# RESOLUTION OF THE PARENTAL CHOICE IN EDUCATION INITIATIVE (PROPOSITION 174)

- WHEREAS, The Choice in Education League has qualified for the ballot an initiative entitled, "Parental Choice in Education" (Proposition 174), which would, if approved by voters, give each K-12 student a \$2,500 "voucher" that could be used to pay tuition at a private school; and
- WHEREAS, Community colleges would experience a projected loss of \$850 per public student and \$425 per current private student who receives a voucher, thus generating a potential loss of hundreds of millions of dollars in state support due to Proposition 98, which ties community college funding directly to the level of state support for K-12 districts; and
- WHEREAS, Revenue loss of this magnitude to community colleges could force the closure of thousands of classes and eliminate hundreds of programs, thus significantly reducing access to higher education at a time when demand for entry is increasing; and
- WHEREAS, The potential effect of the voucher proposal places the California Community Colleges in the position of being unable to fulfill its mission to provide quality educational opportunities to the citizens of California; now, therefore be it
- RESOLVED, That the Associated Students of Sonoma County Community College District opposes the "Parental Choice in Education" initiative on the November 2, 1993 ballot.

Community college funding is based on K-12 enrollment, in accordance with the provisions of Proposition 98. K-12 enrollment will decrease by one student for each public school student that transfers to a voucher school.

Discouraging Enrollment Statistic - Latino student enrollment is down at UC campuses. Fewer than 1,000 Latino students transfer from CCCs and UCs each year, even though more than 150,000 Latinos take CCC courses that are designed for UC transfer. Although more than 12% of California's high school grads are eligible to attend a UC, the rate for Latinos is less than 4%.

Proposition 174, The Voucher Initiative

The Parental Choice in Education Initiative, also known as the school voucher initiative, will appear as Proposition 174 on California's November special election ballot. It has been said that there has never been a bigger educational issue before the electorate in California. Supporters and opponents agree that the initiative has the potential to radically restructure the education of California's 5.5 million school-age children.

There is a great deal of controversy surrounding the Parental Choice Initiative and the campaigns both for and against it are extremely well-funded and visible. It is important that we have a good, objective understanding of this complex initiative and the impact it would have on the education system in our state. In essence, the Parental Choice Initiative would amend the California Constitution and effect major changes in the financing of public and private schools. It would establish a school choice system under which parents would be given the opportunity to use state tax money to pay private school tuition for their children. The measure would give parents a voucher, much like a scholarship, which could be used to pay all or part of the enrollment fees at any qualified private school, including religious schools, that would accept the voucher and their child. The dollar value of the voucher would be set by the legislature, but would not be less than 50% of the public school per student expense. This year, for example, the voucher would be worth about \$2600.

To qualify for voucher receipts, a private school would not be allowed to discriminate on the basis of race, ethnicity, color or national origin or to advocate unlawful behavior. Private schools would not, however, be required by this initiative - or by law - to comply with the detailed Education Code

regulations that apply to public education, nor would all forms of discrimination be prohibited.

Funds for the voucher program would be realized through a reduction of the public schools budget. For each student that receives a voucher to attend a qualified private school, the public schools budget would be reduced by an amount equal to the cost of educating that student in the public school system, approximately \$5200 annually. Half of that amount, \$2600, would fund that student's voucher. The other half would return to the State's general fund for other non-educational uses.

It has been estimated that should Proposition 174 pass, the first year reduction in revenue to the community college system due to loss of Proposition 98 funding would be between 300 and 400 million dollars.

Two aspects of the finances of the Parental Choice Initiative have caused particular confusion. The first concerns the costs associated with vouchers for students already enrolled in private schools. The second concerns the basic arithmetic of school funding which has always been, and would continue to be, based on student attendance.

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The specific financial calculations which clarify these two issues are complex and detailed. However, taken together, they clearly indicate that the financial impact of the voucher initiative would significantly reduce funding for public school students. A careful analysis of the budget projections, both sides agree, shows that this initiative would result in far more being cut from the education budget than the \$5200 per pupil cost attributed to student transfers to private schools. Officials estimate that billions of dollars are at stake and that the State's per student funding would drop even further in comparison to national averages if this initiative is passed.

Advocates for this initiative believe that a voucher system grants parents a wider range of choice in their children's education and that it saves the State money by shifting more of the education burden to the private sector. They also contend that it would shock public education into change and that free market competition for funding would "force" public schools to make critically needed improvements.

Opponents say that the voucher initiative would financially cripple a system already operating under severe fiscal constraints and make any progress impossible. They believe that the problems of California's education system would be exacerbated by taking money from the schools and that the voucher initiative abandons the system rather than driving it towards positive change. They also fear that the initiative allows private schools to pick and

choose their students, opening up the possibility of a highly discriminatory system supported by tax dollars. They believe that the students remaining in public schools would receive a far inferior education as a result of this initiative.

