CALIFORNIA INDIAN DELEGATION TO DELIVER INDIAN TO INDIAN AID TO MAYAN PEOPLE IN CHIAPAS



A delegation of California Indians will be going to meet with the Mayan people of Chiapas, to offer prayers and material aid consisting of computers, medical supplies and other forms of humanitarian aid. The caravan will depart from the Coyote Valley Indian Reservation in Mendocino County, California in late March, 1994.

The delegation will include Pomo elder Delma Eyle of the Coyote Valley Indian Reservation; Norma Knight, a Maidu-Pomo elder from Round Valley Indian Reservation; Priscilla Hunter, tribal administrator from Coyote Valley, Commissioner of the Native American Heritage Commission and Board member of the International Indian Treaty Council; and Howaste Weighill, of the Coastal Band of the Chumash nation and student organizer at San Francisco State University. The delegation will also include Polly Montoya-Girvin and Carolyn Fershtman, international human rights attorneys, who will collect testimony from Mayan people concerning human rights abuses and their struggle to maintain their land base and culture in Chiapas.

We will be collecting computers, typewriters, medical supplies, and blankets, which we will transport overland from northern California. We will collect financial donations to purchase food in Mexico, which we will deliver directly to Mayan villages and refugee camps. We will purchase the food in Mexico to minimize transportation costs and to support the Mexican village economy seriously threatened by the recent passage of the North American Free Trade Agreement.

We will be donating the truck used in the caravan and the computer equipment to the recently formed State

Council of Indigenous and Campesino Organizations, a coalition of over 280 grassroots organizations in Chiapas.

"We are going to deliver aid Indian nation to Indian nation," says Priscilla Hunter. Delma Eyle says, "This place (Chiapas) is where we are supposed to be. The ancestor spirits of this continent have been calling us to help the people suffering in Chiapas, Mexico and the cries of the people of Chiapas have touched us. We are already there in our spirits and our hearts."

"The Mayan people of Chiapas and my people here in the US are in the same struggle for defining our sovereignty rights. Their future as well as ours depends on our two peoples' strength that can ensure a future for our children," says Eyle. Norma Knight, Maidu-Pomo elder, says "I am going in a spiritual way, with my rosary and my medicine bag to meet with Indian elders there to pray for an end to the suffering."

OUTLINE FOR STUDENT BODY ELECTION MOTIVATION

- I. Last year less than 1% of the student body voted for present officers and senators
 - A. Everyone should exercise their *right* to vote.
 - B. Most people are more concerned with their *privilege* to drive
 - C. Students should get in the practice of voting while in school
 - 1. This carries over to life off campus
 - 2. In the last presidential election less than half the eligible voters exercised their right
 - 3. This means less than a majority is running a country that practices a rule by majority vote.
 - 4. This student body is no different than the general public
 - 5. Everyone must get motivated to vote for someone *AND* the Student Representative Fee issue on the ballot
- II. The Student Representative Fee issue
 - A. Originally, community colleges were immune to tuition costs—that is thing of the past... Reality is that education will never be free
 - B. In 1984 fees began at \$5/unit with a \$50 cap
 - C. Two years ago fees were only \$6/unit—with \$60 fee cap
 - D. Last year fees went to \$13/unit—with no cap—more than 100% increase
 - E. Now the governor is proposing another raise to \$20/unit next year—with no cap—another increase of more than 50%
 - F. The governor's intention is have students paying at least 1/3 of the true cost of a community college education—this would be in excess of \$30/unit
 - G. Enrollment is down for regularly enrolled non-BA students
 - 1. Enrollment of students with degrees dropped 50% in one year
 - 2. Fees for this group jumped from \$6/unit to \$50/unit in that period
 - H. When enrollment drops in these economic times, the effect is twofold
 - 1. Less enrollment=less revenue
 - 2. Less revenue=less education
 - I. The fee we are proposing is a \$1 mandatory fee of all students
 - 1. This money will be earmarked for use to lobby on behalf of all SRJC students and all community college students in the state
 - 2. This money can only be used by students for student issues

- a. The Education Code #76060.5 (written by CalSACC) states, "Students of any community or junior college in CA may bring before the student population for vote of a student representative fee of \$1/semester."
 - b. Community colleges have the right of "shared governance" by law at all levels—campus, state, and federal
 - c. Students at SRJC haven't had the funds to lobby because AS membership has been voluntary, therefore, not enough extra money to lobby
 - d. Students need more influence at the state level, but without funds there is little hope
- 3. UC & CSU campuses have mandatory student activity fees that cost up to \$50
 - 4. Junior college are not allowed to have mandatory student activity fees because enrollment was meant to be free—we are right back where we started

Standards for Probation/Dismissal

Academic Probation

A student who has attempted (CR grades not counted) at least 12 semester units as shown by the official academic record shall be placed on academic probation if the student has earned a cumulative GPA between 1.00 and 1.99 in all units which were graded.

