therein an arbitrary Government, and enlarging its Boundaries, so as to render it at once an Example and fit Instrument for introducing the same absolute Ru'e into these Colonies:

For taking away our Charters, abolishing our most valuable Laws, and altering fundamentally the Forms of our Governments:

For suspending our own Legislatures, and declaring themselves invested with Power to legislate for us in all Cases whatsoever.

He has abdicated Government here, by declaring us out of his Protection and waging War against us.

He has plundered our Seas, ravaged our Coasts, burnt our Towns, and destroyed the Lives of our People.

He is, at this Time, transporting large Armies of foreign Mercenaries to compleat the Works of Death, Desolation, and Tyranny, already begun with circumstances of Cruelty and Perfidy, scarcely paralleled in the most barbarous Ages, and totally unworthy the Head of a civilized Nation.

He has constrained our fellow Citizens taken Captive on the high Seas to bear Arms against their Country, to become the Executioners of their Friends and Brethren, or to fall themselves by their Hands.

He has excited domestic Insurrections amongst us, and has endeavoured to bring on the Inhabitants of our Frontiers, the merciless Indian Savages, whose known Rule of Warfare, is an undistinguished Destruction, of all Ages, Sexes and Conditions.

In every stage of these Oppressions we have Petitioned for Redress in the most humble Terms: Our repeated Petitions have been answered only by repeated Injury. A Prince, whose Character is thus marked by every act which may define a Tyrant, is unfit to be the Ruler of a free People.

Nor

Nor have we been wanting in Attentions to our British Brethren. We have warned them from Time to Time of Attempts by their Legislature to extend an unwarrantable Jurisdiction over us. We have reminded them of the Circumstances of our Emigration and Settlement here. We have appealed to their native Justice and Magnanimity, and we have conjured them by the Ties of our common Kindred to disavow these Usurpations, which, would inevitably interrupt our Connections and Correspondence. They too have been deaf to the Voice of Justice and of Consanguinity. We must, therefore, acquiesce in the Necessity, which denounces our Separation, and hold them, as we hold the rest of Mankind, Enemies in War, in Peace, Friends.

We, therefore, the Representatives of the UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, in GENERAL CONGRESS, Assembled, appealing to the Supreme Judge of the World for the Rectitude of our Intentions, do, in the Name, and by Authority of the good People of these Colonies, solemnly Publish and Declare, That these United Colonies are, and of Right ought to be, FREE AND INDEPENDENT STATES; that they are absolved from all Allegiance to the British Crown, and that all political Connection between them and the State of Great-Britain, is and ought to be totally dissolved; and that as FREE AND INDEPENDENT STATES, they have full Power to levy War, conclude Peace, contract Alliances, establish Commerce, and to do all other Acts and Things which INDEPENDENT STATES may of right do. And for the support of this Declaration, with a firm Reliance on the Protection of divine Providence, we mutually pledge to each other our Lives, our Fortunes, and our sacred Honor.

Guidelines for Election

A Qualifications

The student who serves as the representative of the general student body on the Board of Trustees in this District shall:

1. ~~Be a registered student in good standing~~ with a minimum 2.0 cumulative grade point average the semester in which elected.
2. ~~Be a resident of the Sonoma County Junior College District.~~
3. ~~Be a citizen of the United States.~~
4. ~~Give every indication possible of pursuing an educational program throughout the year of the term of office.~~ Be enrolled in a minimum of 6 units during the semester that they run for office and enrolled in a minimum of 16 units during
5. ~~Be qualified by virtue of being enrolled at Santa Rosa Junior College and~~ each semester they serve.
~~elected by all students enrolled at SRJC who choose to vote.~~
Be elected by a plurality vote of all students enrolled at SRJC who choose to vote.

B Election and Term of Office

1. ~~The student member of the Board of Trustees shall be elected early in the Spring of each year.~~ semester of each year held in conjunction with the Associated Students elections.
2. ~~The term of office shall be for one year, commencing on July 1 and ending on June 30 of the following year.~~
3. Termination of office occurs when:
 - a) ~~The student no longer meets the listed qualifications.~~
 - b) ~~The student resigns or otherwise becomes unable to serve.~~
 - c) ~~The student is recalled at an election which is called for through a petition vote of 5% of the electorate.~~
4. Replacement of vacated position.
 - a) ~~The Dean of Student Personnel shall actively seek out applicants to fill an unexpired term of office.~~ (appointed by the Dean)
 - b) ~~The Dean and his Election Advisory Committee (see C-4 below) shall interview the candidates and make a recommendation to the Board.~~
 - c) ~~The Board of Trustees shall make the appointment to fill the unexpired term.~~

C Method of Election

The student member of the Board of Trustees shall be elected through procedures similar to those of regular Trustees except as applied to the campus environment. the Associated Students Officers and conform to all rules and regulations of the

1. Filing for Office Associated Students Election Code.

Any student, meeting the qualifications for service, must complete and file a "notice of candidacy" with the Office of the Dean. This notice must be filed no earlier than the first census date (the Monday of the fourth week of instruction). Each candidate will submit a statement of one hundred and fifty (150) words or less, giving his qualifications for the position and why he desires the position. *The 150 words or less statement MUST accompany the notice of Candidacy when it is filed*

NOTE: These dates are not applicable for the Spring of 1978. It is suggested that the filing dates, for this year only, commence on Monday, April 17 and end on Monday, May 1. The election will occur during the week of May 15-19.

2. Campaign

Candidates for office are responsible for their own campaign. The conduct of all campaigns shall be coordinated with the Office of the Dean of Student Personnel Services and shall conform to existing College rules and regulations for normal student body elections.

3. Election to Office shall be by a plurality vote.

4. An Election Advisory Committee, composed of members of the electorate, shall be appointed by the Dean to assist him in the conduct of the campaign and election.

