



STUDENT PAY RAISE FOR 91-92 BUDGET

#### **Background**

1. On July 11, the Student Salaries Committee met. I was told by Jim Fox that a 2.5% (36,064) increase over a \$1.4 million student salary budget was appropriate. This was at a time when base funding was estimated at \$578,000.

It was requested by the Accounting Office and the Student Employment Office that the four Class pay system be consolidated into two Classes (attachment #2). This takes \$6,233 to accommodate the request. Which leaves 2.1% (29,831) to increase wages across the board (attachment #1).

- 2. Base funding is now estimated at \$1.2 million plus as of July 16.
- While attempting to make an equitable request we took the following facts into consideration:
  - 1. Total budget crunch
  - 2. Base funding
  - 3. Not retaining quality student employee due to low pay
  - 4. Local economy
  - 5. Technical, Licensed, Certified vs. General Employment
  - 6. One pay raise in last five years

- We, the students, respectfully request a pay raise of 3.18% (45,969) (attachment #3). The request for an additional 0.68% is being requested to specifically increase Class II, Columns I & II, due to responsibility, technical knowledge, and certification.
- 2. We, the students, realize that SRJC will attempt to be competitive in the area of student pay. Our request of 3.18% helps in creating greater equity among the campus community. Thank you for your time and consideration.

### CONDITIONS:

- 1. All students are initially employed in Column I. After they have earned 200 hours within the class, they are evaluated by their supervisor and recommended by their supervisor for advancement to Column II. Advancement occurs at the next subsequent pay period.
- 2. To be employed beyond a sixth semester, a student must have specific clearance through the Financial Aids Office. Clearance will be given only when satisfactory academic progress can be proven from transcripts.
- 3. A student employee, employed in Column II who changes to a different employment class, must have accumulated 200 hours or more in that class to retain a Column II placement.
- 4. If after a break in service, excluding summer and normal vacation periods, the student returns to work, either at the same job or in a new position, the new supervisor must analyze the job skills required by both old and new jobs. If the new job requires the same skills, training or credentials as the old the student retains the same class and column as before.
- 5. Placement within a given classification will be by review to determine the skill requirements for the preponderance of the assignment. (The occasional use of job skills that appear in a higher class will not automatically place a student in that classification.)





### Getting to SRJC and Back Again

If it is at all possible, leave your car at home when you come to SRJC this fall. Parking on the Santa Rosa campus is <u>extremely limited</u>. Campus officials have leased additional parking to help during the first few weeks of school, but even this additional parking won't be enough if every student coming to SRJC bring his or her own car.

If you must bring your car, please note the rules and regulations listed below. Take advantage of the new shuttle parking lot, and remember to give yourself enough time to find a place to park and still get to classes on time.

### If You Park on Campus

#### 1. Temporary Leased Lots

To augment the existing parking, SRJC has temporarily leased spaces at the Sonoma County Veterans Building in Santa Rosa. The lot will be open from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m. Monday through Friday and patrolled by campus police. See map to right. Students must have a valid Fall '91 semester parking permit, or purchase a \$1.50 daily permit to park in this lot.

#### 2. Free Shuttle Service

Free shuttle service will be provided from the Veterans Building to SRJC, every 15 minutes between 7:30 a.m. and 6 p.m., Monday through Friday. The last shuttle will leave the college at 6 p.m.

#### 3. Do Not Park in the Neighborhoods

Parking in the neighborhoods, north and east of SRJC, is limited to one hour between 8 a.m. and 8 p.m. SRJC parking permits are NOT VALID in the neighborhoods. Violators will be ticketed by the City of Santa Rosa and fines are \$10 per hour.

### 4. Do Not Park in Shopping Centers or Business Areas:


Parking lots for the businesses in the SRJC neighborhood are also restricted for customers only, and loading areas are to be kept clear. Business owners have indicated they will have student cars ticketed and towed.

#### 5. Plan Ahead and Don't Get a Ticket!

There is no grace period for the issuance of citations by either the City of Santa Rosa or by SRJC Campus Police. Rules and regulations are enforced from the first day of school.

#### **New SRJC Shuttle Parking Lot**

200 parking spaces will be available to SRJC students at the Veterans Building in Santa Rosa. Free shuttle buses will operate every 15 minutes from 7:30 a.m. until 6 p.m. Monday through Friday. Semester permits or daily parking permits are required.



### Find an Alternative

While the additional parking leased by SRJC will help, it won't be enough. We urge you to find an alternative form of transportation to school! Walk, bring your bike, carpool or take the bus!

