At this time we have no funds available in our Football Boosters Account due to additional costs this past year. This account has been used in the past to help defray the cost of team jackets, which is not possible this year because of the lack of funds; however, we are attempting to correct this problem in the future by working on making our 1988 football program a bigger and better issue with more advertising to help defray the costs of the program and to have additional funds in our Booster Account for jackets and other expenses next year.

We are presently working on recreating a positive team image and feel that one way we can accomplish this is by having our players wear their jackets around campus and in the various communities they live in. We also feel that it will make a good impression on our visiting athletes. At this time we have ordered 59 jackets, as follows:

21	Satin jackets	at \$42.95 plus tax	\$ 1,001.95
23	Flannel jackets	at \$36.95 plus tax	847.85
15	Unlined jackets	at \$28.95 plus tax	434,35

The total comes to \$2,284.15 and CSA has budgeted \$670.00 for these awards, which leaves a balance of \$1,614.15.

My request, at this time, is for any additional funding that you might be able to come up with to help us defray the cost of the above jackets.

Your continued support of our program is greatly appreciated.

SRJC NAMES NEW VICE PRESIDENT

SRJC. August 8, 1988. David B. Wolf, President of Los Angeles Pierce College and former Vice President of Los Angeles Harbor College, has been named new Vice President for Academic Affairs for Santa Rosa Junior College.

The Sonoma County Junior College District's seven-member Board of Trustees hired Dr. Wolf on Monday. He will begin his new job on October 1.

Wolf replaces Dr. Patricia K. Miltenberger, who was SRJC's Vice President for Academic Affairs from July 1986 to June of 1988. Miltenberger left SRJC to serve as Vice President of Student Services at the University of Nevada at Reno.

Wolf, who has fifteen years of experience in community college administration, said that he "couldn't be more enthusiastic," about coming to Santa Rosa Junior College.

"Santa Rosa Junior College and the Sonoma County College District are simply the premier community college organization in the country."

He continued,"It is a great privilege to become associated with an institution of this distinction."

Wolf said that the quality of tradition, the caliber of staff, the dignity of the Board and the growing nature of the county have combined to make SRJC "one of the most successful community colleges around."

The New Vice President for Academic Affairs received a Ph.D. in Education (Administration and Policy Analysis) from Stanford University in 1984 and a Master's Degree in Economics from U.C. Berkeley in 1966. He has a Bachelor's Degree in Engineering.

Before his appointment as President at Pierce College in 1985, Wolf served as Vice President of Academic Affairs at Los Angeles Harbor College for one year. He was acting President of Los Angeles Metropolitan College from 1980 to 1983 and of West Los Angeles College in 1979.

Dr. Wolf was a Special Assistant to the Chancellor of the Los Angeles Community College District in 1983 and 1984. At Los Angeles Mission College he was Assistant Dean of Instruction from 1978 to 1979, Assistant Dean of College Development from 1976 to 1977, and a Research Consultant in 1975 and 1976.

In 1975-76, Wolf worked in Northern California as Assistant Director of Continuing Education at Contra Costa College and as Assistant to the Director of Occupational Education for the Peralta Community College District.

Wolf's teaching experience includes a range of subjects including higher education, remedial English, business, and economics. He has taught automobile restoration as a community services course.

Dr. Wolf is on the Board of Directors of the California Community Colleges Chief Executive Officers Organization, where he has served on that organization's Special committee on Matriculation Regulations and on its Task Force on Academic Standards. He is also on the Board of Directors of the Articulation Council of California, an organization which coordinates curriculum issues between the U.C., C.S.U., and California Community College systems.

Wolf's extensive community involvement includes serving as President of the Aviva Center, a child welfare agency in Los Angeles which specializes in residential and counseling services for teenage women. He is also on the Board of Directors of the Foundation for the Junior Blind; and on the Board of Directors for United Way, Region I, where he serves as chairperson of the Corporate Task Force on AIDS. In addition, Dr. Wolf is a member of the Board of Directors for the Woodland Hills Chamber of Commerce.

