During the past 19 months I have spent considerable time reviewing the organizational structure of the college and discussing the structure with members of the administration, Board, faculty, and staff. I have implemented several organizational changes to date, including the separation of the student services unit of the college to be headed by a vice president and the realignment of several reporting relationships affecting my office, administrative services, and business services. None of these changes involved the addition of administrative personnel to the college.

Further study of the organizational structure of the college lead me now to the following observations:

1. The level of administrative assistance in the Academic Affairs unit of the college does not allow sufficient assistance and review in planning and implementing curriculum, budgetary or personnel decisions.
2. The current Instructional Office Assistant Deans are vested with little autonomy in terms of decision making authority and responsibility.
3. Department chairs, in many instances, have had to assume responsibilities because of a mid-management level administrative vacuum, and are too far removed from direct administrative assistance.
4. In general, current administrative staff have little, if any, quality time that can be devoted to sound planning.

5. The Petaluma Center currently has the need for greater structure, and this need will be increased greatly when permanent facilities are opened.
6. Title IX, Title VI, Section 504, and other federally mandated requirements are not clearly defined as to where within the organization compliance responsibilities are vested.
7. Little formal use of the "administrative assistant" concept has been utilized within the college.
8. Confusion exists about the titles and relationship between and among many of the positions commonly referred to as "the Management Team."
9. No administrative training or development program formally exists at the college.
10. A comprehensive research component of the college does not exist.

This list is by no means meant to be complete but rather an overview, from my perspective, of current structural problems that I see with the college's current organization. I also do not intend these observations to be critical of any past or present persons or units of the college. Rather, to me these observations are strong indications of an institution that has grown rapidly in student enrollment and community support but whose infrastructure has failed to keep pace with that growth. Indeed it is my opinion that the college's current structure is insufficient in many ways to adequately meet the demands of an institution even half our size and complexity. At the same time I am fully cognizant that the addition of administrative or support staff needs to be addressed with careful planning and in the most cost effective manner possible.

These observations and brief comments lead me toward further developing the college's organizational structure using the following basic premises:

1. Greater service must be provided to the instructional departments of the organization while maintaining many elements of the current department chair structure.
2. The instructional arena needs to be refined into smaller more manageable units.
3. Reasonable span of control needs to be implemented within various units of the college.

4. Opportunities need to be provided for current staff to enter administration and have reasonable assurance of success.
5. Greater leadership needs to be exerted at all levels of the organization, rather than merely providing custodial care at this time of rapidly changing needs.
6. Greater accountability for decisions needs to be provided throughout the organization.

I want to emphasize that I have not developed nor am I committed to any single structure. I am committed, however, to further study of the structure with the intent of coming to as great a degree of agreement as possible prior to making formal recommendations to the Board of Trustees for its consideration.

I am available to discuss this item with members of the administrative staff, the Academic Senate, and other groups who want to enter into this dialogue. Your written comments are also welcome.

It is my desire to have an initial set of recommendations before the Board in May or June.

What A.S. Can Do To Support Prop.153...

Legally, the district can not use any district resources to promote any candidate or proposition and is limited to providing fact sheets only (see reverse side).

Due to this limitation, Dr. Agrella has asked the various groups on campus (SCOPE, AFA, AS, etc.) to actively participate in the Prop.153 campaign. The following is an outline of what he has requested.

- 1) Have a representative participate on a Prop. 153 steering committee.
- 2) Help organize a fundraiser to meet SRJC's contribution goal of \$4226 (at least!) towards the Prop.153 statewide campaign by May 1st. **Note: Prop.153 statewide promotion campaign has a budget of \$900,000 to be raised through the three higher ed systems (UC \$450,000; CSU \$300,000; CCC \$150,000)*
- 3) Launch a major "GET OUT THE VOTE" campaign for the June election.

THE BENEFITS: I see at least three benefits to be gained from this. First, and most obvious, we'll get some really cool buildings and equipment that are sorely needed. Second, we would be putting a flame under voter apathy on campus which is one of our primary goals here. And finally, I have Dr. Agrella's pledge to serve CSA breakfast if we raise \$1,000 towards the campaign goal (I have witnesses!)

Looks like we need a committee!!!

PROPOSITION 153: A Fact Sheet

What is it?

Proposition 153 is the \$900 million Higher Education Facilities bond measure which will be considered by voters on the June ballot.

What will it do for community colleges?

If it passes, Proposition 153 will provide approximately \$280 million for each of the three segments of higher education. California's community colleges will utilize \$101,380,000 to fund capital outlay projects at 53 of the 70 California Community College Districts for the 1992-93 year. The remainder will be used to fund approved capital outlay projects for 1993-94.

What will Proposition 153 mean for SRJC?

If it passes, Proposition 153 will provide more than \$5 million in 1992-93 for the following capital outlay projects at SRJC:

- \$2.584 million to construct and equip a new Child Care/Development Center
- \$972,000 to purchase equipment for Phase I of the new Petaluma Center
- \$2.177 million to acquire the Los Guilucos site for SRJC's Training Center

What happens if Proposition 153 doesn't pass?

If Proposition 153 fails, there will be no state funding for the three SRJC projects listed above. The delay in funding these projects causes even further delays for the other major capital outlay projects which are part of SRJC's Five Year Plan — including construction of a new library and Phase II of the Petaluma Center.

Who is supporting Proposition 153?

Support for Proposition 153 is coming from all three segments of higher education: the University of California, California State University and California Community Colleges.

At the community college level, an organization called "Californians for Community Colleges" has been formed. Jim Young of Kern Community College District and Tom Van Groningen of Yosemite Community College District, with assistance from Donna Hatchett of North Orange Community College District, are spearheading the bond activities for this organization.

A fund raising and political campaign to support the bond measure is being conducted by Californians for Higher Education. The Association of California Community College Administrators (ACCCA) is also supporting the measure, as are leaders of the statewide employee organizations.

Who is opposing Proposition 153?

There is no known opposition at this time.

Summary of Meeting

- **Matriculation Regulations:** The revisions to Section 58106, relating to prerequisites, were discussed. With regard to subsection (3), the question was raised whether "shall ensure" was the most appropriate term; the Council felt the most strongest term should be used. *It was the consensus of the Council that the regulation be approved.*
- **Real Estate Scholarship Program Regulations:** Currently, there is a \$400,000 endowment from the Department of Real Estate for scholarships for students in real estate programs. The Department would like to augment the scholarship fund by \$500,000, but would first like assurance that the funds are not underutilized and that disadvantaged students get priority in an effort to encourage underrepresented students to enter the profession. Staff distributed regulations that had been developed by the Real Estate Education Endowment Advisory Committee. *It was the consensus of the Council that they needed time to read the regulations and develop a response.* Among their concerns was that Section 56606(b) states that eligibility is limited to disadvantaged students. They also felt that "worthy" was a subjective term and should be changed.
- **Student Equity Policy:** Staff informed the Council that a subcommittee of the Council of Organizations has been established to prepare a proposal using elements of staff's earlier proposal and the Academic Senate's proposal. The next meeting of this subcommittee is scheduled for March 11 at 10 a.m.
- **Legislative Update:** Staff informed the Council that Vice Chancellor Carole Richard has left the agency and that an outside consultant will be hired until a replacement is found.