- a) *Membership on this Advisory Committee will be five (5) in number and represent, as much as is possible, all segments of the campus community.*
- b) *The term of office of this committee is for that period of time deemed appropriate by the Dean.*
- c) *The duties of the committee shall include advising and assisting in all matters having to do with the filing period, campaign, and election. It shall include, but is not restricted to: publicizing the position, supervising the campaign rules and regulations, establishing and supervising polling method and place, counting the ballots and announcing the outcome, plus any other duties as assigned by the Dean.*

D All costs of the election shall be borne by the District.

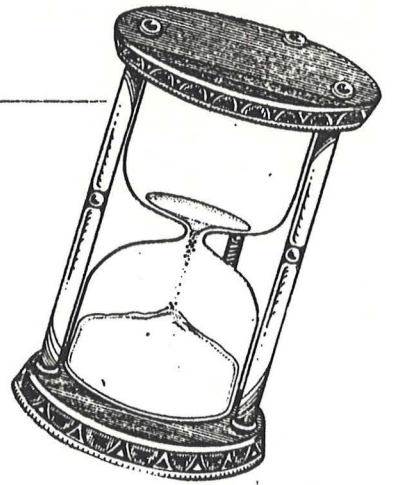

WELCOME BACK for Spring Semester, 1987.

The GOOD NEWS. The First Period Report, our attendance report for Summer Session and Fall Semester is extremely positive with ADA up from 11,260 last year to 12,026 this year. That gain of 572 credit ADA and 194 non-credit (an overall 6.8% increase), if continued through Spring Semester, could net us some added revenue.

Also, our overall WSCH per FTE faculty for day rose from 473 to 481.

THEN THERE IS SACRAMENTO AND GOVERNOR DEUKMEJIAN'S BUDGET PROPOSAL.

I. First, he made the following changes for 1986-87 (our present year):

- A. Reduced Apprenticeship funding by \$2.7 million (probably no effect on SRJC).
- B. Cut all \$9 million funding for equalization (a possible negative impact on SRJC of from \$210,000 to \$457,000).
- C. Added \$4.6 million for growth (SRJC will probably be eligible if our total annual ADA is up over 11,650). As this \$4,6 million is a small amount when spread over 106 colleges, there is no way of knowing what funding per ADA will mean.

II. For 1987-88:

- A. Equalization will be restored in 1987-88 base revenues (how and for how much remains a mystery, as there is an allocation of only \$2.3 million).
- B. The COLA for 1987-88 will be 2.7%, but only from January 1, 1988 to June 30, 1988. This means 1.35% for the year. This would just about cover basic steps and increments on salary schedules, plus other costs such as increases in retirement and Workers Compensation contributions.
- C. ZERO increase for categorical programs.

- D. \$7.0 million for matriculation on a 50/50 match -- for data processing equipment and systems development.
- E. Extension of Current Enrollemnt Fee through June, 1988.
- F. Extension of student financial aid program for fees = \$13.3 million.
- G. \$5.0 million for hazardous substances.
- H. \$12.0 million for instructional equipment replacement and library materials (75/25 match). This is a real drop from an anticipated \$35 million.
- I. \$1.1 million for learning disabled student assessment.
- J. Increase of \$33,000 to provide full-time clerical support for Washington, D.C. office -- from apportionment.
- K. \$22.8 million for growth (1.9%).
- L. \$1 million for Chancellor's Office -- new programs and services and 15.0 additional positions -- to insure compliance. Plus \$118,000 for reorganization of Chancellor's Office.
- M. \$12.7 for deferred maintenance (50/50 match).

At this time further details of the budget are not available. Overall, it is the tightest budget we have seen since Proposition 13. Whether the Legislature can add to the budget remains a question. On January 20 I was in Sacramento all day discussing the issues with our five (5) legislators and their staff members, explaining equalization and the effects of the 1986-87 cuts, along with what a 1.35% cost of living increase meant to Santa Rosa Junior College and California's community colleges.

Legislators are supportive, somewhat angry, and quite frustrated about getting anything done about the budget.

We need to convince Governor Deukmejian:

1. That we are doing a good job; and,
2. That we need resources to continue our programs at a top quality level.

My main concerns are:

1. Money for equalization -- both as a carryover into our 1987-88 base, reinstatement for 1986-87, and adequate funding for 1987-88.
2. That the California community colleges get \$35 million for 1986-87 equipment and another \$35 million for 1987-88 -- all from Proposition 56's \$400,000,000. The only amount in the budget summary from Proposition 56 is \$35 million for 1986-87, but with no details on how or when it will be distributed.