The new Vice President says that he and his wife, Ruth, are "very excited" about moving to Sonoma County. Commented Wolf, "We are very fond of the Bay Area and the North Coast Area and have vacationed there almost every summer since the mid-70's.





I want to express my concern re: the contents of the gift packs being distributed by ASB at arena registration. Both "Vivarin" and "NyQuil" are contained in these packages.

The "Vivarin" tablets are composed of caffeine, a stimulant "for fast pick up". The "NyQuil" cold medicine is a "remedy" that is 25% alcohol. In effect, we are distributing both an "upper" and a "downer". I believe the implicit message is dangerous and certainly not supportive of students making healthy decisions.

I would ask that the ASB reconsider their decision to distribute these products in the interest of promoting student health. I will be happy to discuss this with you further.

Tiff over big campus profits may end in court

By JIM HAYNES

CHICO — The president of California State University, Chico, and the student government may wind up in court over who will run the bookstore, the student union and other campus enterprises that generate \$13 million to \$14 million a year.

The Associated Students at CSUC has managed the campus businesses since 1942—the only student government in the 19-campus state university system to do so, according to state officials.

University President Robin Wilson said student leaders have been devoting too much time to the businesses and too little to traditional campus activities.

"Year after year, this whole business gobbles up young people who do not have time to be student leaders," Wilson said recently.

After years of controversy over the issue, (Continued on back page)

Wilson notified student leaders this week that they will no longer be in charge of campus businesses beginning this fall.

But student body president Kristina Doyle said the Associated Students will send a letter to Wilson asking his to reconsider that decision — or go to court.

"The Associated Students is not going to roll over," she said.

If no progress has been made in negotiations with Wilson by Sept. 20, "we will then commence litigation," she said.

Loss of student control of the commercial activities on campus would mean "students would probably end up paying more," she said.

Doyle said the student government has a legally formed corporation that operates the bookstore and other businesses.

The students question, she said, "how much control in fact does a university president have over an incorporated business?"

Wilson insists that he has sufficient authority.

"No university can let a vendor tell the president what university policy is going to be," Wilson said.

Wilson said he took action after the Associated Students rejected several policy changes he wanted to make in how the campus businesses operate.

He said two new boards made up of student, faculty, staff and perhaps lay members will be established to run the bookstore and other enterprises.

The 90 or so non-student employees who work at the businesses will be able to keep their jobs under the new system, Wilson said.

He then let people know of the Agenda for CSA between he and Jamie's offices. If anyone would like to speak please sign up, but speak to an advisor first to make sure that the subject is placed under the right item and that it is relevent and concise. Bob then anounced that at the next meeting binders with the codes and constitution would be handed out. He summarized his report by saying this is a democratic process and we encourage everyone to vote and express feelings on issues.

Jamie began by introducing himself, and welcoming the new and returning students. He then let people know he was recruiting for ticket crew at the football games, and those who are interested please see him. He ended his report by restating the statement that his door was always open.

Pickets go up outside SRJC

Four dozen non-teaching Santa Rosa Junior College workers, who have been working without a contract since July 1, set up an informational picket line Monday.

The 50 to 60 members of the Sonoma County Organization of Public Employees marched for an hour on the Mendocino Avenue sidewalk in front of the college.

SCOPE represents 320 college workers, of which 120 are part-time workers, according to SCOPE spokesman Bill Steck.

Steck said a mediator was appointed after an impasse in negotiations for a new contract was declared in July. Since then, the

mediator, Ruth Blance, appointed by the state Mediation and Conciliation Service, has been meeting on and off with the union and college administration represented by Lee Munson, director of personnel.

Both sides have not met for three weeks, but another session is scheduled Thursday, Steck said.

"We will be staging additional similar demonstrations and possibly some other things to get our message across," he said.

A package of wage and fringe benefits being sought by the employees include job classification, improved grievance procedures and better health benefits, said Steck.

Top issue for full-time workers is

full payment by the college for Health Plan of the Redwoods health plan. The college now pays for Kaiser, but workers must pay \$50 a month extra to have HPR, Steck said.

Steck said that college does pay the full cost of HPR for instructors and some other workers.