Staff noted that AB 2990 (Costa) is the bill to increase community college tuition to \$6 permanently, and that three bills relating to financial aid have been introduced recently. On the national level, several Board of Governors members are going to Washington, D.C., to meet with Congressional members to seek additional funding for the Amnesty program.

Council members expressed serious concern that a student member of the Board of Governors has not yet been appointed and may not be appointed before July. The Council discussed possible ways to establish communications with the Governor in order to expedite an appointment.

- **Financial Aid Loan Program:** Staff said the Chancellor has asked colleges to consider whether they should continue participating in the Guaranteed Student Loan program, given its major flaws and potential institutional consequences of a high default rate. In its place, the Chancellor proposes increased Pell Grants and College Work-Study funds, especially for first-year students, and federal direct loans for students who have successfully completed their first year of study.
- **CSBG Standing Rules:** The changes to the Standing Rules requested at the January 16, 1992, meeting have been incorporated. *It was the consensus of the Council that the CSBG Standing Rules be approved.*
- **Chancellor's Office Update:** Staff invited Council members to the Chancellor's Office Conference on April 1-3. It was noted that there would be 110 non-repeated workshops offered, focusing on various aspects of community college operations, including vocational education, DSP&S, EOPS, and transfer and articulation. Staff added that it was seeking students, particularly from the Bay Area, to entertain at some of the mealtime functions, and asked Council members to submit names of groups to contact.

There was also a brief discussion of the Governor's budget.

college teaching and may only seem to be vague and fashionable to those who do not have a thorough understanding of the problems and issues of community college education.

It was the consensus of the senate that the proposed mission statement is very close to what we should have as a final draft of our statement and that it reflects the extensive work done by the IPC mission statement subcommittee. It was decided that the senate would request comments from the faculty on further editing the mission statement to make it more readable and effective. The senate will gather these comments and in a special editing meeting it will produce a revised statement which will then be sent to the IPC subcommittee.

2. Discussion with President Agrella concerning organizational restructuring -

President Agrella visited the senate to discuss his proposed restructuring of some portions of the administration. Senators had received copies of the memo written by Dr. Agrella in which he described the reasons for considering a reorganization at this time. (Copies of this memo can be obtained from the senate Office.)

Dr. Agrella said that he was looking into reorganizing portions of the administration at this time because he wished to have some plans for reorganization completed before the end of the semester. He does not want to develop plans during the summer when most of the faculty are away. Nor does he want to wait until September or October to begin reflecting on reorganizational plans which would most likely not be in place until January 1993. When he first came to the college, he did not wish to initiate any reorganizational changes until he could better understand the organizational structure at SRJC.

He believes that there are many administrative needs in the district which are not being met: better coordination with off-site areas, better supervision of compliance with regulations, better research, and more support for instructional areas. He is not looking to add another layer of administration, but he does intend to create additional administrative positions. He intends to maintain the departmental structure and department chairs. He hopes to strengthen the department chair position by shifting some administrative minutiae away from department chairs to others. He hopes this will allow department chairs to focus on professional matters such as curriculum development, revision of programs and faculty evaluations.

In considering organizational changes, senators suggested that Dr. Agrella consider adding additional classified staff, especially in those areas where high student turn over require extensive retraining of individuals, a procedure for training faculty for administrative position, the use of classified administrative assistants to handle much of the paper work, and the use of reassigned time for faculty to engage in shared governance and activities.

Dr. Agrella indicated that he will share with the faculty any proposed plans for revision which will be formulated. The department chairs will discuss organizational structure at a special meeting on March 31.

A guest speaker from Capra's Elmwood Institute in Berkeley – an ecological *think tank* – will introduce 'MINDWALK' on April 16th and lead a discussion following the film at Lakeside Cinemas.

We, the students of G.A.I.A. (Global Awareness In Action), would like to express our environmental concerns concerning the cafeteria. We would like CSA to support us in asking that the cafeteria (meaning those who manage and oversee it) adopt a long term environmental policy--in which it will pledge to re-evaluate it's effects upon the environment and make changes accordingly. As it stands today, the cafeteria is environmentally unsound; it produces huge amounts of trash each day, it does not recycle all that it can, and it uses styrofoam.

We have spoken with the management and have had the opportunity to voice our concerns. While they have taken the time to listen to us--we feel that they have not taken us seriously. We hope that by working with the student government, we would have the support necessary to encourage some positive change, and better represent the general student population's environmental concerns. We have recently conducted an informal survey (with over 300 responses) in which 82% of those polled said that they think that there is a problem with the amount of disposable products being used. In addition to this, 89% said that they would like the option of reusable dishes for inside use and unwaxed paper products for outside use.

What is the cafeteria, the Auxiliary Services Committee, and the administration doing to address these and other environmental concerns? Please join us in urging them to think about the cafeteria's long term effects on the environment, and to develop a sound environmental policy.

In addition to this environmental policy, we have two main areas of concern. The first area being the possibility of changing the cafeteria from the wasteful use of disposable products to the use of reusable dishes (with the option of disposable products for outside use). Instead of throwing away garbage bag after garbage bag of used plates and cups...why not have the option of using the same dishes each day? This does mean considerable change, such as the extra burden of washing and clearing these dishes, but there are

positive opportunities as well, such as jobs. We propose that our first priority should be to lessen the negative long term damage being inflicted on the environment. Reusable dishes is the answer.

Our second main area of interest would be to encourage the cafeteria to use more environmentally sensitive disposable products, meaning untreated paper products, possibly even made from recycled paper. This would be preferable to the plastic and wax coated products currently in use. These coated products are quite harmful to the environment, they do not decompose. Untreated paper products harm the environment less in that they do decompose, and fewer chemicals are used in producing them.

We ask that CSA support these two proposals, reusable dishes and untreated paper products.

AB 2990 (Costa)
Community College Enrollment Fee

An enrollment fee of \$5 per unit (maximum \$50 per semester) was initiated in California's community colleges in the Fall semester of 1984. Effective July 1, 1991, a \$1 per unit surcharge was approved which brought the total fee to \$6 per unit (maximum \$60 per semester). AB 2990 (Costa) has been introduced to include the surcharge as part of the ongoing enrollment fee. AB 2990 would not increase the fee but would maintain it at the 1991-92 level. Other information related to AB 2990 includes.

