



The Public Safety In Service programs are presented either at the Santa Rosa Training Center, participating hotels, or at public safety agencies; these programs are not presented on the main campus and have minimum short-term hours, eight to twenty-four hours, and occasionally fourty.

The students are employed by various law enforcement agencies who provide their employees with training funds budgeted in advance of the students attendance. The student brings to class a prepared department draft for registration and material fees which is also prepared in advance of the class. These students are sent to various training classes by their agencies that are mandated by the State for their continuing professional training. These students have insufficient time or access to benefit from representation.

The fee that will be effective for the Fall semester is collected once per semester; an in-Service student attends several courses within a given semester. The Law Enforcement agency will not track how many times an employee registers for a short term course, therefore, the burden of tracking and returning funds for over payment falls to our registrar, who will be required to track each in-service student to determine if he/she has previously paid this additional \$1.00 fee.

The man hours necessary to return over payments for out weighs the financial gain to the Associated Student Body.

This exemption is not intended for basic Academy (four to fourteen units) Programs. These entry level students will be charged as they have some potential for benefit and register once per semester.

The students of Santa Rosa Junior College voted to establish a \$1.00 per semester Student Representation Fee. This fee is provided for the support of college representatives who will be advocating on behalf of SRJC before city, county and district governments and before officers and agencies of the state government. Student Control of Student Fees Questioned

Are mandatory student activity fees being put to appropriate uses? Are there adequate fiscal controls? Are policies needed to promote responsible and ethical spending by student organizations and leaders?

These questions and others have been asked more and more often in the wake of news stories focused on questionable student stewardship over student fee dollars. Among the recent stories:

- There are allegations that a student government in the South used fee money to bribe political opponents and to reimburse themselves for conferences they did not attend.
- An audit of a Northeastern community college's student government exposed \$30,000 in unexplained expenditures, which resulted in arrests when a meeting to deal with the problem got out of control.
- Charges that a student leader embezzled almost \$10,000 in student fee funds led to an arrest on criminal charges.
- The president of a student organization was accused of stealing admission fees from a student event for personal use. Due to an earlier fraud conviction, the student had to serve jail time.
- Several student leaders from the Midwest are accused of spending over \$2,000 at a conference on car rentals, taxi fares, and meals, even though they stayed in the conference hotel and their meals were included in a prepaid registration fee.

In perhaps the most publicized case of fee abuse, the annual budget of one organization at City University of New York — over \$345,000 in activity fee money — was spent by a student leader in just six months. Expenditures included \$24,000 on car rentals, beepers, and portable telephones, and thousands of dollars in loans for students to attend a conference in Africa. Family members of student officers and campus senators were apparently given full-time employment at student fee expense as well.

The cumulative impact of stories like these has renewed college and university interest in the fiscal

affairs of student government and organizations. Over two decades have passed since greater student responsibility for student fees was established in the wake of widespread national campus unrest. But now, in response to today's allegations of misuse and continuing student objections over some uses, campuses are considering different approaches to fee issues.

Structures

Student mandatory activity fee systems in today's higher education vary. At some institutions, students have complete control over activity funding, while differing degrees of administrative controls exist at other schools. And finally, where students have some or primary authority for student fees, there also exist institutional guidelines, generally established to assure some level of administrative input and oversight.

Student fees are collected by campuses through a variety of systems as well. The standard method of collection is mandatory assessment, a process found at many campuses. Every student in attendance is charged a fee that must be paid with other charges, such as tuition. While this practice has been found to be the least protective of individual student Constitutional rights, courts have supported the process. The system, however, has created problems for students unhappy with the use of their fee dollars. Challenges to the system process by non-supportive students have included suits against health fees, athletic programs, college newspapers, political, and lobbying expenditures.

An alternative method of collection used by some

schools is the **optional check-off** system. Under this system, a student decides whether or not to pay an activity fee and can indicate how it may be used. This is accomplished through tuition invoices, on which students check off boxes to indicate fee levels and intended uses. A student supports only the organizations or causes he or she chooses to support, not others. Voluntary check-off systems have not generated legal challenges, as they generally protect individual student constitutional rights.