The health plan issue arose after the college canceled Blue Cross coverage because of increased costs.

Other issues, Steck said, are health, Social Security and retirement benefits for part-time workers. The benefits were not part of the three-year contract that expired in June, he said.

Free poetry reading at SRJC library

Poets Jonathan London and Lynn Watson will read their works at noon Monday in the Plover Library on the Santa Rosa Junior college campus.

Admission is free.

London has published poems and short stories in many magazines. His work has been included in several collections, and his fourth book of popular tales, "First Born," will soon be published by Manroot Press.

Reared in Sonoma County, Watson earned a master of fine arts from the Iowa Writer's Workshop and has taught creative writing at Sonoma State University, the University of Iowa, and various community colleges. Among her published works are a novel, a collection of short stores, and articles in numerous publications. "Amateur Blues," a book of her poetry, will be published this fall.

SACRAMENTO — A \$7.25 million community college bill to give the state Board of Governors more power and eventually base funding on need rather than attendance was signed into law Monday by Gov. George Deukmejian.

The governor announced the signing of AB1725 by Assemblyman John Vasconcellos, D-San Jose, which was based on recommendations by Deukmejian's review commission.

The bill would give community colleges an additional \$7.25 million for the 1988-89 budget year, bringing total funding to \$2.2 billion.

It would also strengthen the role of the Community College Board of Governors in overseeing community college districts, which are run by locally elected boards and act very much like public school districts. The Board of Governors will also be required to develop a system of educational and fiscal accountability for the community colleges.





RE: Legal Requirements for Parking Citation Process

Dear Dr. Mikalson:

It is our understanding the College District is reviewing its present system for parking citation collection. It is important to evaluate this system in light of state law that governs the scope and procedures for citations.

Pursuant to Vehicle Code Section 21113, the Board of Trustees of the District is authorized to regulate vehicular traffic on college property. The District must post appropriate signs giving notice of the vehicular regulations adopted by the Board and the regulations must be in writing and available to the public.

However, the enforcement and prosecution of any violation of a District regulation governing the parking of a vehicle is subject to the requirements of state law, commencing at Vehicle Code Section 40200 et. seq. (see attached). State law sets forth a number of procedures, including requirements for the form and service of the Notice of Violation (citation), amounts for parking penalties, processing of citations with the State Department of Motor Vehicles, and the right to contest violations in court. In reviewing the present citation system, it appears a number of changes are necessary in order to comply with state law.

1. Notice of Violation: The current citation form issued for a parking violation should specifically reference the District regulation violated. The general reference to Vehicle Code Section 21113 is insufficient since that section speaks only to the general authority of the District to regulate

Alhonity

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The citation must also state the time and place for appearance to answer the citation (in the event the person elects to contest the The registration expiration date must also be included (see Vehicle Code Section 40202).

Tlickers

Limits on Amount of Parking Penalty: Parking penalties must be in the same amounts as set annually by the county court judges for a uniform countywide bail schedule (Vehicle Code Section 40203.5 and Penal Code Section 1269b). Additionally, since 1985 the law requires the District to pay the County \$1.50 on each paid parking citation which is not filed in Court for the funding of county jail facilities. For each parkingcase contested in court, \$1.00 of any penalty assessed must be set aside for the funding of jail facilities (Government Code Section 76004). The District has yet to remit any monies for the County jail fund.

Notice of Delinquent Violation: If payment is not received by the person authorized by the District to receive a parking penalty by the time and date fixed for appearance on the citation, the registered owner of the vehicle involved in the violation must be mailed or served with a Notice of Delinquent parking violation (Vehicle Code Section 40206). Code Section 40207 proscribes the contents of the Notice of Delinquent Violation, including notice that unless within ten days of mailing the notice the registered owner pays the parking or files an affidavit of nonliability, the renewal of the vehicle registration may be contingent upon compliance with the notice or a warrant for the registered owner's arrest may be issued. It appears the District has no routine practice for issuing these Notices of Delinquent Violation. Procedures for the affidavit of nonliability are set forth in Vehicle Code Sections 40208-40210. The District must also process the presentation of a Notice of Delinquent Violation in accordance with Vehicle Code Sections 40211, 40222, and 40223.