When you call RIDES, be ready with the information about where you live and when you need to travel to and from SRJC. - ATTEMPT TO GET NEW LEGISLATION WHICH WOULD DELETE FEE RESTRICTIONS WHERE WE COULD ESTABLISH OUR OWN FEE STRUCTURES AND IF NEED BE, CHARGE \$100 TO \$150 PER SEMESTER FOR AN INDIVIDUALLY RESERVED SPACE BY A PARTICULAR BUILDING (FOR EITHER STAFF OR STUDENTS) MUCH LIKE THEY DO AT SONOMA STATE AND OTHER INSTITUTIONS THROUGHOUT THE COUNTRY.
- E. LOOK AT A TRANSPORTATION FEE THOUGH THIS IS UNSTABLE FUNDING AND OF LITTLE BENEFIT TO MOST STUDENTS AND STAFF GIVEN THE PRIMITIVE NATURE OF OUR LOCAL TRANSIT SYSTEMS. ALSO, THIS WOULD HAVE TO PART OF OUR TOTAL FEE CAP WHICH WOULD THEN DISALLOW US TO HAVE THE FLEXIBILITY TO DO MANY OF THE ABOVE MENTIONED BENEFIT PROJECTS.
- F. CHANGE THE MIX OF PARKING LOTS (I.E. THE RATIO BETWEEN DECAL AND DAILY FEE TICKETS.
- G. CONTINUE TO WORK ON CITY FOR STUDENT AND STAFF DISCOUNT PASSES (I.E. A REDUCED RATE THAT WE WOULD THEN ATTEMPT TO FURTHER SUBSIDIZE.)
- H. CONTINUE TO WORK ON CITY FOR ACCESS TO THE POORLY UTILIZED 7TH STREET PARKING STRUCTURE AS POSSIBLE SHUTTLE LOT. CITY IS SHOOTING SELF IN THE FOOT.

ALL OF THE ABOVE NEEDS TO BE DISCUSSED AND ACTED UPON BY THE PARKING COMMITTEE WITH THE IDEA OF HAVING A PACKAGE DEVELOPED WHICH WE COULD BRING TO THE ENTIRE CAMPUS COMMUNITY BY MID-FALL WITH BOARD ACTION BY END OF FALL SEMESTER.



## ASSOCIATED STUDENTS COLLEGE STUDENT ASSEMBLY FALL 1991 MINUTES

#### Meeting #1 26 August 1991

- I. The meeting was called to order at 3:12 P.M.
- II. Absent were Yosha Ellis, Jeffrey Williams, and Michael O'Donnell.
- III. The agenda was approved as amended.
- IV. There were no minutes to approve.
- V. REPORTS
  - A. President:
- 1. Brian Buck welcomed everyone to CSA.
- 2. Brian talked about the NACA Leadership convention in San Diego, and how it was a positive learning experience for the six officers who attended.
- 3. Brian announced the Fall Leadership Retreat will be on September 20,21, and 22 of this year.
- 4. Brian announced that Andy Azevedo had passed away over the summer. He reminded everyone CSA had made a \$250.00 donation to help finance his cancer treatment.
- 5. Brian announced the possibility of having a student run coffee house in the Doyle Student Lounge within the next couple years. He also mentioned the Auxillary Committee was currently examining that possibility.
- 6. Brian announced the school district had taken over the Recycling Program, which is now being run under Business Services. Profits from the Recycling Program will be divided between Business Services(75%) and the Associated Students(25%). # FROM: ETHNIC MINORITY COMMISSIONER MONIQUE EPPS

All of us in College Student Assembly has taken on a very important position. We have taken on the role of representatives for all students on campus. Taking on this role must be taken seriously. We are responsible for representing all groups on campus. Are we representing and serving the needs of all groups on campus?

Who in C.S.A. is representing and serving the needs for the Chicano students on campus, or the students in the Nursing Program? No one I know of has taken on the task of asking these groups of students if there needs are being met by Santa Rosa Junior College. We do not have to be in the Nursing Program or be Chicano to represent these groups. We need to ask the students from these groups what there needs are, ask them for ideas and comments to help us better serve there need.

We must also bring Ethnic Diversity to what ever position we hold. I being the Ethnic Minority Commissioner, have the role of serving the needs of minorities on this campus. To do this, I talk to different groups on . campus about what their needs are and if their needs are being recognized. If I pass by a group of African American Students in the Cafeteria, I will usually stop and ask them, If they enjoy the noon entertainment, or if they feel this campus offers courses on subjects that concern them. Usually, the comments are telling me that we are not doing what we need to do to properly represent the students on this campus. If you are the Entertainment Commissioner, the Program Chair or other position that deals with Associated Student Events, it is just as much my responsibility as yours to find out if a particular group enjoyed for example, the noon time entertainment or Welcome Back Movie Night. We can't only think of what we like, but must think of the big picture. Would the Chicano or Asian students on campus enjoy this movie or enjoy this band. The big picture is that we DO NOT represent the needs of all students. We need to make the Chicano students, the African American students and other ethnic

minority groups feel welcome. We may not be the most diverse campus in the state of California, but when we start to alienate one minority group on campus another group is sure to follow. As the demographics of California become closer and closer in having no Majority we need to think of the future of this campus and the future of Associated Students.

This is our responsibility, and I feel that representing all students should be top priority to the organization. We need a more diverse group in College Student Assembly and we will be able to achieve this if we become conscience about the needs for ethnic diversity on campus.