- \$1 represents increase of 2.3% per year from 1984 to 1992.
- Continuation of \$1 generates \$15 million per year.
- \$15 million provides access for 10,000 students.
- AB 2990 includes a COLA which provides for a stable, predictable, and moderate increase.
- AB 2990 eliminates the current sunset.
- Community college fees in California are by far the lowest in the nation. The median amount collected nationwide for tuition and fees is over \$750.
- Currently, over 230,000 economically disadvantaged students have the enrollment fee waived.
- No loss of students could be determined from the \$1 surcharge during 1991-92.

§ 76060.5. Student representation fee; election; support of governmental affairs representatives; district administrative costs; refusal to pay fee

If a student body association has been established at a community college as authorized by Section 76060, the governing body of the association may order that an election be held for the purpose of establishing a student representation fee of one dollar (\$1) per semester. The election shall be held in compliance with regulations of the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges and shall be open to all regularly enrolled students of the community college. The affirmative vote of two-thirds of the students voting in the election shall be sufficient to establish the fee. However, the election shall not be sufficient to establish the fee unless the number of students who vote in the election equals or exceeds the average of the number of students who voted in the previous three student body association elections.

The student representation fee authorized by this section shall be collected by the officials of the community college, together with all other fees, at the time of registration or before registration and shall be deposited in a separate fiduciary fund established per the California Community Colleges Budget and Accounting Manual for student representation fees. The money collected pursuant to this section shall be expended to provide for the support of governmental affairs representatives who may be stating their positions and viewpoints before city, county, and district governments, and before offices and agencies of the state government. The chief fiscal officer of the community college shall have custody of the money collected pursuant to this section and the money shall be disbursed for the purposes described above upon the order of the governing body of the student body association. The district may retain a portion of the fees collected and deposited pursuant to this section that is equal to the actual cost of administering these fees up to, but not more than, 7 percent.

The student representation fee authorized by this section may be terminated by a majority vote of the students voting in an election held for that purpose. The election shall be called and held in compliance with regulations of the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges and shall be open to all regularly enrolled students of the community college.

A student may, for religious, political, financial, or moral reasons, refuse to pay the student representation fee established under this section. The refusal shall be submitted in writing to the college officials at the time the student pays other fees collected by the college officials. The refusal shall be submitted on the same form that is used for collection of fees as provided by the college, which, as determined by the college, shall be as nearly as practical in the same form as a model form prescribed by regulations of the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges.

CHAPTER 8 STUDENT ORGANIZATION

ARTICLE 1 — STUDENT REPRESENTATION FEE

§ 54801. Calling of Election

The governing body of each student body association authorized by Education Code Section 76060 shall establish procedures for elections conducted for the purpose of collecting a student representation fee, and call an election for such purpose. The election shall, at a minimum, meet the following criteria:

(a) The student body association on each campus shall maintain in its office written information regarding election procedures. Such information shall be made available to the public upon request.

(b) Adequate notice of the election shall be given by the student body association. Adequate notice is deemed to be at least ten school days prior to the election date.

(c) Each election shall be held on a day which counts toward the 175 day requirement as defined in Section 58120 of this part. In instances where an election is conducted for more than one day, those days shall be consecutive and shall be limited to a maximum of five days.

§ 54803. Termination of Fee

(a) Any student representation fee that has been instituted pursuant to the procedures enumerated in Section 54801 may be terminated by a majority of the students voting in an election called in one of the following two manners:

(1) By placing the issue on the ballot for the next regular associated student body election. The issue shall be placed on the ballot upon receipt of a petition indicating an interest in the termination of the representation fee signed by a majority of the number of student who voted in the election establishing the fee.

(2) Pursuant to procedures pre-established by the student body association for calling such an election. Such procedures shall be available for public inspection during regular business hours.

(b) The election shall be conducted in accordance with the procedures established pursuant to Section 54801.

§ 54805. Collection of the Fee

District governing boards shall include in the materials given to each student at registration, information pertaining to the representation fee. The form used by a college for the purpose of collecting the fee shall contain, at a minimum, the following:

(a) a statement indicating that the money collected pursuant to this article shall be expended to provide support for students or representatives who may be stating their positions and viewpoints before city, county, and district government, and before offices and agencies of the state and federal government;

(b) the amount of the fee;

(c) a statement informing the students of their right to refuse to pay the fee for religious, political, moral or financial reasons.

An act to amend Section 72246 of the Education Code, relating to postsecondary education, and making an appropriation therefor.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 3571, as introduced, Farr. Community colleges: fees.

(1) Existing law permits the governing board of a district maintaining a community college to require community college students to pay a fee in the total amount of not more than \$7.50 for each semester, and \$5 for summer school, or \$5 for each quarter, for health supervision and services.

This bill would increase the fee for health supervision and services to \$10 per semester, and would permit the governing board of a district to proportionately adjust the amount of the fee for term lengths based on a quarter system. The bill would also permit the governing board of each community college district, commencing with the semester, term, or quarter that begins after January 1, 1993, to increase the fee by the same percentage increase as the Implicit Price Deflator for State and Local Government Purchase of Goods and Services, as specified.

(2) Existing law requires any community college district that provided health services during the 1986-87 fiscal year to maintain health services at the level provided during the 1986-87 fiscal year each fiscal year thereafter. Existing law also provides that if the cost to maintain that level of service exceeds a specified limit, the excess cost shall be borne by the community college district.

This bill would, instead, require any community college

district that provides health services during the 1991-92 fiscal year, or any subsequent fiscal year, to maintain health services at prescribed levels thereafter.

(3) Existing law requires each community college district to adopt regulations either exempting low-income students from the health services fee or to provide for payment of the fee from other sources.

This bill would delete that provision and would appropriate \$1,470,000 from the General Fund to the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges to provide financial aid to low-income students who cannot pay the fee for student health services.

Vote: majority. Appropriation: yes. Fiscal committee: yes. State-mandated local program: no.

The rules and regulations shall exempt those students receiving financial aid pursuant to Section 72252.1.

~~(d)~~ The governing board of a district maintaining a community college shall adopt rules and regulations that exempt the following students from any fee required pursuant to subdivision (a):

(1) Students who depend exclusively upon prayer for healing in accordance with the teachings of a bona fide religious sect, denomination, or organization.

(2) Students who are attending a community college under an approved apprenticeship training program.

(d) All fees collected pursuant to this section shall be deposited in the fund of the district designated by the California Community Colleges Budget and Accounting Manual. These fees shall be expended only to provide health services.

Authorized expenditures shall not include, among other things, athletic trainers' salaries, athletic insurance, medical supplies for athletics, physical examinations for intercollegiate athletics, ambulance services and the salaries of health professionals for athletic events, any

to all students. No student shall be denied a service supported by student health fees on account of participation in athletic programs.