SPRING 1987

- 12 Black History - Lost, Stolen or Strayed - Bill Cosby leads us through a history of attitudes, both black and white, plus reveals black accomplishments which went largely unrecorded; and the subsequent effect on the lives of black Americans.
- Bill Cosby on Prejudice - Bill Cosby addresses the issue of prejudice directly in this informative and provocative video. GUEST SPEAKER.
- FEB 19 Inside Nicaragua - This 1986 documentary not only chronicles the Abnica Brigades which help to rebuild houses in war-ravaged Nicaragua, but it also presents a marvelous overview of the current state of affairs in Nicaragua. Narrated by Bill Press, an L.A. news commentator, this film explores the feelings of Nicaraguan citizens on their government and the war.
- Panel on Central America - Focus: Nicaragua - First, a fascinating slideshow of volunteer brigades of people of many nationalities who have gone to Nicaragua to help with the harvests! This will then be followed by a panel of guest speakers who have recently been to Nicaragua and who can share their experiences.
- FEB 26 Sit-In - This inspirational film chronicles a series of grassroots black actions which brought about the desegregation of lunch counters in Nashville, Tenn. in the 1960's; beginning with a black student organized sit-in.
- Black Revolt in the '80s - Journalist Tony Brown examines current black unrest, and speculates about what might be in store for the '80s. This video is sure to stir up controversy, discussion, and, hopefully, some careful examination and grappling for solutions. SPECIAL GUEST SPEAKER.
- MAR 5 The Great Peace March Slideshow - Five hundred Americans walked across the United States to emphasize and spread the message of the importance of nuclear disarmament and turning toward peace in our time. By the end of the journey, their numbers had almost tripled. SSU alumni, Jennifer York has returned from that march to share that journey with us in slides and stories. Come join us in welcoming her back to Sonoma County and to discover about that historic trek.
- MAR 12 She's Nobody's Baby - Alan Alda and Marlo Thomas guide us through this truly exciting video which chronicles both the pain and the triumph of women throughout American history from the turn of the century to the 1980's.
- Carry Greenham Home - This deeply inspirational film chronicles the lives and activities of the women of many nations, classes and generations who have come together to form peace camps at Greenham Commons in Great Britain, and to protest the presence of the U.S. Air Force base and the Cruise nuclear missile there. This film offers inspiring images of fulltime activists and the determination which fires their steadfast resistance.
- MAR 19 Small Is Beautiful: Impressions of E. F. Schumacher - This is a moving portrait of E. F. Schumacher and his revolutionary economic ideas as depicted in his now legendary book, Small is Beautiful. This film raises the issues of an increasing need for decentralization, small-scale technology, and local, humane economics.
- Lovins on the Soft Path - this multi-award winning film features Hunter and Amory Lovins explaining and illustrating the "Soft Path": an energy policy which concentrates on conservation and on the efficient, appropriate use of renewable energy sources. They also present one of the strongest arguments against the current U.S. energy policy. SPECIAL GUEST SPEAKER.

War Tax Resistance Slide Show - At last! A presentation that not only helps us think about how our taxes support wars and proliferation, but also helps us look at what can be done instead. A panel of guests will be present to share suggestions and answer questions about War Tax Resistance after the slide show. GUEST PANEL: Kolya Braun, David Dillman, and Arnie & Woody Schwartz.

PR 2 Dateline: El Salvador - This 1986 film examines recent political developments in that war-torn country. In it, we get to meet and hear the words of members of trade unions and human rights organizations, and see examples of the increase in strikes and protest marches, including footage on a May Day march which was 80,000 strong.
Slide Show on the In Search of Peace Conference in El Salvador - Last summer (1986) an historic conference was held in El Salvador, to which delegates from all nations around the world attended. The World Peace Film Series is fortunate to have a delegate from Sonoma County who will present slides of the conference, along with information about the event, and its implications.

PR 9 AND FOR FUN:
Dr. Strangelove: Or How I Learned to Love the Bomb - Peter Sellers stars in this farce about the insanity on Capitol Hill and in the Pentagon.
Atomic Cafe - A wild montage of outdated popular media and propaganda with regards to the nuclear bomb; full of outrageous and laughable misinformation and hype.
Nixon's Checkers Speech - The famous true-life speech made by Richard Nixon in which he expounds on his dog in defense of his finances. Never meant to be funny, but all the more so for it.

PR 23 Harrisburg - This is a stunning account of the series of events surrounding the nuclear plant accident at Three Mile Island; including all the confusion, contradictory official statements and terrifying surprises that characterized that event. This film documents how local Bay Area activists, in identifying a potential Chernobyl in our own area, set out to draw attention to Rancho Seco nuclear plant in Sacramento, which had come seriously close to a meltdown last winter. This film covers the rally and subsequent sit-in, interviews with participants and includes some stunning but little known facts which expose the nuclear industry. SPECIAL GUEST SPEAKER.

PR 30 Seeing Red - This fascinating film consists of interviews with a variety of American communists, such as Pete Seeger, who discuss their lives of union and urban activism -- as well as the harassment they suffered, due to their beliefs.

Subject: Student Activities Office Rules and Guidelines

As a new semester begins and new people start to more regularly work and volunteer around the Student Activities Office (SAO), I believe that it's necessary to clarify and reinforce a few important points. I'll even admit to some of these rules being pet peeves of mine.

1. First and foremost, the SAO is the administrative and business office for Student Activities and the Associated Students. This in no way infers that an open and comfortable environment is not wanted or accepted. It does mean that the SAO is not the Cafeteria, the Coop Patio or an individual's room where they live. Please be continually conscious of the image you, your actions or your personal habits exhibit (i.e. a disastrous desk top, inappropriate statements or behavior). I think we are all concerned about having and maintaining pride in the SRJC SAO and Associated Students.
2. If you are not working in the Storeroom, Graphics Room and particularly the Information Desk/Reception Area, please do not just hang around and distract the staff from their jobs. All too often, the Graphics Room in particular becomes a coffee break area. Again, the intention of this rule is not to prohibit people from being in the office, but rather to make sure that our staff and volunteers can follow through on the work of the Associated Students and complete the tasks that we say we will accomplish.
3. Food is not allowed in the SAO, Conference Room, Assembly Room, Graphics Room or Storeroom. Enjoyment of a soft drink, minimal snack, gum, candy, etc. is not the problem we are trying to prevent. When someone plops down, alone or with several friends, with a plate of food and begins a meal, our experience has been that the leftovers, trash, stains and fallout on the carpet remain after the warm glow of the friendship and camaraderie has disappeared. In other words, the SAO staff has had to continually look at the mess or clean it up. My guess is that human nature will continue to be as it is and a number of people will simply not pick up after themselves.

4. My admitted major pet peeve is people sitting on the desks. I have been unconvinced that there is any redeeming value, other than a person's individual ego image, in sitting on a desk whether the topic is business or pleasure. I'm sure many of the students who have been involved around here for awhile, we affectionately refer to them as "retreads", can attest to the fact that I may be abnormally obsessed with this peeve. I'm willing to accept any defenses and rationales regarding the need for desk sitting as long as they are typed, double spaced, in triplicate and signed by 10% of the student body and include an appropriate breakdown by academic major and ethnic representation. On second thought, maybe a casual conversation will suffice.