According to legislative analysts, the Parental Choice Initiative includes some specific provisions to carry out its purposes, but also leaves a number of questions unanswered and significant implementation issues to be addressed. A whole new bureaucracy would need to be created - and funded - to implement the provisions of the initiative.

In response to the controversy surrounding this issue, legislators are already seeking alternative programs to address the concept of parental choice without causing such severe cutbacks to public education. Recently enacted legislation allows parents significant options in choosing schools for their children within the public school system. As a result of these efforts, students will no longer be required to attend the school in their district of residence, but may transfer to any public school of their choosing.

The Parental Choice Initiative voices community dissatisfaction with public education and challenges the system to initiate real and meaningful reform. Voters in California will decide in November whether the enactment of a voucher system helps or hinders efforts to provide quality education to our State's diverse population of over 5.5 million children.

As we near the November election, you will be bombarded with pro and con messages about this issue. It is imperative that we each have a clear, factual understanding on which to base our opinion of the voucher initiative. #### REDUCING MANDATES, WAIVING REGULATIONS

#### Introduction

Discussions regarding proposed mandate and regulation relief for California's community college districts and State Chancellor's Office have progressed to the point where district governing boards, administrators, faculty, staff and students must now articulate their views regarding the benefits and drawbacks of this important issue from a district perspective. Chancellor David Mertes, in a presentation to the State Board of Governors in July, asked district governing boards to "enter into a dialogue" with their campus community concerning suspension of mandates and waiver of regulations.

This Consultation Brief outlines the issues under discussion, the possible implications of mandate and regulation "reform," and the arguments pro and con. This paper also provides suggested procedures for undertaking a district-wide discussion and some questions that could help address the issues.

#### **Action Requested**

The CCCT and CEOCCC boards of the League seek the input of local boards of trustees, CEOs and other interested parties on the issue of whether your district supports proposals to suspend certain state mandates and allow districts to seek waivers of certain state regulations. The League wants to know if there is a district consensus of support for these proposals and if not, why not and how the proposals could be modified to gain consensus for change.

Local districts should send their responses to the League office by December 1.

#### **Background**

Earlier this year, Chancellor Mertes proposed suspending certain state mandates and regulations in an effort to reduce the related administrative and staff costs for both the Chancellor's Office and local districts and as a strategy for improving educational services and outcomes in a period of diminishing resources.

The Chancellor is proposing that the current emphasis on program procedures and standards be replaced with a program emphasizing accountability indicators, and particularly student outcome measures. This is a fundamental change in the role and responsibilities of the state office—particularly as related to working with local districts—and shifts responsibility for accountability from the state office to the local districts.

As Dr. Mertes has told the Board of Governors, "At the core of [these recommendations] is a belief that our office essentially should not have compliance and regulatory activity as its primary function. We are not, nor should we appropriately be, policemen for local districts. We believe that our office should be working in coordination with the local districts to make available a level of expertise that can help colleges implement a given area in which we are involved." He added, "Accountability indicators, particularly outcome indicators, will move us beyond the rules and regulations regarding program inputs and processes, to focus directly on results. And when all is said and done, the ultimate goal for all of us is to improve student outcomes."

The proposals for relief from mandates were released by the Chancellor's Office in March. Because of proposed reductions in state funding to both the Chancellor's Office and the local districts, the proposals also were put forward as a cost-saving measure. The proposal identified specific laws and regulations which could be suspended or repealed and recommended a process for districts to seek waivers of specific regulations when certain criteria were met.

Some of the laws and regulations recommended for suspension included:

- ▶ State review and approval of district comprehensive plans.
- ▶ Local district EOPS maintenance of effort requirement.
- ▶ Site evaluations by Chancellor's Office regarding matriculation, EOPS, DSPS, faculty and staff diversity, minimum employment qualifications and special projects.
- ▶ State review of all matriculation assessment instruments.
- ▶ Submission to state by local districts of DSPS program plans.

The proposal also includes recommendations that Fund for Instructional Improvement and deferred maintenance funds be distributed on a formula basis rather than on an approved project basis; that no regulations be adopted if state funds are not provided; and that local districts certify implementation of their transfer center plans rather than develop an annual report to the state.


In addition, the Chancellor's proposal lists more than 25 Title 5 regulations that should be made subject to local district waiver if state funding fails to meet legal guidelines and if the district has made efforts to comply in the past and will continue to make those efforts in the future. Approval of waiver requests would be made by the Board of Governors.

The Title 5 regulations recommended to be subject to waiver include:

- ▶ The full-time/part-time instructor ratio ("75-25" law in AB 1725).
- ▶ Reporting requirements regarding faculty and staff diversity fund expenditures.
- ▶ Requirement that each district have vocational education advisory committees.
- ▶ Evaluation and audit of matriculation (waiver of parts only).
- ▶ Requirement for a full-time EOPS director (this section is already waivable).
- ▶ Requirement for maintenance of local commitment of revenue for EOPS.