- Contest of Violation in Court: The District is given three ways to deal with parking citations (Vehicle Code Section 40220) -
 - Cancel the parking violation and make an 1) adequate record of the reasons for cancellation; or

- File notice with the State Department of Motor Vehicles to render vehicle registration contingent on paying parking fines, or
- 3) Enforce the parking citation in court by filing a complaint.

For a person contesting a parking citation, the District offers an administrative appeal that is treated as final and binding. No contests are referred to local courts. However, under state law the District must afford court review (see Vehicle Code Section 40215).

As you can see, the processing of parking violations is highly regulated. The District may continue to process parking citations or is authorized to contract with a private vendor for this purpose. In either case, we advise the District to conform its process with the legal procedures described in this letter.

SANTA ROSA JUNIOR COLLEGE PARKING JUDICIARY BOARD

The Parking Judiciary Board will have the following membership:

- (1) One member appointed by faculty
- (1) One member appointed by classified
- (2) Two members appointed by students
- (1) One member appointed by the administration
- (5) Five voting members

The Parking Judiciary Board would be voting members who would hear the appeal from the person appealing a citation (the appeal could be in person or in the form of a written appeal), and they would grant or deny the appeal based upon facts presented and college written rules and regulations.

If the appeal is granted, the citation will be voided. (AB 1032 and California Vehicle Code section 40202)

If the appeal is denied, the citation will be forwarded to the processing agency. If the appealing party wants to appeal the Parking Judiciary Board's decision, they could contact the processing agency and request a court date with the local municipal court.

Appeals will be at a set day and time each week at the discretion of the appeals board. The board would meet for one hour and hear no more than ten appeals per week. Any additional appeals will be scheduled for the following week.

An officer of the SRJC Campus Police Department will be appointed to the Parking Judiciary Board as a non-voting member. The officer will coordinate weekly appeals by means of a PJB appeals docket filled out from persons appealing a citation through the Campus Police Office.

The officer will act as a resource person for the PJB in response to questions pertaining to signs, markings, etc.

The purpose of the PJB shall be to allow an in-house system of due process and ajudication for those persons who request to appeal a citation.

In order to appeal a citation through this in-house process, persons wishing to appeal a citation on campus must fill out an appeals form with the Campus Police Office within five (5) school days of receipt of the citations. Persons wishing to appeal citations after that time period must contact the processing agency for scheduling an appeal with the Sonoma County Municipal Court.





Read This First!

For those who may be new to NACA, the following questions and answers should help explain some important information about NACA, the Far West Region, and the conference.

What is NACA?

NACA stands for the National Association for Campus Activities. It is a non-profit educational association based in Columbia, South Carolina, whose services and activities are coordinated primarily by volunteers. These volunteers are assisted by approximately 20 full-time NACA National Office staff.

What is the Far West Region?

It is one of the eleven regions in NACA and includes Arizona, California, Hawaii, Nevada, and Utah. Regional activities are coordinated by approximately 50 volunteers throughout the region.

What does NACA offer besides conferences?

Other services and programs include scholarships, regional and national workshops, **Programming** (our association's magazine), regional newsletters, programming and leadership resources, leadership opportunities, and much more.

What is the Regional Conference?

This year's conference will attract over 500 delegates from Far West schools and local and national entertainment agencies. A conference committee made up of Far West volunteers has been hard at work since January planning this very important event for you. The main components of the conference are cooperative buying, Showcases, the Exhibit Hall, Educational Sessions, and networking.

What is cooperative buying?

Through the cooperative buying process, schools arrange a series of performances by one artist or group in one geographic area. By setting up blocks or groupings of performances, artists are able to reduce their prices. A block can be for three days or thirty days epending on the number of schools that are interested a performer during that period.

What are Showcases?

Selected artists are allowed a 20-minute performance in front of all conference delegates at one of our five Showcases. These performances, or Showcases, help schools select acts they would like to bring to their campuses, usually through the cooperative buying process.