~~(f) Any community college district that provided health services in 1986/87 shall maintain health services at the level provided during the 1986/87 fiscal year in 1987/88 and each fiscal year thereafter. If the cost to maintain that level of service exceeds the limits specified in subdivision (a), the excess cost shall be borne by the community college district.~~

~~(g) This section shall become operative January 1, 1988.~~

(c) Any district that provides health services during the 1991-92 fiscal year shall provide the same types of health services and the same level of health services provided during the 1991-92 fiscal year and each fiscal year thereafter. Any district that starts a program during the 1992-93 fiscal year, or any fiscal year thereafter, shall provide the same types of health services and the same level of health services provided during the first fiscal year the program started each fiscal year thereafter.

Each district shall endeavor to ensure that the district meets the objective of strengthening the educational process by facilitating the physical, emotional, and social well-being of students through health services that are accessible and of high quality.

The board of governors shall adopt regulations that generally describe the types of health services included in the health service program.

SEC. 2. The sum of one million four hundred seventy thousand dollars (\$1,470,000) is appropriated from the General Fund to the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges to provide financial aid to low-income students, as specified in subdivision (a) of Section 72252.1 of the Education Code, who cannot pay the fee established by Section 72246 of the Education Code for student health services.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 2990, as introduced, Costa. Community colleges: fees.

(1) Existing law, which is to be repealed on January 1, 1995, requires the governing board of each community college district to charge each student, except as otherwise specified, a fee of \$5 per unit per semester up to a maximum of \$50 per semester. Existing law also requires the governing board of each community college district, for the 1991-92 academic year only, to impose a surcharge of \$1 per unit per semester up to a maximum of \$10 per semester.

This bill would increase the fee to \$6 per unit per semester up to a maximum of \$60 per semester and would delete the repeal date. The bill also would delete the provisions applicable to the surcharge imposed only for the 1991-92 academic year. The bill would require that the fee be increased, in accordance with the calculation of the Board of Governors of the California Community Colleges, by the same percentage as the Implicit Price Deflator for State and Local Government Purchases of Goods and Services if that calculation produces an increase of \$1 above the existing fee. In that case, the fee per unit per semester would be increased by \$1 and the maximum fee per semester would be increased by \$10. The duties imposed on community college districts in connection with the fee would impose a state-mandated local program.

(2) The California Constitution requires the state to

mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement, including the creation of a State Mandates Claims Fund to pay the costs of mandates which do not exceed \$1,000,000 statewide and other procedures for claims whose statewide costs exceed \$1,000,000.

This bill would provide that, if the Commission on State Mandates determines that this bill contains costs mandated by the state, reimbursement for those costs shall be made pursuant to those statutory procedures and, if the statewide cost does not exceed \$1,000,000, shall be made from the State Mandates Claims Fund.

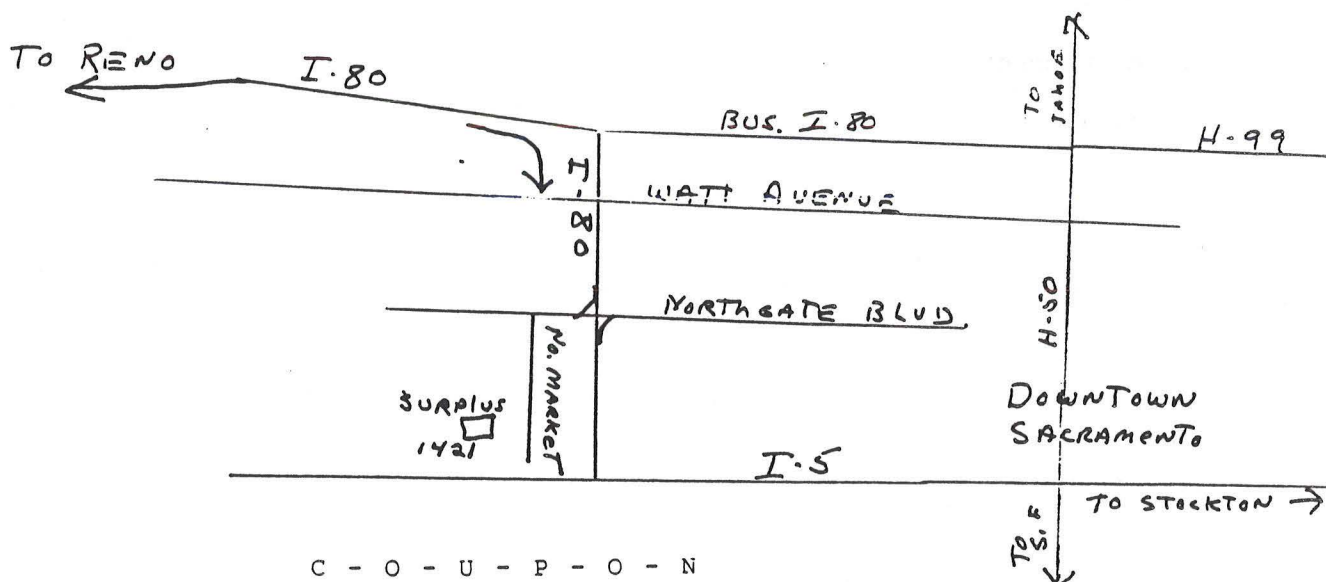

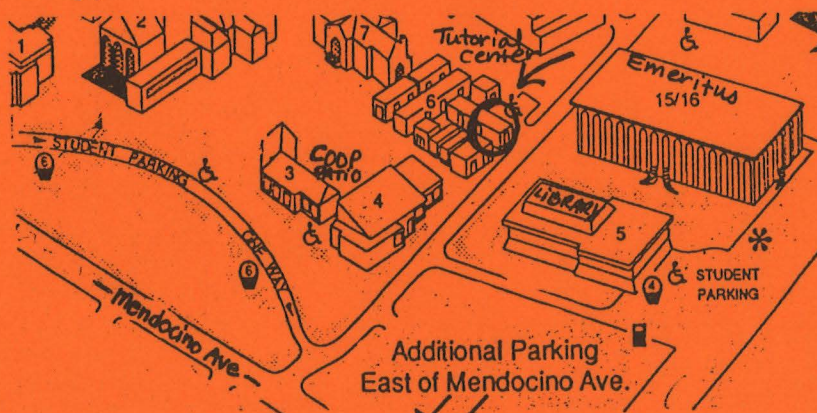

Subject: Proposed Organizational Structure

I want to thank everyone who provided me with observations, comments, and questions in response to my recent memorandum on the organizational structure of the College. I found the information to be quite helpful in preparing the structure described in the attachments.

This proposed structure is not meant to be definitive or respond to all of the questions that may arise regarding the roles and responsibilities of the various positions that are indicated on it. Rather, it is meant to provide the general organizational parameters within which we will be further developing our structure over the next several years. This structure contains what I believe is necessary for us to function effectively as we grow as an institution and face the numerous current as well as future challenges.