As part of his effort to reduce the Chancellor's Office regulatory role and increase its ability to assist districts with meeting educational goals, Dr. Mertes also is proposing that efforts be accelerated to implement the AB 1725 accountability model. This model would include both a statewide report and parallel college reports on student access, success and satisfaction, staff composition, and fiscal conditions.

The reports would include information on such "performance indicators" as enrollment by ethnicity, high school graduates and gender; the average expenditure per student in categorical programs; numbers of students enrolled for two consecutive terms and students who transfer and/or receive degrees, certificates or vocational awards; assessment of student satisfaction with institutions; staff diversity by age, gender and ethnicity; and measurements of fiscal stability within the 71 districts.



Community college organizations have responded to the proposals with both support and opposition. Many chief executive officers have voiced support for this effort, indicating, as one wrote, "It begins to uncouple the mismatch of intended accountability and excessive overregulation which has evolved into the micro-managing of our local districts by the state...Relief from mandates would enhance the ability of districts to improve efficiency and effectiveness at the local level."

The CCCT and CEOCCC boards of the League strongly support this effort. The League believes the development of the statewide accountability model and the reduction of unproductive reporting and unnecessary restrictions will help colleges meet local and state education goals. Furthermore, the League board believes the system should, as Dr. Mertes has urged, emphasize student outcomes and not evaluation of program implementation.

Opposition to the recommendations has come from several groups, including faculty unions and employee organizations. The EOPS Association sees the recommendations as "a threat to the emerging populations in California. These reductions are incompatible with their charge of overseeing and providing accountability to the accomplishments of the EOPS mandates and mission."

The AFT College Guild of the Los Angeles CCD wrote the Board of Governors, "Experience has shown that when protective and defining mandates are removed they are rarely re-instated or put back into effect. Higher education will not be served by a rush to judgement in the removal of carefully crafted standards or the structural entities that have brought them to fruition."

The State Academic Senate says the proposal "potentially dismantles important categorical, student-service programs as well as the legislative mandate to improve community college instructional and student service quality now addressed by the system's full-time/part-time regulations."

#### REDUCING MANDATES, WAIVING REGULATIONS

#### Introduction

Discussions regarding proposed mandate and regulation relief for California's community college districts and State Chancellor's Office have progressed to the point where district governing boards, administrators, faculty, staff and students must now articulate their views regarding the benefits and drawbacks of this important issue from a district perspective. Chancellor David Mertes, in a presentation to the State Board of Governors in July, asked district governing boards to "enter into a dialogue" with their campus community concerning suspension of mandates and waiver of regulations.

This Consultation Brief outlines the issues under discussion, the possible implications of mandate and regulation "reform," and the arguments pro and con. This paper also provides suggested procedures for undertaking a district-wide discussion and some questions that could help address the issues.

#### **Action Requested**

The CCCT and CEOCCC boards of the League seek the input of local boards of trustees, CEOs and other interested parties on the issue of whether your district supports proposals to suspend certain state mandates and allow districts to seek waivers of certain state regulations. The League wants to know if there is a district consensus of support for these proposals and if not, why not and how the proposals could be modified to gain consensus for change.

Local districts should send their responses to the League office by December 1.

#### Background

Earlier this year, Chancellor Mertes proposed suspending certain state mandates and regulations in an effort to reduce the related administrative and staff costs for both the Chancellor's Office and local districts and as a strategy for improving educational services and outcomes in a period of diminishing resources.

The Chancellor is proposing that the current emphasis on program procedures and standards be replaced with a program emphasizing accountability indicators, and particularly student outcome measures. This is a fundamental change in the role and responsibilities of the state office—particularly as related to working with local districts—and shifts responsibility for accountability from the state office to the local districts.

As Dr. Mertes has told the Board of Governors, "At the core of [these recommendations] is a belief that our office essentially should not have compliance and regulatory activity as its primary function. We are not, nor should we appropriately be, policemen for local districts. We believe that our office should be working in coordination with the local districts to make available a level of expertise that can help colleges implement a given area in which we are involved." He added, "Accountability indicators, particularly outcome indicators, will move us beyond the rules and regulations regarding program inputs and processes, to focus directly on results. And when all is said and done, the ultimate goal for all of us is to improve student outcomes."

The proposals for relief from mandates were released by the Chancellor's Office in March. Because of proposed reductions in state funding to both the Chancellor's Office and the local districts, the proposals also were put forward as a cost-saving measure. The proposal identified specific laws and regulations which could be suspended or repealed and recommended a process for districts to seek waivers of specific regulations when certain criteria were met.

Some of the laws and regulations recommended for suspension included:

- ▶ State review and approval of district comprehensive plans.
- ▶ Local district EOPS maintenance of effort requirement.
- ▶ Site evaluations by Chancellor's Office regarding matriculation, EOPS, DSPS, faculty and staff diversity, minimum employment qualifications and special projects.
- ▶ State review of all matriculation assessment instruments.
- ▶ Submission to state by local districts of DSPS program plans.