You may find that these are not the only policies of the SAO, but they are the ones that are most visible and predominant. Please understand that these policies are designed to encourage a positive image of the Associated Students and SAO. I believe that all too often students, staff and community come to the SAO expecting to find a second class operation run by a group of loose knit people whose only goal is to have fun and hang around.

I want to show everyone who comes in contact with us that we are a dynamic organization (yes, even professional) that is responsible for a major impact on the overall quality of life at SRJC and worthy of the respect that comes with the territory.

SUBJECT: STATUS REPORT ON MASTER PLAN REVIEW

Probably the most important event shaping the immediate future will be the final report the Master Plan Review Commission presents for action to the Joint Legislative Committee, which will in turn recommend legislative action to the Legislature and Governor Deukmejian.

A "Catch 22" is emerging, described by Commissioner Remy after a meeting called by the Governor who invited 40 educational representatives. He said the meeting was significant and felt the tone of the meeting could set the parameters for Commission discussion this spring. "We want to be helpful, but we will produce a narrow report with limited vision if constrained by dollars. But if we ignore the limits set by the Governor and the Gann Limit, we may produce a wonderful document with little chance for implementation. These will be heavy choices for us."

Commissioner Williams added: "This Master Plan should last longer than the present governor -- it ought to be guided by a long-term vision. We might as well go home now if we constrain ourselves to a zero-sum game."

This sums up the tone of discussion which will lead to actions taken this spring by the two groups charged with updating the Master Plan for Higher Education.

In their latest session, the Commission:

1. Recommended principal responsibility for vocational education to community colleges;
2. Asked CPEC to review vocational and occupational education for higher education; and,

3. Heard Dr. Bowen summarize the Bowen and Glenny report on Governance. Bowen concluded with: " We are not in favor of local control; we are not in favor of a state system; we are in favor of a strong community college system. And, all elements of this system will be stronger if they behave themselves and follow our recommendations."

So this is where the review of the Master Plan is as 1987 begins. I would sum up the situation this way:

1. The Master Plan Review Commission favors keeping California's community colleges strong and wants to establish a system which can move forward;
2. The Bowen-Glenny report on governance generally supports what California community colleges are doing and their strong role in higher education -- but warns that the colleges must recognize that they are a system and function as one;
3. The Joint Legislative Committee to review the Master Plan is more difficult to "read". The members seem to focus on internal operational issues, the role of the faculty in governance, the part-time teacher regulations, and the transfer "problems"; and,
4. The Governor -- who will through personal persuasion and the power of the final signature be able to affect the final Master Plan -- remains a mystery. He states that education is his highest priority, and for K-12, CSU and UC he has demonstrated that it is.

The future of California's community colleges, system or not, may depend on the views of Governor Deukmejian. So far he has not shown that he will support what comes to his desk from the Joint Legislative Committee and the Master Plan Review Commission.

The California community colleges -- faculty, board members, administrators, classified, students and public citizens -- must do everything possible to convince the Governor, the Commission and the Legislative Committee that California's community colleges can and should be a viable part of higher education to the total system of education in California.

I'll keep you informed as the legislation takes shape.

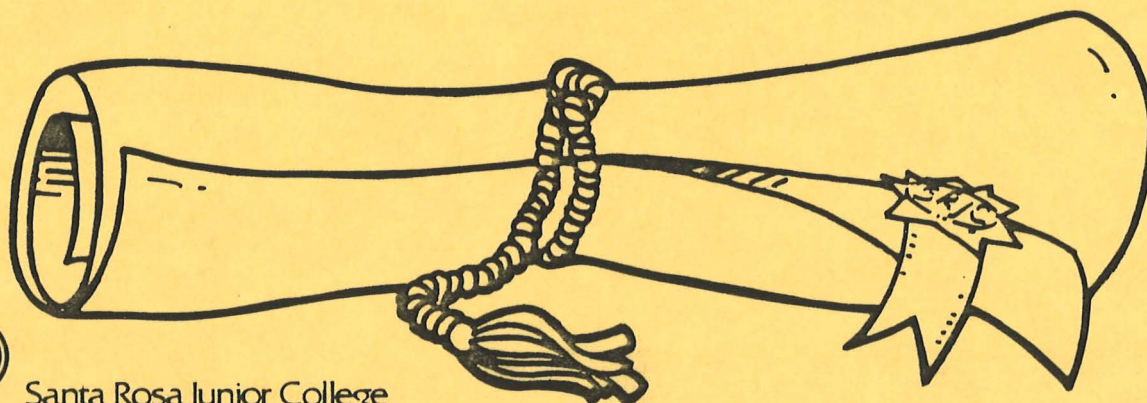
- High School Seniors or Graduates with a 3.00 overall GPA.