For the area of Academic Affairs I have provided a further detail of the structure indicating which departments I propose to be reporting to the various assistant deans. The configuration of departments was arrived at by blending a number of factors, including number of full and part-time faculty and staff, curriculum, and currently approved positions. At this time I envision that each of the Deans of Instruction will be assigned specific primary coordinating responsibilities for all of Academic Affairs for one or more major activity such as personnel, evaluation, budgeting, scheduling, or facilities. Although the Vice President of Academic Affairs will be held responsible for all of these areas, he will provide primary coordinating responsibility for planning and curriculum. One of the goals of this structure is to allow department chairs to concentrate on curriculum development, faculty evaluation, articulation activities, instructional development, and other associated activities. Clearly the chairs need to continue to play a major role in budgeting, class scheduling, various employment practices, and other functions, but I hope to relieve chairs of many of the time consuming and burdensome aspects of these tasks. It is the responsibility of the instructional deans and assistant deans to *support* the departments and chairs.

Within the Student Services segment of the College the primary changes involve the realignment of functions under several management positions, the further recognition of Alumni Affairs as an organizational function and responsibility, and the alignment of EOPS as a part of guidance and counseling services.

As indicated on the chart, the addition of a fourth major unit to the organization is anticipated. This unit is to be headed by Dr. Groninga and greatly expands his role in the area of planning, grants, and research. Although the totality of this unit may not emerge immediately, I anticipate that it will play an ever increasing role in assisting the College to meet our future needs.

The provision of support staff within this structure is being studied further by each of the vice presidents. I have asked each of them to review current staffing levels with the intent of shifting positions internally within each of their respective areas whenever possible. Clearly, however, additional staff will be required when this plan is implemented fully.

An additional component of staffing that will also need to be studied is the possible implementation of administrative assistant positions within the structure. I have not addressed these positions at this time since I believe that the vice presidents, deans, and chairs need to have some in-depth discussions on this topic in order to maximize the effectiveness of these positions.

It remains my intent to have an initial recommendation on organizational structure to the Board in May or June. It is also my intent to begin filling various new positions as soon after formal Board approval as possible, within appropriate Affirmative Action regulations and fiscal constraints.

Because it is possible that some of the recruitment to fill positions will occur over the summer months I am asking the Academic Senate to provide me with the names of faculty who will be available during the summer to participate in the hiring process. I would greatly appreciate faculty and staff assistance in this effort.

I am available to meet with the Academic Senate as well as other departments or individuals to hear comments or questions about this proposal. In addition, I would be pleased to receive written comments prior to submitting my formal proposal to the Board of Trustees.

I have reviewed this memo with members of my staff. You should feel free to discuss this memorandum and its contents with them.