The proposal also includes recommendations that Fund for Instructional Improvement and deferred maintenance funds be distributed on a formula basis rather than on an approved project basis; that no regulations be adopted if state funds are not provided; and that local districts certify implementation of their transfer center plans rather than develop an annual report to the state.

In addition, the Chancellor's proposal lists more than 25 Title 5 regulations that should be made subject to local district waiver if state funding fails to meet legal guidelines and if the district has made efforts to comply in the past and will continue to make those efforts in the future. Approval of waiver requests would be made by the Board of Governors.

The Title 5 regulations recommended to be subject to waiver include:

- ▶ The full-time/part-time instructor ratio ("75-25" law in AB 1725).
- ▶ Reporting requirements regarding faculty and staff diversity fund expenditures.
- ▶ Requirement that each district have vocational education advisory committees.
- ▶ Evaluation and audit of matriculation (waiver of parts only).
- ▶ Requirement for a full-time EOPS director (this section is already waivable).
- ▶ Requirement for maintenance of local commitment of revenue for EOPS.

As part of his effort to reduce the Chancellor's Office regulatory role and increase its ability to assist districts with meeting educational goals, Dr. Mertes also is proposing that efforts be accelerated to implement the AB 1725 accountability model. This model would include both a statewide report and parallel college reports on student access, success and satisfaction, staff composition, and fiscal conditions.

The reports would include information on such "performance indicators" as enrollment by ethnicity, high school graduates and gender; the average expenditure per student in categorical programs; numbers of students enrolled for two consecutive terms and students who transfer and/or receive degrees, certificates or vocational awards; assessment of student satisfaction with institutions; staff diversity by age, gender and ethnicity; and measurements of fiscal stability within the 71 districts.



Community college organizations have responded to the proposals with both support and opposition. Many chief executive officers have voiced support for this effort, indicating, as one wrote, "It begins to uncouple the mismatch of intended accountability and excessive overregulation which has evolved into the micro-managing of our local districts by the state...Relief from mandates would enhance the ability of districts to improve efficiency and effectiveness at the local level."

The CCCT and CEOCCC boards of the League strongly support this effort. The League believes the development of the statewide accountability model and the reduction of unproductive reporting and unnecessary restrictions will help colleges meet local and state education goals. Furthermore, the League board believes the system should, as Dr. Mertes has urged, emphasize student outcomes and not evaluation of program implementation.

Opposition to the recommendations has come from several groups, including faculty unions and employee organizations. The EOPS Association sees the recommendations as "a threat to the emerging populations in California. These reductions are incompatible with their charge of overseeing and providing accountability to the accomplishments of the EOPS mandates and mission."

The AFT College Guild of the Los Angeles CCD wrote the Board of Governors, "Experience has shown that when protective and defining mandates are removed they are rarely re-instated or put back into effect. Higher education will not be served by a rush to judgement in the removal of carefully crafted standards or the structural entities that have brought them to fruition."

The State Academic Senate says the proposal "potentially dismantles important categorical, student-service programs as well as the legislative mandate to improve community college instructional and student service quality now addressed by the system's full-time/part-time regulations."

Final Actions by the Governor on Selected Legislation

Monday midnight was the deadline for the Governor to take action on the large number of bills (over 1000) sent to him during the final weeks of the 1993 legislative session. Following are brief summaries and Governor's action on selected bills of particular interest to community colleges. (Note: a complete year end report on all legislation will be available with the November Board of Governors agenda.)

Measures Signed by the Governor

**FACILITIES** 

SB 343 (Morgan), Chapter 0506

Eases requirements for leasing unneeded district facilities such that districts may more easily rent such facilities for periods greater than five days.

AB 59 (Tucker), Chapter 0137

Requires \$50 of every fine or forfeiture from handicapped parking violations to be used to alter existing facilities to increase accessibility for persons with disabilities.

FISCAL POLICY

AB 1290 (Isenberg), Chapter 0942

Enacts the Community Redevelopment Law Reform Act which modifies (and under certain circumstances) reduces revenues districts may receive in a redevelopment district.

STUDENT FEES

AB 39 (Archie-Hudson), Chapter 1132

Makes various technical adjustments to statutory provisions governing the differential fee for students with baccalaureate degrees and above, including exempting students from dual payment of enrollment fee, exempting students in contracted education classes, as well as exempting students who show



#### Purposes:

Santa Rosa Junior College holds that primary function is the development of intellectual curiosity, integrity and accomplishment. The College further holds that it is in an atmosphere of intellectual freedom and discipline that students can best grow to understand moral, aesthetic, social and economic values.

#### General Responsibilities:

To further these objectives, the College employs teachers and other staff, maintains physical facilities, and attends to the health and safety of persons on the campus. The individuals making up the College community are diverse yet interdependent. Their objectives and the framework provided by the College are necessarily complex. Thus each member of the College community should cooperate in the pursuit by others of their educational objectives, and support the College in providing this framework in which teaching, learning and ervice are honored.


me College has the responsibility to make reasonable efforts to accommodate students with special conditions or needs. All students must be able to benefit from instruction offered at Santa Rosa Junior College.