Progress Probation

A student who has enrolled in a total of at least 12 semester units as shown by the official academic record shall be placed on progress probation when the percentage of all units in which a student has enrolled and for which entries of "W", "I" and "NC" are recorded reaches or exceeds fifty percent (50%).

Removal from Probation

A student on academic probation for a grade point deficiency shall be removed from probation when the student's cumulative GPA is 2.00 or higher.

A student on progress probation because of an excess of units for which entries of "W", "I" and "NC" are recorded shall be removed from probation when the percentage of units in this category drops below fifty percent (50%) of all units in which a student has enrolled.

Standards for Dismissal

For purposes of this section, semesters shall be considered consecutive on the basis of the student's enrollment pattern rather than the calendar pattern. For example, the semesters of a student enrolled fall, not spring, but again fall are considered to be consecutive.

A student who earns a GPA of less than 1.00 for nine (9) or more units attempted during any given semester is subject to dismissal.

A student who is on academic probation shall be subject to dismissal if the student earned a cumulative GPA of 1.99 or below in all units attempted in each of three consecutive semesters which were graded on the basis of the grading scale.

A student who has been placed on progress probation shall be subject to dismissal if the percentage of units in which the student has been enrolled for which entries of "W", "I" and "NC" are recorded in at least three consecutive semesters reaches or exceeds fifty percent (50%).

Qualification for Re-Admission

A dismissed student may re-apply on probation:

1. After completing five or more units (excluding Credit/No Credit) with a 2.00 ("C") or better GPA in summer session or another accredited college or from an accredited correspondence college.
2. After an absence of one or more semesters; or
3. After successful completion of Guidance 56, "Taking Charge of Your Learning".

Re-Admission on Probation Following Dismissal

Each semester a student re-admitted after academic dismissal must improve the cumulative GPA in order to continue while on probation but is subject to dismissal again after three consecutive semesters of a cumulative GPA of 1.99 or below.

A student re-admitted after progress dismissal may not earn any grades of "W", "I" and/or "NC" in the first semester back in order to continue.

Under special circumstances and upon establishing a contract with a College counselor, a dismissed student may petition to the Admissions Office to continue without taking a leave of absence.



Qualification for Re-Admission following Academic/Progress Dismissal

A dismissed student may be re-admitted on Probation 1 after fulfilling one of the following conditions;

1. Successful completion (grade of "C"/"CR" or better) of Guidance 56 (Taking Charge of Your Learning); **OR**
2. An absence of one or more semesters (Fall or Spring only); **OR**
3. Successful completion of at least one three unit course (letter grade only) with a 2.00 ("C") or better GPA in summer session; **OR**
4. Successful completion of at least one three unit course (letter grade only) with a 2.00 ("C") or better GPA in summer session at another accredited college. Students will be responsible for providing an official transcript to Santa Rosa Junior College's Admissions and Records Office.

The re-admitted student is then subject to the normal probation/dismissal standards.

Re-admission By Petition

Students who do not meet one of the Qualification for Re-Admission following Academic/Progress Dismissal conditions may petition to the Admissions and Records Office. The criteria for approval of the petition is:

1. Verifiable special circumstances, and
2. Establishing an approved semester plan with a College Counselor.

The student re-admitted by petition will continue on dismissal status for their re-admitted semester of enrollment.