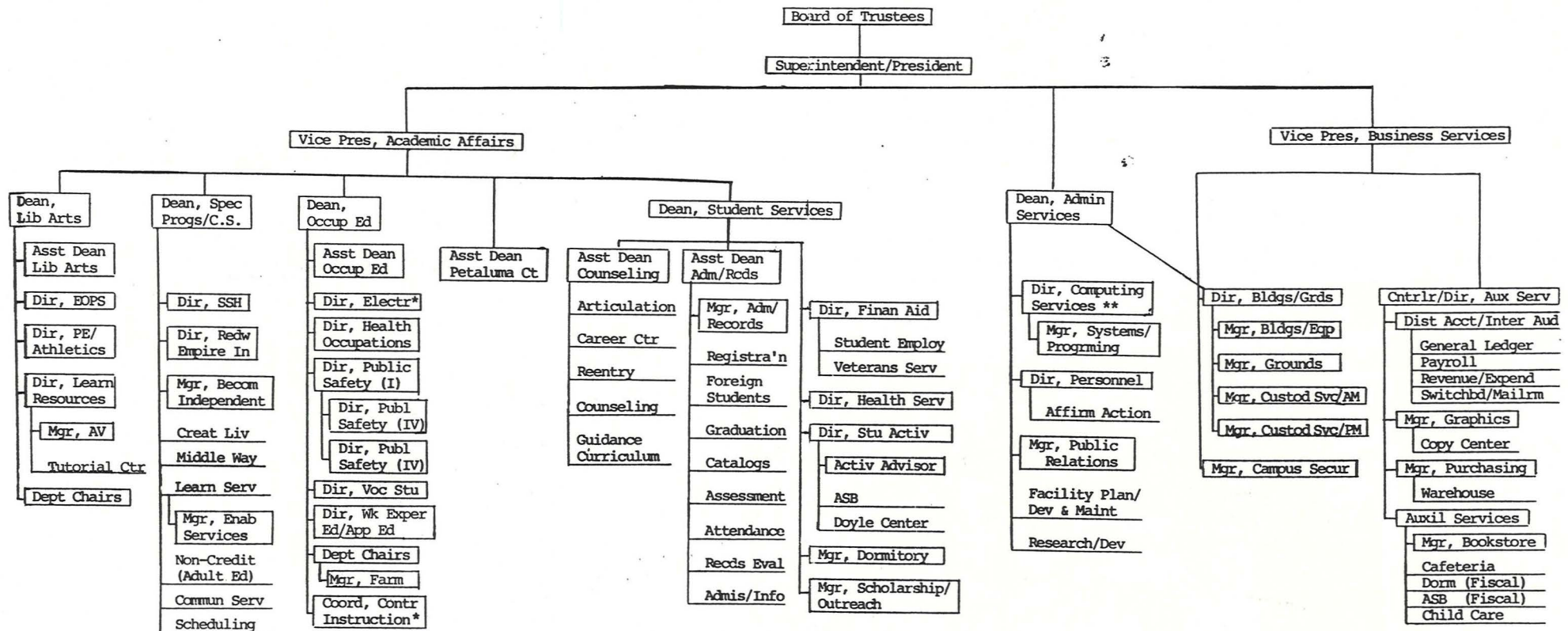

Holiday Drive Collects 54,000 Cans of Food

The 1986 Sonoma County Holiday Spirit Drive (HSD) has recently wrapped up its canned food collection. The effort was successful on several fronts.

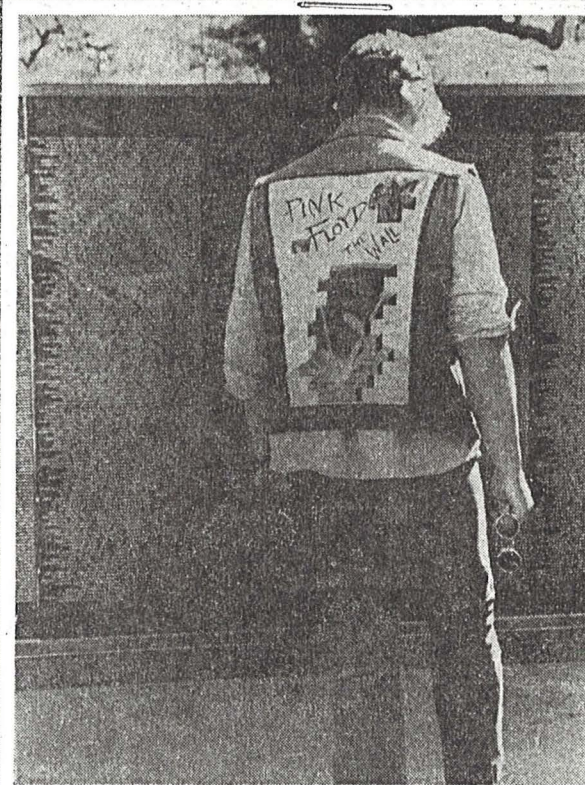
The employees of Biddulph Chevrolet and a large group of volunteers collected over 5,600 cans of food on December 14.

KMGG and Biddulph Chevrolet sponsored a high school collection program at seven Sonoma County High Schools. The total for these high schools will exceed 22,500 cans and parcels of food collected.

Other collection efforts included Santa Rosa Junior College, 1,000. Schools in Rohnert Park turned in over 8,000 cans and parcels of food to St. Vincent DePaul and the Ministerial Association. Safeway in-store collection efforts gathered 800 cans. Private donations to the Coalition Against Hunger totaled 1,000 cans.

In Santa Rosa, the Salvation Army collected over 15,000 cans of food at Elementary and Junior High Schools, through other business donations and private party donations.

As a result of these collection efforts, over 53,900 cans and parcels of food were collected as a part of the Sonoma County Holiday Spirit



Remembering Vietnam

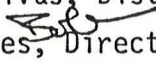

SRJC STUDENT MEMBER ON BOARD OF TRUSTEES

Guidelines for Election

A. Qualifications

The student who serves as the representative of the general student body on the Board of Trustees in this District shall:

1. Be a registered student in good standing with a minimum 2.0 cumulative grade point average the semester in which elected.
2. Be a resident of the Sonoma County Junior College District.
3. Be a citizen of the United States.
4. Be enrolled in a minimum of 6 units during the semester that they run for office and enrolled in a minimum of 11 units during each semester they serve.
5. Be elected by a plurality vote of all students enrolled at SRJC who choose to vote.

B. Election and Term of Office

1. The student member of the Board of Trustees shall be elected in the Spring semester of each year held in conjunction with the Associated Students elections.
2. The term of office shall be for one year, commencing July 1 and ending on June 30 of the following year.
3. Termination of office occurs when:
 - a) The student no longer meets the listed qualifications.
 - b) The student resigns or otherwise becomes unable to serve.
 - c) The student is recalled at an election which is called for through a petition vote of 5% of the electorate.
4. Replacement of vacated position.
 - a) The Dean of Student Personnel shall activitely seek out applicants to fill an unexpired term of office.
 - b) The Dean and his Election Advisory Committee (appointed by the Dean) shall interview the candidates and make a recommendation to the Board.
 - c) The Board of Trustees shall make the appointment to fill the unexpired term.