Occasion may arise when a student's physical, medical, and/or psychological conditions may pose undue risk to the student or to others. In this case, the College has the responsibility to determine that the student's participation is not in the best interest of the student and the College.

## College Conduct Standards:

Interference with the College's educational objectives or community life is cause for disciplinary action. All members of the College community and visitors are expected to refrain from such interference including, among others, the following particutypes of conduct on College preises and at College sponsored or authorized activities.

### Santa Rosa Junior College



#### Section 1: Standards of Conduct

Students shall conduct themselves in a manner which reflects their awareness of common standards of decency and the rights of others.

Students shall be disciplined only for good cause which shall include, but not be limited to, the following categories of misconduct.

- A. Dishonesty, such as cheating, plagiarism, or knowingly furnishing false information to the College
- B. Forgery, alterations, or misuse of College documents, records, or identification
- C. Obstruction or disruption of teaching, administration, disciplinary procedures,
   College activities, or other authorized activities on College premises
- D. Physical or verbal abuse of any person on College owned or controlled property or at College sponsored or supervised functions, or conduct which threatens or endangers the health or safety of any such person
- E. Willful misconduct resulting in injury or death to a student or College personnel or which results in cutting, defacing, or other injury to any real or personal property owned by the District
- F. Theft of or damage to property of the College or of a member of the College community or campus visitor
- G. Willful or persistent smoking in any area on College property where smoking has been prohibited by law or by regulation of the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College
- H. Unauthorized entry into College facilities, or unauthorized use of College supplies or equipment
- Violation of College policies or of campus regulations concerning student organization, traffic, the use of College facilities, or the time, place and manner of public expression
- J. Use, possession, sale or distribution of narcotics, hallucinogenic drugs or substances, or any poison classified as such

by Section 4160 of the Business and Professional Code on College property or at any College sponsored event, or appearance on campus or at College sponsored event after illegal use of narcotic, dangerous drug, or any intoxicant (Schedule D Sec.4160 B.P.C.)

- K. Use, possession, or distribution of alcoholic beverages on College property, at any College sponsored event, or appearance on campus or at any College sponsored event after consuming alcoholic beverages
- Disorderly, lewd, indecent, or obscene conduct on College owned or controlled property or at College sponsored or supervised functions
- M. Continued disruptive behavior, failure to comply with directions of College officials acting in the performance of their duties, continued willful disobedience, habitual profanity or vulgarity, open and persistent defiance of authority or persistent abuse of College personnel requiring inordinate drains on staff time, resources and supervision
- N. Possession and use of any deadly weapon, threatening persons on College property or at College sponsored events (P.C.245)
- O. Assault, battery, or any threat of force or violence upon a student or College personnel
- P. Persistent, serious misconduct where other means of correction have failed to bring about proper conduct (E.C. Sec. 76033)
- Q. Failure to observe precautions which the College deems necessary to insure the safety of the student or others
- R. Sexual assault or related physical abuse including rape, forced sodomy, forced oral copulation, rape by a foreign object, sexual battery, threat of sexual assault, or conduct that threatens the health and safety of another person.

The records regarding disciplinary action and decision or any appeals of any student or students found guilty of violating this conduct standard will be made available to the victim of such assault. (E.C. Sec.76234)

No Student shall be removed, suspended, or expelled unless the conduct of which the student is disciplined is related to College activity or College attendance. (E.C. Sec.76036)

Any violation or violations of any law, ordinance, regulation, or rule regulating or pertaining to the parking of vehicles shall not be cause of the suspension or expulsion of a student. (E.C. Sec.76034)

The chief administrative employee at a community college shall, prior to the suspension or expulsion of any student, notify the appropriate law enforcement authorities of the county or city in which the school is situated of any acts of the student which may be in violation of Section 245 of the Penal Code. (E.C. Sec. 76035)

## <u>Section 2:</u> Forms of Disciplines/ Penalties

The following forms of discipline may be imposed on a student who is guilty of misconduct:

- A. Reprimand: Notice that students conduct in a specific instance does not meet College standards and that continued misconduct may result in a more serious disciplinary action.
- B. Probation: Notice that the student found in violation of the College standards may continue to be enrolled under stated conditions, violations of which may be cause for more serious disciplinary action.
- C. Restitution: Reimbursement for damage to or misappropriation of property which may take the form of appropriate service to repair or otherwise compensate for damages. Restitution may be imposed in combination with any other penalty.
- D. Suspension by Instructor: Denial of the right to attend a particular class for a specific length of time, may not exceed two (2) class meetings of class. (E.C.Sec. 73031)
- E. Suspension by President: Denial for good cause of all campus privileges, including one or more of the following;
  - 1. The right to enter the campus
  - 2. Exclusion from one or more classes for a period of up to ten (10) days of instruction
  - 3. Exclusion from one or more classes and activities for the remainder of

the school term

4. Exclusion from all classes and activities of the Community College for one or more terms.

(Periods of suspension do not allow for makeup class work.)