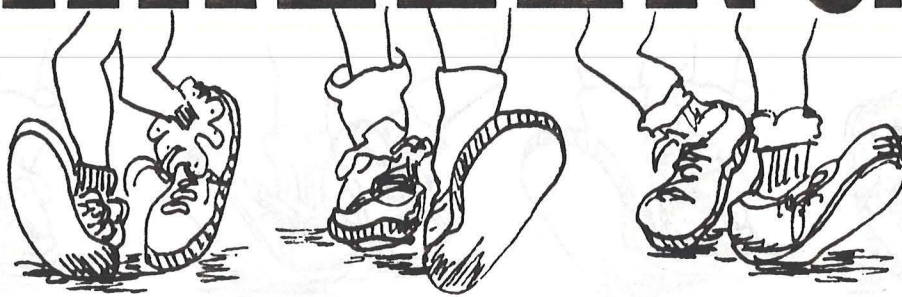

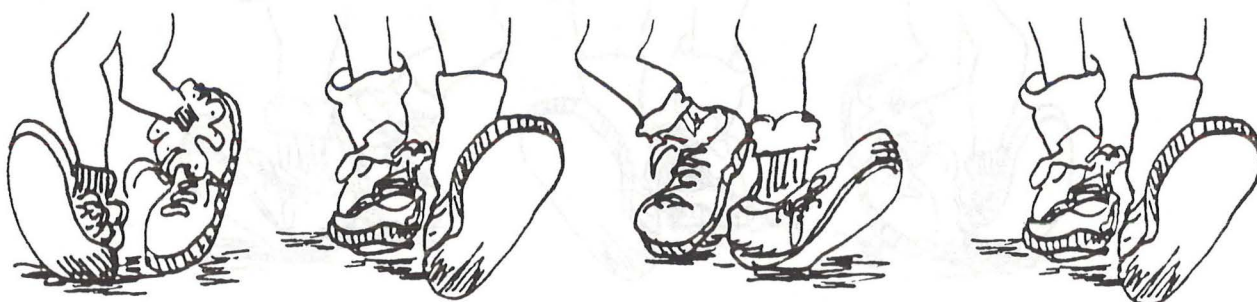

Educational Technology Master Plan

Introduction

The Sonoma County Junior College District is confronted with a combination of factors that directly effect our ability to provide high quality instruction and services to our students. These factors for change are driven by external and internal forces that are reflective of our society at large. These factors can be summarized as follows:

- Changing needs, learning styles, and characteristics of our students
- Rapid changes in required employment skills
- Student enrollments and demand for our services
- Broad geographic service area with multiple sites
- Continued budgetary uncertainty and facility constraints

It is the view of the Educational Technology Committee (ETC) that educational technology, in a variety of forms, provides the District with a realistic option for the delivery of high quality instructional programs and services.

Background

In Spring of 1991, the ETC was charged by the Educational Policies Committee to "explore and develop the use of new technology for teaching and serving students". This general statement was taken as a directive to initiate the planning process with regard to educational technology. The Committee meets monthly, has conducted campus forums, developed and routed a technology "White Paper" and compiled an inventory of applications. All of this activity has been directed towards the development of a master plan for educational technology for the District.

At the heart of the master plan is the recognition that technology should enhance and facilitate student and staff involvement with the instructional programs and services. Given this general context, the master plan must address the following:

Promote equity of access to educational technology for staff and students. Access to information resources, core technologies, and appropriate support are essential for success.

Provide access to resources unrestricted by time and physical location

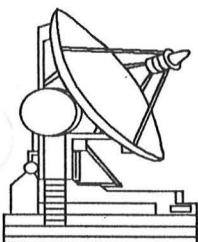
Identify District services, resources, and needs that can be distributed and accessed through technology.

Develop campus infrastructure with regard to networks, facilities, and technical requirements.

Provide financial and human resources to implement various components of the plan in a coherent and sustained manner.

Emphasize community partnerships with other segments of education and industry to ensure coordination.

Provide the structure for the ongoing coordination, evaluation and assessment of each recommendation of the plan.



These components are recognized as being essential to the success of the educational master plan. To address these issues in a concrete fashion, the master plan will contain seven specific recommendations and implementation actions to ensure the integration of educational technology at the District level.

Conclusion

The Educational Technology Committee believes that the coordinated use of educational technology will enhance student learning, contribute to the intellectual growth and productivity of our faculty, and will allow the District to effectively use its informational and human resources.

Educational technology that faculty would have access to might include a computer, videodisc player, VCR, CD ROM player, modem, camcorder, and large television. Educational resources will include access to Library databases, Internet, e.mail, voice mail, and other network services. Although specific equipment and resources have been identified, departments and individual faculty will assist in determining the appropriate choices.

As new or upgraded technologies appear, the list of appropriate educational technology may change. Full implementation will be phased in over a period of years to ensure proper coordination and review.