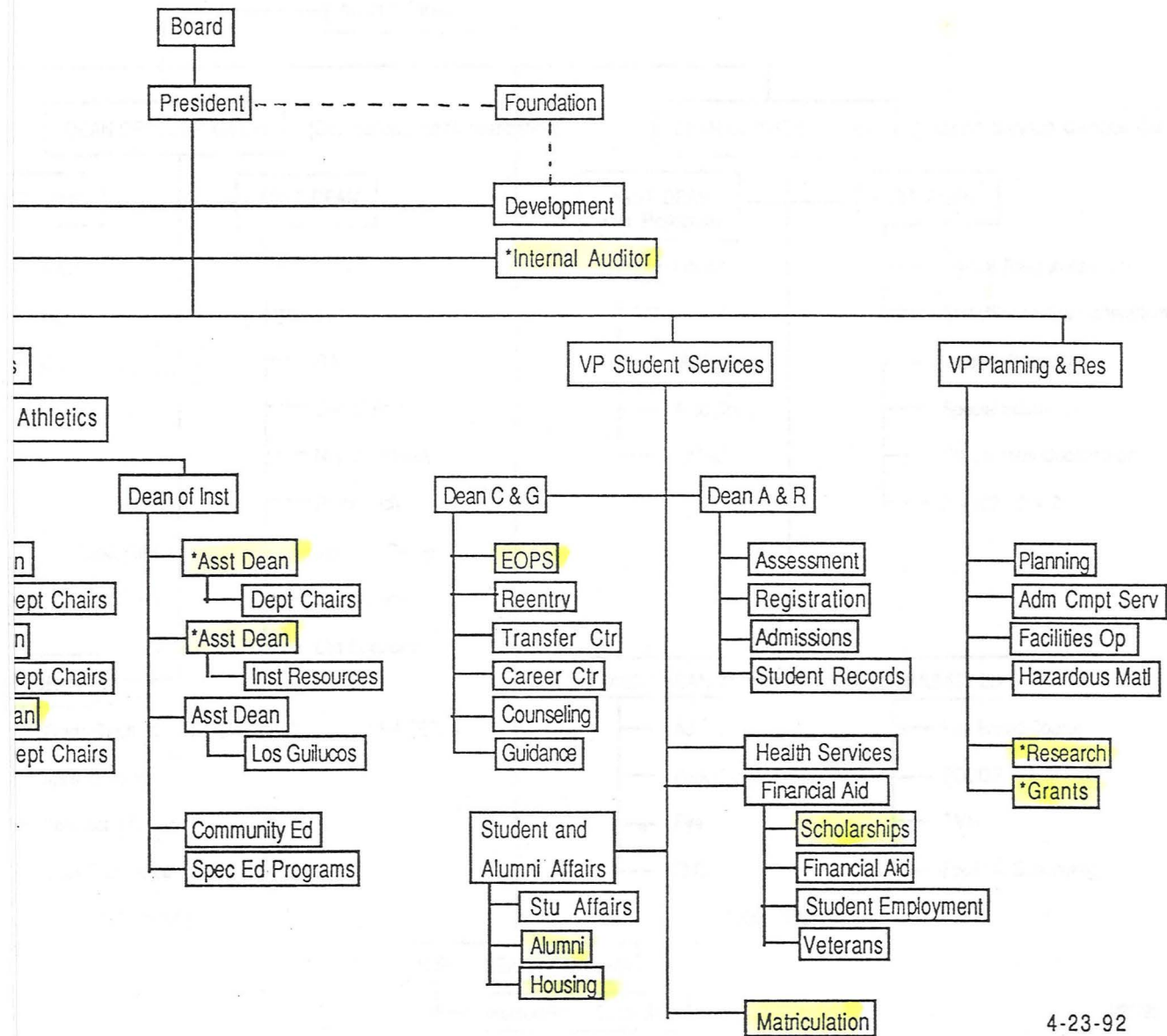

NOTES ON ORGANIZATIONAL RESTRUCTURING

1. Solid lines (—) signify line authority, responsibility, and accountability.
2. Dotted lines (·····) signify coordinating responsibility and accountability.
3. An asterisk (*) denotes a proposed change in present reporting relationship and/or a new position.
4. The District Compliance Officer shall be responsible for Title IX, Section 504, Title VI, Americans Disability Act (ADA) and other federally mandated programs in coordination with the Personnel Department, DSP&S, EOPS, and other appropriate college departments/individuals.
5. To the greatest extent possible, each of the Deans of Instruction positions are responsible for a blend of various occupational and liberal arts programs and courses. Because of the uniqueness of liberal arts and occupational education traditional "specialists" for each of these areas will be maintained, however.
6. Assistant Deans will be selected for not only administrative potential but commitment to being of help and service to departments. The Assistant Deans could be thought of as "ombudspersons" for the departments. In most cases, they shall be responsible for both occupational and liberal arts programs and courses
7. The Athletic Director shall be responsible to the Vice President for adherence to Commission rules and regulations and will serve as the supervisor for all coaches and trainers. In areas such as reconferencing, rules infractions, etc. both the Vice President and the Director will report to the President.
8. Department Chairs primary responsibilities shall center around curriculum development, instructional leadership and faculty evaluation. In such matters as scheduling and budget development they will work closely with their appropriate Assistant Dean who will be charged with providing assistance and leadership in these areas.
9. Whenever possible, the Assistant Deans on the Santa Rosa campus shall be housed outside Bailey Hall and in proximity to their appropriate department chairs and Service Centers.
10. Partial costs for implementing several of the new administrative positions will come by not filling currently approved administrative positions (1.0 FTE, Manager, Becoming Independent; 0.4 FTE, Director, Instructional Office; and, 0.6 FTE, Director, Evening Programs). Some of the additional costs to implement the structure are anticipated to come from a review of current reassigned time.

Constitution of the
California Students Association of Community Colleges

DRAFT

Article I: Name

The name of this organization shall be the California Student Association of Community Colleges, abbreviated: CalSACC.

Article II: Mission

The Association shall address issues of the California community colleges; encourage student participation in the formulation and implementation of policies and procedures which impact them; advocate the exploration of opportunities and involvement in student development and leadership; officially represent community college students in all levels of policy and decisions making to the Governor, the State Legislature, Board of Governors, and Chancellor's Office, and other recognized commissions, agencies, and entities that effect the welfare of California Community College students.

Article III: Objectives

- Section 1:** To serve as an advocate on issues the affect the educational opportunities of California community colleges.
- Section 2:** To provide a network to enhance communication among California community college students, and to facilitate communications with the Governor, the State Legislature, Board of Governors, and Chancellor's Office, and other recognized statewide organizations and entities that affect the welfare of California community college students.
- Section 3:** To provide leadership training and development necessary for student leaders to function effectively.
- Section 4:** To provide services essential to accomplishing the mission of the organization. This should include but not be limited to conferences, publications, and legislative information.
- Section 5:** To provide information on, and act upon, any issue concerning California community college students occurring outside the state of California.

Article IV: Membership

- Section 1:** The membership of this organization shall consist of all community college student body associations
- Section 2:** Formal membership, consisting of active participation and voting, shall be limited to California community college student body associations that sustain and abide by the CalSACC Constitution.

- Section 3:** Regional Board representatives, Policy Board members and Executive Officers must be either a Student Body Association President or the designated representative from their ~~college~~ student body association (one per college) and must maintain their respective ~~college~~ student body association standards for holding office.
- Section 4:** State Policy Board members and State Executive Board Officers shall hold a student body association office at their member colleges concurrently with their state term.

Article V: Regional Board and Membership and Representation

- Section 1:** Each ~~college~~ student body association shall be a member of one of the regions as aligned by the Chancellor's Office (one per college).
- Section 2:** ~~Each regional Board shall consist of one representative from each member college.~~
- Section 3 2:** Each Regional Board shall elect a chairperson at a regional meeting.
- Section 4 3:** Each member college as well as each Regional Board may submit educational issues of importance to the Policy Board.
- Section 5 4:** ~~The~~ Each Regional Board shall ~~discuss and share ideas about programs and leadership, participate in the formulation and implementation of policy and procedures which impacts and governs them~~ through regional meetings, and workshops and/or conferences.

Article VI: Executive Officers

- Section 1:** The Executive Officers shall consist of the President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary, and ~~one-ex-officio~~ non-voting advisor.
- Section 2:** The Executive Officers shall be elected at a statewide spring conference.
- Section 3:** Executive Officers shall serve as support operations to the Policy Board. The Executive Officers shall exercise the decisions of the Policy Board.
- Section 4:** Executive Officers shall serve a term of office from July 1 to June 30 and shall not exceed two terms.

Article VII: Policy Board

- Section 1:** The Policy Board shall consist of one representative from each region, four executive officers, and ~~one-ex-officio~~ a non-voting advisor.
- Section 2:** The Policy Board shall be elected no later than the end of the Spring semester or quarter.
- Section 3:** The Policy Board shall be chaired by the ~~Executive~~ President. Each member of the Policy Board shall have one vote (except as outlined in Article XI, Section 1).
- Section 4:** The Policy Board members shall serve a term of office from July 1 to June 30 and shall not exceed two terms.
- Section 5:** The Policy Board members shall set goals and objectives, provide educational information to the regional board, establish priorities, and suggest programs for the Association.

Section 6: No Policy Board member shall also act as regional chairperson.

Article VIII: Parliamentary Procedures

All meetings of the Regional and Policy Boards shall be conducted according to Robert's Rule of Order, newly revised edition

Article IX: Vacancies and Removal from Office

- Section 1:** In the event of permanent inability, ineligibility, or recall of the President, the Vice President shall ascend to the office of President.
- Section 2:** In the event of permanent inability, ineligibility, or recall of the President and Vice President, a special election shall be held in order to fill both vacancies.
- Section 3:** A vacancy which occurs in the office of the Vice President, Secretary, or Treasurer shall be filled by Presidential appointment and approved by the Policy Board with two-thirds (2/3) vote.
- Section 4:** Any elected officer may be removed from office by two-thirds(2/3) vote of the Policy Board for violations of duties as stated in the bylaws.
- Section 5:** Vacancies of regional chairpersons shall be filled by Regional Board Elections.

Article X: Finances

- Section 1:** The Finance Committee shall consist of the Vice President, Treasurer, and at least two Policy Board members appointed by the Treasurer, and an advisor. The Policy Board must confirm the appointees by a two-thirds (2/3) vote. The Finance Committee will be chaired by the Treasurer and shall be responsible for the development of the CalSACC State ~~develop a~~ budget.
- Section 2:** The Treasurer shall submit the budget to the Policy Board for their approval. The budget is shall be adopted by the Policy Board with two-thirds(2/3) vote.
- Section 3:** Expenditures shall be restricted solely to the line items adopted in the budget.
- Section 4:** All expenditures shall be disbursed through a requisition bearing the signature of the Treasurer, the President or Vice President, and the Advisor.
- Section 5:** CalSACC may assess dues to individual member student associations based on a dues schedule that shall be approved by a majority vote of formal member student associations at a statewide conference.