A third system for student fee collection is based on a combination of the assessment and check-off processes. Fewer schools use this system, refered to as the "negative check-off." All students are charged a fee for student activities. The fee is mandatory and placed on student accounts automatically. However, students have an opportunity to request and receive a refund after payment on request. This system allows students to withdraw support for objectionable groups or efforts, but only after paying the fee and having it available for objectionable use for a limited time.

Most student fee litigation has focused on expenditures. But expenditures issues have also led to reviews of collection processes, as schools search for an appropriate balance between student control and administrative responsibility. The growing number of student challenges to fee systems and expenditures may motivate colleges and universities to consider alternatives.

Objections and Controls

Student fee systems use student dollars to support student activities and programs. That's the simple art. But when the fees are mandatory, they may require some students to support programs or activities that they disagree with due to political, religious, or ethical reasons. That's where it gets complicated.

The balancing test between the rights of individuals and the needs of student organizations were reviewed in *Good v. Associated Students of the University of Washington*, 542 P.2d 762 (1975). Students objecting to fee money used for anti-war protests sued their student government. The court recognized their individual Constitutional concerns, but said:

We must balance the plaintiff's First Amendment rights against the traditional need and desirability of the university to provide an atmosphere of learning, debate, dissent and controversy. Neither is absolute. If we allow mandatory financial support to be unchecked, the plaintiff's rights may be meaningless. On the other hand, if we allow dissenters to withhold the minimal financial contributions required we would permit a possible minority view to destroy or cripple a valuable learning adjunct of university life.

Good established a legal basis for mandatory student fees. But the extent of campus controls over expenditure has been regularly challenged over the years, as has been the judgment of those authorizing expenditures.

Campus control over expenditures have been tested cases involving college and university attempts to halt student program funding. Once funding is estab-

lished, the power of the administration to terminate the funding is heavily controlled by the courts.

Efforts to halt or alter student funding were blocked for X-rated movies (*Swope v. Lubbers*, 560 F.Supp. 1328, 1983), a campus newspaper with segregationist views (*Joyner v. Whiting*, 477 F.2d 456, 1973), and a magazine humor issue that administrators didn't find funny (*Stanley v. McGrath*, 719 F.2d 279, 1983). In each case, campus attempts to limit or eliminate funding were subject to a test for a compelling campus need, since Constitutional First Amendment issues were involved.

Refund Systems

In recent years, some campuses have begun to look at student activity fee refund system to better control expenditures and protect student rights. Fee systems that allow students to select programs for funding encourage fiscal responsibility. If programs are not well run and in an honest manner, students can withhold funding, ending the opportunity for abuse. And if some students find some programs objectionable, they can withhold their personal funding. In addition, the threat of funding loss may affect student decision-makers, leading them to moderate their actions.

Two collegiate cases in recent years have promoted consideration of fee refund systems. They dealt with campus newspapers (*Stanley v. McGrath*) and fees for public interest research groups on campus (*Galda v. Rutgers*, 772 F.2d 1060, 1985).

In *Stanley*, a university attempted to establish a refund system in retaliation for a humor issue. That response was found to be unlawful. The court ruled a





III. THE MEMBERSHIP OF THE CAMPUS ACTIVITIES BOARD (CAB)

A. The Associated Students Campus Activities Board shall consist of the Program Chair, CAB Secretary, Publicity Rep., Entertainment Rep., Arts & Lectures Rep, CAB members at large & Student Activities Advisor and/or Director of Student Activities.

IV. OFFICERS OF CAMPUS ACTIVITIES BOARD

- A. The Chairperson of the Campus Activities Board shall be the Associated Students Program Chair. The Vice-Chairperson shall be appointed by the Program Chair from the Campus Activities Board membership and with the approval of Campus Activities Board.