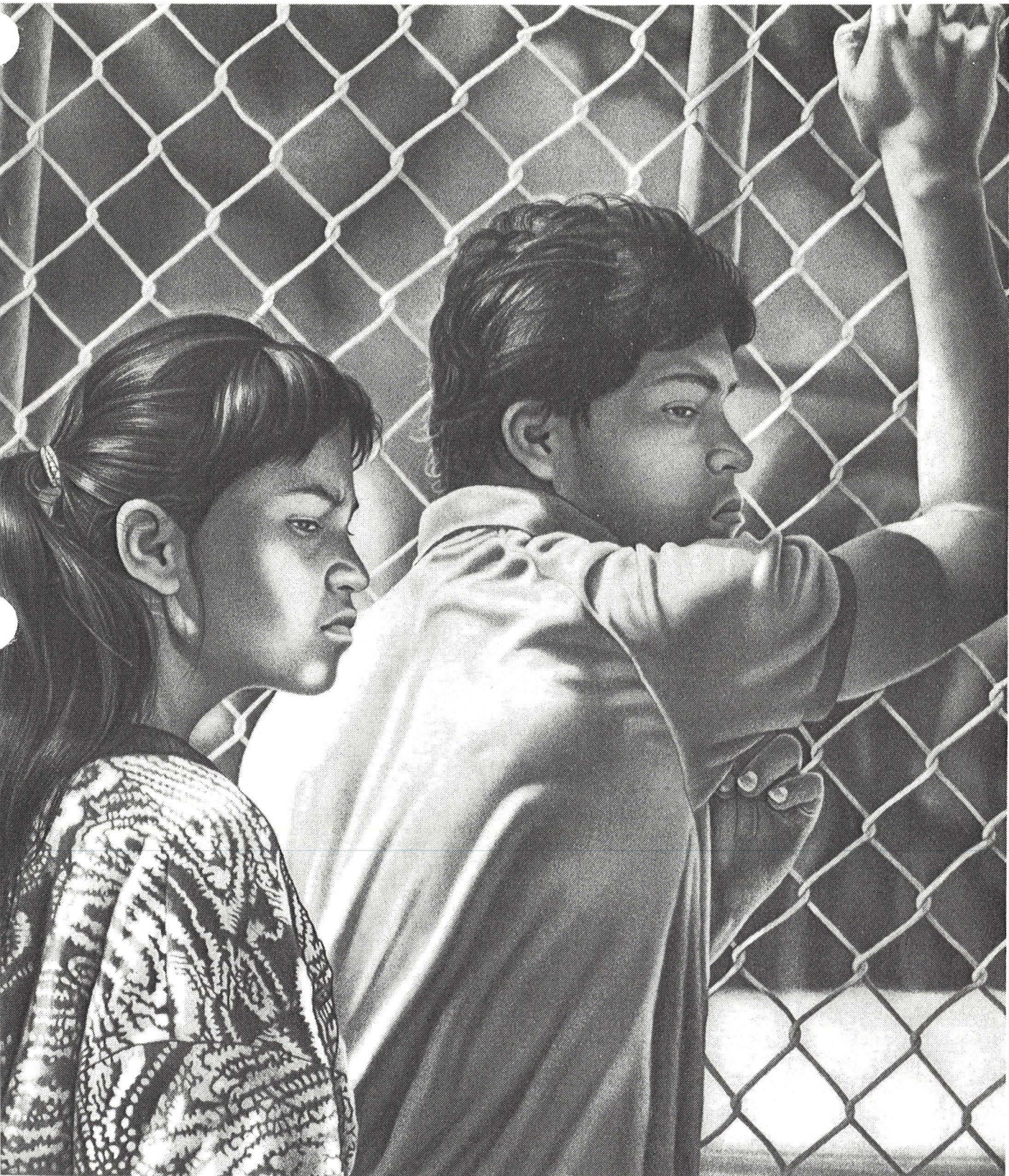

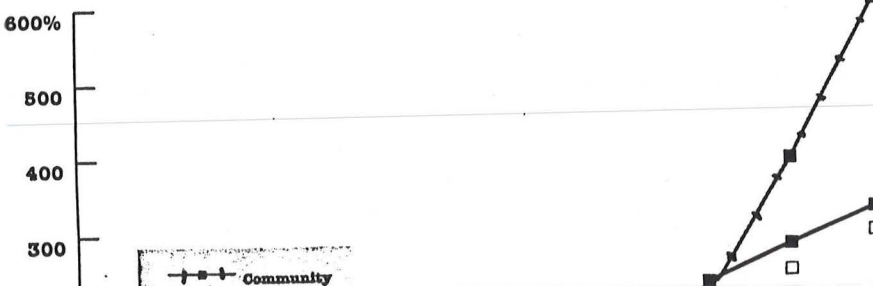

Minutes Of Legislative Advocacy Task Force Meeting of April 21

The SRJC Legislative Advocacy Task Force met yesterday to discuss plans for this year's advocacy efforts. The following recommendations resulted from that discussion:

A letter writing campaign focusing primarily on property tax shortfall and student fees would be initiated by Task Force representatives of each of the constituent groups as soon as possible with sample letter(s) included.

Members within each of the constituent groups would be asked to return signed/completed letters to the Task Force representative and advised that mailing of the letters/cards would take place shortly after the May revise. (By starting the campaign early and collecting the letters, it will be possible to identify the effectiveness of the campaign and to make additional appeals for letters should the early yield appear negligible.)