C. Method of Election

The student member of the Board of Trustees shall be elected through procedures similar to those of the Associated Students Officers and conform to all rules and regulations of the Associated Students Election Code.

1. Filing for Office

Any student, meeting the qualifications for service, must complete and file a "Notice of Candidacy" with the Office of the Dean. This notice must be filed no earlier than the first census date (the Monday of the fourth week of instruction). Each candidate will submit a statement of one hundred and fifty (150) words or less, giving his qualifications for the position and why he desires the position. The 150 words or less statement **MUST** accompany the Notice of Candidacy when it is filed.

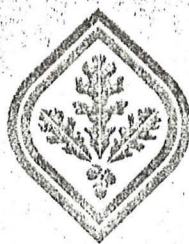

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE ASSOCIATED STUDENTS

SANTA ROSA JUNIOR COLLEGE

PREAMBLE

We, the students of Santa Rosa Junior College, in order to promote general welfare of the students, to guarantee the equality of opportunity among students, to offer experience in moral, aesthetic, social and economic values under an atmosphere of intellectual freedom, to encourage student participation, planning and direction of student activities as permitted under the rules, regulations and policies of the State of California and the Board of Trustees of the Sonoma County Junior College District, do ordain and establish this Constitution of the Associated Students of Santa Rosa Junior College. Other student rules, regulations and constitutions shall not be in conflict with this constitution.

ARTICLE I

NAME, PURPOSE and MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1 The name of this organization shall be The Associated Students of Santa Rosa Junior College.

SECTION 2 The purpose of this Association shall be to furnish rules, regulations and policies under which students, student groups, clubs and organizations may be coordinated, harmonized and integrated.

SECTION 3 All duly enrolled students who have purchased Associated Student membership cards for the current semester shall be members of this Association. Any currently enrolled Santa Rosa Junior College Student may cast a ballot to elect officers of this association.

SECTION 4 Honorary members of this Association shall be all non-student employees of the Sonoma County Junior College District, non-student employees of the Associated Students of Santa Rosa Junior College, and such persons as may be elected by the College Student Assembly. All retired faculty and staff members and all past presidents of the Associated Students of Santa Rosa Junior College (who are no longer enrolled as day students) shall be life members. All honorary life members shall be eligible for reduced rates to all Associated Student sponsored home athletic events, social events and cultural programs.

ARTICLE II

In order that the Associated Students be supported and its activities maintained, membership cards of the Association will be sold for each semester at a rate to be determined by the College Student Assembly. The privileges of this card shall include:

- A. Reduced rates to all Associated Student sponsored home athletic events.
- B. Eligibility to participate in athletics.
- C. The holding of office in Associated Student Government.
- D. Reduced rates on literary publications of the Associated Students.
- E. Free or reduced rates to all Associated Student rallies, dances, assemblies and other social events.
- F. Free or reduced rates to special Associated Student cultural programs.
- G. Cashing checks at the Associated Students' Bookstore or Cafeteria.
- H. Other privileges which may be determined by the College Student Assembly.

ARTICLE III

OFFICERS AND DUTIES

SECTION 1 The elected officers of the Associated Students shall be: President, Executive Vice President, Vice President, Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary and ten Representatives-At-Large, of whom five are to be Sophomores and five are to be Freshmen-

- A. A Sophomore shall be any student that has completed thirty or more units at time of taking office.
- B. A Freshman shall be any student that has completed less than thirty units at time of taking office.

SECTION 2 The duly elected officers of this Association shall serve for a term of one semester. All officers shall be regularly enrolled students with a minimum of eleven (11) units. All Commissioners shall also be regularly enrolled students and shall serve for a term of one semester.

- A. The Fall semester term shall begin the day after termination of Spring semester final examinations and terminate on the last day of Fall semester final examinations.
- B. The Spring semester term shall begin the day after Fall semester final examinations and terminate on the last day of Spring final examinations.

SECTION 3 The President of this Association shall:

- A. Carry out the provisions of the Constitution.
- B. Preside as the chairman of the College Student Assembly and the Executive Cabinet and vote only in case of a tie or to make a tie vote.
- C. Serve on the College Hearing Board.
- D. Perform as the Chief Administrative Officer of the Association.
- E. Direct and coordinate all policies of the Association.
- F. Represent the Association and coordinate matters of mutual concern with the faculty, administration and community.
- G. Appoint a Parliamentarian to advise him in procedural matters.
- H. Appoint with the approval of the Executive Cabinet:
 - (1) An Entertainment Commissioner who shall:
 - (a) Be responsible for the operations of all Associated Students' Assemblies.
 - (b) Appoint a Dance Chairperson when necessary.
 - (c) Arrange for musical and other entertainment on campus.
 - (2) An Elections Commissioner who shall:
 - (a) Be responsible for the operation of all Associated Students' elections.
 - (b) Serve as chairman of the Election Committee and appoint, with the approval of the President, the committee members.
 - (3) A Publicity Commissioner who shall:
 - (a) Be responsible for all Associated Students' publicity on campus.
 - (b) Serve as chairperson of the Publicity Committee and appoint, with the approval of the President, the committee members.
 - (4) An Arts & Lectures Commissioner who shall:
 - (a) Be responsible for all operations taking place at Hyde Park.
 - (b) Serve on the Arts & Lectures Committee.
 - (c) Recommend student members of Arts & Lectures Committee to AS President for appointment.
 - (5) Commissioner of Re-entry Affairs.
 - (6) A Law Enforcement Representative, nominated by the Law Enforcement Department head.
 - (7) An Athletics Commissioner who shall:
 - (a) Be responsible for all Intra-Mural Activities.
 - (8) Commissioner of Ethnic Minority Affairs who:
 - (a) May be recommended by Ethnic Study Department with the approval of the Executive Cabinet.
 - (b) Shall appoint a standing committee on Ethnic Minorities consisting of at least one member of each ethnic group represented on campus.
 - (9) Commissioner on Committees who shall:
 - (a) Be responsible for regulating the affairs of all student representatives to college committees.
 - (b) Act as liaison between college committees and the College Student Assembly.
 - (c) Direct the publicity of matters relating to student involvement in college committees.
 - (d) Serve as a resource for information regarding student participation on committees.
 - (10) Ex-Offenders Commissioner who shall:
 - (a) Assist all student ex-offenders in problems relating to their academic success.
 - (b) Be knowledgeable about legislative changes and programs directly relating to student ex-offenders.
 - (c) Act as an advocate for all ex-offenders enrolled at Santa Rosa Junior College.
 - (11) Veteran's Commissioner who shall:
 - (a) Act as liaison between the Veteran's Office and the College Student Assembly.
 - (b) Be knowledgeable about legislative changes and programs directly relating to Veterans.
 - (c) Assist Veterans in the process of re-entry.
 - (12) Student Surveys Commissioner who shall:
 - (a) Manage the Student Voice Box program.
 - (b) Conduct student polls as directed by the College Student Assembly.
 - (13) Child Care Commissioner
 - (14) Enabling Affairs Commissioner
 - (15) Evening College Commissioner
 - (16) Any other officer deemed necessary by the College Student Assembly.
- I. Terminate, with the approval of the Executive Cabinet, any appointed officer. The terminated officer may appeal the decision to the Executive Cabinet.
- J. Name and appoint members of any committee deemed to be necessary by the College Student Assembly.
- K. Perform other duties as pertain to the office to include the making of policies not in conflict with the Constitution or Codes.