(E.C.Sec.76031 & P.C.246, see required notices, Sec. F)

Expulsion: by Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College for an indefinite period of time includes loss of all College privileges including College employment and the privilege of entering any portion of the campus except by written authorization from the Vice President of Student Services. Expulsion must be imposed by the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College. Readmission is contingent upon a showing of rehabilitation by the stu-(E.C.Sec.76031 & P.C.246) Penalties of a lesser degree may be applied by the Vice President of Student Services as part of the process from those listed.

## Section 3: Disciplinary Procedures/ Process

(Educational Code, Section 760300-76037)

- A. Notice of Discipline
  - 1. Charges: Disciplinary charges may be initiated against a student by another student, staff member, or a noncampus person. A complaint must be in writing, signed and presented to the Vice President of Student Services who will investigate and take appropriate action. The Vice President of Student Services may also initiate disciplinary action on behalf of the College.
  - 2. Notice: A student charged with misconduct shall be given notice in person or by certified return receipt mail to meet with the Vice President of Student Services or other administrative officer designated by the President of the College at a specific time, date, and place for a conference regarding a charge of misconduct. In the case of a minor student, such notice shall go to the parent or guardian.\*

\*(Failure on the part of the student to meet with the Vice President of Student Services as requested may result in a decision being made in the student's absence, and the student shall be notified of this decision by certified return receipt mail or in person. Processing of all student records, registration and transcript detail may be held in abeyance until the student follows up on a Notice to Appear.)

- 3. Conference with the Vice Presid of Student Services
  - a. The student shall be given a written statement of the charges.
  - b. The student shall be asked to make a written response to the charges within two (2) school days.
  - c. The Vice President of Student Services and the student shall discuss the charges and response, if available.
  - d. The Vice President of Student Services shall inform the student of this decision with respect to the charges and recommend disciplinary action or the date and time when another meeting shall be held for further discussion of the Vice President's recommendation.
  - e. The Vice President of Student Services may:
    - i. Dismiss the charges
    - ii. Reprimand the student
    - iii. Order restitution
    - iv. Order probation
    - v. Recommend suspension to he President
    - vi. Recommend expulsion to the President
- B. Suspension by Instructor: An instructor may suspend a student from class for a definite period up to two (2) class meetings no matter the length or type of class. (E.C.Sec.76032). Prior to suspension the instructor shall meet with the student, inform him/her of the cause of the suspension, and allow the student to present his/her side of the matter. (E.C.Sec. 76032) As soon as possible an instructor shall ask the parent or guardian of a minor student who is suspended to attend a parent conference. At the request of the parent or guardian or instructor, a College administrator shall attend the conference. (E.C. Sec. 76032)
- C. Suspension by the President:
  - 1. If the Vice President of Student Services recommends suspension, he/she shall notify the student of student's right to a hearing before President and specify the time and place of the hearing. The student may, in writing, waive his/her right to a hearing.

- 2. The President shall conduct the hearing at which the Vice President of Student Services shall present the basis for his/her recommendation of suspension and the student shall present his/her defense.
- 3. The President may dismiss the charge or impose one or more of the following sanctions:
  - a Reprimand the student
  - b. Order restitution
  - c. Order probation
  - d. Suspend the student
  - e. Recommend expulsion to the Board of Trustees
- 4. The President may suspend a student for the period prior to the hearing to protect lives or property and to insure maintenance of order provided that the hearing is to be held within ten (10) days after the suspension is imposed.
- 5. If a suspension of a minor is ordered by the President, he/she or his/her designee shall notify the parent or guardian in writing by certified return receipt mail.
- D. Expulsion by Governing Board: If expulsion is recommended, the Vice President of Student Services shall notify the student of his/her right to a hearing before the Board of Review and the procedures to request a hearing:
  - 1. Composition; The Board of Review shall be composed of two (2) teachers and one (1) administrator appointed by the College Committee on Committees, the President of the Associated Students, and one (1) student who is not a member of the College Student Assembly but who is elected to Board of Review membership each semester by the College Student Assembly. It shall be the responsibility of the President that no member of the Board of Review is personally involved in the underlying situation to avoid conflict of interest.
  - 2. Jurisdiction; The Board of Review shall review a disciplinary recommendation of expulsion only upon written request of the student for whom expulsion is recommended. The finding of this review shall be communicated by the Board of Review Chairman to the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College in the form of a recommendation to uphold or lessen the disciplinary