Unless otherwise advised, each constituent group would be responsible for the manner in which postage is handled.

It was agreed that the Task Force would not organize a "Campus Lobby Day;" however, the Associated Students' Legislative Committee may want to sponsor a campus rally. Deborah Sweitzer offered to provide updated information to assist the committee in that effort. Students also indicated their intent to send group to the CAL SAC Region 3 meeting in San Francisco on May 14. Per discussion with Dr. Agrella, he will continue to make weekly contact with our local legislators on issues affecting SRJC.

Members of the committee were reminded of the Monday, May 9 Community College Lobby Day in Sacramento, and Maria Bushey, Deborah Sweitzer, Bonnie Pearson and Scott Fuller indicated their interest in participating in that effort again this year. Maria Gaitan will make arrangements for an SRJC vehicle. Meetings of the Legislative Advocacy Task Force will be held each Friday at noon until the end of the semester.

Educational Technology Master Plan

Executive Summary

Introduction

The Sonoma County Junior College District is confronted with a combination of factors that directly effect our ability to provide high quality instruction and services to our students. These factors for change are driven by external and internal forces that are reflective of our society at large. These factors can be summarized as follows:

- Changing needs, learning styles, and characteristics of our students
- Rapid changes in required employment skills
- Student enrollments and demand for our services
- Broad geographic service area with multiple sites
- Continued budgetary uncertainty and facility constraints

It is the view of the Educational Technology Committee (ETC) that educational technology, in a variety of forms, provides the District with a realistic option for the delivery of high quality instructional programs and services.

Background

In Spring of 1991, the ETC was charged by the Educational Policies Committee to "explore and develop the use of new technology for teaching and serving students". This general statement was taken as a directive to initiate the planning process with regard to educational technology. The Committee meets monthly, has conducted campus forums, developed and routed a technology "White Paper" and compiled an inventory of applications. All of this activity has been directed towards the development of a master plan for educational technology for the District.

At the heart of the master plan is the recognition that technology should enhance and facilitate student and staff involvement with the instructional programs and services. Given this general context, the master plan must address the following:

Promote equity of access to educational technology for staff and students. Access to information resources, core technologies, and appropriate support are essential for success.

Provide access to resources unrestricted by time and physical location

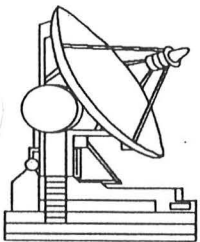
Identify District services, resources, and needs that can be distributed and accessed through technology.

Develop campus infrastructure with regard to networks, facilities, and technical requirements.

Provide financial and human resources to implement various components of the plan in a coherent and sustained manner.

Emphasize community partnerships with other segments of education and industry to ensure coordination.

Provide the structure for the ongoing coordination, evaluation and assessment of each recommendation of the plan.



These components are recognized as being essential to the success of the educational master plan. To address these issues in a concrete fashion, the master plan will contain seven specific recommendations and implementation actions to ensure the integration of educational technology at the District level.

Conclusion

The Educational Technology Committee believes that the coordinated use of educational technology will enhance student learning, contribute to the intellectual growth and productivity of our faculty, and will allow the District to effectively use its informational and human resources.

Educational technology that faculty would have access to might include a computer, videodisc player, VCR, CD ROM player, modem, camcorder, and large television. Educational resources will include access to Library databases, Internet, e.mail, voice mail, and other network services. Although specific equipment and resources have been identified, departments and individual faculty will assist in determining the appropriate choices.

As new or upgraded technologies appear, the list of appropriate educational technology may change. Full implementation will be phased in over a period of years to ensure proper coordination and review.

Re: 1994-95 Budget: "Chicano/a Awareness"

This is a proposal that the ASB set funding aside for Chicano/a Awareness events under the ASB budget. Recognized as best club for Fall and Spring of 93, M.E.Ch.A. has provides important information to the Chicano/Latino students as well as services in the community.

In the past 22 years there has always been money in the ASB Budget for Chicano Awareness activities. For the past 2 years it has been taken off because no one had asked for it. The reasons no one had asked for this money is because they did not know it was there or even available. I am asking for the funding to be put back into Chicano/a Awareness because it serves as very important way to show that the ASB supports these events and it is not only placed in the hands of the M.E.Ch.A. club to raise money for all these events that end up costing quite a bit of money.

ASB funding would be used for Cinco de Mayo, 16 de Septiembre and Dia de Los Muertos dance. (The total cost of this years Cinco de Mayo is \$850, of which we are receiving \$300 from ASB.) We are also asking the Inter-Cultural Committee for \$250, which will cover the cost of music.