What is an Exhibit Hall?

This is an area where delegates can talk to a number of artists and agencies (called associate members) about the act(s) they represent. These associate members have videotapes and cassettes to review, literature to pick up, and sometimes records or tapes to give away. Most importantly, delegates have the opportunity to talk to agents and performers about their acts, try to arrange blocks, and to establish working relationships with the associate members.

What are Educational Sessions?

Over 60 different workshops will be offered on a variety of topics including leadership development, programming skills, student government, multi-cultural issues, and staff development. Workshops last between 75 and 90 minutes and are presented by staff, students, and associate members from our region.

What is networking?

During the conference, delegates have the opportunity to meet and share ideas with student leaders, staff, and associate members. This networking is often the most valuable aspect of the conference and can occur during Educational Sessions, in the Exhibit Hall, at receptions, during meals, in the hallways, and even in the jacuzzil Don't miss this rare opportunity to share ideas, gather information, create a network, and make new friends.

Who should attend this conference?

Most delegates to this conference are student leaders from very diverse areas including programming, residence halls, student government, intramurals, multicultural groups, and fraternities/sororities. Accordingly, all workshops and activities at the conference have been designed to be beneficial for any student leader. Staff members attending this conference represent all of the above areas as directors, coordinators, or advisers. Special workshops and roundtable discussions are planned to meet the special needs of staff.

SANTA ROSA JUNIOR COLLEGE PARKING JUDICIARY BOARD

The Parking Judiciary Board will have the following membership:

- (1) One member appointed by faculty
- (1) One member appointed by classified
- (2) Two members appointed by students
- (1) One member oppointed by the administration
- (5) Five voting members

The Parking Judiciary Board would be voting members who would hear the appeal from the person appealing a citation (the appeal could be in person or in the form of a written appeal), and they would grant or deny the appeal based upon facts presented and college written rules and regulations.

If the appeal is granted, the citation will be voided. (AB 1032 and California Vehicle Code section 40202)

If the appeal is denied, the citation will be forwarded to the processing agency. If the appealing party wants to appeal the Parking Judiciary Board's decision, they could contact the processing agency and request a court date with the local municipal court.

Appeals will be at a set day and time each week at the discretion of the appeals board. The board would meet for one hour and hear no more than ten appeals per week. Any additional peals will be scheduled for the following week.

An officer of the SRJC Campus Police Department will be appointed to the Parking Judiciary Board as a non-voting member. The officer will coordinate weekly appeals by means of a PJB appeals docket filled out from persons appealing a citation through the Campus Police Office.

The officer will act as a resource person for the PJB in response to questions pertaining to signs, markings, etc.

The purpose of the PJB shall be to allow on in-house system of due process and sjudication for those persons who request to appeal a citation.

In order to appeal a citation through this in-house process, persons wishing to appeal a itation on campus must fill out an appeals form with the Campus Police Office rithin five (5) school days of receipt of the citations. Persons wishing to appeal itations after that time period must contact the processing agency for scheduling an appeal with ne Sonoma County Municipal Court.

UPDATE ON SRJC AND AB 1725

The 1988-89 college year has started well, with a strong Summer Session and Fall enrollment almost even with that of Fall, 1987 (in credit and up over 800 head count in non-credit).

But the big news, and something which affects all of us and our present and future students, is the passage of AB 1725 -- which will be phased in as the changes are funded by the Governor and developed by the Board of Governors, the Chancellor, organizations from the field and members of the local Boards of Trustees.

This bill, several years in evolving, is not definitive, but is more a "blueprint" which needs to be "fleshed out" with specifics.

But, it states clearly that California's community colleges will be a system that will play a major role in the State's future. As a start, the Legislature transferred control to the Board of Governors, appointed by the Governor, and locally elected Boards of Trustees, delineating specific functions to each.

The Bill takes effect January 1, 1989, with \$7.25 million allocated; \$5 million for staff development, \$1 million for Affirmative Action and \$1.5 million to the Chancellor's Office. It also sets the primary mission of California's community colleges: transfer education; vocational education; and student services. Important are non-credit and remedial education. Optional, and self-funded, are community service classes.