SGA GOALS FALL '94

1. COMPUTER/NETWORKING

This goal is a combination of updating the SAO's computer and communication services such as; Computers for each desk, a fax system, a new front desk phone system and to promote a computer communication line between SGA and the Oakleaf. Also within the context of this goal is a determination to improve SGA's relations, interaction and communication with Administrators, Staff on campus, Executive Cabinet, College Wide Committees, Campus Activities Board, Legislative Issues Committee, and Interclub Council as well as other prominant and purposeful groups on campus. We are doing this to assess the needs of the campus as well as to find out what departments or organizations will be of help to us when needed. We wish to provide a commputer service that will be accessible to all persons on campus.

2. ACADEMIC SENATE

Within the networking and improving relations portion of goal 1, is the goal of SGA to have two members sit in on Academic Senate meetings. This committee is one of the highest governing bodies of SRJC. SGA and Academic Senate will create a mentor system between faculty and students on College Wide Committees.

3. COMMUNITY OUTREACH

At a time when Community College cutbacks are a given, Santa Rosa Junior College needs more than ever the support of our community. The Santa Rosa community, (being one of the most generous in the state, having more successful volunteer, nonprofit organizations per capita than any other county) has an overwhelming selflessness for those who get involved in concerns of their county. It is time that SRJC's student population show concern and care. It will be up to SGA to promote awareness of such matters. Volunteer programs are one way of doing this. A purpose of this goal is to focus on the "Polly Klaas Community Service Award" and integrating the community with SRJC. The benefits of this program are that it will award a number of students for community involvement and outreach, and will bring the community into SRJC. In addition, we hope to extend our selves to the local high schools

and junior high's, by volunteer programs. This will outreach to possible incoming students and encourage them to participate in SGA.

4. TUTORIAL CENTER GRANT, AND LIBRARY AND PSYCHOLOGICAL SERVICES OUTREACH

This goal was brought forth so that members of SGA would find ways to utilize SGA resources to better serve the campus students by researching possible donations and/or fund-raisers to aid in the preservation of these beneficial services that are in danger of severe cutbacks. There will be a survey through administration and students that will show what the students need and want.

Associated Students' Resolution to Opposition to proposition 187

The Associated Students of Santa Rosa Jr. College recognizes that education is essential to the future of our student population, and students as a whole; and

Whereas, the Associated Students supports public education in the state of California; and

Whereas, the Associated Students support open accessible education for all persons who choose to further their education; and

Whereas, it is in the interest of the Associated students to encourage all persons, whether undocumented or not, to attend higher education; and

Whereas, the Associated Students recognizes that Proposition 187 would restrict accessibility for undocumented students; and

Whereas, the Associated Students recognizes that Proposition 187 would expel undocumented students from all levels of education, including higher education; and

Whereas, the Associated Students recognizes that Proposition 187 would make all students subject to investigation of legal status, thereby violating Federal privacy laws and furthermore endangering certain Federal funds currently going to Santa Rosa Junior College, potentially amounting to millions of dollars of loss to the campus community; and

Whereas; the Associated Students recognize that proposition 187 would hinder the responsibilities of campus Admission and Records staff by requiring them to follow I.N.S. guidelines;

Club Room Purpose October 4, 1994

The Inter-Club Council of the SRJC proposes the creation of a club room. The general purpose of the club room shall be to promote a stronger sense of student community on campus. This will be achieved by giving SRJC clubs access to the resources they need to build themselves into student community foundations at the college.

The resources needed to accomplish this goal, as prioritized by the clubs of ICC, are as follows:

- 1) A place where SRJC students can easily gain access to information concerning the purpose of individual clubs, upcoming events/activities, and ways in which they may participate in all campus clubs.
- 2) A place where clubs may access phones, computers, copy machines, and other office facilities that will assist clubs in the organizing and running of their organizations.
- 3) A place for clubs to store limited materials such as tabling information, concession materials, banners, posters, etc....
- 4) A place where clubs can work on projects either individually or collectively.