M.E.Ch.A. has CO-sponsored many events including the 1993-94 field trip to San Juan Bautista performance of *El Teatro Campesino* and the Puente Banquet that is held at the end of the year. The field trip was attended by Puente, ESL, EOPS, M.E.Ch.A. and other SRJC students. (The total trip cost was \$1008, of which M.E.Ch.A. contributed \$75 and will be asked for \$200 in the 1994-95 year.) As you see the M.E.Ch.A. club has enough money going out into other projects and should not be held completely responsible for educating the students and community and this is why I bring to you this proposal.

We are requesting to have funds to be set aside for Chicano/a Awareness in the 1994-95 ASB budget. The funding allows for an increase in Chicano/a Awareness activities that can be provided to the student population as well as the community, and recognizes the ASB support for such events that serve underrepresented students. The total request is for \$750 which will provide \$250 for Cinco de Mayo, \$250 for 16 de Sept. and \$250 for Dia de Los Muertos.

The following represents a brief update of facilities projects and their status:

1. Learning Resource Center --- The initial space planning has begun. The Learning Resource Center Space Planning Specialist (Linda Demmers) was on-campus the past two days doing a preliminary assessment of space needs and meeting with various faculty and staff. She will return in early May.

The architectural responses to the Request for Proposals have been received from the seven finalists. Staff is doing a preliminary evaluation concurrent to Board Facilities Review. It is hoped that architectural services may be engaged during May in order to meet the February 1, 1995 plan submittal deadline to the State.

2. Refectory Building --- Reconstruction of the old Refectory restaurant has commenced. The anticipated construction completion date is August 15th. This facility, when complete, will serve as the home to the Campus Police and Foundation as well as provide a large meeting room.
3. Criminal Justice Training Center --- Nothing new to report on this project. The College is awaiting release of drawing money for the on/off site development portions of this project. We anticipate a July, 1998 occupancy of this site on Skylane Road (Just south of Shiloh) near the airport. This project, as well as the Petaluma Library books and barrier removal projects, depends substantially on a positive vote for Proposition 1C in the June election.
4. Petaluma Center --- This project is on-line for a October 1st construction completion date. The site development work will be completed by the end of this summer. Major concern is getting the instructional equipment budget (\$972,000) completed, reviewed and approved by the State in order to meet the January, 1995 opening date.
5. Kent Hall Remodel --- Bids have been accepted and awarded on this

project provides a cosmetic rehabilitation and creates some non accessible dorm rooms.

6. Health Sciences Facility --- Planning for this facility is contingent upon the completion of a possible sale of the Walter Eagan Center and the decision as to where to locate the new facility.
7. Baker Hall Backfill --- Academic Affairs has recommended that the space vacated by Campus Police be backfilled by Life Sciences for a lecture room and faculty offices. Jay and Curt are working on the scope of this proposal.
8. Child Development/Child Care Facility --- The College is awaiting final legislative approval this week on emergency legislation which will provide the final .06 of an acre from the Armory. This strip of land will provide the last piece required for the Children's outdoor play area. Construction is estimated to commence on June 1st and the completion is set for August, 1995.
9. Mejia Building --- The possible acquisition of this facility has been held over until the May board meeting.
10. Etc., --- The above is but a smattering of the extensive number of facilities projects under way. Additionally, we have plans for installing air conditioning in portions of Barnett Hall, replacing the Quinn Center skylight roof, planning physical education facility upgrades (including the repair of Sypher field), etc. We ask your patience and forbearance given the magnitude of activities. Sometimes I fear that it can get disruptive and annoying (not unlike when your bookmark falls out somewhere between pages 250 and 400 of a real good book).