Article XI: Advisor

- Section 1:** The Advisors of the Student Body Association shall serve as ~~ex-officio~~ non-voting members on the Regional and State Policy Boards.
- Section 2:** The advisor shall serve as the Parliamentarian.
- Section 3:** The advisor shall serve as a consultant, and shall provide guidance and support to the Policy Board.

Article XII: Amendments

- Section 1:** An amendment(s) may be proposed by any member college or any member of the Policy Board.
- Section 2:** In order to appear on a ballot for ratification, each amendment shall receive a majority vote of the Policy Board or a petition formally supported by four (4) or more regions.
- Section 3:** Amendments to this Constitution shall be ratified by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of all member student associations at a statewide conference.

Article XIII: Bylaws

- Section 1:** Bylaws shall be established and amended by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of the Policy Board.
- Section 2:** Bylaws adopted by the CalSacc Policy Board shall only apply to the CalSacc Policy Board.

Article XIV: Ratification

This Constitution became effective upon its adoption by two-thirds (2/3) vote of the member colleges present at the CCCSAA Leadership Training Conference on November 13-15, 1987, and was modified at the CalSACC Legislative Conference on April 25, 1991 and May 10, 1992.

Article XV: Implementation

Any amendment made to the CalSacc Constitution shall take effect on July 1, concurrent with the newly elected term of office as stated in Article VII: Section 4.

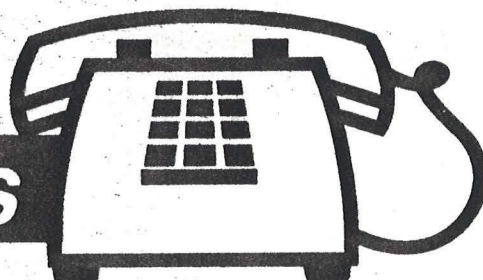

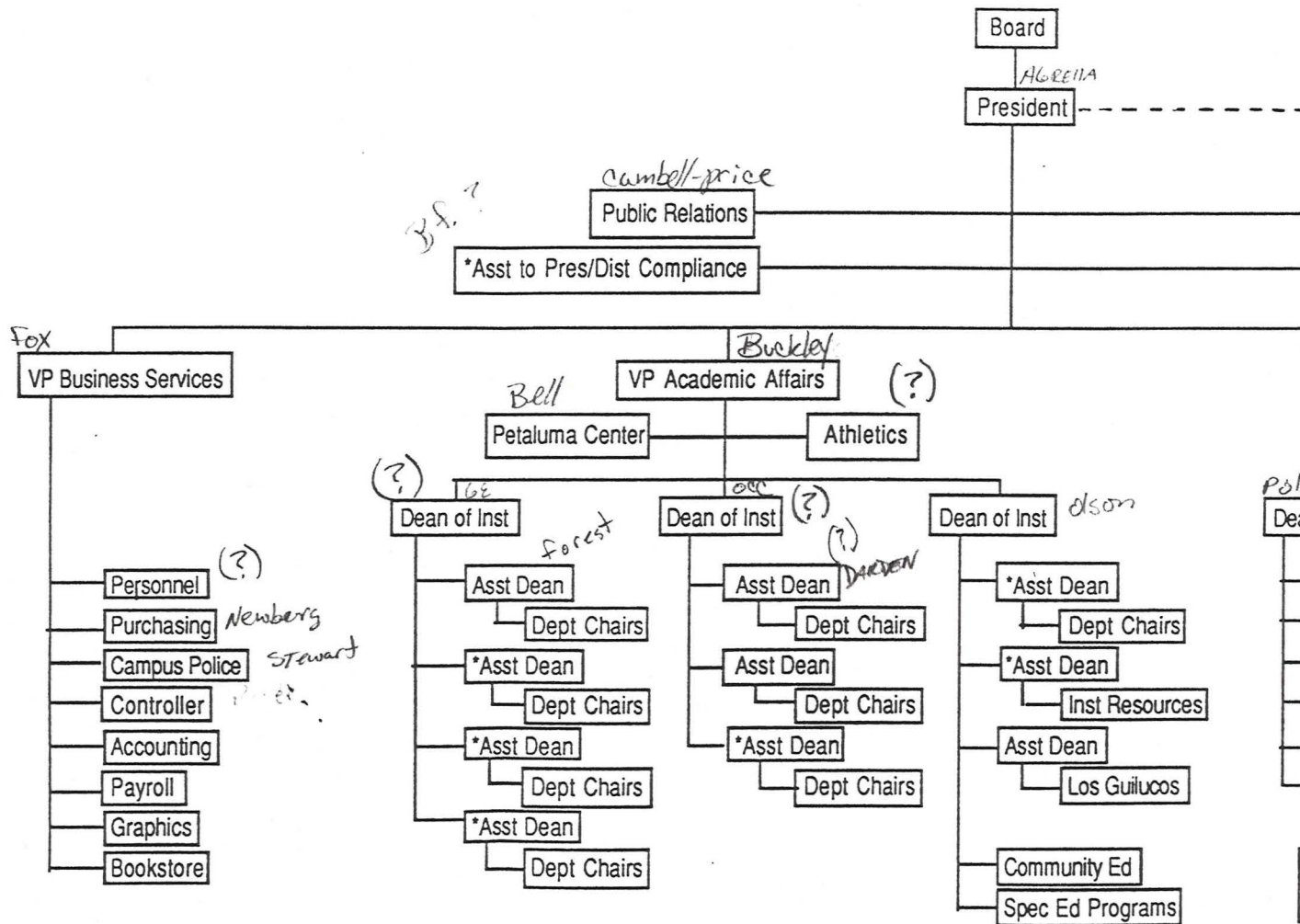

BUDGET LINE ITEM

I would like to bring to your attention the "Earth Day" line item under the "Student Activities/Events/Services" head line in the AS 92-'93 Budget. While the line item was originally labeled "EarthDay Events/Community Events," the Budget committee thought that that could be misunderstood and/or used for other purposes and was too broad. It was changed to "Earth Day."

As it stands now, I think "Earth Day" as a line item is misleading, at least in the context that it was intended. As you may know, Earth Day is used typically for an EarthDay celebration in April sometime. The request and allocation of funds, however, also allows for a(n) event(s) outside of a typical Earth Day in April. Thus, I do not want a potential organizer, looking at next years budget, to think that monies can only be allocated for April.

Therefore, I am proposing a change in the "Earth Day" line to something that will more accurately reflect on environmental awareness event any time in the year. For example, "Environmental Awareness Events" for the line, or, "Environmental Awareness Day(s)," or (?) something else?

The Budget Committee does not want it to be too vague so that it could mean just any sort of environmental funding, and I do not want it to be too specific and limiting to Earth Day.

In order for students to be able to learn and participate in college life and academia, it is essential that their health needs are met. Many of our students have no other means of health care. Without the care they receive through our student health center, they would find themselves desperately in need.