#### **AB 1725 MISSION STATEMENT**

#### SEC. 6. Section 66701 of the Education Code is amended to read:

- 66701. (a) Public community colleges shall offer instruction through but not beyond the second year of college. These institutions may grant the associate in arts and the associate in science degree.
- (b) Authorized instruction in the community colleges shall include standard collegiate courses for transfer to other institutions, vocational and technical courses leading to or upgrading, or leading to and upgrading, employment, general or liberal arts courses, adult noncredit courses, and community services programs and courses. However, priorities in the instructional programs shall be as follows:
- (1) The primary mission of the community colleges is the provision of rigorous, high quality degree and certificate curricula in lower division arts and sciences and in vocational and occupational fields.
- (2) The provision of remedial instruction, English as a second language instruction, and support services which help students succeed at the postsecondary level are essential and important functions of the community colleges.
- (3) The provision of adult noncredit education curricula in areas defined as being in the state's interest is an essential and important function of the community colleges.
- (4) The provision of community services courses and programs is an authorized function of the community colleges so long as their provision is compatible with an institution's ability to meet its obligations in its primary missions.

## SANTA ROSA JUNIOR COLLEGE MISSION STATEMENT

Santa Rosa Junior College recognizes that education can come in many shapes and forms and will provide opportunities for all those who can benefit from its educational program. The special needs of the community must be met--taking into consideration the constantly changing requirements of the area served. Everyone, regardless of age, sex, race, physical disability, ethnic, socioeconomic, cultural or educational background, are invited to participate. Emphasis will be put upon eliminating economic, psychological and physical barriers to college attendance. Therefore, the College is committed to providing the following to the residents of the district:

- 1. General education offering intellectual and social experiences for the development of knowledges, values, attitudes and skills needed by each student in realizing his/her full potential in a free society.
- 2. Transfer education equivalent to the lower division of universities and colleges for students who plan to continue their pursuit of higher education.
- 3. Occupational education to provide technical skills and related instruction for entry employment, vocational retraining and job advancement.
- 4. **Development education** to assist students who enter the College inadequately prepared so that they may succeed in college courses related to their interests.
- 5. Continuing education to provide equal opportunity for district residents to participate in a variety of lifelong learning experiences.
- 6. Student services to provide assistance and support to persons seeking access to the College and to encourage students to realize their personal potential and achieve social and educational goals.
- 7. Community services to assist in meeting the cultural, educational, avocational and vocational needs of district residents.

## Effects of the College Calendar Change on Summer Repertory Theatre, (SRT)

Report to College Council ubmitted by: Frank J. Zwolinski October 3, 1991

SRJC's Summer Repertory Theatre (SRT) is a unique theatre program in which advanced professionally-oriented theatre and music students recruited from throughout California combine with a staff of distinguished directors and designers from all over the United States to produce over 30 performances of six plays in full rotating repertory. During twenty years of continuous operation SRT's students have gone on to work at major schools and theatres across the nation; as teachers, actors, designers, technical directors, costumers, box office managers and directors. Using a combination of Repertory and Conservatory concepts, SRT offers the professionally oriented theatre student a chance to explore what is only theory during the academic year. The effect of adding a full veek to the semester break and thus lengthening the Spring semester by one week will have serious consequences for SRT! I urge you to adopt a calendar with a three week semester break.

#### THE PROBLEM

Originally SRT was a 12 week program

The effect of beginning the Fall semester before Labor day (the Early Calendar) was to cut one week off the program, a total loss of 14 performances. Now SRT is an 11 week program.

A four week break between semesters would cut another week from the program; another 14 performances, creating a 10 week program.

#### HE RESULTS

This change would be seriously detrimental to the educational experiences of the students in the SRT program. With only ten weeks in which to mount and produce six major productions, the scale and quality of those productions would be seriously jeopardized as would be the students training.

Our recruitment ability is already hampered by the early start of the summer session. Students who traditionally have applied to SRT are still in school when the program needs to begin.

The time which the program has already lost due to previous changes in the calendar has had serious consequences for SRT:

- 1) We have lost time in Santa Rosa High School auditorium, costing valuable setup and preparation time.
- 2) Fewer performances have lessened the acting and music student's performance experience.
- 3) A shorter building period, diminishes the technical theatre student's training.
- 4) The income loss from those missed performances further erodes our ability to offer scholarships to the students in the program.
- 5) College facilities are already at a premium, allowing no time between the summer and Fall would eliminate the use of the Doyle complex for registration.





The EOPS program at Santa Rosa Junior College is officially declared "impacted" as of October 1, 1991 for the remainder of the 1991-92 academic year. An "impacted" EOPS program is defined by the Chancellor's Office as one which is unable to provide the services mandated by the EOPS title 5 regulations to the next student accepted into EOPS. The "impacted" status of the EOPS program at SRJC is due to a 50% increase in the number of students served in the Fall of 1991 and a \$15,000 cut in the EOPS state allocation for 1991-92.

IMPLEMENTATION: As of October 1, the EOPS program will not accept new applications for the Fall 1991 or Spring 1992 semesters.

New EOPS applications for the Fall of 1992 will be accepted as soon as the Financial Aid Office begins accepting BOGG applications for the 1992-93 year on \_\_\_\_\_, 1992.