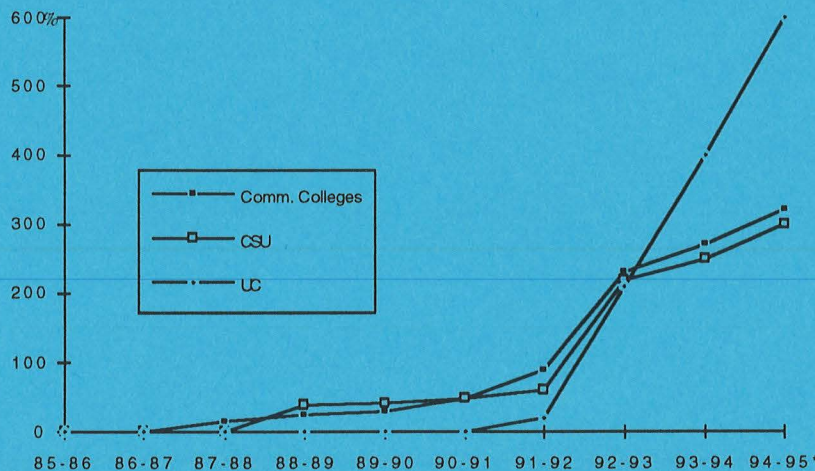

Authoring and Developing a CD-ROM Product

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INTRODUCTION

CD-ROM, or Compact Disc Read- Only Memory, is an emerging new technology that enables millions of bytes of data to be stored on a CD-Disc. CD-ROM provides numerous benefits compared with other forms of information storage and retrieval. Perhaps most significant is cost: Massive databases incorporating powerful search and retrieval software can be replicated and distributed for a fraction of the cost of other types of storage media; making CD-ROM a very cost effective method of distributing large amounts of information. (Sherman xxi)

The primary benefit of CD-ROMs is their storage capacity; each disk holds up to 650 megabytes of data. This is equivalent to 680 million characters, or roughly 380,000 pages of text.

The purpose of this document is to provide an information and resource guide. I will describe how you can develop a CD-ROM product. This guide is intended to take you through an overview of the CD-ROM publishing process. The electronic format of this document, on SOLO, will be updated on a monthly basis.

AUTHORING AND DEVELOPING A CD-ROM PRODUCT

Planning

It is worthwhile to do some serious upfront planning with a CD-ROM publishing project. Allocating time and money in the beginning of a project for planning is always helpful and can save thousands of dollars over the course of a CD-ROM project. The following guidelines are provided as a stimulus list to assist in the upfront planning stages of a CD-ROM project or to act as signposts along the way to finishing a project. These guideposts are just that, only guidelines. Once you have a good understanding of the basic issues, you'll be able to take that knowledge and apply it appropriately to your own CD-ROM project.

Overview

Following are steps to convert an existing product to CD-ROM:

1. Choose CD-ROM authoring software
2. Choose mastering hardware and software (Optional)
3. Design product
4. Convert printed documentation text to electronic text with markup as needed for chosen authoring system
5. Scan images in documentation
6. Design CD-ROM artwork and create film positives
7. Index electronic version of document
8. Test with retrieval software, making desired changes
9. Write and print CD-ROM user manual
10. Master software and documentation and simulate performance
11. Produce writable "One-Off" CD-Rs for final testing

- 12.Subcontract mastering and replication of CD-ROMs
- 13.Receive CD-ROM replicates and begin distribution
(Guzzetti 2)

STANDARD CD-ROM FILE FORMATS

*ISO-9660

CD-ROM text and images may be in any file format recognized by the application retrieval software.ISO-9660 is a widely used file format for CD-ROM.The ISO-9660 standard defines a directory structure which has been accepted by the International Standards Organization.This standard,supported by Microsoft in the MS\DOS Extensions,allows ISO-9660 formatted CD-ROMs to be read like a DOS write protected hard disk.Formatting a CD-ROM to this standard will allow CD-ROM interchange on any platform that supports the ISO-9660 standard.

*Apple HFS (Hierarchical File Systems)

This format is unique to Apple Macintosh computer systems.A disk using this format will look and behave like a Macintosh hard drive (other than being read only and slower).The disadvantage of this format is that the disks are readable only by Macintosh computer systems.A CD-ROM using the HFS format can contain all the features of the Macintosh interface:

- Full 31 character file names and custom icons,
- Aliasing using System 7.x,
- Comments and labels attached to files,
- No limit on depth of folders.

*Hybrid Formats(Cross Platform)

-Dual Partition

This consists of creating both an ISO-9660 and a HFS disk image,merging them into a disk that looks like an HFS disk on the Mac and a DOS disk on DOS machines.

(Disk Manufacturing 3)

DATA CONVERSION

Data conversion is the first step toward publishing on CD-ROM. Although it is tempting to use existing electronic files,this doesn't always turn out to be the best solution. Some text files contain embedded typesetting codes that are difficult to remove.Other text files don't reflect final changes made after "blue-line"proofs where a quick cut and a paste often seems to be a faster solution than going back to the original source file.In many cases, the text files are created by many authors.There is no single,consistent, electronic file.The cost and time to write custom programs to conform the text files can be expensive(See Adobe Acrobat)

Another option is to use OCR(Optical Character Recognition) The feasibility of using OCR for data conversions depends primarily on the suitability of the source materials and the amount of reliability needed.The particular type Ont-page type font changes,inclusion of tabular materials,and number of different type sizes can all "fool"the OCR software and

can potentially lead to many errors. Typically, OCR, with corrections, provides between 95%-99% accuracy. This sounds acceptable until you consider what this means per page. A typical page has about 2,000 characters. This means 20 errors per page. At the 95% level of accuracy, there would be an average of 100 errors per page.