Dollars coming to us (about \$7 per ADA for staff development and \$1.40 per ADA for Affirmative Action) must be carefully accounted for, answering to the Chancellor as to how we use the funds and what the expenditures achieve.

The Board of Governors gets relief from the Office of Administrative Law, which has had authority to deny policies and procedures. The Chancellor is allocated six (6) positions (exempt from Civil Service), so the quality of staff in his office should improve considerably.

Credentials will be repealed July 1, 1990, if the Governor allocates \$70 million for the Bill next summer.

The final "trigger" of \$70 million will lead to a four-year tenure program; this with tenure sometime after that. And this \$70 million will complete the bill's outline for operation.

In 1991-92, the program-based funding will go into effect. Until then, the present finance plan will be operative (somewhat changed each year).

By that time we will have specific details established and approved by the Board of Governors and we can then get back to worrying about annual funding and wonder how we ever got to where we shall be.

On the bright side, the California Community College system has a good Board of Governors, a fine Chancellor, and unlimited talent in the field; all working together to develop a system which will permit us to focus on our mission -- educating students for transfer; training for entering the job market and/or participating in our non-credit and community service programs; all being helped by student services.

Result? A real life utopian system!



Darin:

We at The Oak Leaf have received mixed response to our editorial on Bob Flores. Most of the positive feedback has been from students; some faculty members have also said that we really hit the nail on the head. We have also heard from several members of CSA that the quote of Bob Flores', you know which one I'm talking about, is not true. We quoted Erick Maker, not Bob Flores. Maker could have been incorrect, however, we have received several corroborating accounts of that meeting.

I think it's rather juvenile to threaten Yvette Marchand with dismissal from the Condom Committee. It is unfair to persecute Yvette because she is on the staff of The Oak Leaf. Although Yvette was the principal author of the editorial, it represented the opinion of The entire Oak Leaf staff. In fact the last part of the editorial, calling for Mr. Flores's resignation, was not Yvette's idea, yet all of us agreed that it should be included.

Yvette did what any good reporter should have done, gathered information from both sides to support her arguments and then back them up in a well written editorial. Elizabeth Russell came to The Oak Leaf office and told me that the editorial was one sided, and that its author should have considered the other side. Yvette talked to Bob Flores as well as Erick Maker and several current members of CSA. What should we have done, asked Bob Flores to write the editorial for us? I'd think again about removing Yvette from the committee: she might have grounds to file suit against CSA and the person, or persons responsible for her dismissal.

For your information, editorials are generally not signed. They represent the views of the publisher. In the case of The Oak Leaf, the publisher is the editorial board, made up of myself and all section editors and their assistants. Editorials are not supposed to be two-sided, they are supposed to take one side of an issue. They are opinions.

One other thing, please advise all members of CSA that any time they talk to a member of The Oak Leaf, what they say will be "on the record." This is to protect our reporters from being accused of using something that was said "off the record."

College parking lot gets environmental OK

The board of trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College overrode neighborhood opposition Monday and gave environmental clearance for construction of a parking lot across from the campus on the east side of Mendocino Avenue.

Construction of the lot just north of Elliott Avenue is expected to start in the spring and be completed during the summer.

The 1.25-acre project, which is intended to alleviate critical parking problems on and near the college campus, is expected to cost about \$471,000 for land and construction.

The school has about 24,000 full and part-time students but only 2,300 on campus parking spaces.

Neighbors, speaking during a public hearing on environmental

documents that must be approved before the project proceeds, contended the new parking lot would create more traffic, noise and air pollution in the area.

Trustees disagreed, with one member contending the lot should improve traffic conditions because it would take cars off the streets.

"Why will it move cars off the streets when the drivers can park there for free instead of being charged in the lot," said Bob Pasolli, a Slater Street resident who has spoken in opposition to the project at previous hearings.

Ellen Wood wondered why the lot couldn't be just for college staff instead of staff and students. She said such a restriction would reduce the amount of traffic, air pollution and noise.