SECTION 4 The Executive Vice President of this Association shall:

- A. Assume the duties of the President during his absence and succeed to the office upon the vacancy of the President.
- B. Serve as vice chairman of the College Student Assembly and the Executive Cabinet.
- C. Be the Assistant Administrative Officer of the Association.

SECTION 5 The Vice President shall:

- A. Preside as chairman of the Inter-Club Council.
- B. Be responsible for the coordination and operations of clubs.
- C. Serve as chairman of the Constitution Committee.

SECTION 6 The Treasurer of this Association shall:

- A. Authorize all payments of bills against the Association.
- B. Verify, sign, and authorize requisitions for the disbursement of funds of this Association according to budgets established by the College Student Assembly.
- C. In cooperation with the Budget Committee, present to the College Student Assembly no later than four weeks before the termination of the Spring semester the proposed budget for the following year.
- D. Make monthly reports of all income and expenditures of this Association to the College Student Assembly.
- E. Perform these duties and others as described in the Financial Code of this Association.

SECTION 7 The Recording Secretary of the Association shall:

- A. Be the official recorder of the Association, the College Student Assembly and the Executive Cabinet.
- B. Be the official custodian of all records of the Association.
- C. Prepare and post the minutes of the meetings of the College Student Assembly within three days after each meeting.
- D. Administer attendance regulations for the College Student Assembly and initiate charges of non-attendance.

SECTION 8 The Corresponding Secretary of the Association shall:

- A. Arrange for all correspondence required by the College Student Assembly and the Executive Cabinet.
- B. Be responsible for acquiring minutes of student government meetings of other colleges in Area 7, and any other colleges.
- C. Be aware and informed of happenings and problems of other student governments.

SECTION 9 The duties of the Representatives-At-Large shall be:

- A. Two Representatives-At-Large, one a freshman and one a sophomore, shall serve on the Executive Cabinet and be elected by the College Student Assembly.
- B. Two Representatives-At-Large shall serve on the Student Affairs Committee.
- C. One Representative-At-Large shall serve on the Arts & Lectures Committee.

SECTION 10 The Inter-Club Council Representative shall be elected by the Inter-Club Council and shall:

- A. Represent and speak for the Inter-Club Council before the College Student Assembly.
- B. Report to the Inter-Club Council on College Student Assembly's meetings.

SECTION 11 The Order of Succession shall be:

- A. In case of the vacancy of the office of President, the order of succession shall be Executive Vice President, Vice President, Treasurer, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary and then a person elected by majority vote of the College Student Assembly.
- B. In all other vacancies, the President shall appoint a successor, with the approval of the Executive Cabinet.

ARTICLE IV

COLLEGE STUDENT ASSEMBLY

SECTION 1 The College Student Assembly shall be the main legislative body of the Associated Students of Santa Rosa Junior College.

SECTION 2 The College Student Assembly shall consist of the following voting membership: All elected Associated Student Officers, Inter-Club Council Representative, Law Enforcement Representative, and the Commissioners of Entertainment, Publicity, Elections, Arts & Lectures, Ethnic Minority Affairs, Re-entry Affairs, Veterans Affairs, the Commissioner on Committees, Child Care Commissioner, Enabling Affairs Commissioner, Evening College Commissioner, and any other officer deemed necessary by the College Student Assembly. Each is entitled to one vote.

SECTION 3 A quorum shall consist of one-half plus one of the total voting membership, plus the Activities Advisor.

- A. If less than two-thirds of the total voting membership is present, it shall take a two-thirds vote of the present members to pass any motion.
- B. A majority vote is necessary in all other cases except as stated elsewhere in this Constitution or in the Sturgis Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedure.

SECTION 4 It shall be the duty of the College Student Assembly to:

- A. Hold weekly meetings through the college semester and such special meetings as may be called by the President or three voting members. Notice of special meetings must be made through the Activities Office and posted 24 hours in advance of all meetings.
- B. Decide by two-thirds majority vote of the total voting membership, the guilt of any elected officer charged with misconduct, incompetency or non-attendance. Three unexcused absences shall constitute grounds for charges of non-attendance. Any officer found guilty on the above charges shall be removed from office and have the right to appeal to the next College Student Assembly meeting. It shall take a two-thirds vote for reinstatement of the officer.
- C. Transact business relating to the Association as a whole.
- D. Approve the Associated Student budget prior to the last regularly scheduled meeting.
- E. Elect student members to administrative and/or faculty college committees as necessary.
- F. Supervise all Associated Students publications without the right to edit.
- G. Determine the dates of elections.
- H. Abide by the parliamentary procedures as set forth in Sturgis Standard Code of Parliamentary Procedures.
- I. Serve as the official representative of the Associated Students.
- J. Assume any other responsibilities as may be deemed necessary.