Another option is to keyboard all the text. A high accuracy level of 99.975% is achieved through double keying. Even at that highly accurate rate there can be 2.5 errors for 10,000 characters, or about one error every two pages. Compare this to the 100 errors per page that OCR often yields and it is an easy choice to keyboard the text. (Guzzetti 3)

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Many CD producers convert to (SGML) Standard Generalized Mark-Up Language at the time of keyboarding the text. With development support from the American Association of Publishers, SGML is a language for marking text for a variety of purposes, including typesetting and CD disk publishing. A well designed SGML scheme would enable the publisher to mark text just once for multiple uses. Since typesetting requires more codes than disk publishing, the procedure of moving SGML-marked text to disk usually involves suppressing or modifying some of the codes. SGML significantly increases the cost of conversion (doubling to tripling the cost depending on the complexity of the markup) and is frequently not the best choice for a CD publisher's goal.

Each CD-ROM project will inevitably have differences. The requirements for data conversion and preparation for one project will often be different from another. (Guzzetti 4)

FULL-TEXT INDEXED RETRIEVAL SOFTWARE

Full-text software generally consists of two portions. The first the user invokes is the inverter, which creates the index: then a retrieval engine is used to search for data.

The Index

To find information in a document we could use a program that starts at the beginning of the document and searches through the document, looking for the words of interest. This approach is easy to implement and fast for small documents, but for very large documents or databases of hundreds of documents, it is cumbersome. What is needed is the equivalent of a card catalog that can quickly indicate the location of desired information. This information is contained in the index and not all indexes contain the same information. One might indicate the equivalent of a Dewey Decimal System number, while another might indicate a bookshelf number. (Sherman 303-307)

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The Retrieval Engine

Once the index has been created, the user can invoke the retrieval engine to locate information. Retrieval engines allow the user to access the document in several ways. Public Domain Software

Full-text software and reader licenses (royalties) are expensive, (\$3000-\$10,000) and can be cost prohibitive for the aspiring electronic publisher. Several programs are available from U.S. government agencies for nominal fees. However, they do not offer many of the fulltext features, but they serve the purposes of the low budget start-up operation.

CD-R ONE OFF DESKTOP PRODUCTION

Desktop CD-Recordable technology is bringing electronic publishing to the masses. But don't be fooled by the overselling of CD-R and all the "roll your own" articles and advertising. CD-ROM production is a major publishing effort. It is not a one person effort or an overnight project. A CD-R recorder, simply put, is a tool that expands the CD producers testing options by allowing the producer to view and test the CD product in an ISO-9660 format prior to sending the finished product to a replication plant. CD-R disks should not be confused with CD Glass Masters. The mastering process is still required for mass replication. (Hudson 66)

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Functionally, CD-R and CD-ROM disks are identical. Slip a CD-R disk into a CD-ROM drive and the drive will treat it like a CD-ROM. The cost of CD-R publishing overlaps with the cost of traditional replication at somewhere between 40 and 100 copies of a single pre-mastered disk. CD-R is economical for distributing data to a limited number of users. Applications include distribution of corporate databases to branch offices, limited runs of a multimedia or information product for test marketing and a less widely used but up-and-coming application of CD-R is archiving.

Only 7,500 CD-R drives were sold in the United States in 1993, according to Freeman Associates (Santa Barbara, CA.) and the infancy of the market shows. Painful installations, wide variations in interface design, and moderately buggy software are

just a few of the problems that are cited in recent reviews of CD-R hardware by Byte and PC Magazines.

Falling prices, combined with the present bugs in CD-R. Make a wait and see attitude, a prudent choice for 1994.

REPLICATION GUIDE

*Data Formats

There are two methods of sending data to a replication plant. The first is to send data as a CD-image ready for mastering. This would normally be an image file on CD-R (also referred to as CD-WO one-offs).

*Non-Image Format

If you are unable to create a CD-image, replication plants will accept your non-image format materials. These materials can be anything from back-ups on a hard drive to compressed files on floppies. These non-image materials require formatting and media conversion to put them into the correct CD-image and input media format. Replication plants perform this service based on an hourly charge. 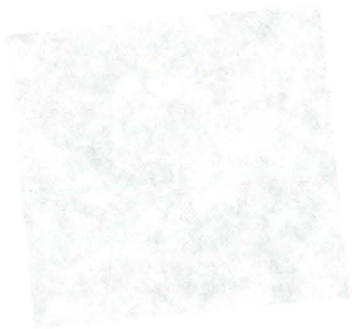