- action recommended by the Office of the President. The Board of Review is not a court of law, but is a lay body whose sole function is to investigate, reach a conclusion, and make a recommendation to the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College.
- 3. Organization: One of the members of the Board of Review will be appointed as Chairperson by the College President. He/she shall serve in that capacity for the entire school year unless he/she resigns. In case of resignation, the President shall appoint a second chairperson.
  - a. Three members of the Board of Review must be present for it to take any action.
  - b. The President may authorize the formation of additional Boards of Review as needed with selection to be made through the same procedures as outlined above.
  - c. Alternates to serve on a summer Board will be chosen as needed through these same procedures except that the President of the Associated Students will appoint the student members
  - d. The Chairperson shall determine the time and place of all meetings.
    - i. The Chairperson has the obligation to maintain a responsible and orderly process during the meeting. He/she is vested with the right to adjourn the meeting at any time he/she feels orderly procedures are not being followed.
    - ii. The Chairperson shall determine whether to use a tape recording of the meeting and/or minutes taken by a College secretary. The record (s) shall be filed in the Office of the Vice President of Student Services.

#### 4. Procedures:

- a. It shall be the responsibility of the Vice President of Student Services to submit to the Board of Review the Vice President's Due Process and Disciplinary Procedure Summary which includes charges, written statements, evidence, and disciplinary recommendations.
- b. A meeting of the Board of Review shall be convened no earlier than twenty-four (24) hours (one school day) and generally no later than

- seven (7) school days following the filing of arequest for hearing in the office of Vice President of Student Services.
- c. The meetings of the Board of Review shall be closed to everyone other than the Board of Review members, the student charged, an adviser selected by the student, the representative of the Vice President of Student Services or other College representative, the person designated to record the minutes, and witnesses while they are presenting testimony.
- d. The Vice President of Student Services shall be asked first to make any further comments and answer questions regarding the Vice President's Due Process and Disciplinary Procedures Summary. The Vice President of Student Services may provide further evidence and witnesses.
- e. The student together with a representative, may appear in person to present evidence and witnesses. The student shall have an opportunity to question adverse witnesses.
- f. Persons involved may be asked questions by the student, the Vice President of Student Services, and any member of the Board of Review
- g. Written as well as oral evidence may be introduced by the student and the Vice President of Student Services.
- h. All matters upon which the recommendation is based must be introduced into evidence at the meeting of the Board of Review.
- The members of the Board of Review shall vote by open written ballot, and the votes shall be recorded in the minutes by name.
- j. The Chairman of the Board of Review shall transmit a recommendation to the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College and the student that the:
  - i. Charges be dismissed
  - ii. Student be reprimanded
  - iii. Restitution be ordered
  - iv. Student be placed on probation
  - v. Student be suspended
  - vi. Student be expelled
- k. If the action recommended is expulsion, the Chairman of the Board

- of Review shall inform the student that he/she may demand a hearing before the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College.
- 5. Decision by the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College:
  - a. The Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College shall review the record of those student disciplinary cases in which the Board of Review has recommended a penalty of expulsion.
  - b. At least one week prior to the meeting at which the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College will decide the matter, the Board of Review will submit to the Board of Trustees and the student a statement of its recommendation and findings. The Board of Review will also submit a copy of the record produced by the Vice President of Student Services.
  - c. The student may submit a brief written statement to the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College stating his/her own position and including his/her own request for disposition of his/her case. This statement must be submitted to the Board of Trustees and the Board of Review at least two (2) days prior to the meeting at which the Board of Trustees will decide the matter.
  - d. The student and his/her adviser may make a brief oral presentation to the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College at the meeting. If he/she wishes to do so, he/she must notify the Board of Trustees. A representative of the Board of Review may also make a brief oral presentation.
    - e.The Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College may dismiss the charges or impose one or more of the following sanctions:
    - i. Reprimand the student
    - ii. Order restitution
    - iii. Order probation
    - iv. Suspend the student
    - v. Expel the student
- E. Student Records: Right to Include Statement or Response to Disciplinary Action.

"Whenever there is included in any student record information concerning any disciplinary action taken by community college personnel in connection with the student, the student shall be allowed to include in such record a written statement or response concerning the disciplinary action." (E.C.Sec.76035)

1. The President shall, prior to the suspension or expulsion of any student, notify the appropriate law enforcement authorities of any acts of a student which may constitute an assault with a deadly weapon as set forth in Section 245 of the Penal

Code of California. (E.C. Sec. 76031)

- 2. The President shall report all suspensions to the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College. (E.C. Sec. 76031)
- 3. Suspensions and expulsions shall be so noted on the official records of those affected.
- 4. The standards and actions listed herein do not interfere with rules and regulations established by individual instructors regarding grading, attendance, and classroom expectations.

Although all staff members representing the College are concerned with the welfare and discipline of students, it is the responsibility of the Vice President of Student Services in concert with the other campus offices to see that rules and regulations are maintained.

If there are any questions regarding Student Conduct Standards of Due Process/Discipline these should be referred to the Vice President of Student Services at Santa Rosa Junior College.

The rules and regulations as set forth in these pages were officially adopted by the Board of Trustees of Santa Rosa Junior College on June 14, 1971, in compliance with a law passed by the State Legislature in the fall of 1969.