Knowing this, as elected student representatives of Orange Coast College, and after thorough examination of the issue and consultation with the students, we pledge our full support of the student health fee increase. Assembly Bill 3571 would increase the allowable fee by \$2.50 per student per semester and require maintenance of effort by colleges that choose to increase their fees.

We feel that this bill is just and necessary to support our student body in meeting their health needs. Passage of this bill would allow our student health center to continue to operate and serve the growing needs of our student population at the reasonable level demanded by our students.

We realize that this is not a good time to increase fees, but health care for our students is too important an issue to neglect just on the basis of political climate. Without the increase of funds allowable by this legislation, our health center will not be able to adequately care for Orange Coast College students. We acknowledge that reality, and we support AB 3571. We hope that you will do the same.

SUBJECT: Pre Collegiate Basic Skills Unit Limitation (AB 1725 Regulation)
 Re: Draft Policy and Procedures

Background

In accordance with AB 1725 the Board of Governors has mandated (Title 5:55756.5) that Community Colleges implement a policy limiting the number of units a student may earn for remedial courses to a total of 30 semester units. Non credit basic skills are not affected by the regulation as they do not bear credit. Units completed at other colleges are not included in this limit.

Applicable course work is defined by T5 55002 (b) as "precollegiate basic skills courses in reading, writing, computation, learning skills, study skills and ESL which are designated by the community college district as non degree credit courses."

However the regulation also exempts the following students from this 30 unit limitation: students enrolled in one or more ESL courses, and students identified by the district as having a learning disability as defined by T5 56014.

The regulation states that a college may provide a waiver for a specified time period for students who show significant, measurable progress toward the development of appropriate skills for college level courses.

Finally the college is required to establish dismissal and reinstatement procedures for students who reach the 30 unit limit and have not been granted a waiver.

Proposed Policy

"It shall be the policy of the Sonoma County Junior College District to exercise a limit on the number of precollegiate basic skills credit units a student may earn within the district. Such limitation will take into account appropriate exemptions and waivers for certain students as permitted by the Title 5 California Code of Regulations. The college shall establish and publish procedures that will assure implementation of reasonable standards for student notification, dismissal, appeal and reinstatement pursuant to this policy."

Proposed Procedures

1.0 Precollegiate Basic Skills Definition

The precollegiate basic skills courses shall include those non degree credit courses in reading, writing, computation, learning skills, study skills, and English as a Second Language designed to ensure acquisition of those skills

necessary for successful completion of associate degree, transfer, and occupational courses.

2.0 Unit Limitation

2.1 A student is permitted to earn a cumulative total of thirty (30) credit units in precollegiate basic skills courses at Santa Rosa Junior College.

2.2 Credit course units transferred from other colleges will not count in the 30 unit limitation.

3.0 Exemptions

All precollegiate basic skills courses taken by students enrolled in an English as a Second Language courses and students identified by the district as having a verified learning disability, acquired brain injury or hearing impairment are exempted from the 30 unit limitation.

4.0 Notification

4.1 Students will be sent notification of the unit limitation policy and waiver procedures when their enrollment reaches or exceeds twenty four (24) units in the designated precollegiate courses.

4.2 Students will not be permitted to enroll in precollegiate basic skills courses above their individual 30 unit limit unless a waiver has been granted.

4.3 Students denied further enrollment in precollegiate basic skills because of the 30 unit limitation will be notified of their status, will be advised of the waiver option, and will be advised of non credit course alternatives.

5.0 Waiver

5.1 Students may submit a petition to the Admissions Office to waive the 30 unit limitation prior to the date the requested course begins.

5.2 Petitions for waiver must include specific documentation of the student's measurable progress toward the development of skills necessary for college level courses as corroborated by faculty recommendation, satisfactory overall grade average, competency assessment, or course work completed elsewhere.

5.3 Petitions for waiver must specify the course work and time anticipated to be necessary to attain the desired skill level at Santa Rosa Junior College.

6.0 Reinstatement

A student may petition the Admissions Office for reinstatement to the credit course program upon demonstration of skill levels appropriate for college level course work as corroborated by faculty recommendation, satisfactory overall grade average, competency assessment, or course work completed elsewhere.

SUBJECT: ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE

During the past several weeks I have received numerous comments and advice regarding my draft proposal of an organizational structure for the College. Throughout this process I have been impressed with how seriously individuals have taken the draft document. In addition, I have become increasingly aware of the anxiety that the proposal has raised. In some instances this anxiety appears to be based on not having more detailed information about the proposal, the implementation time line, etc. In other instances this anxiety appears to be rooted in prior historical events. Regardless of the reasons I want to try and be sensitive to the issues that have been raised while at the same time begin taking action that I feel is necessary in order to address some of the college's administrative concerns.

Let me begin by stating that it was never my intent to ask the Board of Trustees for the full implementation of a new organizational structure within one fiscal year. As I have repeatedly explained, the draft that I circulated was meant to promote internal discussion and to indicate where we might be at some time in the future — how far in the future depends upon a number of factors including budget, evaluation of how the structure is working as it is initially implemented, problems that arise, etc.

The structure that I proposed was not meant to do away with the departmental structure. I fully recognize the long tradition of reliance on the departmental structure at SRJC and the changes that I proposed were meant to build on this tradition, not eliminate it. What I had hoped is that as a new structure is implemented we could develop the role of the department chair in that structure together, rather than my attempting to define the role solely from my perspective. With additional Assistant

Dean positions I envision a structure that generates greater advocacy and support for all departments, particularly those that are in need of it.

In order to address many of the concerns raised during the last several weeks and yet allow me to begin to address the problems and concerns that I see with the present organization I propose that we move forward in a careful preliminary manner. Therefore, in June I will be proposing to the Board of Trustees the establishment of two new Assistant Dean positions and a District Compliance Officer position. Funding for two of these positions will come from management positions funded but not filled currently. Funding for the other position as well as the necessary secretarial support for each of the positions will be provided in the most cost-effective manner possible and with the intent of minimally impacting the General Fund. The filling of these positions will, I believe, give us time during the Fall Semester to further discuss and develop a more comprehensive long-range plan.

I do not see the establishment of these positions affecting the duties and responsibilities of the department chairs for the Fall. The alignment of departments with respect to the Assistant Deans will obviously need to be changed from what I proposed initially and I will be discussing this matter with Dr. Buckley and share with him the comments I have received to date.

I hope that this recommendation to the Board will be seen in the spirit that it is being made. I am quite concerned about the administrative structure of the College, particularly the Academic Affairs unit. As one of California's largest single campus districts we are, by every estimate and calculation, greatly understaffed administratively. While it is certainly not my intent to add administrators merely for the sake of adding new positions, I am convinced that we must begin to move forward in a manner that will give us the flexibility to further study our structure while simultaneously reduce some of the problems that exist currently. At the same time, I do not wish to recommend more comprehensive structural changes when this topic obviously needs further discussion in order for it to be better understood and supported.