SECTION 5 Should the College Student Assembly dissolve itself and should all the officers in the order of succession resign, the Student Activities Advisor is required to call for a Special Election within two weeks, unless the end of the semester is less than 45 days away.

ARTICLE V

EXECUTIVE CABINET

- SECTION 1 The voting members of the Executive Cabinet shall consist of the President, Executive Vice President, Vice President, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer and two Representatives-At-Large. The Activities Advisor and Parliamentarian shall serve as non-voting members. The duties of the Executive Cabinet are:
- A. To approve appointed officers. After the fourth week of each semester those appointments that have not been made may be nominated and elected by the Executive Cabinet.
 - B. To meet once weekly and prepare agenda for the College Student Assembly.
 - C. To coordinate matters of mutual concern with the faculty and administration.
 - D. To make any recommendations to the College Student Assembly as deemed necessary.
 - E. To act as the legislative body of the Associated Students during the summer and in times of emergency as deemed necessary by two-thirds vote of the Executive Cabinet. Decisions voted upon under these conditions are subject to being overruled by a two-thirds vote of the College Student Assembly.

ARTICLE VI

INTER-CLUB COUNCIL

- SECTION 1 The Inter-Club Council shall be composed of the Associated Student Vice President as chairman and one representative from each official Associated Student club or Association.
- SECTION 2 It shall be the duty of the Inter-Club Council to comply with the Inter-Club Council Code.
- SECTION 3 No actions of the Inter-Club Council shall be in conflict with rules, regulations or policies of the College Student Assembly.

ARTICLE VII

COMMISSIONS & COMMITTEES

- SECTION 1
- A. The Constitution Committee shall review all club constitutions, the Associated Student Constitution, and make recommendations for changes.
 - B. Insure that constitutions are not in conflict with State and Board of Trustees rules, regulations and policies.
 - C. The Constitution Committee shall consist of the Vice President as chairman, Parliamentarian, one Representative-At-Large and two non-College Student Assembly members appointed by the Vice President with the approval of the Executive Cabinet.
- SECTION 2 The Elections Committee shall enforce the Elections Code, count the ballots and insure that the polling places are open and staffed.
- A. The Elections Committee shall consist of the Elections Commissioner as chairman, Executive Vice President, one Representative-At-Large appointed by the Elections Commissioner and others deemed necessary by the chairman with the approval of the Executive Cabinet.
- SECTION 3 The President may appoint any other such committees as deemed necessary.

ARTICLE VIII

INITIATIVE, REFERENDUM & RECALL

- SECTION 1 An initiative measure may be proposed by a petition signed by a number of members equal to one-third of the votes cast in the last Associated Students' election. The College Student Assembly shall schedule an election to be held not more than two school weeks after receipt of a valid petition. Approval of an initiative measure shall require a two-thirds majority of the votes cast.
- SECTION 2 Any measure may be submitted to referendum by a two-thirds vote of the College Student Assembly. The College Student Assembly shall schedule an election to be held not more than two school weeks after submitting the measure to referendum. Approval of a referendum measure shall require a two-thirds majority of the votes cast.
- SECTION 3 A recall measure may be proposed by a petition signed by a number of members equal to one-half of the votes cast on the last Associated Student election. The College Student Assembly shall schedule an election to be held not more than two school weeks after receipt of a valid petition. Approval of the recall measure shall require a two-thirds majority of the votes cast.

ARTICLE IX
AMENDATORY SYSTEMS & PROVISIONS

- SECTION 1** Amendments shall be designated as those items which directly or indirectly affect either the intent or scope of those articles within the main body of the Constitution.
- A. No amendment to the Constitution may conflict with the Education Code or laws of the State of California or the regulations of the Sonoma County Junior College District.
 - B. Initiative proposals to amend this Constitution must meet the requirements as prescribed in Article VIII, Section 1.
 - C. The College Student Assembly may propose amendments upon approval by two-thirds of its total voting membership.
 - D. Ratification of an amendment shall require two-thirds of all votes cast at a special or regular election.
 - (1) Copies of proposed amendment (s) must be made available to all registered students at least one week prior to being voted upon.
- SECTION 2** A code shall be designated as an area of activity deemed necessary to perpetuate and comply with the purposes of this Constitution. It shall contain only ratified statutes.
- A. All Codes shall be separate from, but subordinate to, this Constitution.
 - B. The establishment of a code shall require a simple majority vote of the College Student Assembly.
- SECTION 3** A statute shall be that specific regulation or function deemed necessary to expedite and perpetuate the purposes and functions contained within the Constitution and included within the scope of a Code title.
- A. No statute may be in conflict with an article or section of this Constitution.
 - B. No statute may violate a superior regulation or code.
 - C. A statute may be enacted by the approval of a simple majority of the total voting membership of the College Student Assembly.
 - D. All statutes shall be binding upon the students of Santa Rosa Junior College.
 - E. Proposed statutes shall be voided by petition if such petition is signed by a simple majority of the Associated Students voting in the last general election and submitted to the College Student Assembly prior to the Adoption.

ARTICLE X
ENABLING CLAUSE

This Constitution shall become effective when approved by a simple majority of the Constitution Council, simple majority of the Executive Cabinet, two-thirds of the total voting membership of the College Student Assembly and three-fourths of the votes cast by the Associated Students and deemed operational not later than the first day of the Spring semester, 1967.