These rules and regulations were revised to meet State Education Code requirements and approved by the Board of Trustees on March 12, 1984.

## —13. Promote understanding of the meaning of higher education for college students

To enable students to share in the responsibility for their success in college, we must promote a good understanding of what it means to be a college student. A chieving this goal requires ensuring that the curriculum and faculty help equip students with college skills by incorporating these skills into presentations and assignments. The curriculum and faculty should also encourage in students the values and attitudes essential to success in a college environment. Course readings, assignments, and lectures should encourage development of critical thinking skills and respect for diverse viewpoints. Finally, faculty should transmit the highest level of professionalism to students, and student performance should be measured against appropriate standards of academic achievement.

- a) Ensure that the curriculum and faculty provide students with college skills, including organizational, listening, note-taking, test-taking, and research skills, and information literacy. Accomplish these through
  - incorporating development of these skills into course presentations and assignments;

- emphasizing, supporting, and promoting courses and presentations in the curriculum that provide college skills.

  - ensuring that course readings, written assignments, and lectures demonstrate the diversity of opinions and arguments in an academic discipline;
  - ensuring the highest level of professionalism among faculty in all lectures and assignments, transmitting this level of professionalism to students, and measuring students' performance against appropriate standards of academic achievement.

#### 14. Increase instructional support for adjunct faculty

Adjunct faculty require the same instructional support services that are available to regular faculty. Whether instructors teach during the day or evening, on or off the main campus, they share the need for library, audio visual, clerical, and graphic arts services, as well as the need for support by the counseling staff. SRJC should provide off-campus adjunct faculty with emergency preparedness and information specific to their off-campus site. We also should survey off-campus faculty to assess the adequacy of off-campus facilities and equipment and study the possible need for weekend services to students and faculty.

We should study ways in which to minimize the number of times students are unsuccessful and subsequently re-take classes. Our student orientation materials and program information should emphasize the time commitment required for academic success, as well as the importance of seeking help from instructors outside of class and developing study skills. We need to expand the use of non-credit labs, study groups, mid-term conferences, guidance courses for probation students, and other programs and activities designed to improve retention. Staff development activities should encourage across-the-curriculum collaboration on ways to improve teaching and promote retention. The District also should expand its recognition of successful students.

Adjunct faculty require the same instructional support services that are available to regular faculty. Whether instructors teach during the day or evening, on or off the main campus, they share the need for library, audio visual, clerical, and graphic arts services, as well as the need for support by the counseling staff. SRJC should provide off-campus adjunct faculty with emergency preparedness and information specific to their off-campus site. We also should survey off-campus faculty to assess the adequacy of off-campus facilities and equipment and study the possible need for weekend services to students and faculty.

#### -12. Promote the success of students both within and beyond the classroom

As part of our mission, we seek to promote the educational and academic success of students in many different ways. Areas for review should include programs for remedial and developmental education, cultural diversity and global awareness, under-represented and underserved students, and improving retention.

## ——13. Promote understanding of the meaning of higher education for college students

To enable students to share in the responsibility for their success in college, we must promote a good understanding of what it means to be a college student. A chieving this goal requires ensuring that the curriculum and faculty help equip students with college skills by incorporating these skills into presentations and assignments. The curriculum and faculty should also encourage in students the values and attitudes essential to success in a college environment. Course readings, assignments, and lectures should encourage development of critical thinking skills and respect for diverse viewpoints. Finally, faculty should transmit the highest level of professionalism to students, and student performance should be measured against appropriate standards of academic achievement.

#### Student Equity Plan

- Student Equity policy adopted the Board of Governors September 1992; to become effective March 6, 1993.
- The student equity policy intent is for districts 1) to attain, at a minimum, proportional representation of their service area in the access of students from historically underrepresented groups to the instruction and services provided by their colleges; and 2) to maximize the rate of student success which is defined as retention and completion of educational objectives.
- The underrepresented population is defined as women, persons with disabilities, and ethnic minorities (American Indians or Alaskan natives, Asians or Pacific Islanders, Blacks and Hispanics).
- Pursuant to this policy, SRJC:
  - Formed a Student Equity Steering Committee.
  - Determined the extent of the college's current student equity related achievements for educational and student services.
  - Conducted campus-based research to define Sonoma County's under-represented population, and their enrollment at SRJC; defined retention, course completion, degree and/or certificate completion and transfer rates for under-represented students.
  - Plans to adopt a Student Equity Policy and Procedure.
  - Will adopt a Student Equity Plan which will consist of student equity goals and timelines, and student equity achievements and goals by department and student service.
  - The Student Equity Plan is due in Sacramento by December 31, 1993.
- Informational presentations are in the process of being made to the following groups: College Council, President's Cabinet, Academic Senate, Student Government Assembly, and Educational Policy Committee.
- The Student Equity Plan will be presented as an "informational" item at the November Board of Trustees' meeting, final adoption is hoped for at its December meeting.
